

Report of the Governing Council of NCUI

Dear Fellow Cooperators,

n behalf of the Governing Council of National Cooperative Union of India, I have the pleasure in placing before you the Annual Report of NCUI for the year 2020-21.

During the year under review, the NCUI continued to function as nodal agency of the Indian Cooperative Movement. Its main objectives are to educate, guide and assist its member organizations in strengthening the cooperative sector. A brief report relating to various aspects of cooperative development during 2020-21 is as under:

Membership

At the close of the year, there were 272 cooperative organizations representing various sectors of the cooperative movement as members of NCUI. In the year 2020-21, 4 new members have been enrolled.

Meetings of the Governing Council

During the year, six meetings of the Governing Council were held. No meeting of the Executive Committee was held due to Covid Pandemic. Matters relating to administrative and financial management of NCUI, and various issues confronting the cooperative sector to make it strong and vibrant were discussed in the meetings. The election of the Members of Governing Council was held on 23-11-2020 in which 19 members were elected to the Governing Council for a term of 5 years whereas one seat was kept vacant in views of non-receipt of valid nomination under the said constituency. Consequently the Governing Council elected Shri Dileep Sanghani as President and Dr. Bijender Singh and Shri Shivadasan Nair as Vice President of NCUI. During the year under report, Shri N. Satya Narayana was holding the charge of Chief Executive, NCUI up to 28th February, 2021. On 1st March, 2021, Dr. Sudhir Mahajan, IAS (Retd.) took charge as Chief Executive, NCUI who was selected and appointed by the Governing Council.

Cooperative Education

The National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE), New Delhi organised 111 training programmes during the year. All the important and emerging sectors/areas like skill development, women, dairy, consumers, digital technologies, etc. were covered in the training programmes. 4313 persons from various sectors of the cooperative movement in different states, were trained. The syllabus of Diploma Programme on Cooperative Education and Development was upgraded and more paid programmes were organised during the year. Emphasis was placed on organising training programmes for strengthening relatively weaker sectors like labour, fishery, tribal cooperatives, handloom Report of the Governing Council of

NCUI and handicrafts etc. Due to the important role played by women in the development of cooperatives, several programmes were organised exclusively for women participants.

Cooperative Education Field Projects

During the Year 2020-21, the NCUI Cooperative Education Field Projects including North-East and Women Projects conducted wide ranging programmes on various issues of cooperative development. During the year under report, 240 SHGs with membership of 2048 women were formed by the Lady Mobilisers of Cooperative Education Field Projects and total of 3575 SHGs with membership of 32784 have been formed since inception till date. During the year Rs. 22,17,01,549/- was disbursed as loan to members of SHGs for taking up income generation activities. 70 cooperative societies have been registered under various State Cooperative Societies Acts out of the members of SHGs organised by NCUI Cooperative Education Field Projects.

General Cooperative Policies

A Zonal Conference was organised for North East States on 28th October, 2020 in which several important leaders and officials of North Eastern States participated. The conference was inaugurated by NCUI President Dr. Chandra Pal Singh Yadav. The conference came up with wideranging recommendations for strengthening the cooperative movement in the region. Academic assistance to the member institutions was provided as and when needed.

Public Relations and Publications

The 67th All India Cooperative Week was organised from 14th to 20th November, 2020. The theme of the Cooperative Week was Covid Pandemic — Atmanirbhar Bharat — Cooperatives. The inaugural function of the Cooperative Week was held through a webinar organised by NCUI in which Chief Guest was Shri Kadakampally Surendran, Hon'ble Chief Minister of Kerala. The Valedictory Function of the Cooperative Week was organised on 19th November, 2020 in which the Chief Guest was Shri Santosh Kumar Gangwar, Hon'ble Union Minister of State for Labour and Employment, Govt. of India. A special issue of "The Cooperator" was released on the occasion. 21st Vaikunath Bhai Mehta Memorial Lecture of Late Vaikunth Bhai Mehta, a well known cooperative leader, was organised on 19th August, 2020, which was delivered by Shri Govinda Rajulu Chintala, Chairman, NABARD.

International Relations

A webinar was organised on the International Day of Cooperatives 4th July, 2020 by NCUI in collaboration with ICA-AP on the theme of IDC, "Cooperatives for Climate Action" in which Shri Suresh Prabhu, India's Sherpa to G20/G7 was the Chief Guest. An international online training programme on "Training Techniques for Trainers of Rural Financing Institutions" was organised by NCUI in collaboration with CICTAB from 27th to 30th January, 2021, which was attended by 50 participants. An international online training programme on "Project Approach to Cooperative

Development: Sharing Experiences on NCUI Coop Education Field Project" was organised for first time by CICTAB and NCUI from 24th to 27th November, 2020.

Our sincere thanks and gratitude to the Hon'ble Minister of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Minister of State for Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare, officials of the Department of Agriculture and Cooperation for their cooperation and the support given by them, both in the form of Grants and otherwise. MANAGEMENT

Management Organs of National Cooperative Union of India

The following three organs carry out the management of National Cooperative Union of India:

- General Body, which comprises of delegates of member institutions of NCUI.
- Governing Council which comprises of office bearers, elected and co-opted members.
- Executive Committee, which is a subcommittee of the Governing Council of NCUI.

GENERAL BODY

As per the provision of the Multi-State

Cooperative Societies Act 2002 and bye-laws of NCUI, the General Body of NCUI comprises of one delegate from each member institution. The Annual General Body Meeting of NCUI for the year 2019-2020 was held on 23rd November, 2020 in the Auditorium of National Cooperative Union of India. The General Body deliberated on various issues concerning the cooperative movement in the country.

In the above meeting the election of the members of the Governing Council and office bearers of NCUI was also conducted as the term of the present Governing Council had expired in March 2020. The term of the previous Governing Council expired on 15th March 2020, but due to arbitration proceedings it could not be held on the due date, hence the existing Governing Council continued to hold the office till assuming the charge of office by the newly elected Governing Council as per provisions laid down in the MSCS Act, 2002. Finally, after withdrawal of the petition by the petitioner, the present claim petition was dismissed as withdrawn, and hence arbitration proceedings stood terminated by the order dated 12.06.2020 of the Sole Arbitrator. Accordingly the election took place on 23.11.2020 in which 19 members were elected to the Governing Council for a term of five years whereas one seat was kept vacant in view of non receipt of valid nomination under the said constituency. Consequently the Governing Council elected

Shri Dileep Sanghani as President and Dr. Bijender Singh and Shri K. Shivadasan Nair as Vice-President of NCUI.

GOVERNING COUNCIL

During the year under review, six meetings of the Governing Council were convened on 30.04.2020, 14.07.2020. 16.09.2020, 23.11.2020, 19.01.2021 and 24.02.2021. The Governing Council in its meetings dealt with various matters placed before it in accordance with the bye-laws of NCUI for its smooth functioning. The Governing Council took various decisions for the growth of NCUI as well as for development of the cooperative movement by undertaking such activities which are in accordance with the attainment of the objectives of NCUI.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

During the year under review, no meeting of the Executive Committee of NCUI took place due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

ADMINISTRATION

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION FIELD PROJECTS IN UNDER DEVELOPED STATES / AREAS OF THE DEVELOPED STATES OTHER THAN NORTH EASTERN STATES & WOMEN PROJECTS

Introduction

As a special measure for strengthening the cooperative movement in cooperatively underdeveloped states / areas and reducing regional imbalance in the level of development, the Government of India approved a scheme of Cooperative Education of NCUI in 1976. This is a central sector scheme funded by the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare.

Objective

The main objective of the scheme is to develop and promote cooperative societies in project areas and through them to increase the productivity of farmer members and thus improve their socio – economic condition.

Approach

Intensive efforts for cooperative development through cooperative education combined with farm / technical guidance are the main ingredients of the project approach. The office-bearers and members of the project adopted societies are motivated and educated to implement the business development plans through their active participation in planning of business activities, operational management and evaluation. Self-help groups are formed by the project personnel to facilitate disbursal of micro - credit and initiating sustainable income - generating activities. Formation and working of these groups is based on cooperative culture. All educational, farm guidance and developmental activities are linked with business development plans of PACS / LAMPS adopted by projects for their overall development.

• NCUI is implementing central sector scheme for the intensification of Cooperative Education through 41 Cooperative Education Field Projects including Women Projects and North Eastern Projects located in cooperatively under developed states / under developed areas of developed states and union territories as detailed given below:

- Women development activities: Aiming at involvement of women in cooperatives as well as promoting the women cooperatives exclusively and through them raising their socio – economic conditions.

Number of Beneficiaries

Through various income generating activities, 6642 women have benefited under this programme.

◆ Average income

On an average, each woman beneficiary was able to earn about Rs. 24273/- per month.

◆ Women Educated

During the year a total of 51720 women were imparted education under various educational activities as shown at Annexure-I.

◆ Loan distributed

During the year Rs. 22,17,01,549/- was disbursed as loan to members of self help groups for taking up income generating activities.

♦ Self Help Groups converted into cooperatives

70 cooperative societies have been registered under various State Cooperative Societies Act out of the members of self-help groups organized by NCUI Cooperative Education Field Projects.

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION FIELD PROJECTS IN UNDER DEVELOPED STATES/AREAS OF THE DEVELOPED STATES OF NORTH EAST

Introduction

As a special measure for strengthening the cooperative movement in North East and reducing regional imbalances, the Government of India has been giving grants to NCUI under Central Sector Scheme to operate 6 Cooperative Education Field Projects in the North East Region which cover the under-developed areas of the region.

50% of the expenditure incurred on these projects is met through the grants received from the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare and the balance 50% is met through the funds collected from the cooperative movement in the form of Cooperative Education Fund.

Objective

The main objective of the scheme is to develop and promote cooperative societies in the project areas, to increase the productivity of farmer members, to inculcate the habit of thrift amongst the women members, and to develop skills of the women and youth members thus improving their socio-economic conditions. Each project is given activity-wise targets to be achieved over the course of entire year.

Project Activities

The project activities as earlier mentioned are as follows :

- Educational and Training activities
- Farm / technical guidance activities
- Socio-developmental activities
- Women development activities

Progress

During 2020-2021 all the six projects achieved the set targets and objectives as per the overall guidelines. A total of 22477 participants were trained.

GENERAL COOPERATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAMMES/SCHEMES CONDUCTED BY STATE COOPERATIVE UNIONS

Monitoring and Guidance of the Programmes of State Cooperative Unions

In furtherance of its objectives to promote and develop the cooperative movement in India in accordance with cooperative principles, NCUI monitors cooperative education programmes to popularize the principles and practices of cooperation. The overall objective of the cooperative education programme is to create enlightened,

participatory and responsive membership and cooperative leadership; to improve the management efficiency of board members and office bearers of cooperative societies; to provide and develop dynamic and forward looking leadership and to create cooperative awareness among masses particularly youth and women. Presently, three types of Cooperative Education Programmes are being conducted in the country – (1) General cooperative education programme for agriculture cooperatives implemented by State Cooperative Unions; (2) Sector specific cooperative education programmes covering dairy, fishery, women, urban credit, consumer, housing, industrial, handicrafts, forest, and labour contract construction, marketing cooperatives etc. (3) Special cooperative education projects based on area development approach.

General Cooperative Education Programme

The target group of this programme consists of members and managing committee members of primary agriculture cooperative societies and selfhelp groups wherever they are developed by the concerned state cooperative union at village level. The programme is implemented by state cooperative unions through the adoption of two types of approaches namely; peripatetic approach and intensive approach (cooperative education and development scheme). Under the peripatetic approach, education activities are organised at society level through cooperative education instructors and under intensive approach the cooperative societies in selected blocks and districts are adopted for overall development of cooperatives and the cooperative education of members. The education programme is dovetailed with the developmental activities in the area. Under this approach, a team of educational personnel is deployed to organize the education programme on an intensive basis in an identified area. During the year under report, NCUI continued to monitor the State Cooperative Unions for effectively conducting all programmes. The states implemented cooperative education programmes with peripatetic approach.

Activities covered under Cooperative Education Programme

1. Educational Activities

Under the Cooperative Education Programme the following main educational and developmental

activities are included:

- (i) Orientation course / classes for secretaries/ managers of PACS - 2 weeks
- (ii) Managing committee members class 5 days
- (iii) Ordinary members and potential members class 3 days
- (iv) Leadership development programmes 3 days
- 2. The activities of the CEDS aim at assisting local societies in :
- (i) Increasing membership.
- (ii) Convening meeting of managing committee and general body regularly with high attendance and securing active participation of members.
- (iii) Providing credit and other inputs required on the basis of real planning of crops and preparing societies to enable them to fulfill the members' needs.
- (iv) Promoting repayment of loan in time out of marketing of sale proceeds through cooperatives / cooperative efforts.
- (v) Enabling societies to move towards selfreliance, assisting them in preparing long term plans of mobilizing deposits and ensuring regular collection of deposits out of sale proceeds of crops.
- (vi) Developing farm /dairy/ poultry/ horticulture etc. guidance services on their own in due course.
- (vii) Diversifying the activities.
- (viii) Utilizing Secretary / Managers and managing committee members for local education work.
- (ix) Undertaking family welfare education activities.

Progress

During the year 2020-21, a total of 2938 training programmes were conducted. In the programmes, 69219 persons were educated / trained including 26588 SC/ST participants and 27277 women participants.

Sector Specific Cooperative Education

Many of the state cooperative unions have diversified their education programmes and organised

cooperative education programmes for other sectoral cooperatives. These programmes were conducted for many sectors i.e. dairy, urban credit, fishery, industrial / weavers, marketing, labour contract and forest labour cooperatives, cooperative law etc. in the rural as well as urban areas in the country.

Cooperative Education Programme for SC/ST and other Backward Classes

Some of the state cooperative unions like Himachal Pradesh and Kerala implemented special education programme for SC/ST's in selected area of the states. Additionally some states organized classes/courses for SC/ST and backward community members / potential members as a part of the on going cooperative education programme. During the reporting year 2020-21, a total of 26586 SC/ST persons and 27277 women were trained.

Cooperative Education Programme for Educationally Backward Minority Communities (15 Point Welfare Programme)

In response to the Government of India's 15 Point Welfare Programme for minority communities in the 40 identified districts, consistent efforts were made to cover minority communities under the on going cooperative education programme. The programme is being implemented through state cooperative unions and cooperative education field projects / units. The benefits of cooperative education programme are provided to the minority communities.

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAMME FOR WOMEN AND YOUTH THROUGH STATE COOPERATIVE UNIONS

Women Empowerment

The cooperative education programmes for women are being implemented through the state cooperative unions in the states of Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Delhi, Gujarat, Himachal Pradesh, Kerala, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Mizoram, Orissa, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal. Cooperative education programmes/classes under this programme are being conducted by the lady cooperative education instructors in rural as well as in urban areas. The duration of these programmes vary from 1 to 7 days which covers classes/ meetings for ordinary and potential women members of cooperative societies, managing committee members, office bearers and employees of women cooperatives etc.

Progress

During the year, April 2020 to March 2021, a total of 873 events were organized and as many as 21680 women were imparted knowledge on varied subject in the various classes. The details of progress are mentioned below:

GENERAL COOPERATIVE POLICIES

One of the notable activities of NCUI is to formulate policies and programmes which not only highlight the achievements of cooperatives but also set the directions for future growth of the cooperative movement in India. Another objective is to organize national/state level seminars/workshops on important policy issues related to cooperatives.

Webinar on Cooperative Development for Northeast States

National Cooperative Union of India organized a significant webinar on Cooperative Development for Northeast States on October 28, 2020 in which several important leaders and officials of the North-Eastern states participated

The objective of the webinar was to assess the problems and challenges confronting the cooperative movement of North Eastern Region and to formulate a strategy for strengthening the cooperative movement in the region.

The webinar was attended by Chairmen and Managing Directors of national/state/district level cooperative organisations, Governing Council Members of NCUI, Chairmen of PCC, NCUI Cooperative Education Field Projects, Registrars and other officials of cooperative societies, representatives from various regional cooperative institutions and eminent cooperators etc. of North East States.

Dr. Chandra Pal Singh Yadav, President, NCUI and MP (Rajya Sabha) inaugurated the webinar and addressed the delegates of the webinar. The main speakers included Ms. Valentina Arambam, IAS, Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Manipur and N. S. Wahlang, Deputy Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Meghalaya.

Services provided to Cooperative Societies—Several cooperative institutions approached NCUI regarding the issues faced by them. NCUI examined the issues in detail and extended all possible support to them in solving their problem.

17th Indian Cooperative Congress

Preparatory work for organizing the 17th Indian Cooperative Congress was initiated quite some time back. Unfortunately the 17th Indian Cooperative Congress could not be organised due to COVID-19 pandemic. Compilation of action taken on the recommendations of 16th Indian Cooperative Congress by various organization was undertaken.

Ch. Brahm Prakash Research Scholarship

The objective of Ch. Brahm Prakash Research Scholarship is to encourage youth participation in cooperatives by giving scholarships for research in cooperative development. The division proposed reconstitution of Ch. Brahm Prakash Research Scholarship committee.



INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

In accordance with the need to adopt IT in education and training, NCUI is emphasizing on conducting member education programmes through online courses throughout the country. Based on response received from various quarters, NCUI intends to conduct more such programmes in future. Considering the importance of the IT Sector, NCUI in recent times has made considerable efforts to strengthen its working by adopting new technologies.

Usage of IT in NCUI

- Most of the computer systems are up-to-date in terms of hardware i.e. i3 or higher and operating systems as well (windows 8.0 or higher)
- Installed Sophos firewall. A firewall is a network security device that monitors incoming and outgoing network traffic and decides whether to allow or block specific traffic based on a defined set of security rules. Firewalls have been deployed as a first line of defense in network security.
- Licensed enterprise antivirus is installed in all computers and laptops for regular monitoring of threats.
- Official website of NCUI (ncui.coop) and official social media platforms (twitter, facebook, instagram and youtube) are properly up-to-date.
- NCUI's website is managed on a regular basis.
 There is uploading and removal of contents received from various divisions from time to time.
- Managing ncui.coop and india.coop domains on a regular basis.
- Monitoring C-panel of all official email ids.

