Report of the Governing Council of NCUI

Dear Fellow Cooperators,

n behalf of the Governing Council of National Cooperative Union of India, I have the pleasure in placing before you the Annual Report of NCUI for the year 2018-19.

During the year under review, the NCUI continued to function as nodal agency of the Indian Cooperative Movement. Its main objectives are to educate, guide and assist its member organizations in strengthening the cooperative sector. A brief report relating to various aspects of cooperative development during 2018-19 is as under:

Membership

At the close of the year, there were 262 cooperative organizations representing various sectors of the cooperative movement as members of NCUI. In the year 2018-19, 11 new members have been enrolled.

Meetings of the Governing Council

During the year, five meetings of the Governing Council were held. Besides this, one meeting of the Executive Committee was held. Matters relating to administrative and financial management of NCUI, and various issues confronting the cooperative sector to make it strong and vibrant were discussed in the meetings.

Cooperative Education

The National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE), New Delhi organised 131 training programmes against the target of 80 programmes during the year, including a 12 week Diploma Programme in Cooperative Education and Development. All the important and emerging sectors/ areas like self employment cooperatives, women, dairy, consumers, service coops, tourism coops, etc. were covered in the training programmes. 4459 persons from various sectors of the cooperative movement, in different states, were trained. Emphasis was placed on organising training programmes for strengthening relatively weaker sectors like labour, fishery, tribal cooperatives, handloom and handicrafts etc. 28 such programmes were organised for weaker sector cooperatives. Due to the important role played by women in the development of cooperatives, 16 programmes were organised exclusively for women participants. Under the Coop Connect Programme, training programmes for students of Bhagat Phool Singh Mahila University, Sonipat gained momentum during the year. A study on status of PACs of Chattisgarh was undertaken, which identified the strengths and weaknesses of the cooperative movement in the state. Besides this, a study of handloom cooperatives in Delhi was also undertaken highlighting the current status, and the ways to revamp the functioning of these cooperatives.

Cooperative Education Field Projects

During the Year 2018-19, the NCUI Cooperative Education Field Projects including North-East and Women Projects conducted wide ranging programmes on various issues of cooperative development. Under UDS projects, new societies registered during the year were 24, and the

number of persons benefitting from income generating programmes were 7807, while 1913 SHGs were formed with 23,551 members. Under the Cooperative Education Field Projects (North-Eastern State), new societies registered during the year were 36, and number of SHGs formed were 57, while approximate income earned per member during the year was 1,53,600. For women projects the total number of SHGs, were 1517, while their total membership was 13551. A total number of 80887 women were imparted education under various educational activities.

General Cooperative Policies

Initiatives were undertaken to strengthen member services by seeking detailed information from the member institutions. Several member institutions approached NCUI for academic and financial assistance and they also sought assistance from NCUI in solving their problems. NCUI examined these issues and extended all possible support to them. A brief report as well as detailed recommendations of the one day Zonal Conference on Cooperative Development for the Southern States was prepared and forwarded to Secretary, Cooperation, Registrar of Cooperative Societies and all concerned. In order to give due representation to NCUI, an apex organisation of the cooperative movement, Hon'ble Finance Minister, Government of India was requested to consider the nomination of President, NCUI in the Governing Board of NABARD.

Public Relations and Publications

The 65th All India Cooperative Week was organised from 14th to 20th November, 2018 which was inaugurated by Shri Radha Mohan Singh, Former Hon'ble Union Minister for Agriculture and Farmers Welfare. An attractive poster designed on the theme was printed and distributed to all the cooperative organisations. A Special Issue of 'The Cooperator' was brought out on the occasion. NCUI continued to publish 'The Cooperator' a monthly magazine carrying articles, features, success stories and news and views related to various issues of cooperative development. 'Indian Cooperative Review' a research journal containing case studies on various sectoral issues of the cooperative movement was regularly published. Vaikunth Bhai Mehta Memorial Lecture, a prestige event of NCUI in the memory of Late Vaikunth Bhai Mehta, a pioneering cooperative leader was organised twice during the year. 19th Vaikunth Bhai Mehta Memorial Lecture which was delivered by Shri M. Venkaiah Naidu, Hon'ble Vice President of India was organised on 25th June, 2018. 20th Vaikunth Bhai Mehta Memorial Lecture, which was delivered by Shri Amitabh Kant, Chief Executive Officer, NITI Aayog, was organised on 27th March, 2019.

International Relations

A major highlight during the year was visit of Mr. Ariel Guarco, President ICA and COOPERAR (Argentine Cooperative Federation) to NCUI on 18th February, 2019. In a meeting of ICA President with the representatives of Indian Cooperative Movement, he said that the Indian Cooperative Movement being the biggest cooperative movement in the world can guide the growth of the cooperative sector in other parts of the world. Coopathon 2.0 of ICA-AP was jointly organised by ICA-AP and NCUI on 29th January, 2019 at NCUI with the theme of "Engaging Youth on Agenda 2030 for Sustainable Development". International Cooperative Day 2018 was organised on 7th July, 2018 with two events viz. a Symposium on the theme "Sustainable Consumption and Production of Goods and Services" and Children Painting Contest at NCUI Auditorium. An International Training Programme on Training Techniques for Trainers of Cooperative and Rural

Financing Institutions was organised jointly by NCUI and CICTAB, Pune from 29th January - 2nd February, 2019 at NCCE, Delhi. Considering the importance of International Study Exposure Visit, NCUI organised the visit of a six members Indian Cooperative Delegation comprising of senior cooperative leaders and functionaries to Mauritius from 8th - 11th August, 2018. NCUI and Mauritius Cooperative Alliance signed a MOU to strengthen relations by organising capacity building programme for the cooperative functionaries in Mauritius. Besides visit of delegations of several countries to NCUI, the visit of representatives of Indian Cooperative to other countries through participation in many international fora provided a good opportunity for them to share, as well as exchange views on various issues of cooperative development.

Our sincere thanks and gratitude to the Hon'ble Minister of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Minister of State for Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare, officials of the Department of Agriculture & Cooperation for their cooperation and the support given by them, both in the form of Grants and otherwise. We also express our thanks to the representatives of NCDC, International Bodies like ICA, IRU, ILO, NEDAC and FAO, different Ministries, Members of Parliament, State Legislatures and all such prominent persons who took keen interest in the functioning of NCUI. Thanks are also due to the member institutions of NCUI, RCS of different States, State Cooperative Unions and other constituent members of NCUI for their valuable support towards achieving the organizational goals. Our heartfelt thanks to the officers and employees of NCUI for their hard work, dedication and commitment for achieving the objectives of the NCUI in the year of reporting.

Membership

The membership of NCUI is open to national cooperative societies, state cooperative union, state level cooperative federation and multi state cooperative societies. At the beginning of the year, the membership of NCUI comprised of 251 cooperative institutions. These institutions represent different sectors of Indian Cooperative Movement.

MANAGEMENT

- General Body, which comprises of delegates of Member Institutions of NCUI.
- 2. Governing Council comprises of office bearers, elected and co-opted members.
- Executive Committee, which is a subcommittee of the Governing Council of NCUI.