- Monitoring C-panel of NCUI website.
- Troubleshooting of all hardware and software related complaints received from various divisions from time to time.
- IT Division provides the backend support and conducts all online training programs/webinars conducted by NCUI/NCCE.
- Uploading of data/information is done regularly on NCUI website.

Social Media interface of NCUI

The division regularly updates the information of programmes/events organised by various divisions of NCUI on social media interfaces such as Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and Youtube, the details of which are as under:

PUBLIC RELATIONS

During the year 2020-21, various activities were organized to strengthen the image-building of the organisation and also establish strong liaison with the print and electronic media.

Webinar on Role of Cooperatives during Covid Crisis

The Division took a timely initiative during the lockdown when the Covid pandemic was at its peak by organizing this webinar on 16th April, 2020. The key Guests during this webinar were- Mr. K.C. Supekar, Managing Director, National Cooperative Dairy Federation of India, Shri BK Mishra, MD, FISHCOPFED, Shri Mukesh Kumar, MD, Kendriya Bhandar, and T.K. Kishore, Programme Director, Uralungul Labour Contract Cooperative Society. The Resource Persons shared their experiences and challenges during the corona pandemic. Around 100 representatives from cooperatives and other organisations including officials of NCUI participated in the webinar.

2. Video Message of NCUI President

Considering the importance of social media for wider dissemination, a video message of erstwhile NCUI President, Dr. Chandra Pal Singh Yadav was drafted for Facebook Live which went live in the month of May, 2020

3. Covid Guidelines for State Cooperative Unions

Considering the need for NCUI, being an apex organization of the cooperative movement, to formulate Covid Guidelines for State Cooperative Unions, these Guidelines were prepared in the month of May, 2020 and sent to all the state cooperative unions. These guidelines laid emphasis on following covid protocols and organizing online training programmes.

4. Webinar on 'Importance of Cooperatives as Business Model for Youth

Considering the need for creating awareness amongst youth for cooperatives as a career option, a Webinar was organised on the topic 'Importance of Cooperatives As Business Model for Youth' on 22nd May, 2020 in which Dr. Yashwant Dongre, Formerly Professor and Dean, Mysore University and currently Co-Secretary of ICA-AP Committee on Cooperatives in Educational Institutions was the Guest Speaker. Around 100 young students from schools, colleges and universities participated in the webinar, which saw unending questions from the participants regarding future career prospects in cooperatives, and ways to set up cooperative enterprises.

Nomenclature Meeting of MDs/Senior Officers of National level Federation for Cooperative Week Celebrations

A Nomenclature Meeting of MDs/senior officers of Delhi based national / level cooperative federations was organised on 20th July, 2020 through a webinar due to Covid restrictions. In consultation with the MDs/key representatives of national level federations, the theme of the Cooperative Week Celebrations, 67th in series, was decided as "Covid Pandemic — Atmanirbhar Bharat — Cooperatives".

6. 21st Vaikunth Bhai Mehta Memorial Lecture

21st Vaikunth Bhai Mehta Memorial Lecture in memory of Late Vaikunth Bhai Mehta, a well-known cooperative leader was organized on 19th August, 2020. The Lecture was delivered by Shri Govinda Rajulu Chintala, Chairman, NABARD on the topic 'Revival of Cooperative Structure with Technology and New Business Plan'. The webinar which saw participation of around 300 people included high dignitaries like Chairmen/MDs of national level state federations, state cooperative unions, state cooperative banks, district central cooperative banks, officials of cooperative organisations, trainers/researchers, etc.

7. 67th All India Cooperative Week

- The 67th All India Cooperative Week was organised all over the country from 14th to 20th November, 2019. The theme of the Cooperative Week was "Covid Pandemic — Atmanirbhar Bharat — Cooperatives". The inaugural function of the Cooperative week celebrations was held through a webinar organised by NCUI on 14th November, 2019. The Chief Guest on this occasion was Shri Kadakampally Surendran, Hon'ble Cooperative Minister of Kerala. The other distinguished persons as Guests of Honour were- Mr. Balu Iyer, Regional Director, ICA-AP, Shri Satish Marathe, Central Board Director, RBI, Shri R. S. Sodhi, MD, AMUL, Prof. K. G. Suresh, Vice-Chancellor, MLNUJC, Bhopal, Shri Hitesh Bhatt, Director, IRMA. Participants numbering around 250 people comprising of Chairmen/MDs of national level and state federations, cooperative officials from various organisations and others attended the inaugural function.
- The valedictory function of the 67th All India Cooperative Week was organised on 19th November, 2020 at the Auditorium building of NCUI premises in which the Chief Guest was Shri Santosh Gangwar, Hon'ble Union Minister of State for Labour and Employment, Govt. of India. Amin, former Vice-President of NCUL A special issue of the NCUI Journal "The Cooperator", which carried articles from eminent dignitaries including Chairmen/MDs of national/state level cooperative federations, besides the messages received from President, PM, Cabinet/State Ministers, / Chief Ministers, of States, etc. was released on the occasion. A message of NCUI President in English and Hindi on the occasion of Cooperative Week was prepared, and distributed to the national level federations/state cooperative unions and other cooperative organizations. The message was uploaded on the NCUI website, and it was also published in the special issue of 'The Cooperator' released on the occasion of Cooperative Week celebrations.
- An attractive digital poster was designed on

- the theme of Cooperative Week celebrations 'Covid Pandemic Atmanirbhar Bharat Cooperatives'. The designed poster sample was sent to State Cooperative Unions, Registrars of Cooperative Societies. Institutes of Cooperative Management etc. The Poster design drew wide appreciation from all quarters.
- The division handled the work of Preparation of Guidelines of 64th All India Cooperative Week Celebration. The write-up inputs based on the themes of each day of Coop Week celebrations received from officials of NCUI were fine-tuned and edited, and the compilation in pdf format was sent to all the national level federations and state cooperative unions so that they could initiate the preparations for Cooperative Week celebrations at their end. This was also uploaded on the NCUI website.

7. NCUI collaboration with FICCI Global Youth Entrepreneurship and Industry Connect and SEWA

NCUI's collaboration was forged with FICCI Global Youth Entrepreneurship and Industry Connect programme for which reputed institutions like Shri Ram College of Commerce, Indian Institute of Management, Bangalore, etc. were the key partners for a digital entrepreneurial programme in which successful entrepreneurs from various fields shared their stories. The programme ran on a weekly basis from August, 2020 and was concluded on 25th December, 2020. With NCUI's efforts, stories of cooperative entrepreneurship like AMUI, Go-Coop, etc. were highlighted in this programme. A collaborative Seminar was organised by SEWA in collaboration with NCUI on 'Atmanirbhar Bharat: Lessons from Women Coops' on 4th November, 2020 in which CE, NCUI presented his paper.

8. Mentorship for ICA-AP COOPATHON virtual event from 11-14 December, 2020

During ICA-AP COOPATHON virtual event from 11-14 December, 2020 to promote youth entrepreneurship in Asia-Pacific region based on technology diffusion, the Division (Dy. Director (Pub/PR) provided mentorship support to an Indian team MECOON which was awarded second prize in the event.

"The Cooperator" —Monthly Journal

"The Cooperator" is a monthly Journal of NCUI. It has both English and Hindi sections and provides a regular communication channel to the cooperative fraternity including cooperative institutions. Despite the Covid pandemic which started from end of March, 2020, and disruption in publication services of 'The Cooperator' from April, 2020, in a major initiative, the division decided to prepare an online edition of 'The Cooperator' as a compilation of topical articles from Chairmen/MDs of national federations, experts, academicians, etc. on the vital subject of impact of Covid pandemic on cooperatives. There was a heartening response to this, and an e-edition of 'The Cooperator' comprising of topical articles/papers was released in July, 2020 and uploaded on the website/social media, and through mass e-mailing services, it was sent to all the subscribers and other cooperative institutions.. Because of disruption in publication services everywhere, and starting of postal services after some time, this e-edition of 'The Cooperator' could be printed only in the month of September, 2020, as a combined edition of all the issues from April till August, 2020. Henceforth, the regular services in printing of 'The Cooperator' from September, 2020 continued.

Special Issue

During the year, the division published a Special Issue of 'The Cooperator' in the month of November 2020 on the occasion of the 67th All India Cooperative Week. The main theme of the journal was based on the Cooperative Week Theme, "Covid Pandemic — Atmanirbhar Bharat — Cooperatives". A good number

of articles were obtained from the Chairmen/MDs of national level cooperative organisations, besides other experts.

Indian Cooperative Review

This is a quarterly research journal of NCUI. The issues for the months of April, July, October 2020, and January, 2020 were printed despite disruption caused due to the Covid pandemic, and due to this, there was some delay in posting the journal to the subscribers. Dr. U S Awasthi, Managing Director, IFFCO was the Key-note speaker. Shri Satish Marathe, Central Board of Director of the Reserve Bank of India, Mr. Tomio Shichiri, Country Director of FAO, India and Mr. Balu Iyer, Regional Director, ICA-AP were the distinguished Speakers. A video message on IDC 2020 of Dr. Chandra Pal Singh Yadav, President, NCUI was released on the occasion. More than 400 participants attended the Webinar including senior co-operators. Governing Council members of NCUI, key representatives of cooperatives and other organizations.


Detailed guidelines pertaining to 'Cooperatives for Climate Action', the theme of IDC, along with recommendations of NCUI webinar on this theme, were prepared in both English and Hindi. Both the versions were circulated to Registrar of Cooperative Societies, all Member Institutions of NCUI, all ICMs/RICMs & Cooperative Education Field Projects located in different parts of the country.

International Online Training Programme of CICTAB for members of SAARC countries

An International Online Training Programme on

"Training Technique for Trainers of Co-operative and Rural Financing Institutions" was organized by National Cooperative Union of India in collaboration with Centre for International Cooperation in Training and Agricultural Banking (CICTAB) from 27th to 30th January 2021. As many as 50 participants from Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Nepal and India representing Central Bank of Bangladesh and Cooperative Bank of Bangladesh, National Cooperative Federation of Nepal and Nepal Agricultural Cooperative Central Federation, National Cooperative Council of Sri Lanka and Sanasa Union, Training Institutes of Karnataka and Telegana Federation, A&N Islands NCCT and NCUI Field Projects joined the programme. The four days training programme was inaugurated by Shri Dileep Sanghani, President NCUI in presence of Ms. Chitra Kumari, Chief Executive Officer, Nepal Cooperative Federation, Dr. Asanka Tilakratna, Chief Executive, National Cooperative Council of Sri Lanka, Shri N. Satyanarayana, Chief Executive NCUI Dr. K.K. Tripathi, Director, VAMINICOM, Dr. K.N. Sinha, Executive Director, Shri Ritesh Dev. Director and officers/ staff of International Division of NCUI. The nominated participant of NCUI from SEWA Bharat, Bihar was provided necessary guidance from time to time.

Member Services

The International Relations Division has been regularly attending to the requirements of all member organisations of NCUI and its affiliates by providing them with up-to-date information. All the circulars regarding various programmes were timely updated on NCUI web-site and circulated to all the members. Also, nominations for international courses received from the member organisations were processed, and in case of selection, all necessary support was extended. All necessary assistance was also provided to the representatives of the member organizations for participation in the international programmes/events.

BRIEF REPORTS OF NATIONAL LEVEL COOPERATIVE ORGANISATIONS

INDIAN FARMERS FERTILISER COOPERATIVE LTD. (IFFCO)

Brief Report on the Activities of IFFCO during 2020-21

Indian Farmers Fertiliser Cooperative Limited (IFFCO) is a national level multi state cooperative society incorporated on 3rd November, 1967. IFFCO is the largest fertiliser cooperative engaged in manufacturing and marketing of fertilizer products.

In the year 2020-21, the society has continued its excellent performance in a year affected by global pandemic caused by COVID-19 and unprecedented economic challenges. IFFCO recorded its highest ever sales of fertilisers at 136.58 lakh MT and profit before Tax at Rs. 2,369.78 crore. The paid up share capital of the society stood at Rs. 627.01 crore as on March 31, 2021. The total number of member shareholders (cooperative societies) of the society as of March 31, 2021 was 35,343.

In line with the vision of our Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi Ji of doubling farmers' income by 2022, IFFCO developed nanotechnology based nano urea (liquid) fertiliser to address the imbalanced and excessive use of conventional urea. This nanofertiliser has been developed indigenously, for the first time in the world at IFFCO-Nano Biotechnology Research Centre (NBRC) Kalol, Gujarat through a proprietary patented technology. IFFCO introduced this innovative product during its Annual General Meeting on 31st May, 2021 across the country. IFFCO Nano urea (Liquid) has manifold benefits such as:

- It has a dynamic advantage due to its nanoscale morphology and surface area to volume size ratio which makes it more impactful. It is thus required in lesser measure compared to the conventional urea fertiliser to fulfil plant's nitrogen requirement.
- Nano Urea is an environment-friendly product, it improves soil, air and water quality thus

helping in addressing the concerns of global warming and achieving Sustainable Development Goals (SDG's) laid down by United Nations

- Cheaper than conventional urea.
- It reduces input cost to farmers, leads to increase in farmers' income.
- Improves crop productivity, soil health and nutritional quality of produce.
- Easy to transport and reduce logistic cost
- Increase farmers' income. This is a step in the direction of Atmanirbhar Bharat and Aatmanirbhar Krishi.

This will bring in revolution in the agriculture world over and the way farmers use fertilisers to grow crops to provide food to millions.

It is a matter of pride that IFFCO is ranked as the No. 1 cooperative in the world. This honour comes to IFFCO based on the ratio of turnover over GDP per capita income in the 2020 edition of the World Cooperative Monitor (WCM) report, designed by International Cooperative Alliance (ICA).

During the year, IFFCO plants bagged top awards from the Fertilizer Association of India (FAI) in various categories including excellence in production, safety, environment protection, and others.

While the nation grappled with pandemic challenges in various ways, all production units of remained operational during the lockdowns and management facilitated work from home for its employees. Further, with its advanced IT infrastructure, IFFCO conducted all business meetings and the audit through virtual mode for smooth functioning. In addition to this, IFFCO has shared the burden of farmers by reducing the price of its NP fertilisers by Rs. 50 per bag. IFFCO, with the help of e- Bazar digital platform has helped

farmers by offering retail agri inputs at farmer's doorstep through more than 12000 retail outlets.

IFFCO launched its 'Break the Corona Chain' campaign across India. The focus of this campaign was to educate the farmers about the transmission of the virus, equip them with masks and sanitizers and spread the message of hygiene and social distancing. IFFCO's field staff in various states distributed masks, vitamin-c tablets and soaps to farmers, farm labourers and truck drivers.

Through its unique humanitarian efforts at ground zero, IFFCO organized relief and awareness camps at over 5000 locations across India. In these programs, IFFCO reached out to nearly 12 lakh people and distributed more than 30 lakh Vitamin-C tablets, over 5 lakh medicated soaps, over 5 lakh masks, over 2 lakh sanitizers, over 50,000 gloves, over 50,000 gamachhas and a lot of medical kits. In addition, 1 lakh ration kits (containing Rice, Pulses, Spices and cooking oil) and 6 lakh food packets, 10,000 Biscuits/ Groceries have also been distributed to migrant laborers, workers and needy families at various locations including the national highways in Bihar, U.P and Punjab. In addition, during the winter season more than 1 lakh blankets were distributed to orphanages, old age homes, poor people, farmers, society members, labourers and local villagers.

Cooperative and Rural Development Through Various Initiatives

IFFCO in its efforts towards rural and cooperative development continues to fulfill Corporate Social Responsibility through its promoted organisations / different programmes such as:

- ♦ IFFCO Kisan Sewa Trust: This is a charitable trust created out of joint contribution from IFFCO & its employees to provide relief and rehabilitation to the victims in the event of natural calamities. The Trust expanded its scope by providing financial assistance to the farmers living below poverty line for their critical medical treatment and education scholarship for higher studies to the children of poor and needy farmers.
- ♦ Indian Farm Forestry Development Cooperative Limited (IFFDC): IFFCO promoted a separate multi-state cooperative society with the prime objective to conserve environment and mitigate climate changes through sustainable natural resource

management for enhancing the socio-economic status of rural poor, tribal community and women in particular. So far, 29,421 hectares of wasteland has been developed as multi-purpose forests. These forests are catering to the needs of the community and helping them in mitigating climate change. Presently, IFFDC is implementing projects on farm forestry, integrated watershed development, climate proofing, rural livelihood development, women empowerment, CSR etc. For women empowerment, Self Help Groups (SHGs), for skill and microenterprises development which have 94% women members are nurtured.

- ♦ Cooperative Rural Development Trust (CORDET): has been promoted by IFFCO with an objective to promote rural development. It is engaged in providing training to farmers on various aspects of farming and animal husbandry by establishing model farms.
- ♦ Farmers Extension Activities: Various promotional and extension programmes on latest agri-technology were organised with farmers for balanced use of bio fertilisers, agro chemical etc. to enhance crop productivity through efficient use of fertilisers, water conservation etc.
- ♦ Save the Soil Campaign: The society has continued the "Save the Soil" campaign with emphasis on soil rejuvenation and crop productivity enhancement, by undertaking various activities and also assisted farmers by providing financial assistance for installation of biogas plants.
- Village Adoption programme: The village adoption program was initiated by IFFCO with an objective to bring about overall socio-economic development in villages for sustainable agriculture development with particular emphasis on balanced use of fertilizers, quality seeds and better farm management. Various promotional, social and community development programs, medical and veterinary check-up campaigns, training programs for rural women etc., were organized in 228 adopted villages during the current year. Additionally, in order to promote and disseminate the appropriate technologies among the farmers in large areas, Farmers Friend Clubs have been formed in the districts. Regular meetings and support for advanced agriculture inputs (water soluble fertilisers, biofertilisers and Sagarika) as well as sharing of latest technologies are being done with the members of

Farmers Friend Club.