GENERAL BODY

As per the provision of the Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act 2002 and bye-laws of NCUI, the General Body of NCUI comprises of one delegate from each member institutions. The

Annual General Body Meeting of NCUI for the year 2017-2018 was held on 19th September, 2018 in the Auditorium of National Cooperative Union of India. The General Body deliberated on various issues concerning the cooperative movement in the country.

GOVERNING COUNCIL

During the year under review, five Governing Council Meetings were convened on 25.04.2018, 25.06.2018, 19.09.2018, 27.12.2018 and 15.03.2019. The meetings dealt with various subjects related to the development of the cooperative movement and carrying out the activities for fulfilling the objectives of NCUI as per its bye-laws.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

During the year under review, two meetings of the Executive Committee of NCUI took place on 10.05.2018 and 14.11.2018. The Executive Committee dealt with the matters relating to administrative and financial management of NCUI.

CHAPTER - 2

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION

NATIONAL CENTRE FOR COOPERATIVE EDUCATION (NCCE)

The National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE) New Delhi organized 131 training programmes against the target of 80 programmes during the year 2018-19 including 12 week Diploma Programme in Cooperative education and Development. In all 4459 persons from various sectors of the cooperative Movement in different states were trained. Out of 132 training programmes, 28 programmes were organized for weaker sectors like labour, fisheries, tribal cooperatives etc and exclusively for SC/ST Cooperatives in which 112 persons participated. 16 programmes were organized exclusively for women cooperatives which were attended by 524 participants.

NCUI WOMEN COOPERATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAMME UNDER COOPERATIVE EDUCATION FIELD PROJECTS FOR THE YEAR 2018-19

Cooperative Education and Development Programme for Women of NCUI is run through its 43 Cooperative Education Field Projects of which 4 are exclusive Women Projects at Shimoga (Karnataka), AskaBehrampur (Orissa Bhopal (Madhya Pradesh) and East Imphal (Manipur). The progress relating to various activities and the formation of Self Help Groups and other educational/developmental achievements for the year i.e. April, 2018 to March 2019 are given at Annexurel & II respectively..

During the year under report 382 Self-Help Groups with membership of 3302 women were formed by the Lady Mobilisers of the Cooperative Education Field Projects making for a total of 3534 Self Help Groups with a membership of 38479 being formed since inception till date. Through various income generating activities, 18200 women were benefited under this programme. On an average, each women beneficiary was able to earn Rs. 6000/- per month.

During the year a total of 3456 women were imparted education under various educational activities.

The self help groups were able to mobilize Rs. 21,60,8267 from their own savings during the year and Rs. 13,37,32,797/- was disbursed as loan to members of self help groups for taking up income generating activities. 218 cooperative societies have been registered under various State Cooperative Societies Act out of the members of self help groups organized by NCUI Cooperative Education Field Projects.

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION FIELD PROJECTS IN UNDER DEVELOPED STATES/ AREAS OF THE DEVELOPED STATES OF NORTH EAST

As a special measure for strengthening cooperative movement in North East and reducing regional imbalances, the Government of India has been giving grants to NCUI under Central Sector Scheme to operate 7 Cooperative Education Field Projects in the North East Region which cover the under-developed areas of the region. 50% of the expenditure incurred on these projects is met through the grants received from the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare and the balance 50% is met through the funds collected from the cooperative movement in the form of Cooperative Education Fund.

The main objective of the scheme is to develop and promote cooperative societies in the project areas, to increase the productivity of farmer members, to inculcate the habit of thrift amongst the women members, to impart and develop skills of the women and youth members, thus improving overall socio-economic conditions of the area. Each project is given activity-wise targets to be achieved over the course of entire year. During 2018 – 2019 all 6 projects (Sikkim Project is not functioning due to absence of manpower) achieved the set targets and objectives as per the overall guidelines. A total of 30,754 participants were trained.

Activity wise and project wise achievements/ progress and highlights of special activities are placed below at Annexure-XII, XIII, XIV, XV, and XVI.

GENERAL COOPERATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAMMES/SCHEMES CONDUCTED BY STATE COOPERATIVE UNIONS

In furtherance of its objectives to promote and develop the cooperative movement in India in accordance with cooperative principles, the NCUI monitors cooperative education programes to popularize the principles and practices of cooperation. The overall objective of cooperative education programme is to create enlightened, participatory and responsive membership and cooperative leadership; to improve the

management efficiency of board members and office bearers of cooperative societies; to develop dynamic and forward looking leadership and to create cooperative awareness among masses particularly youth and women. Presently, three types of Cooperative Education Programmes are being conducted in the country - (1) General cooperative education programmes for agriculture cooperatives implemented by State Cooperative Unions; (2) Sector specific cooperative education programmes covering dairy, fishery, women, urban credit, consumer, housing, industrial, handicrafts, forest, and labour contract construction, marketing cooperatives etc. (3) Special cooperative education projects based on area development approach.

The target group of this programme consists of members and managing committee members of primary agriculture cooperative societies and Self Help Groups wherever they are developed by the concerned state cooperative union at village level. The programme is implemented by state cooperative unions, through the adoption of two types of approaches namely; peripatetic approach and intensive approach (cooperative education and development scheme). A total 7812 Training Programmes were conducted resulting in 370670 persons being educated / trained, including 105176 SC/ST participants and 108254 women participants.

Many of the state cooperative unions have diversified their education programmes and organised cooperative education programmes for other sectoral cooperatives also. programmes were conducted for many sectors i.e. dairy, urban credit, fishery, industrial / weavers, marketing, labour contract and forest labour cooperatives, cooperative law etc. in the rural as well as urban areas in the country. Some of the state cooperative unions such as Himachal Pradesh and Kerala implemented special education programme for SC/ST's in selected area of the states. Additionally, some states organized classes/courses for SC/ST and Backward community members / potential members as a part of on going cooperative education programme. During the year 2018-19, a total of 102710 SC/ST persons and 100935 women were trained.

In response to the Government of India's 15 Point Welfare Programme for minority communities in the 40 identified districts, consistent efforts were made to cover minority communities under the on going cooperative education programme. The programme is being implemented through state cooperative unions and cooperative education

field projects / units and its benefits are provided to the minority communities.

A total 7812 courses were conducted and 370670 persons were trained by the state cooperative unions of Gujarat, Delhi, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Kerala, Tripura, West Bengal, Chhattisgarh, and Assam.

Women Empowerment

The cooperative education programmes for women are being implemented through the state cooperative unions in the states of Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Delhi, Gujarat, Himachal Pradesh, Kerala, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Mizoram, Orissa, Rajasthan, Tamilnadu, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal. Programmes/ classes under this programme are being conducted by the Lady Cooperative Education Instructors in rural as well as in urban areas. The duration of these programmes vary from 1 to 7 days, which covers classes/ meetings for ordinary and potential women members of cooperative societies, managing committee members, office bearers and employees of women cooperatives etc.