- ♦ Neem Plantation and Development of Improved Variants: IFFCO has undertaken a project on Induction, evaluation and development of polyploids in Neem (Azadirachta indica) in collaboration with the Forest Research Institute (FRI), Dehradun since June 2015. The society has also undertaken 'Neem Plantation Campaign' during 2020-21. Neem saplings were provided free of cost for plantation at fields, schools, cooperative premises, residential areas etc. in different States.
- ◆ **Dividend:** IFFCO has paid the maximum

permissible dividend of 20% of paid up equity share capital for the twentieth consecutive year to its member societies.

♦ Information and Communication Technology: IFFCO through its advanced IT infrastructure provided reliable work from home infrastructure to the employees during the COVID-19 pandemic and also has provided support to 6600 online meetings, conferences and webinars for smooth functioning of work.

NAFED's Role in Agricultural Marketing in India

AFED, a Multi-State Federal Cooperative Society was established on October 2, 1958 under Bombay Cooperative Societies Act 1925, presently deemed to Be Registered under Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act 2002. The objective of the NAFED is to organize, promote and develop marketing, processing and storage of agricultural, horticultural and forest produce with the overall aim of providing a ready market to farmers and preventing

their exploitation at the hands of private trade. The core competence of NAFED is procurement of agricultural commodities directly from the farmers through the cooperative network spread all across the country. The vast reach and infrastructure is the main strength of NAFED apart from its expertise in procurement and marketing of agricultural commodities. NAFED is the only organization in the country which has the experience and capability to procure, handle and market all agricultural commodities cultivated anywhere in the country.

The Structure and Strength of NAFED

NAFED has its presence in all states of the country through its network of branches/sub offices/

member cooperatives. NAFED has its reach in the remotest of locations in all states and union territories through its three tier structure consisting of primary cooperatives at the bottom, state level cooperatives in the middle and NAFED at the top level. There are 945 members of NAFED as of 31.03.2021

Some of the important activities/initiatives undertaken by NAFED during 2020-2021 are listed as below:

- NAFED's response to Covid-19: During the Covid-19 pandemic, NAFED rose to the occasion to provide food to the needy. GOI entrusted NAFED with the challenging task of supplying milled/cleaned pulses under PMGKAY scheme to the states/UTs for onward distribution to the beneficiaries. NAFED supplied about 1.50 million MT of milled/whole pulses and 34,449 MT whole Channa to all the 36 States / UTs across the country for distribution to the poor under this extremely challenging operation amidst the pandemic. NAFED also supplied 33,744.95 MT whole chana to migrants under the Atmanirbhar Bharat scheme during the pandemic.
- Procurement of oilseeds and pulses under Price Support Scheme: NAFED is one of the nodal agencies of Govt. of India for procurement of oilseeds and pulses under PSS. Under the scheme, procurement of stocks is organized directly from the farmers at the declared MSP to provide remunerative prices to farmers for their produce. The total quantity of pulses under PSS / PSF and oilseeds under PSS procured by NAFED during the financial year 2020-2021 was to the tune of around 35.23 Lakh MT valuing approx. Rs.17,240 crores including perennial crop of copra.
- Supply of Food Aid kits to Govt. of Uttar Pradesh: NAFED organized emergent supply of 37,700 kits of varied grocery items worth Rs. 2.79 crores to UP Govt. for distribution as relief to the migrant workers in Noida district of the state. The supplies were made at short notice amid the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic at a time when all other suppliers were not in a position to organize such volume in limited time.
- NAFED to store 25,000 MT of Onion in MAHA ONION complex (PPP-IAD-Project): NAFED has executed a joint venture, Maha Onion, with Maharashtra Farmers Producer Co. Ltd. with the aim to create 25,000 MT capacities for long term storage

of onion to reduce losses and provide alternate marketing facilities based on hub and spoke model outside APMC markets.

- Working with Farmer **Producer** Organisations (FPOs): NAFED has been appointed as national implementing agency under the mission for formation of 10,000 Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) by the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare (MoA&FW), Government of India. NAFED has taken over the Federation of Indian FPOs and Aggregators (FIFA) with an objective to support the farmers by providing them market linkages and post harvest infrastructure. FIFA has been specifically set up to provide incubation support to Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) which includes cooperative societies and farmer producer companies. FIFA has more than 600 FPOs as its members. FIFA will work extensively to support the FPOs by linking them to markets for agri-produce as well as supply of quality agriculture inputs and their capacity building. NAFED has also launched e-Kisan Mandi at Pune and plans to open 100 such mandis pan India.
- International market initiatives of NAFED: As per instructions of Ministry of External Affairs, Govt. of India, NAFED organised supply of various agri-commodities, household and other items to several countries as humanitarian AID in a time-bound manner. These include Bangladesh, Syria, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Malawi, Namibia etc.
- NAFED's intervention in J&K to promote long term sustainable development of horticulture: NAFED provided respite to apple growers in Kashmir by undertaking purchase of apples in the Valley under the Market Intervention Scheme on the direction of Govt. of India amidst most challenging conditions. A total quantity of around 15,589 MT (10.64 lakh boxes) valued at procurement cost of around Rs.69 crores of different varieties of apples like delicious, american and maharaji were procured at the centres of Anantnag, Sopore, Srinagar, Shopian and Kulgam. NAFED has also executed an MoU on 1st January, 2021 with Govt. of J&K in the presence of the Hon'ble Lt. Governor for long term sustainable development of horticulture in the region.
- Supply of Pulses to Army and State / UT Governments under different welfare schemes : NAFED was authorized to supply pulses to the forces

as per decision taken by the Cabinet Secretary. A quantity of 38,531 MT of milled pulses was supplied to the Army and the Central Para Military Forces (CPMFs) out of the existing buffer stock of pulses (whole & milled). NAFED also continued to supply milled / cleaned pulses for their different welfare schemes such as ICDS, MDM, PDS out of national buffer. A quantity of around 4 LMT of pulses was supplied to the states of Arunachal Pradesh, Kerala, Rajasthan, Goa, Gujarat, Telangana, Mizoram, Uttar Pradesh, West Bengal, Orissa, Manipur, Lakshadweep etc. during the year.

- Several retail outlets of NAFED Bazaar opened at prime locations in NCR Delhi and across the country: A chain of "NAFED Bazaar" outlets are operating in Delhi and a few other cities. Along with NAFED brand pulses, tea, spices, rice, dry fruits etc., these outlets are also selling grocery items of other popular brands with a view to offer wholesome solutions to customer needs.
- Buffer stocking of onion and release of stock to check onion price rise: NAFED also creates and manages the buffer of onion on similar lines as pulses as per the directives of GOI to stabilize the volatility of onion prices in the wholesale and retail markets.
- Implementation of NADCP Programme: In October 2019, Hon'ble Prime Minister launched the National Animal Disease Control Programme (NADCP) valued at Rs.12,652 crore and aimed at vaccination of livestock against protection from FMD and Brucellosis diseases over a period of five years. Under this programme, NAFED has to deliver 925 million doses of FMD vaccines, 5000 lakh crore ear tags and 3.60 crore doses of Brucella to 15 states/UTs across the country and further supplies are continuing. The scheme is under implementation all across the country.
- A Multi Portal Management System: has been designed for ensuring time precision up-to milliseconds for same auction running across multiple portals in real-time by IT Division of NAFED.
- An MoU signed between NAFED and CWC to provide warehousing services to farmers and stakeholders: for providing the scientific integrated warehousing services to farmers including handling, transport & value added services for proper upkeep of NAFED procured stocks and commodities.

KRISHAK BHARTI COOPERATIVE LTD. (KRIBHCO)

Brief note on the activities of KRIBHCO 2020-21

rishak Bharati Cooperative Limited (KRIBHCO), a national level multi state cooperative society, was incorporated on April 17, 1980 and is presently registered under Multi State Cooperative Societies Act, 2002. The main objective of the society is to produce and distribute quality agriculture inputs mainly chemical fertilizers, seeds, bio fertilizers through cooperatives and institutional agencies across the nation.

During the Financial year 2020-21 the society's plants at Hazira, Surat in its 35th year of commercial production achieved the production of 14.02 lakh MT ammonia & 23.23 lakh MT urea which corresponds to capacity utilization of 112.43 % for ammonia and 105.87% for urea. In addition, the society produced 8.50 lakh liters of liquid bio-fertilizer, 14.024 lakh MT of surplus ammonia, 5332 thousand NM³ liquid argon and 1.75 lakh quintals of certified seeds.

The total membership of KRIBHCO consists of 9472 cooperatives societies and paid up share capital of the Society was Rs.388.85 crores as on 31st March, 2021. The Board of Directors of the society have recommended for the year, the dividend of 20% on the paid up share capital. The society has posted ever highest profit before tax of Rs. 513.13 crore. The networth of KRIBHCO has increased from Rs. 3250 crore in FY 2019-20 to Rs. 3557 crore as on 31st March, 2021.

KRIBHCO has recorded third highest market share of Urea sales in the country and has achieved 42.77 Lakh MT Urea sales during the year. It consisted of sales of 23.79 lakh MT of KRIBHCO Urea, 5.05 lakh MT of OMIFCO Urea, 11.08 lakh MT of KFL Urea and 2.85 lakh MT of Government account urea during the year. In order to promote balanced fertilization, the Society continued to market Imported DAP, NPK, NPS, SSP etc. this year also. The society imported 6.97 lakh MT of DAP, 1.51 LMT of NPK 10-26-26, 1.24 LMT of NPK 12-32-16, 2.29 lakh MT of NPS20-20-0-13 and 0.66 lakh MT of MOP. A total quantity of 12.35 lakh MT 'P' & 'K' fertilisers was handled during the year, which is ever highest for the Society in a financial year.

Apart from the above, KRIBHCO managed to sell 70679.20 MT of surplus ammonia and 5428.93 thousand NM3 liquid argon during 2020-21.

The Society successfully completed the 16th consecutive year of handling and marketing of OMIFCO urea under the agreement with Department of Fertilizers, Government of India. During the year 2020-21, a quantity of 4.14 lakh MT granular urea was handled at five Indian ports. The Urea Off-take Agreement between Department of Fertilisers, Government of India and OMIFCO expired in July 2020.

The seed multiplication programme of the society was initiated in the year 1990-91 to provide high quality seed of major crops to farmers and has set up 11 modern seed processing plants located at various states. During 2020-21, the society produced 1.75 lakh qtls. and sold the entire quantity of certified seed of various crops.

To enhance the agricultural productivity by providing quality hybrid seeds of appropriate characteristics to the farming community, Society has tied up with a leading hybrid seed company for marketing of their produce through society's marketing network in KRIBHCO's own brand. During the FY 2020-21, the society sold 50026 packets of Bt. cotton, 245 quintals of paddy hybrid, 2468 quintals of paddy research, 4936 quintals of hybrid maize and 60 quintals of hybrid bajra seeds.

The society is presently producing 10 types of bacterial strains of liquid bio-fertilizers and during the year 2020-21, KRIBHCO sold 8.30 lakh litres of liquid bio-fertilizers, keeping in view its appreciable response due to its longer shelf life, survival at higher temperature, easy application and low prices.

KRIBHCO is constantly educating farmers about the benefits of application of compost, which improves organic carbon in the soil and has sold 65,790 MT of city compost during the year 2020-21.

The society is operating 62 of its own outlets known as Krishak Bharti Sewa Kendra(KBSK) in the states of Uttar Pradesh, Haryana, Punjab and Madhya Pradesh. These centres are society's own retail outlets located in the countryside to cater to the farmers' needs for quality agro-inputs at a reasonable price at their doorstep. KBSKs are also instrumental in transmitting to the farming community

the latest technical knowledge of agricultural practices.

Society, having a dedicated team of agricultural professionals, continued its efforts towards transfer of latest farm technology to the farming community. The Society organized over 5401 programmes such as farmers meetings, field demonstrations, field days/crop shows, cooperative conference, and group discussion etc., benefiting 2.34 lakh farmers and cooperative officials in its area of operation. The Society also made available 17.99 lakh technical folders in regional languages on KRIBHCO products to farmers and cooperatives as back-up knowledge.

For inclusive development of cooperatives, the society adopted 210 cooperative societies, trained 11107 cooperative managers in 135 cooperative conferences. The Society also organized 52 health campaigns for human and livestock and 30 rural sports programmes, 28 sanitation campaigns 40 Income generation programmes and 31 drinking water facilities for integrated rural development.

'KRIBHCO Krishi Paramarsh Kendra', a hightech centre at KRIBHCO Bhawan, NOIDA, continued free consultancy to farm-related problems. The centre also propagated efficient and balanced use of fertilizer by testing 3147 soil samples collected scientifically for micro-nutrients and 2823 soil samples for macro-nutrients & irrigation water from 16 states free of cost.

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE HOUSING FEDERATION OF INDIA (NCHF)

The National Cooperative Housing Federation of India (NCHF) is a nation-wide organization of the cooperative housing sector. The primary objective of NCHF is to promote housing cooperatives and to coordinate and facilitate their operations especially the Apex Cooperative Housing Federations (ACHFs) which are its members. The main activities and achievements of NCHF during the year 2020-21 are given below:

Promotional Activities

- All necessary support and cooperation was provided to Member ACHFs on various issues.
 Important publications/documents were also circulated to them at regular intervals.
- A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between Rajasthan State Cooperative Housing Federation and the Housing & Urban Development Corporation (HUDCO), Regional Office, Jaipur for extending the benefits of interest subsidy to the eligible beneficiaries under the Credit Linked Subsidy Scheme (CLSS) component of Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (PMAY). Information regarding this was circulated by NCHF to concerned ACHFs to explore the possibility of availing benefit of the scheme on similar lines.
- Information/data on borrowings, lending

- operations, housing loans disbursed and units constructed/financed by ACHFs during 2019-20 was sent to the National Housing Bank (NHB) for including in their annual publication.
- Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) was requested to sanction fresh loans and to grant repayment re-schedulement/one time settlement of loans advanced by LIC to the concerned ACHFs. Necessary guidance was also provided to the concerned ACHFs in preparing repayment reschedulement proposal of LIC loans and LIC was requested to consider such proposals sympathetically keeping in view genuine problems faced by them.
- Rajasthan Housefed has initiated the building material business in different kinds of marbles, granites, kota-stone, karauli-stone, etc. and intends to undertake building material business with ACHFs and housing cooperatives of other states. The other Member ACHFs were requested to look into the proposal of Rajasthan Housefed and explore possibilities to initiate building material business to supplement their regular income.
- The Registrars of Cooperative Societies (RCS) of concerned states were requested to permit housing cooperatives to get their audit done by Chartered Accountants registered with the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI). The RCS of concerned States were also requested to advise housing cooperatives to incorporate provisions for structural audit in their bye-laws or issue orders in this regard.
- An article on 'Affordable Housing and Real Estate in the Budget 2021-22' written by Shri N.S. Mehara, Chief Executive, NCHF was published in the cooperative journal of Haryana State Cooperative Development Federation namely Haryana Sahakari Prakash (1st March, 2021) and also published in 'NCHF Bulletin' (February, 2021) for the benefit of members of housing cooperatives.
- Senior Officers of Member ACHFs visited NCHF Secretariat and discussed various issues with the Chief Executive, NCHF regarding strengthening of housing cooperatives, raising of funds, etc. NCHF was also represented through video conferencing in various meetings/conferences convened by the Government of India, state governments, cooperatives and other concerned organizations.
- A brief note on the 'The Expectations of Housing

- An invitation to enter the World Habitat Awards-2021 received from the World Habitat, an international not for profit organization established in the United Kingdom was circulated to Member ACHFs to facilitate them to submit the entries of their housing projects.
- The messages of Shri S.N.Sharma, MLA, the then Chairman, NCHF and Shri N.S. Mehara, Chief Executive, NCHF were sent to the West Bengal State Cooperative Housing Federation for inclusion in their special publication **Housfed Bulletin** (Utsav Issue) brought out to commemorate its Foundation Day.
- A copy of judgement of the Income Tax Appellate Tribunal ("SMC" Bench, Mumbai) in the matter of Mrs. Rashmi Mahendra Dhanani Vs. Income Tax Officer, Ward-26(2)(5), Mumbai (ITA No.3166/Mum/2019-Assessment Year 2010-11) decided on 26th November, 2020 in which the Tribunal has held that the tax payer can add the price paid for amenities to a builder's group company to arrive at the total cost of acquisition of the property/flat for determining capital gains, was circulated to all Members of the Board of Directors and Member Federations of NCHF for their information.
- Properties of housing cooperatives got insured through NCHF. Member ACHFs and primary housing cooperatives were requested to cover their housing projects under the 'Standard Fire and Special Perils Policy' through NCHF at reduced premium.
- On request, Judgements of Supreme Court/ High Courts were sent to primary housing cooperatives and other concerned. Necessary guidance was also provided to housing cooperatives on various issues.
- One day's salary of the employees of NCHF was contributed to the Prime Minister's Citizens' Assistance and Relief in Emergency Situation (PMCARES) Fund. Member ACHFs of NCHF also made contribution to the PMCARES Fund and Chief Minister's Relief Fund of their respective states to help fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The Registrars of Cooperative Societies of concerned states were requested to look into the public grievances raised by members of housing cooperatives etc. Replies to queries pertaining to

housing cooperatives raised on Public Grievance Portal of the Government of India were uploaded on the CPGRAMS portal.

Education, Training and Information Dissemination

A Leadership Development Programme for the Chairmen/Directors of Housing Cooperatives was organized from 16-18th September, 2020 through video conferencing in collaboration with the National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE). In all, 33 participants from various states attended the training programme. Shri N.S. Mehara, Chief Executive, NCHF also addressed the participants on 'Issues before Housing Cooperatives in Post COVID Era'.

NCHF also conducts research and studies and compiles information/statistical data for the benefit and use of all concerned engaged in cooperative housing activities. The Registrars of Cooperative Societies (RCS) of concerned states were requested to send information/data on the operations of housing cooperatives in their respective States.

Conferences/Webinars

NCHF has been organizing conferences/ workshops/study visits/webinars etc. for the personnel of ACHFs and housing cooperatives and also representing the cooperative housing sector in such events.

The 67th All India Cooperative Week was celebrated from 14-20th November, 2020 on the theme of 'Covid Pandemic-Atmanirbhar Bharat-Cooperatives'. Shri Kadakampally Surendran, Hon'ble Cooperation Minister of Kerala inaugurated the Cooperative Week Celebrations-2020 on 14.11.2020 through video conferencing and Shri Chandra Pal Singh Yadav, Ex.MP and the then President, NCUI presided over the function.

To commemorate Cooperative Week Celebrations-2020, NCHF brought out a special issue of 'NCHF Bulletin' which was released by Shri Santosh Kumar Gangwar, Hon'ble Union Minister of State (Independent Charge) for Labour and Employment at the valedictory function of Cooperative Week Celebrations organised by the National Cooperative Union of India (NCUI) on 19th November, 2020 at New Delhi.

The Chief Executive, NCHF also attended through video conferencing a Webinar on 'Cyber Security, Cyber Forensic and Cyber Law' organized by the NCUI and Uralungal Labour Contract Cooperative Society (ULCCS) on 24.06.2020, a Webinar on 'Cooperatives for Climate Change' convened by the NCUI in collaboration with International Cooperative Alliance Regional Office for Asia & the Pacific (ICA-AP) on the occasion of International Cooperative Day-2020 on 04.07.2020.

Publications

NCHF has been bringing out various publications from time to time. During the year 2020-21, it brought out/circulated various publications namely a monthly journal 'NCHF Bulletin' (including a Special Issue on Cooperative Week Celebrations), compilation of Orders of RCS on provision for structural audit, compilation of Supreme Court Judgements, English Hindi Dictionary, Annual Report and Audit Report of NCHF both in Hindi and English.

Implementation of Rajbhasha (Hindi) in NCHF Office

Articles written in Hindi and other relevant news items in Hindi on cooperative housing and related fields were published in 'NCHF Bulletin' regularly; Banners and posters/placards were displayed at prominent places in office complex of NCHF during Hindi Pakhwada celebrated from 7-21st September, 2020 and Hindi Diwas was celebrated on 14.09.2020; The Annual Report and Audit Report of NCHF for the year 2019-20 were prepared in Hindi; Meetings of Rajbhasha Karyanvayan Samiti and Hindi Workshops were held regularly; Letter-heads, envelopes, vouchers, etc. were printed in Hindi; Quarterly/half yearly/annual progress reports on the use of Rajbhasha Hindi in NCHF Secretariat were sent to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (HUA) and TOLIC; Efforts were made to procure more Hindi Books and Hindi section on the web-site of NCHF was updated and contents in Hindi were uploaded on the web-site alongwith contents in English simultaneously; Officers of NCHF participated in the meetings of Rajbhasha Karyanvayan Samiti of Ministry of HUA through teleconferencing; and the Chief Executive, NCHF attended the meetings of Town Official Language Implementation Committee (TOLIC) South Delhi-I on 26.08.2020 and 29.01.2021 through video conferencing;

A filled-in questionnaire regarding the progress of use of Rajbhasha in official work of NCHF was also sent to the Ministry of Home Affairs, Department of Official Language. Accordingly, an E-Inspection of NCHF was conducted by the Ministry of Home Affairs, Department of Official Language on 22.07.2020 to review the progress of use of Rajbhasha in official work. The Chief Executive, NCHF presented the progress through video conferencing.

World Habitat Day Celebrations

The World Habitat Day is celebrated on the first Monday of October every year. This facilitates the world community to review the initiatives taken towards the sustainable development of human settlements. The World Habitat Day-2020 was observed globally on 5th October, 2020, the theme of which was 'Housing for All: A Better Urban Future'.

The Government of India in the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs organized a Webinar to celebrate the World Habitat Day-2020 on the theme 'Housing for All: A Better Urban Future' on 5th October, 2020.

Shri N.S. Mehara, Chief Executive, NCHF also attended the above Webinar through video conferencing.

Documentation Centre

The Documentation Centre on Cooperative Housing at NCHF Secretariat was further strengthened by procuring various useful publications, reports etc. During the period under reference, a total of 25 books were added. This Documentation Centre has a collection of 1652 documents/books as of 31st March, 2021.

Updating of NCHF Web-site

NCHF Web-site (www.nchfindia.net) was updated regularly during the period under report. For the benefit of members of housing cooperatives and others concerned, judgements of Supreme Court pertaining to housing cooperatives/development authorities/housing boards were included in NCHF Bulletin, all issues of which (April, 2020 to March, 2021) were uploaded on the Web-site. The Web-site

of NCHF has been made bilingual having information both in Hindi and English.

Study Visits to NCHF Secretariat

Various trainees, students, cooperators and participants of training programmes undertake study visits to NCHF Secretariat from time to time to know about the role, activities and achievements of housing cooperatives functioning at various levels across the country. However, in view of restrictions on travel, gathering, etc. during the lock-downs and thereafter due to COVID-19 pandemic, the trainees were addressed through video conferencing by the Chief Executive, NCHF.

New Board of Management

A new Board of Directors of NCHF was constituted in the Special General Body Meeting of NCHF on 25th March, 2021 at New Delhi for a period of 5 years (2021-26). Thereafter, the new Board elected the Office Bearers of NCHF in its first Meeting held on the same date.

The report of the proceedings recorded by the Returning Officer in respect of the Election of Directors and Office Bearers of NCHF held in the Special General Body Meeting on 25th March, 2021 was sent to the Central Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Department of Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare for their information and record.

Miscellaneous

Necessary information and various monthly/ quarterly/half yearly reports were submitted to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs at regular intervals. A brief report on the activities of NCHF during January to December, 2020 was also sent to the above Ministry both in Hindi and English for inclusion in their Annual Report for 2020-21. The Chief Executive, NCHF participated in the Review

meeting regarding preparation of Annual Report of the Ministry of HUA for the year 2020-21 on 15th January, 2021 through video conferencing.

- Details of various events/programmes organized or planned through video conferencing by the international cooperative, housing and related organizations were circulated to Members of the Board of Directors of NCHF and the Managing Directors of ACHFs.
- Chief Executive, NCHF attended through video conferencing a meeting of the Managing Directors of National Federations (Delhi based) convened by the NCUI to decide the nomenclature of 67th All India Cooperative Week on 20.07.2021; 21st Vaikunth Bhai Memorial Lecture on 24.08.2020; Foundation Day Ceremony of Vaikunth Bhai National Institute of Cooperative Management (VAMNICOM) on 15.01.2021; and online Inauguration Ceremony of the newly constructed 'VAMNICOM CAFÉ' on 25.01.2021.
- As requested, a brief write-up of Shri N.S. Mehara, Chief Executive, NCHF regarding views on the Union Budget 2021-22 was sent to the National Cooperative Union of India (NCUI) which was published as an Article in the February, 2021 issue of the 'The Cooperator' under caption 'A Mixed Bag'.
- NCHF celebrated the International Day of Yoga (IDY) on 21.06.2020 and Yoga Pledge was administered to the staff on this occasion.
- The Managing Directors of ACHFs were requested to: send the photographs of the cooperative housing projects/complexes completed or under construction in their respective states for inclusion in the 'National Album' maintained by NCHF for giving publicity to such projects; brief note on their achievements and Best Practices followed by them for publishing in NCHF Bulletin.
- The information pertaining to NCHF for the year 2019-20 as on 31.03.2020 as per the prescribed statistical proforma for filing of Returns under Section 120 of the Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act, 2002; the Report of the Audited Annual Accounts for the year 2019-20 and plan for Distribution of Surplus for the Financial Year 2019-20 as approved by the General Body of NCHF were sent to the Central Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers' Welfare.

- The details of digital transaction of payment of dividend for the Financial Year 2018-19 was sent to the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare, Department of Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers' Welfare, Government of India for their information and record.
- Swachhta Pakhwadas were observed and cleanliness/sanitisation drives especially for ensuring plastic free environment were undertaken in the office premises of NCHF during 1-15th June, 2020, 1-15th October, 2020 and 1-15th February, 2021.
- Vigilance Awareness Week was observed in NCHF Secretariat from 27th October-2nd November, 2020.
- Letterheads of NCHF were printed with the logo for commemoration of 150th Birth Anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi.
- NCHF Secretariat observed the Constitution Day on 26.11.2020 to commemorate the adoption of the Constitution of India. On this occasion, the Preamble of the Constitution was read by the staff members of NCHF.
- A special meeting of the Internal Complaints Committee on Sexual Harassment of Women at NCHF Secretariat was held on 09.12.2020 to commemorate the 7th anniversary of notification of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 and discuss the Agenda suggested by the Ministry of Women and Child Development.
- Shri Narendra Singh, Director, Uttarakhand State Cooperative Federation visited NCHF Secretariat on 17.11.2020 and discussed various issues with the Chief Executive, NCHF, about strengthening of housing cooperatives in Uttarakhand and sharing information about the cooperative movement in the State; Shri Iqbal Valiyaveetil, Executive Director, Kerala Housefed and Vice-President, Ernakulum Cooperative House Construction Society, Kochi visited NCHF Secretariat on 03.01.2021 and discussed various issues with the Chief Executive, NCHF about strengthening of housing cooperatives in Kerala.
- As a part of Government's initiative to promote

digital payments, necessary efforts were made to increase the digital transactions in the operations of NCHF. Monthly/quarterly details of digital transactions in the office of NCHF were sent to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs regularly.

NATIONAL FEDERATION OF URBAN COOPERATIVE BANKS AND CREDIT SOCIETIES LTD. (NAFCUB)

The National Federation of Urban Cooperative Banks and Credit Societies Ltd. (NAFCUB) is the apex level promotional body of urban cooperative banks and credit societies in the country. As of 31st March 2020, there were 1541 urban cooperative banks out of which 54 were scheduled banks including 31 multi state urban banks, 23 single state multi state cooperative banks and 1433 non scheduled banks. Its main objective is to promote the urban cooperative credit movement and protect the interests of the sector. The Federation was registered as a multi-state cooperative society on 17th February, 1977. The registered office of the Federation is in Delhi.

The area of operation of the Federation is whole of the country. It represents around 1541 urban cooperative banks and 50,000 cooperative credit societies functioning all over India. As of 31st March 2021, the total membership of NAFCUB is 1778, out of which 986 are urban cooperative banks and 770 cooperative credit societies are members of NAFCUB. There are 22 state federations/associations in the urban cooperative credit sector and all are members of the national federation.

Activities of NAFCUB during the year 2020-21

The Financial Year 2020-21 started with the lockdown in the country on account of outbreak of Covid-19. This resulted in slow down of the economy and people were availing the work from home facility. However, NAFCUB being an apex body of urban cooperative banks and credit societies was actively involved in placing the issues concerning the sector with the regulators - Reserve Bank of India, Central Registrar of Cooperative Societies and Registrar of Cooperatives Societies as also with other authorities - Ministry of Finance, Ministry of MSMEs etc., for their consideration and necessary action in resolving these issues. NAFCUB is committed to work towards building a strong and viable urban cooperative

banking and credit system across the country. NAFCUB, which is an effective voice of the sector, is making every effort with the RBI to provide a level playing field for the urban cooperative banks.

Umbrella Organization for UCBs

Keeping in view the recommendations of various RBI Committees/Working Groups in the past and NAFCUB's Steering Committee Report, RBI had conveyed it's regulatory approval for formation of UO by NAFCUB in June 2019. NAFCUB has since then undertaken the task of setting up of the UO in right earnest and a company by the name of Apex Coop. Finance and Development Company Ltd. has been promoted by NAFCUB in the name of National Cooperative Finance and Development Corporation Limited as approved by the Registrar of Companies in August 2020.

Issues Related to Urban Cooperative Banks

Banking Regulation Amendment Bill 2020 and Constitution of Board of Management (BOM) in Primary (Urban) Co-operative Banks (UCBs)

NAFCUB has written to RBI Governor, Deputy Governor to withdraw the instructions on constitution of BOM in UCBs as the amendment carried out through enactment of Banking Regulation (Amendment) Act 2020 in June, 2020, provides the same powers to RBI to regulate the cooperative banks as it has in regulating the commercial banks.

Pursuant to the recent enactment of amendments to Banking Regulations Act 1949, NAFCUB had requested the Hon'ble Union Finance Minister and Governor, RBI that the views of the sector should be considered before issuance of regulatory instructions and implementation of the provisions of the amendments in the Act as also to ensure that cooperative character and democratic functioning of the cooperative banks is not affected.

Considering our request, RBI has constituted an Expert Committee to go into various issues of urban cooperative banks, including the implementation of the amendments, with a view to strengthen the sector. Sh. N.S. Vishwanathan, former Dy. Governor RBI is its Chairman and NAFCUB is one of the members of the Expert Committee.

Voluntary Transition of Primary Urban Cooperative Banks (UCBs) into Small Finance Banks (SFBs)

RBI Governor has been requested to withdraw the circulars on voluntary transition of primary urban cooperative banks (UCBs) into small finance banks (SFBs) as permitting transition of UCBs into SFBs is in violation of the provisions of Cooperative Societies Acts of all the states as also the Multi State Cooperative Societies Act 2002. Moreover, it is also a violation of cooperative principles and provisions of the Constitution of India.

Inclusion of all Urban Cooperative Banks as Lending Institutions under CGTMSE Scheme

Since long, NAFCUB has been regularly requesting Ministry of MSMEs to include all UCBs as lending institutions under CGTMSE scheme of Govt. of India. With our persistent efforts, the Ministry via its circular letter dated March 3, 2020 has included all urban cooperative banks (scheduled and non-scheduled) as lending institutions under CLCSS, CGTMSE and ISS. As a majority of UCBs do not meet one of the important criteria of having DTL of Rs.750 cr. to become lending institutions, NAFCUB has requested the Minister of Finance and Credit Guarantee Fund Trust for Micro and Small Enterprises to provide relaxation in this regard.

Formation of Parliamentary Cooperative Forum

In the Annual General Meeting of NAFCUB held on December 30, 2021, it was felt that a Parliamentary Forum of all members of Parliament associated with the cooperative banking and credit sector be formed in order to provide legislative support and recognition to the urban cooperative banking sector. Sh. Nitin Gadkari, Hon'ble Union Minister for Road Transport & Highways and MSMEs has been requested to chair the Forum.

Claim for deduction to Cooperative Credit and other Societies under Section 80P of Income Tax Act, 1961

Cooperative credit societies are allowed to avail deduction under 80 AC of the Act under the heading "C- Deductions in respect of certain incomes" on filing the returns of income by due date. Due to the pandemic situation across the country, the societies were not able to file the return of income by due

date. The Finance Minister was requested to permit cooperative institutions to file belated return of income and not to restrict to the due date given in the Act.

Prohibition of declaration of dividends by all banks

RBI had prohibited all banks from declaring and paying dividend to their customers. With the persistent efforts made by NAFCUB in this regard, RBI has now removed the restriction and permitted UCBs to pay dividend for the year ending 2021.

Resumption of new branch licensing of urban cooperative banks

It is requested to RBI that instead of imposing fresh pre-conditions like having BoM in place or any other condition that the Regulator may think of imposing, the process of licensing of new branches be resumed without any further delay.

Sharing of Government Business among banks

The Union Finance Minister has been requested that approval be given for at least all scheduled urban cooperative banks and scheduled state cooperative banks to undertake government business. All these banks are equipped with technology which is at par with those of commercial banks and this can enable them to handle the government business efficiency.

Issues Related to Cooperative Credit Societies

A submission to the Hon'ble Union Finance Minister was given on the difficulties faced by cooperative credit societies which are working at the grass root level and have problems due to certain provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

H.R. Initiatives

Webinars/Training Programmes/Round Table

The Federation during the year organized 28 webinars/training programmes in collaboration with Reserve Bank of India, College of Agricultural Banking, Pune, National Centre for Cooperative Education, and Member State Federations of Urban Cooperative Banks for the benefit of urban cooperative banks particularly for smaller urban banks, Mahila banks and cooperative credit societies on the important topics of cyber frauds, digital

banking and cyber security, cyber insurance, credit management, financial management, corporate governance, etc.

Publications

"Fortnightly News Letter and Quarterly Journal Urban Credit"

The Federation is regularly publishing two of its flagship publications (i) quarterly journal "Urban Credit" and (ii) fortnightly newsletter "Coop Banking". Both these publications are very popular with subscribers and contain useful reading material. We have also started publishing our Newsletter on electronic mode titled 'e-coop Banking which is being circulated to all the urban cooperative banks, credit societies, all national level cooperative institutions, RBI and government departments through email.

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE DAIRY FEDERATION OF INDIA LTD. (NCDFI)

CDFI celebrated the Golden Jubilee Year this fiscal year, which marks fifty glorious years of a wonderful journey of this great institution. However, as the country has been reeling under the Covid-19 pandemic, things have remained far from normal all through the year 2020-21 and we continued to traverse an unparalleled set of challenges resulting from the extraordinary times owing to the pandemic. Nevertheless, the NCDFI continued to coordinate the sale of milk and milk products to institutions, facilitated online transactions of various commodities at NCDFI eMarket and worked for genetic improvement of the cattle. NCDFI also continued to utilize part of its surplus in the developmental activities.

Institutional Sale

During the year 2020-21, the NCDFI continued to coordinate the sale of milk and milk products to Institutions such as Defence forces, Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP) and Indian Railway Catering and Tourism Corporation (IRCTC). Some of the key achievements of NCDFI in this domain are presented below.