Over the year, 3383 events in total were organized and as many as 99246 women were imparted knowledge in different areas in the various classes. The details of progress are mentioned below:

GENERAL COOPERATIVE POLICIES

1. Member Services

II member institutions of NCUI were requested to provide information regarding the assistance rendered by NCUI to its member institutions. Several member institutions approached NCUI for academic and financial assistance, and they also sought assistance from NCUI in solving their problems. NCUI examined the issues received from member institutions and extended all possible support to them. Member institutions were also requested to give suggestions regarding the improvement of cooperative activities in their area. In this regard, the cooperative credit institutions came up with various suggestions like continuation of financial assistance to organize programmes, conduct studies, analyze policies / reports in important areas of credit and banking, devise effective strategy for strengthening training activities, giving more importance to member educations programmes at grass root levels, undertaking effective lobbying during the consultations with Union Finance Minister on problems concerning cooperatives and organising symposiums on subjects related new emerging areas / issues of cooperatives.

NCUI has taken requisite action on the issues/suggestions received from the member institutions. It has been providing financial assistance to its member organizations for conducting training programmes like LDPs/ Capacity Building programmes. NCUI has been providing @ 50% of programme cost for selective programmes under Central Sector Scheme. Through NCCE, it is organizing training programmes for weaker sections, particularly SC/ST societies at the primary level. During the year, NCUI organized a National Conference with State Cooperative Unions on 25.06.2018. For implementation of the resolutions adopted, NCUI approached the respective authorities including Chairman, NABARD to issue loans to multi state cooperatives, based on their performance but without collateral. The Central Registrar was requested for necessary support in solving the problems being faced by the scheduled cooperative banks with regard to recovery of mounting non-performing assets (NPAs). Further, efforts are being made to reconstitute Parliamentarian Forum of Cooperative Leaders for effective lobbying.

2. 17th Indian Cooperative Congress

All the managing directors of national level cooperative federations were requested to contribute a comprehensive sectoral paper on the theme "Cooperatives for Sustainable Development" for preparation of a background paper to be distributed among the delegates of the 17th Indian Cooperative Congress which is proposed to be held in the month of October / November 2019.

3. One day Zonal Conference on Cooperative Development for the Southern States

A brief report as well as detailed recommendations of the one day Zonal Conference on Cooperative Development for the Southern states were prepared and forwarded to Secretary (Cooperation), Registrar of Cooperative Societies, State Cooperative Unions, Member Institutions of NCUI, Director, RICMs and ICMs of the respective states and Managing Directors, National level Cooperative Federations for their valuable suggestions / action taken in this regard. A necessary follow-up is being maintained with them.

4. Nomination of President NCUI in the Governing Board of NABARD

In order to give due representation to NCUI, an apex organisation of the cooperative movement, Hon'ble Finance Minister, Government of India was requested to consider the nomination of President NCUI in the Governing Board of NABARD.

CHAPTER – 4

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Restructuring and development of NCUI website www.ncui.coop

Restructuring and development of NCUI website www.ncui.coop was undertaken as per the guidelines and standards of Indian Government websites. The content of NCUI website was updated, based on the inputs received from various divisions of NCUI. Reports of Seminars, Conferences, training programmes, etc. photos, press releases, information of upcoming programmes at national/inter-national level, programmes, etc. were uploaded on the website.

Strengthening of IT Infrastructure in NCUI

During the year, the process for strengthening of IT infrastructure in NCUI was initiated as per requisition received from various division of NCUI regarding IT hardwares. After the assessment of IT hardwares, the division initiated the procurement process of IT hardwares i.e. Laptop, Colour MFP Printers, All in one MFP Printers, UPS Batteries and External Hard disk etc. The division has allotted and installed the hardwares in various divisions and also strengthened the NCCE with one new Laptop and Colour MFP Printer.

Support Services Provided

PUBLIC RELATIONS

V arious activities were organized, the year round, to strengthen the image of the organisation and also establish strong liaison with the print and electronic media.

PUBLICATIONS

'The Cooperator'—Monthly Journal

'The Cooperator' is a monthly Journal of NCUI. It has, both English and Hindi sections and provides a regular communication channel to the cooperative fraternity including cooperative institutions. A number of steps such as change in layout, design, new feature, getting articles from reputed authors/experts, etc., were initiated, which brought about definite improvement. During the year under review, all the 12 issues of 'The Cooperator' from April, 2018 to March, 2019 were printed and posted to the subscribers timely.

Special Issue

During the year, the division published Special Issues of 'The Cooperator' in the month of November 2018, on the occasion of the 65th All India Cooperative Week. The main theme of the journal was based on Cooperative Week Theme, "Inclusive Growth and Good Governance through Cooperatives for Rural Prosperity". A good number of articles were obtained from the Chairmen/MDs of national level cooperative organisations, besides other experts. The advertisement campaign for the journal fetched good results leading to a good advertisement revenue the Special issue.

A detailed presentation on Indian Cooperative Movement and activities of NCUI was made by Deputy Director (IR) for the Commissioner and other visiting delegates.
- A 36 member delegations from Shree Yuba Saving and Credit Cooperative Limited of Nepal under the leadership of Mr. Pralhad Bastola, Chairperson visited NCUI on 23rd January 2019. A briefing and interaction meeting was arranged with the Chairperson and other officials of the Society.

International Study Exposure Visit

NCUI organized the visit of a six members Indian Cooperative Delegation comprising of senior cooperative leaders and functionaries to Mauritius from 8 – 11 August 2018. During the visit, NCUI and the Mauritius Cooperative Alliance Limited signed a MoU to strengthen the relations between the two nations, through the exchange of delegations and by organizing capacity building programme for the personnel and the functionaries working in co-operatives in Mauritius. The delegates got an opportunity to see the functioning of the cooperative movement in Mauritius as they visited most of the sectoral

cooperative federation in Mauritius viz. Mauritius Livestock Marketing Cooperative Federation Limited at Henrietta, Mauritius Cooperative Agricultural Federation Limited, Mauritius Agricultural Marketing Cooperative Society Ltd at Belle Mare, Bio Fertilizer Factory at Mer Rouge and the Fishermen Cooperative Society Limited at Troud' EauDouce.

- ICA President Mr. Ariel Guarco urged the President of Apex Cooperative organizations/Federations of all countries to provide information and contact details of cooperative groups and large cooperatives in the respective countries so as to establish a common network of these selected large cooperatives / groups for exchange of ideas and strategies for building up a new initiative to be launched by ICA soon. The contact details of cooperative groups and large cooperatives in India has been compiled by the International Relations division and the same has been forwarded to ICA.
- ☐ The USAID's local sustainability office has conducted a comprehensive study of International Cooperative Apex Associations. Mr. Barak Daniel Hoffman, World Bank conducted the study to develop profiles of number of apex cooperatives throughout the world including NCUI. A teleconferencing was arranged with the Chief Executive NCUI, Chief Executive, NAFCUB and FISHCOFED participating so as to provide information to Mr. Hoffman about the functioning of their respective organizations.
- A Meeting on Annual Action Plan of National Cooperative Union of India was held on 25th July 2018 in the Ministry of Agriculture and

Farmers Welfare, New Delhi. Issues related to the Annual Action Plan points and the implementation process related to International Relations Division were prepared in PPT format for presentation.