Supplies to MoD and ITBP

During the year, NCDFI coordinated the supply of milk and milk products to 327 Army Supply Corp

Depots, 43 Indian Air Force, and 3 Indian Naval Services Units under the Ministry of Defence. Further, the requirement of milk products of Indo-Tibetan Border Police was also met by the member cooperatives of NCDFI.

Amul, Mahanand, Nandini, Saras, Verka, Visakha and Warana brand UHT Milk was supplied to MoD. Milk product supplies were allocated to Alwar, Bengaluru, Jaipur, Kaira, Ludhiana, Mehsana, Rohtak, and Warana Milk Unions; Mother Dairy Bengaluru and Nandini Hi-Tech Plant Channarayapatna. 114 cooperative dairies spread across the country participated in the milk and milk products supply. Contracts concluded during the year were worth Rs. 1,407 crores.

Supplies to the Indian Army and other armed forces have always been considered a matter of great pride. Apart from the privilege and business interest, cooperatives that have been consistently supplying to the Indian Army have had tangible and intangible benefits. Apart from serving the purpose of having an assured market, it has helped in capacity building, consistently improving the quality of products, creating goodwill, and expanding markets.

NCDFI eMARKET

Adoption of technology and its application to ensure better returns to dairy cooperatives and in turn to milk producers has been the prime focus of NCDFI. During the year 2021, eAuctions for milk and milk products were continued at NCDFI eMarket. Further, services are extended for procurement of cattle feed ingredients, fodder seeds, edible oils, packing materials, chemicals, sugar, etc. During the year, NCDFI eMarket also extended its services to various service contracts such as hiring labor, transport, godown hiring, canteen services, etc.

Introduction of New Auction Formats

NCDFI eMarket introduced three new auction formats during the year 2020-21. The 'Price Validation Auctions' facilitates large trade volumes with undisclosed traded prices to protect market sentiments and assures guaranteed trade conclusion at the equilibrium price. Then, the 'Price Discovery Auctions', was introduced to discover the fair market price, broader participation ensuring competitive price discovery, and faster turnaround time with no manual intervention. Lastly, NCDFI eMarket

announced another auction format, 'Forward Auctions (Mini)', to cater to the requirement of our dairy cooperatives who wish to offer smaller quantities.

Dairy Commodities

The transacted volumes at NCDFI eMarket during 2020-21 were 49,431 MT SMP, 21,762 MT Butter, 5,183 MT WMP, 1,720 MT While Powder, 707 MT Cheese, 230 MT Ghee apart from 3.21 crore liters of Raw Chilled Milk (RCM) and 1.03 Crore liters of Separated Skimmed Milk (SSM). These transactions were done at NCDFI eMarket through various types of auctions, i.e., 'Forward Auctions', 'Auction Sale' and 'Reverse Auctions'. Brands that participated in the NCDFI eMarket auctions were Aarey, Aavin, Amrut, Amul, Devbhog, Devgiri Mahanand, Gokul, Krushna, Maahi, Mahanand, Medha, Milma, Mother Dairy, Nandini, Parag, Rajhans, Sagar, Sanchi, Saras, Sudha, Verka, Vijaya, Vikas, Visakha Dairy, Vita and Warana.

The dairy cooperative members are actively offering their dairy commodity in bulk through the NCDFI eMarket platform. Their decision has resulted in higher sale proceedings as the system determined the prices considering the supply and demand scenario, especially in volatile markets. During the year, various dairy cooperative brands, mainly Aavin, Gokul, Mother Dairy, Nandini, Sanchi, Saras, and Verka offered different dairy products for sale on the NCDFI eMarket platform. The dairy cooperatives could earn cumulative additional revenue through these trades to the tune of Rs.7.45 crores.

Cattle Feed Ingredients

Besides the sale of milk and milk products, NCDFI eMarket also facilitates the procurement of all required agri commodities for cattle feed plants. During the year, 32 cooperative cattle feed plants in the states of Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Goa, Gujarat, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Orissa, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh, and West Bengal procured required cattle feed ingredients through NCDFI eMarket. A large and diversified supplier base facilitates the cooperatives to get the required raw materials in time with competitive prices. Hence, many cattle feed plants are in the process of procuring raw materials through NCDFI eMarket. NCDFI eMarket additionally offered

support for procurement of sugar, edible oils, packing materials, compound cattle feed, fodder seeds, chemicals apart from scrap sales, and concluded service contracts as hiring of labour, transport, godown hiring, canteen services, etc.

Increased Transparency

NCDFI is consistently making efforts to update the Android application and have released updated versions of NCDFI eMarket periodically, which enabled the users to remain updated with customized auction information on a real-time basis. Further, NCDFI eMarket is publishing the results of eAuction in monthly 'Activity Report' which is circulated to all members and is also available on the mobile application and webpages of NCDFI eMarket. It gives larger publicity to the concluded trades and prices for different products apart from the information on newly introduced commodities and services on NCDFI eMarket platform, which further helps cooperative buyers to get the products and services at much competitive prices.

NCDFI eMarket has started releasing a monthly "Market Research Report" on selected commodities in association with Agriwatch.com, this year. Agriwatch is a leading market research organization that has a long association with the Indian agribusiness sector.

Members

The total registered members on NCDFI eMarket platform were 2,706 as of March 31, 2021, representing participation from across the country. During the year, due to the Covid-19 pandemic, NCDFI organized most of the meetings virtually with its members through video-conferencing.

Transacted value

During the year 2020-21, total business transactions at NCDFI eMarket were to the tune of Rs. 3,177 crores consisting of liquid milk and value-added dairy products worth Rs. 1,940 crores, cattle feed ingredients worth Rs.773 crores, sugar worth Rs. 44 crores, packing/packaging materials worth Rs.241 crores and Rs. 179 crores worth of other miscellaneous products and services.

Genetic Improvement

To provide better access of good quality semen doses to the milk producers in the country, NCDFI

has partnered with NDDB Dairy Services for the distribution of frozen semen doses (FSDs) produced by Sabarmati Ashram Gaushala (Gujarat), Animal Breeding Centre (Uttar Pradesh), Alamadhi Semen Station (Tamilnadu), Rohtak Semen Station (Haryana) and Rahuri Semen Station (Maharashtra). These semen stations are either owned or managed by the NDDB Dairy Services. During the year 2020-21, the combined sale from all these semen stations was 3.44 crore FSDs valued at Rs.77 crores.

Total Business Transacted

We are pleased to inform that during the year 2020-21, cumulative business transactions conducted by the NCDFI amounted to Rs. 4,661 crores which was 37% higher as compared to the previous year. This includes milk and milk product sales to Institutional buyers worth Rs. 1,407 crores, NCDFI eMarket transactions worth Rs. 3,177 crores, and the sale of frozen semen doses worth Rs.77 crores.

Developmental Activities

Being an apex body of dairy cooperatives in India, NCDFI foresees the requirement to utilize part of its surplus in spreading awareness among dairy cooperatives, specifically in the areas of clean milk production, cooperative governance, productivity of animals, artificial insemination, ration balancing, etc., and to train manpower to enhance their performance and productivity. Most of the programs and events were either kept on hold or canceled due to the health and safety concerns of the participants due to the corona pandemic.

Management Development Programme

NCDFI sponsored a 3-day Management Development Program (MDP) in association with the Regional Institute of Cooperative Management (RICM), Bengaluru on Electronic Markets for the senior officials of cooperative dairy unions/federation at Coorg, Karnataka. To spread awareness on artificial insemination, NCDFI set up stalls at various exhibitions and farmers' fairs across the country. This year due to pandemic, NCDFI could only set up stalls at two farmer fairs in the states of Tamil Nadu and Odisha. The consistent engagement of NCDFI with its members coupled with developmental initiatives provide an opportunity for NCDFI to get valuable feedback from participants on issues pertaining to

procurement, processing, marketing, governance, policy, etc. NCDFI is continuously working on the feedback received from the participants to address the needs of member cooperatives.

Manpower Development

During the year, NCDFI organized a Certification Programme on 'Soft Skills Development' for 25 officials of NCDFI in association with VAMNICOM, Pune. Apart from this, NCDFI employees were also nominated to attend various online training programs and webinars organized by premier institutions to help them be updated with the latest developments in the industry.NCDFI continued to liaison with the Government on various policy issues. NCDFI will continue to engage with the ministries like Defence, Agriculture, Cooperation, and Railways on various pertinent issues of the cooperative dairy sector. Consistent support and inputs of members for working out a continuous strategy for liaisoning with various Government authorities will immensely benefit us to take up the relevant policy matters.

Contribution in the Research and Development

Research and development are the building blocks in the creation of new knowledge. NCDFI has been supporting training research and publication of the literature on the matters of dairy interest and encourages collaborative efforts between organizations for the same. As NCDFI eMarket has multiple technological, as well as operational knowhow to offer, it has been chosen as 'Knowledge Partnering Institution (KPI)' for the 'Research Study on Transparency in Primary Commodity Procurement' under the 'Center for Cooperative & Livelihoods' at the Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie, mainly providing the technology platform for the research.

MoU between NCDFI and (VKCoE) at IRMA

An MoU was signed between Verghese Kurien Centre for Excellence (VKCoE) and at IRMA in 2015. Under the MoU, NCDFI and IRMA will work together till the year 2023-24 for research collaboration activities to study the evolution, growth, working, and contribution of dairy and agriculture cooperatives, and to ensure that the research findings, reach to the targeted beneficiaries so as to increase the income of farmers and rural masses of our country.

MoU between NCDFI and Anand Agricultural University (AAU)

Under the MoU, both NCDFI and AAU have agreed to work initially for two years till the financial year 2021-22 to create programs that promote institutional development and academic enhancement, including but not limited to: faculty and student training, academic and scientific research, and publications.

Awards and Recognition

During the year 2020-21, the Chairman, NCDFI, has been unanimously elected as Governing Council Member of the National Cooperative Union of India (NCUI). The recognition will further boost the spirits of all the stakeholders of dairy cooperatives and further accelerate the efforts of NCDFI aimed at enhancing the welfare of millions of dairy farmers.

NATIONAL FEDERATION OF COOPERATIVE SUGAR FACTORIES LIMITED (NFCSF)

About NFCSF

he National Federation of Cooperative Sugar Factories Limited (NFCSF) was established in 1960 to coordinate and facilitate the working of the affiliated cooperative sugar factories and state federations of cooperative sugar factories and to assist in promotion and installation of new cooperative sugar factories. The NFCSF was established at a time when India's standing in the world sugar scenario was negligible. However, the establishment of NFCSF changed the scenario. There was a steady increase in the sugar production and the cooperatives' share in the total production. During the years 1982, 1988 to 1993, 1995, 1996, 2000 & 2019 India had achieved the distinction of being the world's largest producer of sugar and the share of cooperatives in total sugar production during the above said years was 55% to 61%. As of March 31, 2021 there were 753 installed sugar factories, out of which 283 are in the cooperative sector.

Sugar Production Status

India is witnessing a glut in sugar production. The average domestic sugar production in last four sugar seasons is 309 Lmts which is more than the average consumption of 255 Lmts. Continuous backto-back over production piled up a carryover stock

of more than 90 Lmts for SS 2021-22 despite overwhelming response in sugar export policy of SS 2021-22 of 60 Lmts after delay in announcement by three months with reduction in financial incentive amount by Rs 4,448/Ton and expected export of another 5 Lmts without any financial incentives. Cumulatively India is exporting more than 165 Lmts of sugar from SS 2017-18 onwards till end of this season.

Initiatives by the Government

In order to improve the liquidity of sugar mills, enabling them to clear cane price arrears of farmers and to stabilize domestic sugar price, Government took various corrective measures, as follows.

- Maximum Admissible Export Quantity (MAEQ) of 60 Lmts
- Financial Assistance on Sugar Export
- Financial assistance to sugar mills and grain based distilleries for enhancement and augmentation of ethanol production capacity.

Techno-Commercial Services by NFCSF

Besides the above, NFCSF continued to render its techno-commercial consultancy services to its member cooperative sugar factories and to the need based private sector mills. The professional experts of NFCSF in various disciplines viz. sugar engineering, sugar technology, sugarcane agronomy, financial management, by-products have helped the member sugar factories adopt new technologies and methods for cost effective production of sugarcane and effective utilization of by-products of the industry for its value addition. The technical competence, financial acumen, excellent skills and professional interfacing of the experts of NFCSF helped the member sugar factories to meet new challenges and ever rising global standards. Emphasis was laid on the vertical growth of production of the factories rather than horizontal growth. Accordingly, the projects undertaken during the year pertained more to expansion of crushing capacities, modernization, cogeneration, effective utilisation of by-products i.e. ethanol from sugarcane juice etc.

During the year, NFCSF undertook 74 projects in nine States in India. These projects were related to rehabilitation, modernization, expansion, co-

generation and valuation project reports and detailed project reports and project reports for ten distillery projects. During the year, total techno-commercial consultancy and inspection services from concept to commissioning were also provided.

As sugarcane is the backbone of the sugar industry and as varieties of sugarcane play a major role not only in increasing sugarcane productivity but also sugar recovery, in order to improve the productivity of sugarcane, NFCSF constituted a committee under the Chairmanship of the Managing Director, NFCSF. This Committee has been monitoring the varietal trials conducted in different cooperative sugar factories' operational areas.

Election of President of NFCSF

Shri Jaiprakash R. Salunke Dandegaonkar was unanimously elected as the President of the National Federation of Cooperative Sugar Factories Ltd. at the Apex Sugar Body's 214th meeting of the Board of Directors held on 18th December 2020. Shri Dandegaonkar succeeded Hon'ble Dilip Walse Patil, who had resigned as the President of NFCSF on becoming the Cabinet Minister of State Government of Maharashtra.

A former State Minister of Cooperation and Textile in the Govt. of Maharashtra, and as a senior leader of the Cooperative Sugar sector, Shri Dandegaonkar has contributed significantly towards the growth and development of the Indian sugar sector, one of the few heavily controlled industries in India. As a senior Director of NFCSF, he has been advocating for dynamic reforms in this industry.

61st Annual General Meeting of NFCSF held

The 61st Annual General Meeting of the National Federation of Cooperative Sugar Factories Ltd. took place on 19th December, 2020 at New Delhi. Since the current situation was not quite conducive to conduct the AGM and Efficiency Award ceremony in the traditional manner due to the ongoing COVID-19 situation in Delhi, the annual meeting was organized at a much small scale to meet the statutory requirements.

The meeting saw active and lively discussions among members despite less attendance than the previous years. The members highlighted the

practical hurdles being faced by the sugar mills in enhancing their efficiency level in their expansion plans. They also deliberated upon the future course of action to improve the general well being of cane growers and millers.

Earlier, Shri Jaiprakash Dandegaonkar, Hon'ble President, NFCSF listed the challenges before the Indian sugar industry and reiterated the commitment of NFCSF to make the Indian cooperative sugar sector highly efficient and competitive in the wake of changing domestic and global scenario.

Chief Guest Shri Ishwarsinh T. Patel, Hon'ble Minister of Cooperation, Youth and Transport, Govt of Gujarat and Director, NFCSF assured the President, NFCSF and the Members of the AGM that he would take up the issues with the Central Government so that the hurdles impacting the growth of cooperative sugar sector are mitigated and sorted out at the earliest.

Further, Shri Prakash Naiknavare, Managing Director, NFCSF presented the Annual Report of the Federation for the year 2019-20 before the general body. The members praised the efforts of the federation taken during the year to help cooperative sugar mills and cane growers across the country.

By-Election to Vacant Seats of NFCSF Board

During the 61st Annual General Meeting of the National Federation of Cooperative Sugar Factories Ltd., by-election to the vacant seats in the board of NFCSF was also conducted. In the election, Thiru A.S.A. Raajasekhar, President, Tamil Nadu Cooperative Sugar Federation Ltd., Chennai and Thiru K.P.S. Sureshkumar, President, The Salem Cooperative Sugar Mills Ltd., Namakkal District, Tamil Nadu were elected unopposed to the board of NFCSF.

Outreach to State Cooperative Sugar Federations and Members Cooperative Sugar Mills during the first lockdown of 2020-21

COVID-19 and the subsequent first nationwide lockdown were a major jolt to businesses across the country including the cooperative sugar factories. There were issues of labour, smooth factory operation, marketing and export of sugar etc. There was a sudden halt of all activities at the member

factories, a few of which were in the middle of their operations. To assist and guide the member sugar factories during the testing time, technical experts from the National Federation of Cooperative Sugar Factories organized a series of one-to-one video-conferences with state sugar federations and member cooperative sugar factorie, and wide-ranging issues pertaining to the sugar sector were discussed.

Cooperative Sugar Journal

During the year, NFCSF continued to publish its regular publications viz. its 'Cooperative Sugar Press News' weekly magazine containing present reports on sugar and allied subjects, Parliament questions and answers, market reports, etc. 'Cooperative Sugar' a monthly journal was also published containing useful technical articles on sugarcane, sugar and their by-products and government orders, notifications and statistical information.

NATIONAL FEDERATION OF STATE COOPERATIVE BANKS LTD. (NAFSCOB), VASHI, NAVI MUMBAI

ational Federation of State Cooperative Banks Ltd. (NAFSCOB) was established on May 19, 1964 with a broad objective to facilitate the operations of state and central cooperative banks, in particular and development of short term cooperative credit structure (STCCS) in general. At the end of March, 2020, there are 33 State Cooperative Banks (SCBs), with a network of 2031 branches, 349 District Central Cooperative Banks (DCCBs) with 13799 branches and 95140 Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) in STCCS.

Highlights of the work done

The MoU was signed between NCDC and NAFSCOB on 28-05-2020 to learn, assimilate and develop further on the core strengths, experience and institutional objectives of the respective organisations in the public interest of advancement of training, action research, studies, consultancy, monitoring, evaluation, systems development and technology development in the areas of development of cooperative banking sector.

The Board of Directors of NAFSCOB on 16-03-2021 accorded approval to set up "Standing Advisory Committee on STCCS" to work as a think-tank to deliberate on the issues which are likely to affect the functioning and performance of STCCS and advise suitable interventions in the interest of the STCCS.

Advocacy Role by NAFSCOB:

- Represented for continuation of interest subvention scheme to cooperatives.
- Represented for continuation of 3 tier shortterm cooperative credit structure in present form, in many states, to achieve the spelt out objectives except in Kerala.
- Impressed upon the regulators, supervisors and government to take appropriate regulatory, supervisory and relief measures in the context of Pandemic COVID-19 to help cooperative banks to continue to carry out their operations. Pursuant to the action initiated by NAFSCOB, cooperative banks have been provided major relief measures.
- A number of interventions have been made to relook into various policies initiated by NABARD to help rural cooperatives to perform better in a flexible environment.

Annual Performance Awards to SCBs, DCCBs, PACS and Agricultural Cooperative Staff Training Institutes (ACSTIs)

The Annual Performance Awards to winning SCBs, DCCBs, PACS and Best performance awards to winning ACSTIs for the year 2018-19 were presented jointly by Dr. G.R. Chintala, Chairman, NABARD and Dr. Chandrapal Singh Yadav ji, Ex.M.P (Rajya Sabha), & Chairman, KRIBHCO in a specially arranged event held at Mumbai on 29 December 2020.

The General Body of NAFSCOB for the term 2020 to 2025 has been reconstituted on 29-12-2020. Board of Directors and Chairman & Office bearers for the term 2020-2025 have been elected on 29-12-2020.

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE AGRICULTURE & RURAL DEVELOPMENT BANKS' FEDERATION LTD. (NCARDBF)

The Federation was established in 1960 as the National Apex organization for Long Term Cooperative Credit Structure (LTCCS). LTCCS

advances loans mainly for capital formation of agriculture and rural sectors.

At present the structure comprises of 16 SCARDBs of which only 13 are fully functional with a network of 1722 PCARDBs/branches of SCARDBs at ground level. These banks have a total membership of 1,02,44,345 rural households of which 56,55,969 have outstanding loans. The Total Loans Outstanding and Borrowings Outstanding of these banks as on 31.03.2020 were Rs. 20102.57 crores and Rs. 13437.20 crores respectively. Fully functional SCARDBs have total deposits of Rs. 2129.21 crores as on 31.3.2020 as against Rs. 2113.92 crores as on 31.3.2019. Their total lending during 2019-20 stood at Rs. 4214.40 crores as against Rs. 4242.50 crores during the previous year. Aggregate recoveries were 38.59% (As on 31 March 2020) as against 36.37% last year.

Major Developments - 2020-21

Deposit Mobilisation by ARDBs – TDS on Interest on Deposits

Government of India through an amendment in section 194A of Income Tax Act 1961 has made it mandatory for cooperative societies to make TDS on interest paid on deposits mobilized.

Before the above amendment, through separate subsections of 194A, cooperative societies were exempted from making TDS on interest paid on deposits by voting members. Similarly, Land Mortgage Banks (ARDBs) were also specifically exempted from making TDS on interest payment on deposits mobilized by them.

However, through the recent amendment brought through Union Budget 2021, the above exemptions are withdrawn. All cooperative societies including ARDBs are now required to make TDS on interest payable on deposits if total amount of such payment exceeds Rs.40000 during a financial year. This is applicable in respect of deposits received from members as well as non members.

However, if the total annual income of any depositor is within the income tax exemption limit there is no need for making TDS if the depositor concerned submits form 15G or form 15H (in the case of senior citizens).

International Day of Cooperatives on 4 July 2020

International Cooperative Alliance selected 'Cooperatives for Climate Action' as the theme for International Day of Cooperatives on Saturday 4 July, 2020. Climate action is one of the important goals in SDG 2030 (SDG 13). Agricultural cooperatives can play an important role in tackling climate change. ARDBs can contribute to tackling climate practices by promoting sustainable agricultural and irrigation especially agro forestry, financing and popularizing water saving micro irrigation systems etc.

Follow-up with State Governments for Enhancing Policy Support to SCARDBs

The two Conferences of Principal Secretaries of Cooperation and Registrars of Cooperative Societies organised by the Federation in 2012 and 2014 made several important recommendations for improving the legal and policy environment of ARDBs and improving their working in general. Priority to SCARDBs in giving govt guarantee along with simplifying the procedure and waiving guarantee fee or keeping such fees at lower rate in case waiver is not possible, waiver of stamp duty and registration fee which is yet to be done in some States, removing restrictions on legal recovery measures with regard to wilful defaulters, giving permission for accepting deposits by ARDBs in a couple of States where it has not been done so far, etc. were among the important recommendations relating to State Govts made by the above Conferences. The Federation is continuously following up these recommendations with State Governments concerned.

Challenges in the Context of Covid-19 Pandemic

The country went to lockdown for 68 days from March 25, 2021 to contain covid19 pandemic. Though financial services were exempted from lockdown restrictions, it was a challenging time for ARDBs to carry on normal business when everything else was closed down. The Federation in the above context had a virtual meeting with CEOs of member banks to consider measures to facilitate business continuity while ensuring safety of staff and clients. Following are the main suggestions and observations which emerged in the meeting.

 There is a need for coming up with a contingency plan for ARDBs till the situation becomes normal. Also critical functions which have to be necessarily carried out in all circumstances need to be identified, and suitable staff required for those functions taking into account their age group, general health condition and their competency level need to be short-listed.

- Strengthen IT infrastructure by introducing software for online applications, and online submission of reports by loan processing and recovery follow up by the staff.
- Recovery follow up should be strengthened especially in the case of loanees who have money at this time/ have regular incomes through mobile phone calls, SMS and WhatsApp.
- This is the right time to help existing borrowers by meeting their short term credit requirements.

Promotion and Financing of Joint Liability Groups

JLG concept for advancing investment credit was introduced about 15 years back to increase credit flow to persons not having adequate land or other collaterals to give as security to undertake farming and non farming activities.

NABARD in October 2020 issued revised guidelines to SCARDBs for promoting JLGs and also enhanced the financial support for formation of JLGs to Rs.4000 per JLG from Rs.2000 before.

Publications

Land Bank Journal

The Federation publishes Land Bank Journal since 1962. The journal publishes research articles and news on Agriculture Rural Credit and Cooperation. Important events in the sector and reports on activities of member banks in the publication are also covered.

Annual Statistical Bulletin

Collection and compilation of statistics relating to member banks' operations and publication of Annual Statistical Bulletin is also undertaken.

Monthly Progress Reports of ARDBs

The Federation collects and compiles data on member banks' key operations on a monthly basis for review at its level and thereafter reporting to Govt of India regularly.


Providing employment to Skilled/Unskilled

During the year, The Federation continued to provide skilled and unskilled manpower to Rajiv Gandhi Institute of Petroleum Technology, Noida (U.P.) and Rajiv Gandhi Institute of Petroleum Technology, Bangluru (Karnataka).

INDIAN FARM FORESTRY DEVELOPMENT COOPERATIVE LIMITED' (IFFDC)

FFCO promoted a multi-state Cooperative Society named 'Indian Farm Forestry Development Cooperative Limited' (IFFDC) in 1993. The prime objective of IFFDC is to conserve environment and mitigate climate changes through sustainable natural resource management for enhancing the socioeconomic status of rural poor, tribal community and women in particular. So far, 29,421 hectare wasteland has been developed as multi-purpose forests in the states of Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan and Uttarakhand. These forests are playing an important role in conserving bio- diversity and sanctuary for a large number of wild animals and birds. These forests are sequestrating about 1.41 lakh tonne atmospheric carbon annually, which is helping in mitigating the climate change. The afforestation is being implemented through 152 village level primary farm forestry cooperative societies (PFFCS) having 19,331 members, out of which about 38 per cent are landless, 51 per cent are small/ marginal farmers. Women constitute 32 percent of total membership.

Presently, IFFDC is implementing 20 projects on farm forestry, integrated watershed development, rural livelihood development, agriculture & horticulture development, women empowerment etc. for developing resilience and adaptation to climate changes. This has helped to increase income of the farmers and rural poor community in about 9,563 villages in eight states. About 17,480 ha. area covered under Integrated Watershed Development has resulted in increase of an additional irrigated area of about 15,193 ha. Moreover, IFFDC has developed 8515 Wadis (Small Orchids) on 3406 ha

area under the agri-horticulture programme in various states in partnership with NABARD. In sequel to watershed development projects of NABARD, climate proofing projects are being taken up. For women empowerment, IFFDC is nurturing 1,840 Self Help Groups (SHGs) through skill development, knowledge building and micro-enterprises development etc. The total membership of these SHGs is 18,782 out of which, 94 percent are women members.

Seed Production Programme:

Seed has an important role in crop production. Often, due to non-availability of quality and reliable seed, productivity of crop is affected, resulting in low income from the farm. IFFCO has entrusted job of the Seed Production Programme (SPP) to IFFDC. Accordingly, IFFDC has undertaken the SPP of high yielding and promising varieties of different crops on farmer's fields with its 5 state-of-art technology seed processing units (SPU) located in the states of

Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, Punjab and Rajasthan. During 2020-21, total 3.80 lakhs qtls certified seed of paddy, hybrid paddy, moong, soybean, urd, arhar, hybrid bajra, hybrid maize, sudan sorghum grass during kharif and wheat, barley, gram, mustard, hybrid mustard, cumin & berseem during rabi were made available to the farmers. Seed production of 14 Crops and 52 varieties was undertaken by IFFDC. 11 New varieties of five Crops have been added to production programme during 2020-21. IFFDC supplies seeds to Agricultural Department under Minikit Scheme of Mission on Oilseed & Oil-Palm (NMOOP), Government of India. It is expected that, about 4.25 lakh qtls certified seed of high yielding varieties under production during 2020-21 will be available for marketing during 2021-22.

During the year 2020-21, 2734 quintals of hybrid seed of paddy, pearl millet, maize, mustard & sorghum and 9924 kg of vegetable seeds of 24 different crops have also been made available to the farmers.



IMPORTANT ACTIVITIES OF STATE LEVEL COOPERATIVE ORGANISATIONS

DELHI

The Delhi State Cooperative Union

Due to Covid-19, offices remained closed/non working for about five months. However during the year the staff of the Union conducted 61 managing committee courses and trained 943 elected members of the societies. 36 classes of the active ordinary members were held. 831 members were trained on issues pertaining to registration of new society, role of members, etc. Hence in all 1774 persons were trained upto June 2021.

Technical Workshops

During the year following technical workshops were organized:

- Workshop at Bhajanpura Society of newly registered societies in which 18 office bearers of East Delhi area T/C societies were trained on 18.11.2020.
- Workshop of newly registered societies at Darya Ganj which was attended by 11 office bearers of the newly registered T/C societies on subjects like maintenance of accounts, KYC norms, conducting of meetings and advancement of loans on 17.11.2020.
- Workshop of the cooperative credit societies on Dual Membership and Defaulter in the T/C societies was attended by 14 office bearers of the societies and a representative of Delhi integrated cooperative society. The subjects related to maintenance of records, the number of defaulters, etc. was covered in the workshop. The federation of T/C societies also participated in the said workshop on 28.1.2021.
- Workshop-cum-training programme on arbitration, election procedure, holding of AGM and audit was held at Jai Shree Sharda Coop. T/C Society Ltd., Dilshad Garden, Delhi.

Publication

The Union during the year published Sahkari magazine containing useful information such as notifications of cooperative department of audit, election and AGM as well as judgements of Delhi High Court on joint membership, disqualifications to contest elections, etc. The topics on appeals, revision and review by the competent authorities under the Act were published in the said magazine.

The bye-laws, registration forms of the societies and account books were printed and supplied to the promoters of the societies and already registered societies.

The staff of the Union in the office guided member societies online as well as by personal contacts in the office on different subjects such as registration procedures and submission of documents, calling of AGM, holding of elections and statutory functions of the elected management. A sufficient number of persons were given guidance on the above subjects.

On this occasion, "Aatmanirbharta Udaan " booklet was released by Chair of the seminar, Shri Ghanshyambhai Amin, Chairman of Gujarat State Cooperative Union who addressed the participants of the Seminar on this occasion.



The Gujarat State Cooperative Agriculture & Rural Development Bank Limited

his bank is an apex institution in the cooperative sector in the State of Gujarat for providing investment finance for the development of agriculture and allied activities. It has adopted unitary structure and is involved in business through the network of branches numbering to 176. This bank has got unitary structure having Head Office at the state level and branches at each taluka level. The Head office functions through seventeen district offices.

During the year under review, the total number of members stood at 6,74,729 at the end of the year.

Last year the share capital as on 31st March 2020 was Rs.44,50,97,715/- During the year, considering the amount of share capital refunded on

closure of loan account and added owing to enrollment of new members (loanees), the share capital at the end of the year i.e. as on 31st March 2021 stood at Rs.43,17,75,611/- (tentative). Last year, the balance of Statutory and other Reserve fund was Rs.5,70,86,38,955/- and this year as on 31st March 2021, the balance of statutory and other reserve fund was Rs.6,06,53,43,931/- (tentative) during the year under report.

The Bank has introduced the scheme of accepting fixed deposits from 1991-92. Under this Scheme, the outstanding balance of Fixed Deposit as on 31st March 2020 was Rs.267.12 crores which as on 31st March 2021 stood at Rs.245.88 crores. 0.50% additional interest is given to the members, employees of the bank & senior citizens on their fixed deposits in the bank. The bank disburses loan to the farmers against mortgage of their agricultural land. Thus, the fixed deposits mobilized by the bank are fully secured. The depositors have faith in the Bank, due to which every year there is rise in the amount of fixed deposit of the Bank.

During the financial year 2020-21, total loans disbursed by the bank was Rs.117.76 crores. Due to impact of lockdown by Government of India, on account of (Covid-19) during the financial year 2020-21, the disbursement of loan by the bank got affected.

As per the Loan Policy of the Bank for the year 2020-21, lending targets to the branches of the bank is fixed by considering its achievement, cash flow of previous financial years, recovery percentage, area of operation of branch, potentiality of branch, branch manager / employees and other aspects of the branches.

The bank has been providing medium term agricultural development loans since 2005. During the year 2012-13, the bank introduced Green House Loan. The bank gives loan for Subsidy based activities like rural godowns, sprinklers, drip irrigation, poultry etc. The bank gives loan to agricultural graduates for establishment of Agri. Business Centers. The bank disburses loan for all types of consumer products. Thus, bank disburses loan for more than 300 activities under farm sectors and non-farm sectors.

During the financial year 2017, the bank has started "Kheti Bank Case Credit Scheme". Under this scheme, loan is disbursed to borrowers at the rate of 10% simple interest. If the borrower repays the loan annually along with the interest, he is eligible to get new loan. Under this scheme, mortgage deed has to be done once in five years.

As per amendment made in Section 116 of The Gujarat Cooperative Societies Act 1961, the bank can now finance short-term loans if interest subversion is available from Government of India and Government of Gujarat. For long term loans, the bank is not getting benefit of Interest subvention from either Govt. of India or State Govt. The rate of interest on refinance available from NABARD is very high. The bank has therefore submitted a proposal to State Govt. to avail the benefit of 5% interest subvention on the loan disbursed by the bank to the farmers. The decision taken by the state government in the interest of the farmers will enable them to avail loans at low interest rates.

Private banks and commercial institutions in the country are constantly conducting a review of their operations to help the progress of organizations by providing continuous guidance to their employees to work towards achieving future goals in due course of time. In today's competitive era, such standards are also implemented by organizing the Review Meeting on quarterly basis at the head office, Ahmedabad for the district managers of the Bank.

Quarterly Review Meetings are conducted at district level, to review functioning of the branches. Meetings of various committees are also organized at the head office for the management of the bank. As part of the course work of Diploma In Cooperative Management, the students of Gujarat Sahakari Vyavasthapan Kendra, Ahmedabad run by Gujarat Rajya Sahakari Sangh, Ahmedabad visited the training center to prepare assignments and study the working of the cooperative institution.

In view of modern times, the proposal of NIC National Informatic Center (NIC) New Delhi for computerization of the 176 Branches of the bank, 17 district offices and head office was sanctioned by the Board of the Bank. CCBS project has started from 2016. Under this project, CCBS First pilot project was started in 5 branches. After successful implementation in 5 branches, CCBS project was started in 166 branches and 9 district offices out of which more than 145 branches of the bank are operating the Software, and 130 branches of the bank are operating till date.

All branches of Mehsana, Banaskantha, Amreli and Valsad districts of the state are operational. Besides, work has been started in software in 9 district offices. CCBS software will be launched in Head Office after all the branches and district offices start operating. The bank's branches and district offices will be launching mobile application for all the members of the bank shortly

As per the norms of the bank, if the borrowers/ members of the bank died in an accident, under those circumstances, to repay the outstanding loan of the deceased borrowers, the bank provides financial support upto Rs. 1,00,000/- to those borrowers, who are regular in the repayment of their loan, under the circumstances of accidental death.

The Cooperative Department has done the audit of the bank for the year 2018-19. The Bank was classified under "A" category.

In the dire situation of Corona epidemic, Rs.11,00,000/- lakhs was donated to the Chief Minister's Relief Fund as financial assistance for welfare of people of Gujarat.

GSCARD Bank arranged COVID-19 test for employees of the Bank at Head Office, Ahmedabad. The bank also installed automatic sanitizer machine for use of employees and visitors. Use of mask and maintaining social distance at work place is also made mandatory.

HARYANA

Haryana State Cooperative Supply and Marketing Federation Ltd.