- ☐ The International Co-operative Alliance (ICA) General Assembly in conjunction with the Co-operative Summit of the Americas was held in Buenos Aires, Argentina on 21st October 2018. Since, no one was nominated to attend the General Assembly 2018, the decision for the distribution of votes to the National Federation of State Cooperative Banks Ltd. (NAFSCOB) and the dully filled Vote Designate Form of NCUI for General Assembly 2018 was forwarded to the Director of Membership, International Co-operative Alliance.
- The 2018 BRICS Co-operatives Leaders Meeting under the theme "Rekindling Partnerships for Development, Industrialization, Trade and Investment through Co-operatives", was hosted by the South African National Apex Cooperative (SANACO) from 9-11 October 2018 at Pretoria, South Africa. Though participation from NCUI was not made, a presentation on "Cooperative development in India" was forwarded to the host organization in South Africa for their reference.
- The General Assembly (G.A.) of NEDAC was held at NAAS, Pusa, New Delhi on 15th-16th November 2018. The GA was inaugurated by Mr. Parshottam Rupala, Hon'ble Minister of State for Agriculture and Farmers Welfare and Panchayati Raj, Government of India. The GA under the Chairmanship of MD, NCDC was attended by delegates from 19 member organizations in 6 countries (1 each from China, Philippines and Thailand, 12 from India, 2 from Nepal and 2 from Sri Lanka) and FAO Representative in India. On behalf of NCUI, the Chief Executive along with Executive Director and Director, (IR) participated in the event. The General Assembly adopted the revised constitution of NEDAC, which was presented by Mr. Orlando R. Ravanera, Co-chairman NEDAC and Chairman of the Committee. The

General Assembly unanimously decided the office bearers of new Executive Committee of NEDAC.

Member Services

The IR Division has been regularly attending to the requirement of all member organisations

of NCUI and its affiliates by providing them up to date information. All the circulars regarding various programmes have been timely updated on NCUI web-site and circulated to all the members. Nominations for international courses received from the member organisations have been processed and in case of selection, all necessary support has been extended.

NCUI supported the membership application of the Uralungal Labour Contract Cooperative Society (ULCCS) Ltd., Kozhikode, Kerala and a brief of the society along with its annual turnover was forwarded to ICA for consideration. On recommendation of NCUI, ULCCS has became a member of ICA.

BRIEF REPORTS OF NATIONAL LEVEL COOPERATIVE ORGANISATIONS

INDIAN FARMERS FERTILISER COOPERATIVE LIMITED (IFFCO)

ndian Farmers Fertiliser Cooperative Limited (IFFCO), a National Level Cooperative Society was registered as a Multi-Unit Cooperative Society on 3rd November, 1967 presently registered under Multi State Cooperative Societies Act, 2002. IFFCO is the largest fertiliser cooperative engaged in manufacturing and marketing of fertilizer products with a market share of around 25 %.

The year 2018-19 was yet another great year of achievements and accomplishments for IFFCO. During the year 2018-19, IFFCO achieved production level of 81.49 lakh MT fertilizer materials. In the field of Marketing, the Society achieved an impressive sale of 115.56 lakh MT fertilizers and recorded Turnover of Rs. 27,852 crore in the current year. The Society recorded the Profit Before Tax at Rs. 1,158.23 crore.

On international front, IFFCO's efforts were recognised widely and IFFCO was ranked No. 1 amongst the Top 300 largest agriculture cooperatives from around the world by turnover over GDP per capita basis by "World Cooperative Monitor", an international project designed by International Cooperative Alliance (ICA).

Dr. U. S. Awasthi, Managing Director IFFCO for his outstanding contribution towards the growth and development of Cooperative Movement in the country, has been awarded the prestigious 'Late Laxmanrao Inamdar Memorial Award' instituted by 'Sahakar Bharti'.

In its efforts to promote women empowerment IFFCO reserved 5% seats for women cooperators on its RGB. There is also a Woman Director on its Board elected by women delegates.

Apart from manufacturing and marketing of quality fertilizers, IFFCO always give equal emphasis on environment, energy saving and soil rejuvenation. IFFCO's Head Office has been certified as Green Building by Indian Green Building Council. In its initiative to adopt green energy, IFFCO has commissioned Grid connected Rooftop Solar Power Plants in few of its offices.

The paid up share capital of the Society stood at '627.57 crore as on March 31, 2019. The total number of member shareholders (cooperative societies) of the Society as on March 31, 2019 was 35,282.During the year, IFFCO plants bagged top awards from the Fertilizer Association of India (FAI) in various categories including Excellence in Safety, Best Technical Innovation and others.

Shri Rakesh Kapur, Joint Managing Director, IFFCO was elected as the President of International Fertiliser Association (IFA) which is the global fertiliser association with 500 members representing 68 countries.

Cooperative and Rural Development Through Various Initiatives

IFFCO in its efforts towards rural and cooperative development, continues to observe Corporate Social Responsibility through its promoted organisations / different programmes such as:

• IFFCO Kisan Sewa Trust: Formed a charitable trust namely out of joint contribution from IFFCO and its employee to provide relief and rehabilitation to the victims in the event of natural calamities. The Trust expanded its scope by providing financial assistance to the farmers living below poverty line for their critical medical treatment and education scholarship for higher studies to the children of poor and needy farmers.

IFFCO Managing Director Dr. U S Awasthi was given the prestigious Laxmanrao Inamdar Memorial Award for his outstanding contributions in promoting the cooperative movement in the country on the occasion of the 6th National Convention of Sahakar Bharati organized in Pushkar, Rajasthan



- Indian Farm Forestry Development Cooperative Limited (IFFDC): Promoted a separate multi-state cooperative society named with the prime objective to conserve environment and mitigate climate changes through sustainable natural resource management for enhancing socio-economic status of rural poor, tribal community and women in particular. So far, 29,420 hectare wasteland has been developed as multipurpose forests. Moreover, IFFDC has developed 8.515wadis (Small Orchards) on 3406 ha area under the agri-horticulture programme in various states in partnership with NABARD. For women empowerment, IFFDC is nurturing 1,780 Self-Help Groups (SHGs) through skill development, knowledge building and microenterprises development etc. The total membership of these SHGs is 18,229 out of which 94 per cent are women member.
- Cooperative Rural Development Trust (CORDET) has been promoted by IFFCO with an objective to promote rural development. It is engaged in providing training to farmers on various aspects of farming and animal husbandry by establishing model farms.
- **Promotional Programmes**: IFFCO organises promotional and extension programmes and conducts rural livelihood development activities in its special projects areas. Around 10,000 promotional and extension programmes are conducted annually which includes farmer meetings, field day, soil testing campaigns, crop demonstrations, farmers training & visit, farmers fair, exhibition, village sports, crop seminars, critical input package (CIP) kit distribution, village adoption etc.
- Village Adoption programme: IFFCO has been adopting villages for a period of 3-5 years emphasizing upon integrated rural development with thrust on increasing crop productivity. Need based agricultural implements, machineries, equipment's such as motivators, paddy transplanted, sprayers, dusters, seed drill etc. are supplied for community use through village cooperatives.