AFED is the largest apex cooperative federation of Haryana State. It came into existence on 1st November, 1966 alongwith the formation of Haryana as a separate State. Since then it is playing a leading role in serving the farmers of Haryana as well as consumers in India and overseas. Over the years HAFED has become one of the leading organizations in the State in the following segments:

- Largest food grains procurement agency of the State.
- A premier warehousing agency of the state for scientific storage of food grains.
- Largest chain of agro-processing units in the State.

- Major supplier of quality, hygienic and safe consumer products, cattle/animal feeds in the domestic and overseas markets.
- Largest supply chain network upto the village level in Haryana State for distribution of agri - inputs like fertilizers, pesticides, seeds, etc.

Infrastructure

To execute these functions, HAFED has the following infrastructure, the main features of which are as under:

Procurement

Wheat Procurement

The wheat procurement is done for the central pool on behalf of the FCI. The quantity procured was 29.69 lakh MT for the year 2020-21.

Oil-Seeds/Pulses Procurement

NAFED is the central nodal agency for procurement of oil seeds and pulses under price support scheme (PSS) in the country. Hafed is the state agency for procurement of oil seeds and pulses on behalf of Nafed in Haryana. Hafed therefore also procures mustard seed, gram & sunflower seed on behalf of NAFED under price support scheme in case the prices of these commodities fall below the support price. Hafed also makes procurement of mustard seed for its oil mills on commercial basis. While the procurement of mustard seed was 4.53 lakh MT, the procurement of sunflower was 6,711 MT.

For bajra procurement for 2020-21, the qty procured was 5,06,421 MT, while MSP was Rs. 2,150 per qutl. For moong procurement, the quantity procured (in MT) was 580. For gram, quantity procured (in MT) was 6,215, while MSP was 4.875 (Rs. Per qntl). For paddy procurement, HAFED procures paddy at support price for central pool which is delivered as custom milled rice to FCI as per Govt. of India Scheme. For 2020-21, paddy procured was 18.03 (in lakh MT). For maize, the quantity procured in MT was 4,058.

Procurement of Groundnut

Procurement of groundnut has been started first time by HAFED. HAFED has purchased 651 MT of groundnut in the kharif 2020 season upto 31.12.2020.

10/9 Years Private Entrepreneur Godowns (PEG)

HAFED was declared as a Nodal Agency by the State Government for construction of approx. 39.56 lakh MT godowns in the State of Haryana under Private Entrepreneur Godown (PEG) Scheme 2008 of Government of India.

Major Processing Units

Oil Mill, Rewari

Oil Mill was set up at Rewari in 1986. This mill produces 'Kachchi Ghani 'Agmark' mustard oil, the quality of which is comparable with the best available in the country. As for as the performance of oil mill, Rewari is concerned, the turnover was 38,936,77 while profit/loss (in lakhs) was 600.

The processing and marketing facilities in the oil mill have also improved. Various measures have been taken up to enhance the crushing capacity and to improve the quality of the oil. The godown of 3,300 MT has been constructed in the oil mills and a packing section of 1500 MT was constructed at Oil Mill Rewari.

Oil Mill, Narnaul

HAFED set up Modern Kachchi Ghani Mustard Oil Mill at Narnaul of 30 TPD capacity in 2003. As far as the performance of the oil mill, Narnaul is concerned, for 2020-21, the turnover was 38,636 (in lakhs), while the profit was 600 (in lakhs).

Cattle Feed Plant, Rohtak

Cattle Feed plant of 100 TPD capacity was set

up in 1976 at Rohtak. It has facilities for manufacturing cattle feed, poultry feed, piggery feed & mineral mixtures, bricks and molasses urea bricks. The consistency in quality and regular supply has earned a lot of goodwill for HAFED cattle feeds. HAFED had replaced existing plant with ultra modern technology new plant of 150 TPD capacity (expandable upto 300 TPD) in the year. As far as the performance of cattle feed plant is concerned, the turnover was 3,568.50 in MT for 2020-21.

HAFED set up an Animal Feed Plant at Saktakhera of 50 TPD capacity in the year 2001. As far as the performance of AFP, Saktakhera is concerned, the turnover was 1,600 (Qty. in MT), while the profit was 90 lakhs.

Pesticides Plant, Taraori

With a view to make available quality insecticides and weedicides at reasonable prices, HAFED established a Pesticide Plant at Taraori in 1974. During the last few years, several new products have been added to meet the requirements of wheat, paddy, cotton & oil seed crops of Haryana State. As far as the performance of pesticides plant, Taraori is concerned, the turnover was 2,349.19 (in lakhs), while the profit was 30 lakhs for 2020-21.

Sugar Mill, Assandh

HAFED has set up a Sugar Mill of 2500 TCD capacity along with incidental co-generation and 2 MW power units exportable to state grid at Assandh with an approx cost of Rs. 80.00 crores during the year 2008. The sugarcane sowing area has been increased remarkably since its inception. Hafed Sugar Mill, Assandh has been awarded National Level 3rd prize for the year 2013-14, 2nd prize for the year 2014-15 and 1st prize for the year 2016-17 in financial management among the cooperative sugar mills situated in India.

Seed Processing Plant, Ganaur

With the aim to provide good quality seeds to the farmers at a reasonable price, HAFED has diversified into a new activity of seed production during the year 2010-2011. The turnover of the plant during 2020-21 is Rs. 1650 lakhs.

Rice Mill, Taraori

The rice mill was set up by HAFED at Taraori in 1970 and up-gradations have been made in the

mill from time to time. In the year 2012-13, the rice mill has been modernized and the capacity of newly set up paddy shelling, polishing and surtax units increased to 4 MT, 4 MT and 6 MT per hour respectively. The performance of rice mill, Taraori during 2020-21 as far as turnover is concerned, was 502.86 (in lakhs).

Flour Mill At Taraori

The flour mill has been set up at Taraori in the year 2012-13 with a capacity of 20 tons per day. The performance of Flour Mill, Taraori as far as turnover for 2020-21 is concerned, is 426.84 (in lakhs).

- HAFED supplied approx. 126.35 lakh litre fortified mustard oil during the period from 01.04.2020 to 30.09.2020 under PDS schemes of Haryana Government for further distribution to the families of BPL/AAY in Haryana.
- HAFED also supplied approx. 120 MT edible oils (Fortified Mustard Oil, Soyabean Refined Oil and Cottonseed Refined Oil) per month to Woman and Child Department, Haryana.
- HAFED implemented the scheme of food fortification by supplying whole wheat fortified chalkki atta in Naraingarh and Barara Blocks of Ambala district. Atta is being supplied under PDS through Food Department w.e.f. March 2018. Fortified Atta is supplied through HAFED Flour Mill, Taraori to WCD in these two blocks. The supply of fortified atta in 5 districts of Haryana also started w.e.f. October, 2019.
- HAFED also started supply of fortified atta for ICDS and Mid-Day-Meal Schemes in 6 districts of Haryana.

Marketing and Fertilizers

The sale of HAFED consumer products for the year 2020-21 is Rs. 408.02 crores. Hafed is the Sole State Nodal Agency for arrangement and distribution of fertilizers through cooperative network in Haryana and is successfully making timely arrangements of all kinds of fertilizers. Agricultural inputs like seeds, fertilizers and pesticides/insecticides/ weedicides play an important role in increasing the productivity of crops. Over the years, through the network of its cooperatives, HAFED has been ensuring that the farmers get quality Inputs at reasonable prices. HAFED's role in

Inputs' supply is important not only from economy point of view but also from the fact that with HAFED, a farmer is sure of the quality/ purity of the product. He is saved from the possibility of any damage to his crops. The fertilizer sale during the year 2020-21 is 1.08 MT. HAFED has played a vital role in controlling shortage of urea and DAP in the state by taking timely action for advance stocking. HAFED has made advance tie ups with IFFCO, KRIBHCO, NFL & the Indian Potash Limited for advance stocking of DAP and urea in the state.

Financial Highlights

For 2020-21, the turnover approx. was Rs. 17,310 crore while the profit approx. was Rs. 90.86 crore.

New Projects/Initiatives taken up

 HAFED has started setting up of Mega Food Project at IMT, Rohtak with an estimated project cost of 17975 crore.

- To set up a modern oil mill of 150 TPD capacity at Rampura district, Rewari, and to upgrade and modernize the existing oil mills of HAFED at Rewari and Narnaul from 30 TPD to 50 TPD capacity.
- ◆ To open its new sales outlets at strategic locations in all district headquarters in the state.
- To appoint distributorship in other states for sale of HAFED consumer products.
- ◆ To increase the HAFED consumer products range by adding new products like wheat bran, poha, jiggery, honey, etc.
- ◆ To set up a turmeric and cold storage plant at Taraon district Karnal.
- To install CCTV based surveillance in HAFED godowns.

HIMACHAL PRADESH

Himachal Pradesh State Cooperative Development Federation

The Himachal Pradesh State Cooperative Development Federation Ltd., Shimla came into being in the year 1960, at the initiative of the Department of Cooperation, H.P. Government. Its principal objective in nutshell is, "to promote and develop the cooperative movement in Himachal Pradesh; to educate, guide and assist the people in their efforts to build up and expand the cooperative movement". The main activities of this federation can be broadly divided into four parts.

Cooperative Education Programme

Cooperative education programme was first introduced in Himachal Pradesh in the year 1957 with two cooperative educational units under the charge of cooperative education officer. The programme was introduced under the charge of state cooperative bank. The education programme was transferred to HIMCOFED in the year 1962. The present sanctioned strength of CEIs is 24, and the number of Lecturers & CEIs/others is only 15. The main objective of the programme is to generate awareness and acquaint committee members, members, potential members, SC/ST members, women and youth with the philosophy, principles of the cooperative movement, quorum of Annual General Body Meeting, and special privileges of cooperative societies, etc.

Cooperative Training Programme

This Federation is running two Cooperative Training Centres at Mashobra, Distt. Shimla and Garli, Distt. Kangra to cater to the training needs of junior personnel of cooperative development and employees of cooperative institutions. In both training Centres, one Diploma in Cooperative Management Course of 16 week duration is organized in accordance with the guidelines and syllabus prescribed by National Council for Cooperative Training (NCCT).

Publication and Propagada

Apart from implementation of cooperative education and training programme, this federation is also undertaking publication and propaganda activities. The main activities under the programme are as below:-

Printing Press

A Printing Press was established by this Federation in the year 1971 with a view to provide stationery and printing facilities to the cooperative institutions of the state at reasonable prices. In the recent years the Printing Unit has been modernized

by installation of three offset printing machines. The modernization drive enhanced the quality and quantitative capacity of the Press. As a result this Federation is able to acquire the printing work from H.P. University, transport department, science and technology, ICAR, Panchayati Raj etc.

KARNATAKA

Karnataka Cooperative Milk Producer's Federation Ltd.

The Karnataka Cooperative Milk Producers Federation Ltd., a cooperative apex body in Karnataka, has been implementing dairy development activities in the entire state since 4 decades in a phased manner through the 14 district milk unions, ushering prosperity in the lives of rural milk producers.

The Federation in its fold has 14 district milk unions spread-over the entire state of Karnataka covering all 31 districts by cooperative dairying activity. The district milk unions in operation are situated at Bengaluru, Kolar, Mysuru, Chamarajanagar, Mandya, Tumkuru, Hassan, Dharwad, Belagavi, Vijayapura, Kalaburagi, D.Kannada, Shivamogga and Ballari.

Following are key dairy plants:

- 1. Mother Dairy, Yelahanka, Bengaluru
- 2. Nandini Hi-Tech Product Plant.
- 3. Nandini Mega Hi-Tech Powder Plant (Ramanagar)
- 4. Nandini Milk Products, KMF Unit, Bengaluru
- 5. Cattle Feed Plant Rajanukunte, Gubbi, Dharwad, Hassan and Shikaripur

Training Institutes

The Central Training Institute at Bangalore and Training centers at Mysuru, Dharwad and Gulbarga are imparting a wide range of need-based training programs on various subjects related to DCS Staff, accounts, administration, technical inputs and also training is conducted under HRD and other specialized fields for officers and staff, WDCS members and officers/ staff of KMF, Unions and Units.

Physical Achievements

By March 2021, a network of 16789 dairy cooperative societies (DCS) have been organized, in 14 milk unions. Among them, 14864 DCS are functioning with 96% of them being in profit. About 4093 women DCS are functioning. These DCS are spread over 227 talukas covering 24120 villages, (76%) out of total of 29736 villages in all the 31 Districts of Karnataka. About 25.71 lakhs rural farmers are members in these DCS, of which 9.51 lakhs are small farmers, 7.49 lakhs are marginal farmers, 4.56 lakhs landless labourers and 4.13 lakhs are others. Out of these, 2.69 & 1.51 lakhs of them belong to SC & ST groups, and 9.31 lakhs are women members.

The DCS carry out milk procurement activity on all the 365 days procuring an avg. of 78.73 lakh kgs per day during 2020-21.

The surplus milk is handled, without resorting to milk procurement holidays. Karnataka Milk Federation stands 2nd position in milk procurement at the National level.

The Financial Progress

The Federation has maintained low price spread between procurement and sale price which has resulted in higher realization. At present, on an average 19 crores is being paid per day to the milk producers.

The overall impetus given by the Federation to the Dairy development activities in the state has resulted in higher procurement of milk, which is handled without declaring any milk holiday.

The adequate processing facilities coupled with new marketing strategies have resulted in higher turnover. There is a marked increase of 16656 crores in 2020-21 as compared to 998.39 crores in the year 1999-2000.

Support to Training and Employment Programme (STEP) for women was launched by the Ministry of Women & Child Development, Government of India, as one of the measures to ensure well-being of women in the traditional informal sector in the year 1986.

Karnataka Milk Federation (KMF) initiated the STEP Programme in Karnataka from October 1997.

Since then, KMF has organized 800 Women Dairy Cooperative Societies (WDCS) in three Phases and in Phase IV converted 250 WDCS organized prior to the advent of STEP into STEP WDCS. In addition to these in the year 2007, the Government of India has approved two more Phases – Phase V for organizing of 200 new WDCS and Phase VI for bringing the 200 existing WDCS into the fold of STEP. Till now there are 4,053 WDCS organized in KMF, 1924 WDCS are covered under STEP scheme. Another project was sanctioned to Nittur Education Society of Bhalki in collaboration with KMF for organizing 24 WDCS under the jurisdiction of Gulbarga Milk Union confined to Bidar Distict.

KMF initiated 'Ksheera Sanjeevini' - Phase-I project with Sanjeevini-KSRLPS from April 2014. The proposed project brings 250 existing women dairy cooperative societies by the 30 district into the fold of Ksheera Sanjeevini. It is anticipated to enroll 10,000 women as target group members (TGMs). The outlay of the project is Rs.17.10 crores for three years.

- In Ksheera Sanjeevini phase II(2020-21), the target is to benefit/meet 6,920 women under below poverty line (poverty stricken) with 170 women cooperative milk producers societies through founding 346 milk producers group.
- The project plans at providing margin money (interest free loan) for the purchase of 6,920 milch animals and facilitating the group members with technical training on dairying, educational tour and accessibility for credit facilities from the financial institutions. The Project is estimated to demand funds of Rs.1,032.39 lakhs, inclusive of the recollected margin money from the women cooperative milk producers societies, which account for Rs.300 lakhs, as mentioned according to Memorandum of understanding (MoU) signed by Sanjeevini-KSRLP and KMF. During the period of 2021-22, the project plans to establish and add 250 milk producers group.

KMF -Sanjeevini (IBP)

After the very good impact of STEP & Ksheera Sanjeevini scheme in uplifting the rural women economically and socially, KMF also started a new scheme KMF Sanjeevini program in the same lines of STEP/ Ksheera Sanjeevini in all milk unions. In this scheme in 100 WDCS, 4000

- beneficiaries are covered in 14 milk unions with an outlay of 4.25 crores. This scheme also covers training, animal purchase through margin money and bank linkages.
- Since 2017-18, Rotary institutions in collaboration with KMF launched "Kamadhenu" project to provide margin money for the purchase of milch animal s i.e., Rs.50,000/per animal per women beneficiary as interest free loan (margin money). Under the project, 236 women beneficiaries belonging to the jurisdiction of Bangalore, Mandya, Tumkur and Kolar were provided with the margin money with an total outlay of Rs. 118 lakhs (60% from Rotary institutions and 40% from KMF) for the animal purchase on a regular basis.