- Farmer's friend club, Youth club and Mahila Mandal are also formed to encourage their participation. Strengthening of village cooperative society is also undertaken in the adopted village through timely supply of fertilizers.
- Save the Soil Campaign: IFFCO's flagship programme "Save the Soil" campaign initiated in 2009 -10 has been a novel initiative for promoting, "Soil Rejuvenation & Productivity Enhancement activities" which are being conducted regularly across India. Concerted on farm management and development activities such as soil testing, green maturing, composting, bio fertilizer application, lime/ gypsum application for reclamation, incorporation of pulses in crop rotation, water resource development, promotion of drip / sprinklers; farm mechanisation, promotion of technologies like SRI/SSI etc. have resulted into 25-30% increase in crop yields besides, improvement in soil health etc.
- Nano Fertilisers : Nanoscale fertilisers / nutrients (1-100 nm) can address many challenges faced by agriculture at soil, environment and sustainable production levels. To address these IFFCO has initiated pioneering work in this direction through establishment of "IFFCO- Tarafdar Nano Lab" at its Kalol unit at Gujarat in 2018. Nano lab is working on bio and organic synthesis of Nano nutrients such as Nano P. Nano Zn, Nano K, Nano Mg, Nano Ag and their formulations. Extensive "ON Farm" and "On Field" experimental trials are also being conducted in collaboration with SAU's, Research institutions, CORDET and IFFCO Field officers.
- Sagarika: Society has been instrumental in promotion of CSIR-CSMCRI technology based seaweed extract product called "Sagarika". Sagarika is produced from seaweed cultivated by fishermen self-help groups (SHGs), majority of whom are controlled by women. Marketing of Sagarika (liquid and granular) has benefitted cooperative societies by improving their profitability, whereas, farmers have

- benefitted through increase in crop productivity to the tune of 15-20%.
- Neem Plantation and Development of Improved Variants: Neem has multifarious benefits besides, being a source of extra income for farmers. IFFCO has initiated project in collaboration with Forest Research Institute (FRI) for enhancing availability of quality genotypes which have traits like early flowering, higher seed and oil production etc. In addition, neem plantation campaigns have been undertaken all over India, as a result more than 50 lakh neem trees have been planted up till 2019-20 at farmers' fields, cooperatives and educational institutions premises, panchayat land etc.
- IFFCO Yuva: IFFCO has launched a job

- portal for youth called IFFCO Yuva. Through this digital platform, youth can assess and improve their skills and aspire for better career opportunities. The portal is released in six different languages and has more than 6700 registered candidates and 250 employers. The society has been able to provide 1400 job opportunities so far.
- Sikkim IFFCO Organics Ltd. (SIOL) is a joint venture company of IFFCO with Govt. of Sikkim. The company was formed for the purpose of value addition and marketing of the organic produce of Sikkim. It also aims to include more number of products in its portfolio and proposes to spread its wings in North Eastern states. IFFCO holds 51% stake in the company.

KRISHAK BHARTI COOPERATIVE LTD. (KRIBHCO)

Brief note on the activities of KRIBHCO during 2018-19

rishak Bharati Cooperative Limited (KRIBHCO), a national level multi state cooperative society, was incorporated on April 17, 1980 and is presently registered under Multi State Cooperative Societies Act, 2002. The main objective of the society is to produce and distribute quality agriculture inputs mainly chemical fertilizers, seeds, bio fertilizers through cooperatives and institutional agencies across the nation.

Fertilizer industry has been facing challenges for quite some time, however, the society has been able to overcome these challenges with continuous monitoring and review. The society's plants at Hazira, Surat in its 33rd year of commercial production achieved the production of 13.65 lakh MT Ammonia & 23.42 lakh MT Urea which corresponds to a post revamp capacity utilization of 109.39% for Ammonia and 106.74% for Urea.

The total membership of KRIBHCO consists of 9462 cooperatives societies and paid up share capital of the society was Rs. 389.11 crores as on 31st March, 2019. The Board of Directors of the Society have recommended for the year, the maximum permissible dividend of 20% on the paid up share capital. The Society has posted a pre tax profit of Rs. 205.54 crore. The networth of KRIBHCO has increased from Rs. 3,413.05 crore in the year 2017-18 to Rs. 3507.88 crore as on 31st March, 2019.

KRIBHCO continued to maintain second highest Urea sales in the country and has achieved urea sales of 46.89 lakh MT (23.86 lakh MT of KRIBHCO urea, 10.05 lakh MT of OMIFCO Urea, 10.91 lakh MT of KFL Urea & 2.07 lakh MT of government Account Urea) during the year, breaking its own previous record of highest sales of 44.02 lakh MT achieved during the year 2017-18. Similarly, the sale of imported phosphatic fertilizers was 5.92 lakh MT during the year breaking its own record of 4.82 lakh MT sold in the year 2016-17. The society achieved ever

highest sales of 53.16 lakh MT fertilizers during 2018-19 breaking its own record of 48.62 lakh MT during 2017-18.

Apart from above, the Society sold 27,207 MT of Surplus Ammonia and 5597 Thousand NM³ liquid Argon during 2018-19.

The society successfully completed 14th consecutive year of handling & marketing of OMIFCO Urea under the agreement with Department of Fertilisers, Gol. The society handled 22 vessels containing 9.51 Lakh MT granular urea at eight Indian ports during the year and sold 10.05 Lakh MT Neem coated OMIFCO granular urea in its marketing territory.

KRIBHCO has been operating 11 modern seed processing plants in various states and one custom processing unit at Rudrapur (Uttrakhand). The total seed production capacity of the Society is 28 TPH comprising of all the units. During the year, despite several challenges in the certified seeds' market, the society produced 2.25 lakh quintals and sold 2.47 Lakh quintals of certified seed of various crops.

Hybrid seed has been playing an important role in Indian Agriculture for maximizing yield. The society continues to have tie-up with a leading hybrid seed company and is successfully marketing seeds through its own marketing network in KRIBHCO brand. During the year, Society marketed 75,026 Packets of Bt. Cotton, 250.90 quintal of paddy hybrid, 2249.70 quintal of paddy research, 4476.93 quintal of hybrid maize and 52.20 quintal of hybrid bajra seeds. kribhco brand hybrid seeds have become popular among farming community due to high yield, farmers' connect and strong brand image.

The society is presently producing nine types of bacterial strains of bio-fertilizers. During 2018-19, KRIBHCO sold 6.99 lakh litre of liquid bio-fertilizers, keeping in view its appreciable response due to its longer shelf life, survival at higher temperature easy application and low prices. During the financial year, the society has also sold 27.29 thousand MT of city compost to improve the organic matter in soil.

The society is operating 58 own outlets known as Krishak Bharti Sewa Kendra(KBSK) in

the states of Uttar Pradesh, Haryana and Punjab. These are society's own Retail outlets located in countryside to cater to the farmers' needs for quality agro- inputs at a reasonable price at their doorstep. Apart from KBSKs, the society has initiated "Kisan Suvidha Kendras", a franchisee concept, in the states of UP, Bihar and West Bengal by giving franchise to fertilizer dealers.

KRIBHCO, having a dedicated team of agricultural professionals, continued its efforts towards transfer of latest farm technology to the farming community. The Society organized over 4514 programmes such as farmers' meetings, field demonstrations, field days, crop show, cooperative conference, group discussion etc. benefiting 6.83 Lakh farmers and cooperative officials across the nation. The society also made available 10.18 Lakh technical folders on various crops to farmers and cooperatives as back-up knowledge.

'KRIBHCO Krishi Pramarsh Kendra' continues to provide free consultancy on farm-related issues, propagate efficient and balanced use of fertilizer by testing 6661 soil samples (Micronutrients- 3434 and Macro-nutrients- 3227) collected from 13 states. For inclusive development of cooperatives, the society adopted 81 cooperative societies, trained 13754 cooperative managers in 126 cooperative conferences. The Society also organized 66 health campaigns for human and livestock, 43 income generations Programme, 30 drinking water facilities, 35 rural sports programme and 32 sanitation campaigns for integrated rural development.

KRIBHCO Sahakarita Awards for the year 2017-18 were presented to two eminent cooperators in its 38th AGM held on September 20, 2018. Sahakarita Shiromani Award was conferred on Shri Suresh Patel from Gujarat and Sahakarita Vibhushan Award on Shri Mahendra Kumar Nayak from Odisha for their contributions towards development of the cooperative movement.

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE DAIRY FEDERATION OF INDIA LTD. (NCDFI)

Operations

During the year 2018-19, the NCDFI continued to coordinate the sale of milk and milk products to Institutions; facilitated online transactions of various commodities at NCDFI eMarket; and worked for genetic improvement of cattle. NCDFI also continued to utilize part of its surplus in developmental activities.

Institutional Sales

NCDFI coordinates the supply of milk and milk products by dairy cooperatives across the country to Institutions such as Ministry of Defence (MoD), Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP) and Indian Railway Catering and Tourism Corporation (IRCTC).

Supplies to MoD and ITBP

During the year, NCDFI coordinated the supply of milk and milk products to 215 Army

Supply Corp Depots and 46 units of Indian Air Force and Indian Naval Services under the Ministry of Defence. The requirements of Indo-Tibetan Border Police were also met by its member cooperatives.

Amul, Mahanand, Nandini, Saras, Verka, Visakha and Warana brand UHT Milk was supplied to the MoD. Milk product supplies were allocated to Bengaluru, Indore, Kaira, Ludhiana, Mehsana, Patiala, Sangamner and Warana Milk Unions; Mother Dairy Bengaluru and Nandini Hi-Tech Plant. It is a matter of pride that 107 cooperative dairies spread across the country participated in the milk and milk products supply. Contracts concluded during the year were to the tune of Rs. 1103 crore.

Supplies to the armed forces have always been considered a matter of pride. Apart from the privilege and business interests, the cooperatives that have been consistently supplying the Army have had tangible and intangible benefits. Apart from resulting in an assured market, it has helped in capacity building and consistently improving the quality of products, in creating goodwill as well as the expansion of markets.

NCDFI eMARKET

Adoption of technology and its application to ensure better returns to dairy cooperatives and in turn to milk producers has been the prime focus of NCDFI. One such initiative is NCDFI eMarket, which has immensely benefitted dairy cooperatives across the country. With eAuction of dairy commodities, the platform has created a benchmark for market prices at the national level. In addition to services extended for procurement of cattle feed ingredients, fodder seed, edible oils, packing material, chemicals, sugar, etc., NCDFI eMarket has also ventured into transport services.

Dairy Commodities

During the year, volumes transacted at NCDFI eMarket through various type of auctions i.e. 'Forward Auctions', 'Auction Sale' and 'Reverse Auctions' included 23,382 MT SMP, 5,550 MT Butter, 195 MT WMP and 15 MT Ghee. These transactions were done at NCDFI eMarket.

Brands such as Aarey, Aavin, Amrut, Amul,

Devbhog, Gokul, Maahi, Mahanand, Medha, Mother Dairy, Nandini, Parag, Rajhans, Sagar, Sanchi, Saras, Sudha, Verka, Vijaya, Vikas, Vita and Warana participated in the NCDFI eMarket auctions. Though both private entities and cooperatives are registered members on the portal, only cooperatives are allowed to sell dairy commodities on the portal.

Cattle Feed Ingredients

Besides the sale of milk and milk products, NCDFI eMarket also facilitates the procurement of all required agri-commodities for cattle feed plants. During the year, 26 cooperative cattle feed plants in the states of Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Gujarat, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Maharashtra, Orissa, Tamil Nadu, Telangana and West Bengal procured required cattle feed ingredients through the NCDFI eMarket. These ingredients included 1,54,027 MT Rice Bran/Polish, 90,889 MT Maize, 25,260 MT Mustard Meal, 10,190 MT Cotton Seed Meal, etc. The large and diversified supplier base facilitates cooperatives to get the required raw materials in time and at competitive prices and many cattle feed plants are in the process to procure raw materials through the NCDFI eMarket. NCDFI eMarket also additionally offered support for procurement of sugar, edible oils, packing materials, fodder seeds, chemicals apart from transport services and scrap sales during the year.

Increased Transparency

In line with Government of India's Digital India campaign, to bring more transparency in the system, NCDFI eMarket has developed an Android based eMarket application. This application enables the users to remain updated with customized auction information on real time basis. Shri Dilip Rath, Chairman, NDDB launched the NCDFI eMarket App on January 31, 2019. The application is freely available to all on Play Store.

NCDFI eMarket has also started publishing the results of eAuction in a monthly 'Activity Report' which is circulated to all members and is also available on the App and Webpages. It gives larger publicity to the concluded trades and prices for different products, which further helps cooperative buyers to get the products at highly competitive prices.

Members

The total registered members on the NCDFI eMarket platform were 905 as on March 31, 2019 with participation from across the country. During the year, NCDFI arranged member meets at Bengaluru and New Delhi to have their valuable inputs. NCDFI also participated in the 47th Dairy Industry Conference at Patna, where it had an exhibition stall for promoting the activities of its eMarket.

Transacted value

During the year, total business transactions at NCDFI eMarket accounted for Rs. 1,010 crores consisting of dairy commodities worth Rs. 479 crores, cattle feed ingredients worth Rs. 498 crores and Rs. 33 crores of other products.

GENETIC IMPROVEMENT

To provide better access of good quality semen doses to the milk producers in the country, NCDFI has partnered with NDDB Dairy Services for distribution of Frozen Semen Doses (FSDs) produced by Sabarmati Ashram Gaushala (Gujarat), Animal Breeding Centre (Uttar Pradesh), Alamadhi Semen Station (Tamilnadu), Rohtak Semen Station (Haryana) and Rahuri Semen Station (Maharashtra), either owned or managed by NDDB Dairy Services. These semen stations are equipped with sophisticated semen processing equipments adhering to stringent quality control tests. The semen straws produced by these semen stations are marketed under the common brand name of 'SAG' which stands for Superior Animal Genetics.

During the year 2018-19, combined sale from all these semen stations was Rs.3.10 crore FSDs valued at Rs.64 crores.