Performance Highlights

The mission of Karnataka Milk Federation is to promote economic prosperity and social empowerment of our member milk producers through vigorous cooperative dairy development in Karnataka State. The successful realization of these goals is reflected in many landmark achievements during the recent years, some of which are listed below:

- ◆ Full coverage: The state is entirely covered by cooperative dairy development.
- Covered by Farmers: Elected boards are in position in all the district milk unions and the federation.
- ◆ Lowest price spread in the country: Lowest price spread between procurement price and sale price. Due to efficiency of operations in the federation and unions, more than 75% of the consumer rupee is passed on to the producers.
- Cooperative Excellence: Most of the dairy cooperative societies (DCS) are earning profit.
- Pioneer in Cross-breeding: Extensive coverage of cross-breeding programs has catapulted the state to become one of the few pioneering states in cross-breeding in the country.
- Empowering Producers for Rural Prosperity: An overwhelming majority of the beneficiaries of cooperative dairy development programs in

- the state belong to vulnerable section of the society in villages.
- Remunerative price to producers: The purchase price paid to producers has seen a quantum jump during the recent years, thereby making the occupation of dairying remunerative for the farmers in the state.
- ◆ The State Government has magnanimously increased the incentive, being paid for every litre of milk supplied by farmers to dairy cooperatives in the state.
- Majority of our member milk producers are small farmers, marginal farmers and landless laborers, who need hand-holding in their critical times of distress. KMF is implementing several financial assistance programs of GOK.
- Karnataka Milk Federation is also successfully implementing Central Government Schemes, such as National Programme for Dairy Development and Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojane.
- ♦ Strengthening Training facilities: The KMF is making great efforts to ensure that DCS operate as profitable business units and producer members play active role in the management of their DCS. Determined efforts are being made continuously to build the capacities of our member producers by making large investments in member education and training.
- The five cattle feed plants of the Federation have excelled in productivity by capacity utilization of more than 120% so as to meet the ever increasing demand for NANDINI cattle feed from producers. The cattle feed plants are ISO9001-2008 certified for producing quality cattle feed.
- In order to meet the increasing demand for NANDINI cattle feed, a new 300 MTD (MTs per day) Cattle Feed Unit, at Hassan and a new 300 MTD capacity Hi-tech cattle feed plant at Shikaripura have been commissioned which have started production.
- The capacity of Dharwad Cattle Feed Plant has been expanded from 150 MTD to 200 MTD

- KMF is the first Federation in the country to introduce area-specific mineral mixtures, under the technical guidance of NIANP. Now, this concept has become very popular across the country.
- Established Mineral Mixture Plants in Gubbi Dharwad and Hassan cattle feed plants.
- In the present days of increasing manufacturing cost of cattle feeds, the profitability of dairying for the farmers is getting constantly eroded. Hence, effective utilization of locally available roughages is a promising solution to increase farmers profitability in milk production. KMF has initiated ambitious program to commission Fodder Densification Units in the state.
- The overwhelming success of AI programs in the state is due to supplier quality semen straws, being produced in the Nandini Sperm station of the Federation. This Station has been recognized by the Ministry of Agriculture, GOI, as the Best A-Grade station in the country and this station is also certified for ISO 9001-2008.
- Mother Dairy has been certified for exports by EIA, GOI, KMF and supplies milk products to several other states and to the Indian army, besides exporting to USA, Russia, South Africa, Singapore, Thailand, Philippines, Nepal Bangladesh and many other countries

Karnataka State Souharda Federal Co-operative Ltd.

Due to corona virus (COVID-19), the Federal Cooperative has continued to conduct online training programs. During the lockdown, Whatsapp groups of President, CEO/officials of Souharda Cooperatives were formed, and necessary information was sent to all concerned through these groups.

A copy of the Swabhimani Sahakari monthly magazine, which is published monthly by the Federal Cooperative, was widely circulated through e-mail and whatsapp. Diploma in Cooperation and Banking Management, a 6 months course was started from 1st January 2021. The second and third contact class of the diploma course and examination of the course were successfully completed online. A total of 276 training programmes were conducted by the Federation during the year.

Management Training Programmes

- On 23rd and 24th February 2021, a two days programme was conducted for President, Directors and CEO's of the Souharda cooperative banks. A total number of 50 participants from 12 Souharda cooperative banks participated in the training programme.
- Training on social networking, digitalization and

- financial inclusion was organized by the divisional office of Kalaburagi for Souharda cooperatives in Bidar District. A total of 145 participants from 128 souharda cooperatives participated in the training programme.
- Cluster Training: A Cluster Training Programme was organized in the month of January by all regional offices of the Souharda Federal Cooperative. A total of 292 participants participated in 25 such cluster programmes.
- Loan documentation training: A loan documentation training programme was organized by the Mysore regional office for the Presidents, Directors and CEOs of Hassan District souharda cooperatives. 42 participants attended the programme.
- Basic training was held for Presidents/CEOs of New Souharda Cooperatives in Bellary district. A total of 35 delegates from 24 souharda cooperatives participated in the training programme.
- Training on documentation and federal circulars was organized in which 342 delegates from 276 souharda cooperatives participated.

Family Development Cooperative Thrift and Credit Society Ltd. (FAMCO)

AMCO was registered by the Central Registrar of Cooperatives, New Delhi, on the 23rd Day of July, 2009, as a Multi State Cooperative Society. Its area of operation is the states of Puducherry, Tamilnadu and Karnataka with the registration number MSCS/CR/307/2009. FAMCO has been functioning with the following Vision and Mission.

Vision: To build up an egalitarian society as one family based on the principles of cooperation

where the virtues of justice, equality, freedom, fraternity, and peace are the living values of the people at the local, state and national level.

Mission: FAMCO will work with the poor, marginalized, vulnerable, downtrodden, and excluded communities and families by encooraging them to acively participate in various meetings/events. In this process, FAMCO will also collaborate with societies, trusts, associations, companies, cooperatives, and other organizations which believe in the cooperative principles.

As on 31.03.2021, FAMCO has a total membership of 443 members (114 Individual members and 329 group members). The total paid up share capital is Rs.12,82,500/-. The total number of members as on 31.03.2020 was 433 (111 individual members and 322 group members) and the total paid up share capital was Rs. 12,58,100/-. During the reporting period, 3 individual members and 7 Group members have joined FAMCO with an additional share capital of Rs.15,900/- and Rs.8,500/- respectively Hence the total shares increased during this reporting period.As on 31st March 2021, FAMCO has total deposits of Rs.1.58 crores.

During the year, 36 member SHGs were given a total loan of Rs.1, 05, 00,000/- for small income generation activities. The loans are repaid 100%. Since inception, FAMCO granted a total loan of Rs.11.48 crores to 443 SHGs covering 6400 families.

11th Annual General Body Meeting of FAMCO was held on 23.01.2021 (Saturday). Only two meetings of FAMCO Board and Directors were conducted due to corona pandemic.

The nationwide curfew was also observed in Puducherry as a result of covid. During that time Ariancouppam village was sealed as one corona positive case was identified. As a result, 250 families were left out with no food for them. FAMCO was approached by the state government volunteers for support.

FAMCO under the leadership of Rev. Fr. A.S. Antonisamy, Founder, FAMCO formed the voluntary group in the name "One Body Global Merciful Charity Group" and mobilized Rs.23,000/- for providing food to the people who were in hunger. Rs. 18,000/- was spent for providing lunch to the suffering families.

Food was cooked and distributed to the needy families by the volunteers.

उपमोक्ता संघ कागठन एवं उद्देश्य: राजस्थान राज्य सहकारी उपभोक्ता संघ लि. जयपुर (कॉनफैड) की स्थापना दिंनांक 27.03.1967 को राज्य के उपभोक्ताओं को उत्तम गुणवत्तायुक्त वस्तुएं उचित मूल्य पर उपलब्ध कराने के लिए की गई थी। उपभोक्ता क्षेत्र की शीर्ष सहकारी संस्था कॉनफैड का कार्यक्षेत्र समस्त राजस्थान राज्य है एवं पंजीकृत कार्यालय जयपुर में स्थित हैं। कॉनफैड द्वारा वर्तमान में जयपुर में अपने 8 उपहार विक्रय केन्द्रों के माध्यम से उचित मूल्य पर अच्छी गुणवत्ता के उत्पाद उपलब्ध करवाये जा रहे हैं। उपभोक्ता संघ की कुल हिस्सा पूंजी 324.51 लाख रुपये है। इसमें राज्य सरकार की हिस्सा राशि 289.81 लाख रुपये है।

संघ के कार्यकलाप: कॉनफैड द्वारा अपनी व्यावसायिक गतिविधियों का संचालन प्रधान कार्यालय व तीन अनुभागों मेडिकल/मार्केटिंग/नागरिक आपूर्ति के माध्यम से किया जा रहा है।

मेडिकल अनुभाग : मेडिकल अनुभाग द्वारा जयपुर जिले में 56 ऐलोपैथिक, 3 आयुर्वेदिक एवं 1 प्रधानमंत्री जन औषधि दवा विक्रय केन्द्र (कुल 69 दवा विक्रय केन्द्रों) के माध्यम से दवाईयों का व्यवसाय किया जा रहा है। राज्य सरकार के कम्रचारियों, पेंशनर्स एवं आमजन को दवाईयां उपलब्ध करवाई जा रही हैं। कॉनफैड के मेडिकल अनुभाग द्वारा नवाचार के रूप में जयपुर शहर में पेंशनर्स को अनुपलब्धता प्रमाण पत्र के आधार पर खरीदी गई दवाईयों के बिलों केपेटे भूगतान आरटीजीएस के माध्यम से किये जा रहे हैं तथा प्रधानमंत्री जन औषधि योजनान्तर्गत एक जन औषधि दवा केन्द्र का संचालन भी प्रारम्भ किया गया है। प्रधानमंत्री जन औषधी योजनान्तर्गत कॉनफैड के मेडिकल अनुभाग द्वारा एस.एम.एस. अस्पताल परिसर में एक जन औषधि दवा केन्द्र तथा संतोकबा दुर्लभजी मैमोरियल हॉस्पिटल एवं रिसर्च सेन्टर, जयपुर में भी दवा विक्रय केन्द्र का संचालन किया जा रहा है।

TAMIL NADU

Tamil Nadu Cooperative Union

he cooperative movement in Tamil Nadu has grown and spread like a banyan tree and taken deep roots and is closely linked with the day today affairs of the people. Tamil Nadu Cooperative Union was started on 4.1.1914. The first President of the Tamil Nadu Cooperative Union is Thiru. M. Adhinarayana Ayya.

The TNCU consists of membership of 17 apex cooperative societies, and 29 district cooperative unions. These member societies pay annual subscription to TNCU.

Administration

The administration of TNCU is being carried out by Board of Directors. From October 2018, the administration is carried out by Add. Registrar/ Managing Director.

Statutory Funds

As per Sec. 72 of TNCS Act 1983 and Rules 90 & 91 of TNCS Rules, 1988, 3% and 2% of net profit of profitable societies are appropriated as CRDF and CEF funds respectively. Of the above amount collected by DCU, 10% is retained by DCU and 90% is remitted to CRDF & CEF. At present, out of the collection amount for Cooperative Research and Development Fund and Cooperative Education Fund, 15% of the collection amount has been utilised for TNCU establishment and contingencies charges as per law.

- There is approvision for grant-in-aid for researchoriented activities.
- To give interest free loans for business development.
- Grant from CEF are given for cooperative education purpose, 50% share for general basic course to ICM, Madurai and 100% share to Natesan ICM, Chennai and ICM, Madurai for conduct of short-duration courses for the employees of cooperative societies.

Publications

The Tamil Nadu Cooperative Union is publishing "Kootturavu", a Tamil monthly journal. "Tamil Nadu Journal of Cooperation" an English monthly journal and "Madhamirumurai Kootturavu Murasu" a Tamil fortnightly are also published.

Public Relations/Education and Training

- The State Cooperative Union celebrates the "All India Cooperative Week" every year during Nov. 14 - 20. Shields are presented to best working cooperative societies.
- Blood camps, eye camps, medical camps, environmental cleaning camps etc. are organised.
- ◆ TNCU and DCU Union organize exhibitions, and state union participates every year in the procession of tableaux organised on the eve of Republic Day celebrations.
- In TN, 20 ICMs conduct Diploma in Cooperative Management for +2 students in order to get employment opportunities in the cooperative sector in regular stream (36 weeks/9 months).
- DCM course is also conducted for employees in correspondence steam (weekend course).
- Short duration courses are conducted for government employees and cooperative institutions employees.
- Part-time-computer courses such as DCA, MS office, Tally 9.0 and DTP are also conducted.
- Out of 20 ICMs, 10 ICMs, 2 ITI's and 1 polytechnic college are functioning in own building. 3 ICMs have own land. Remaining 7 ICMs are functioning in rental building.

- During the year 2020-21, 3722 students were imparted DCM training through regular courses, 1801 students were trained through correspondence course.
- ◆ To promote self-employment opportunities among the unemployed youth, TNCU established cooperative industrial training institutes at Bargur in Krishnagiri district and at Pattukkottai in Thanjavur district, where courses like Electrician, Sewing Technology, Computer Operator and Food Production are conducted.

During the year 2020-21, 107 students were admitted in the above two Pattukkottai and Bargur ITIs (due to Covid-19 pandemic admission for the year 2020-21, the government quota is not filled).

Lalgudi Cooperative Polytechnic College

The TNCU with the permission of the All India Council Education, New Delhi started a Cooperative Polytechnic College at Lalgudi in Trichirappalli district.

The Cooperative Polytechnic College was started during the academic year 2000-01 (9-10-2000) with the following Diploma programmes:

- 1. Computer Engineering: 60 students (intake per year.
- 2. Mechanical Engineering : 120 students (intake per year)
- 3. Electrical and Electronic Engineering : 60 students (intake per year).

During the year 2020-21, 203 students were admitted in the above three courses (the number of admission decreased due to Covid-19 pandemic).

District Cooperative Union

- Member education programmes are conducted for the primary and district level society members especially the rural masses so as to create awareness for cooperatives.
- Youth programmes for school and college students are organized to make them aware about the functioning of cooperatives.
- Success stories of members and other societies

are published in the magazines of TNCU. They are also publicized widely in electronic media.

Future Plans

- ☐ To start skill-based job oriented courses like A/c mechanic, web designing, mobile servicing, CCTV camera, video conferencing, etc.
- To computerise the functions of Tamil Nadu Cooperative Union head office, 29+8 district cooperative unions, 20 institutes of cooperative management, two industrial training institutes and one polytechnic.
- ☐ To construct own buildings at Kanyakumari, Dindigul, Sattur, for the Institutes of Cooperative Management which are running in rental buildings.
- ☐ To modernize the TNCU head office and the class rooms and to develop the infrastructure facilities in all Institutes of Cooperative Management where the professional courses are being conducted.
- ☐ In the context of technology development, competitive exam courses will be started in all ICMs. Yoga classes and computer related courses of latest versions will also be started in all ICMs and ITI's.
- ☐ To appraise the feasibility of starting evening colleges/arts and science courses in select ICM's/Polytechnics/ITI.

Telangana State Cooperative Union Ltd., Cooperative Training Centre, Hyderabad

The Cooperative Training Centre, Hyderabad conducted nine departmental training programmes in which 270 trainees participated. Chairman and CEOs Interactive Sessions

Interactive Sessions for Chairmen and CEOs of 14 UCBs were conducted by the Federation on 22nd, 23rd and 25th February 2021 to impress upon the managements of these banks to take suitable corrective steps for improving their performance.



Telangana State Cooperative Apex Bank Ltd. (Apex Bank), Hyderabad

Telangana State Cooperative Apex Bank Limited, Hyderabad is registered under State Cooperative Societies Act. It commenced its business from 2nd April, 2015 onwards.

Services of the Bank

The Apex Bank is providing crop loans for crop production, long term loans for capital investment in agriculture and allied activities through the DCCBs and PACS. It also provides loans to weavers societies, employees coop. credit societies, APOs and also credit to apex coop. institutions in the state. The total business of the Bank as on 31.03.2021 is Rs.13245.69 crores, while Gross Profit was Rs. 59.38 crores.

- ◆ TSCAB introduced HRMS Portal which contains complete profile of the staff members.
- Introduced Half Yearly Performance Management system (upto AGM cadre).
- ◆ In order to bring in transparency in evaluating the performance of the branches, a new mechanism for rating was introduced by the bank which was designed scientifically to bring more transparency and to adequately recognize the efforts being made at the branch level.
- The bank has formulated a monitoring system for the new recruits by assigning them to senior officers of the cadre of DGMs, GMs, CGM and MD who act as mentors/guide to them.
- The bank has revised Annual Performance Appraisal Report (APAR) format as

recommended by Amalorpavanathan Committee.

- Review meetings of branch managers are conducted every month on a pre-fixed dates (on 8th & 9th).
- Review meetings of CEOs of DCCBs are held on 14th of every month.
- Surprise verification of gold ornaments, cash balances etc., of the branches is made by senior officers of AGM cadre.
- Internal Communications is disseminated to different group of officers via WhatsApp so as to facilitate timely decisions.
- Fixing of per gram rate for gold loans on weekly basis.
- Preventive Vigilance Committees for the branches and all the departments of H.O. are constituted and quarterly review meetings are held.
- Video conference facilities are provided to all the DCCBs and also 42 branches of Apex Bank.
- Keeping in view the security risks in the branch, TSCAB has implemented Electronic Security System with Centralized CCTVs. Fire Alarm Systems and Access control while issuing HID (High Security) cards to all the employees and visitors.
- ◆ To Strengthen the Internal Checks and Control systems, the Bank has delegated powers to the senior officers for approval and fixation of limits on expenditure incurred by the departments. The expenditure of above Rs.5000/- shall be sanctioned by Senior Officers Group (SOG) consisting all three General Managers and Chief General Manager.
- ◆ TSCAB publishes quarterly newsletter viz., TSCAB TIMES which is an interactive and informative, in-house news journal. Its first issue was launched on Independence Day i.e., on 15.08.2016 and it is published regularly.
- ◆ TSCAB is the first state cooperative bank in the country to issue Rupay Platinum Cards.

 CKYC module has been implemented in the bank from 01st Jan, 2019, and a total of 43,084 records were uploaded with CERSAI as on 31.12.2020.

Technology upgradation

- The TSCAB is functioning on a core banking solution (CBS) platform since the year 2002. All its 42 branches are on-line with 36 ATMs, 5 ATMs in Metro Stations and 1 Mobile ATM.
- APEX Bank has implemented mobile banking from October'2016 onwards, and further four DCCBs namely Karimnagar, Khammam, Nizamabad and Medak have obtained mobile banking licenses and live in intra bank transactions.
- APEX Bank has implemented IMPS from 06.04.2017 and about 20,725 customers have registered for mobile banking/IMPS services as on 31.03.2021.
- Apex Bank has soft-launched Unified Payment Interface (UPI) services from its customers from 01.08.2018.
- The Bank has completed pre-requisites so as to launch AePS and e-KYC services for its customers.
- Apex Bank has applied with RBI for obtaining prepaid payment Instrument license for extending services through its program called National Electronic Toll Collection.
- With a view for getting ready for entering credit card business of it's own, or co-branding arrangement with other banks, Apex bank has applied for Merchant Acquiring License with RBI.
- Now CTS operations of all the DCCBs in the state have been brought under TSCAB sponsorship.
- TSCAB launched "Internet Banking "with "View only" facility on 18.02.2019.