Total Business Transacted

During the year , cumulative business transactions conducted by the NCDFI amounted to Rs.2,177 crores which was 5.83% higher than the previous year. This includes milk and milk products sales to Institutional buyers valued at Rs. 1,103 crores, and sale of frozen semen doses of Rs.'64 crores.

Developmental Activities

Being the apex body of dairy cooperatives in India, NCDFI is seized of the importance of utilising part of its surplus in spreading awareness among dairy cooperatives, specifically in the areas of clean milk production, cooperative governance, productivity of animals, artificial insemination, ration balancing, etc. and training manpower to enhance their performance and productivity. NCDFI also arranges AI Technician Meets, Stalls at Farmer Fairs, Training Programs, Farmer Meets, Seminars, Workshops, Cooperative Conclaves and Management Development Programs, based on the industry need assessment.

Workshops of Dairy Farmers

NCDFI organized three one day workshops for dairy farmers in coordination with member cooperatives. cooperative governance, artificial insemination, productivity of animals and ration balancing were some of the topics covered by experts from the field during the workshop.

The first such workshop was organized at Nagpur on April 21, 2018, in collaboration with Mother Dairy and NDDB, and was attended by about 1,200 dairy farmers. Shri Nitin Gadkari, Hon'ble Minister for Road Transport & Highways, graced the occasion as the Chief Guest. Shri Dilip Rath, Chairman, NDDB also graced the occasion. The program emphasised 'scientific animal rearing practices' by the farmers.

The second workshop on the theme of 'Scientific Animal Rearing Practices' was held at Motihari on July 08, 2018 in collaboration with NDDB Dairy Services, which was attended by 1,135 dairy farmers. Shri Radha Mohan Singh, Hon'ble Minister for Agricultural, Government of India graced the occasion as the Chief Guest. Other dignitaries included Shri Pramod Kumar, Hon'ble Tourism Minister, Government of Bihar and Shri Dilip Rath, Chairman, NDDB.

The third workshop in the series on the theme 'Role of Technology in Doubling Income of Farmers through Dairying', was held at Anand on September 10, 2018 in collaboration with NDDB, and was attended by about 800 dairy farmers who had come from across the country. Shri Radha

Mohan Singh, Hon'ble Minister of Agricultural, Government of India was the Chief Guest. Other dignitaries included Shri Parshottam Rupala, Hon'ble Union Minister of State for Panchayati Raj, Agriculture and Farmers Welfare and Shri Dilip Rath, Chairman, NDDB.

The NCDFI eMarket Awards have been instituted in the financial year 2018-19 to recognize the efforts taken with integrity, honesty, correctness, transparency and confidentiality, combined with a sound risk awareness, as a few indicators of responsible behavior of the member organisation. The first set of awards was given away by Shri Radha Mohan Singh during the workshop to those dairy cooperatives who had taken initiatives in bringing more transparency in purchase and sale transactions for the year 2017-18. The awardees included Aavin, Amul, Gokul, Medha, Mahanand, Milma, Mother Dairy Calcutta, Nandini, Omfed, Purabi, Rajhans, SAG, Saras, Sudha, Verka, Vijaya and Warana.

Al Technician Meets

To promote Artificial Insemination, NCDFI, in coordination with NDDB Dairy Services, organized 139 AI Technician Meets, with the active participation of 4,630 technicians from various parts of the country.

Cooperative Conclave

NCDFI, in collaboration with NDDB and IRMA. organized a Cooperative Conclave on the theme 'Enhancing Competitive Advantages of Dairy Cooperatives as Business Enterprises' during March 12-13, 2019 at IRMA, Anand. Participants at the conclave included imminent cooperators, dairy professionals, legal experts, veteran academicians and progressive farmers. Dr Rajiv Kumar, Vice Chairman, NITI Aayog inaugurated the Conclave as the Chief Guest. Some key participants of the conclave included Shri Dilip Rath, Chairman, IRMA & NDDB; Shri Satish Marathe, RBI Central Board Member; Dr RS Sodhi, Managing Director, GCMMF; Dr Tushaar Shah, Former Director, IRMA and Senior Fellow, International Water Management Institute (IWMI); Prof Sanjiv Phansalkar, Former Professor, IRMA and Director, Vikas Anvesh Foundation.

The conclave deliberated on matters such

as professionalism, legal framework, member engagement and good governance in the context of dairy cooperatives, with focus on strengthening farmer collectives and further expansion across the country. The gathering was of the opinion that the Anand dairy model must be replicated, especially in underdeveloped states including aspirational districts, but with its adapted version, which is relevant to the changing economic, political and social status.

Key policy recommendations of the Conclave have been shared with NITI Aayog and the Prime Minister's Office in anticipation of robust budgetary and policy support to the dairy sector and especially the dairy cooperatives.

Stalls at Farmer Fairs

To spread awareness on artificial insemination, NCDFI organized stalls at 12 different farmer fairs in the states of Bihar, Gujarat, Jharkhand, Maharashtra, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh.

Management Development Program at IRMA

NCDFI sponsored a four-day Management Development Program (MDP) at the Institute of Rural Management, Anand (IRMA) during the year for marketing officers of dairy cooperatives. Employees of various dairy cooperatives spread across the country attended.

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE HOUSING FEDERATION OF INDIA (NCHF)

he National Cooperative Housing Federation of India (NCHF) is a nation-wide organization of the cooperative housing sector. The primary objective of NCHF is to promote housing cooperatives and to coordinate and facilitate their operations, especially those of the Apex Cooperative Housing Federations (ACHF), which are its members. The main activities and achievements of NCHF during the year 2018-19 are given below:

 NCHF makes efforts to promote ACHF in those States where such organizations do not exist and to strengthen the ACHF which are comparatively weak. Necessary guidance was provided to the newly admitted

- member federation namely Telangana State Cooperative Housing Societies Federation.
- The State Governments were requested to designate ACHF as one of the implementing agencies under the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana-'Housing for All' (PMAY-HFA), especially for promotion of Affordable Housing for Weaker Sections through Credit linked Subsidy Scheme (CLSS) and Affordable Housing in Partnership component of the programme. State Governments of Haryana and Punjab have acknowledged the request of NCHF. Scheme Guidelines for Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana-Urban (PMAY-Urban) and Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana-Rural (PMAY-Rural) were also circulated to concerned ACHF.
- Details of outstanding loans, loan disbursement and housing units constructed/ financed by ACHF during the last 20 years i.e. 1997-98 to 2016-17 were compiled and sent to the National Housing Bank (NHB). Information/data on borrowings, lending operations, housing loans disbursed and units constructed/financed by ACHF during 2017-18 was also sent to NHB for including in their publication.
- The Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) was requested to sanction fresh loans and grant repayment re-schedulements to concerned ACHF. Data on overdue position of loans advanced by LIC to ACHF which are in NPA category was collected from LIC and circulated to concerned ACHF with a request to clear the overdues. Necessary guidance was also provided to the concerned ACHF in preparing repayment re-schedulement proposal of LIC loans and the LIC was requested to consider such proposals sympathetically, keeping in view genuine problems faced by them.
- The Registrars of Cooperative Societies (RCS) of concerned states were requested to permit housing cooperatives to get their audit done by Chartered Accountants registered with the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI). The RCS of concerned states were also requested to

- advise housing cooperatives to incorporate provisions for structural audit in their byelaws or issue orders in this regard.
- Member ACHF and primary housing cooperatives were requested to cover their housing projects under the 'Standard Fire and Special Perils Policy' through NCHF at reduced premium. On request, judgements of supreme Court/High Courts were sent to primary housing cooperatives and others concerned. The decision of the Hon'ble Bombay High Court dated 22.06.2018 stating that housing society is not an industry even if it earns profit, was circulated to all Members of the Board of Directors and Member ACHF. Necessary guidance was also provided to housing cooperatives.
- A Rainwater Harvesting Structure was installed at NCHF Secretariat. A Booklet and the Guidelines on Rainwater Harvesting by Delhi Jal Board were sent to West Bengal Housefed and others concerned. Guidelines/ Circular issued by the Government of Maharashtra regarding redevelopment of Cooperative Housing Societies was sent to Gujarat House Corporation. A copy of 'National Urban Housing and Habitat Policy-2007' was sent to Delhi House Corporation. A compilation of the bye-laws of ACHF was sent to Pune District Cooperative Housing Federation and the above compilation and amendments in the Bye-laws of Rajasthan Housefed were sent to Odisha House Corporation. The necessary information regarding Goods and Services Tax (GST) on services provided by Resident Welfare Associations/Housing Cooperatives was also sent to West Bengal Housefed.
- A Handbook on 'Cyber Safety for Children/ Students published by the Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India was circulated to members of the Board of Directors of NCHF and Managing Directors of ACHFs.
- As a part of Government's initiative to promote digital payments, necessary efforts were made to increase the digital transactions in the operations of NCHF. Monthly/quarterly details of digital

transactions in the office of NCHF were sent to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs regularly.

- A Swachhta Action Plan (SAP) of NCHF for the year 2018-19 was prepared and sent to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (HUA). Action Taken Report on the SAP was sent to the Ministry regularly and the Chief Executive, NCHF also attended various review meetings of SAP convened by the Ministry of HUA during the year under report.
- The West Bengal State Cooperative Housing Federation celebrated its Foundation Day as HOUSFED DAY on 25th September, 2018 at Kolkata. The Federation brought out a bimonthly news bulletin on the auspicious occasion which was released by the Hon'ble Minister of Cooperation, Government of West Bengal. The 'Messages' of the Chairman and the Chief Executive of NCHF were also published in the News Bulletin.
- NCHF was represented in various meetings/ conferences convened by the Government of India, State Governments, Cooperative and other concerned organizations. All necessary support and cooperation was provided to Member ACHF on various issues. Important publications/documents were also circulated to them at regular intervals.

Education, Training & Information Dissemination

A Leadership Development Programme for the chairmen/directors of housing cooperatives was organized from 10-12th September, 2018 at New Delhi in collaboration with the National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE). In all, 40 participants from 10 states attended the training programme.

NCHF also conducts research and studies and compiles information/statistical data for the benefit and use of all concerned engaged in cooperative housing activities. The Registrars of Cooperative Societies (RCS) of concerned states were requested to send information/data on the operations of housing cooperatives in their respective States.

Conferences/Workshops/Study Visits

NCHF has been organizing conferences/ workshops/study visits etc. for the personnel of ACHF and housing cooperatives. Such fora are organized to give them exposure to best practices as well as to review the progress and discuss various problems faced by housing cooperatives so as to suggest measures for their smooth functioning. A study visit of the directors of NCHF and officers of apex cooperative housing federations was organized by NCHF in collaboration with Rajasthan State Cooperative Housing Federation to a cooperative housing project of Rajasthan Housefed namely Sahayog Apartments on 9th March, 2019 at Jaipur.

The 65th All India Cooperative Week was celebrated from 14-20th November, 2018 on the theme of 'Inclusive Growth and Good Governance through Cooperatives for Rural Prosperity'. To commemorate Cooperative Week Celebrations-2018, NCHF brought out a special issue of 'NCHF Bulletin' which was released by Shri Radha Mohan Singh, Hon'ble Union Minister for Agriculture and Farmers Welfare at the inaugural function of the Cooperative Week Celebrations organized by NCUI on 14th November, 2018 atDelhi. The above publication was circulated among the participants at the inaugural function. An article on 'Inclusive Growth of Human Settlements' written by Shri N.S.Mehara, Chief Executive, NCHF was published in the Special Issue of 'The Cooperator' brought out on this occasion by the NCUI. Further, NCHF Staff also participated in the Cooperative Quiz Competition organized by NCUI.

A workshop on 'New Initiatives and Best Practices of Apex Cooperative Housing Federations' was organized under the joint auspices of Rajasthan State Cooperative Housing Federation (Rajasthan Housefed) and National Cooperative Housing Federation of India (NCHF) on 9th March, 2019 at Jaipur, which was inaugurated by Shri Niraj K. Pawan, Registrar of Cooperative Societies, government of Rajasthan. The above workshop was attended by 41 participants from nine States.

Publications

NCHF has been bringing out various

publications from time to time. During the year 2018-2019, it brought out various publications:-Monthly journal 'NCHF Bulletin' (including special issues on World Habitat Day and Cooperative Week Celebrations); Bye-laws of NCHF in Hindi; Annual Report; Audit Report; and Supreme Court on Housing Cooperatives.

Implementation of Rajbhasha (Hindi) in NCHF Office

Articles and news items in Hindi on cooperative housing and related fields were published in 'NCHF Bulletin' regularly; Hindi Diwas was celebrated on 14th September, 2018, Annual Report, Audit Report for 2017-18, Citizen Charter and Bye-Laws of NCHF were prepared in Hindi; Meetings of Rajbhasha Karyanvayan Samiti & Hindi Workshops were held regularly; Letter heads, envelopes, vouchers, etc. were printed in Hindi; Quarterly/annual progress reports on the use of Rajbhasha Hindi in NCHF were sent to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (HUA) and efforts were made to procure more Hindi Books, Hindi section on the web-site was updated & contents in Hindi were uploaded on the web-site alongwith contents in English simultaneously. Inspection regarding use of Rajbhasha Hindi in official work of NCHF was also done by the Ministry of HUA on 28.09.2018.

The Chief Executive, NCHF attended the meeting of Hindi Salahkar Samiti of the Ministry of HUA on 28.03.2019 at New Delhi, which was chaired by the Hon'ble Union Minister of State (I/c) for Housing and Urban Affairs. He also attended the meetings of Town Official Language Implementation Committee (TOLIC) South Delhi-I on 28.08.2018 and 27.02.2019 at New Delhi and 'Hindi Diwas Samaroh-2018' organized by the Department of Official Language, Ministry of Home Affairs on 14.09.2018 at Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi.

World Habitat Day Celebrations

The World Habitat Day-2018 was observed globally on 1st October, 2018, the theme of which was 'Municipal Solid Waste Management'. The Government of India in the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (HUA) organized a programme to celebrate the World Habitat Day on 5th October, 2018 at Vigyan Bhawan in New Delhi, which was

inaugurated by Shri Hardeep Singh Puri, Hon'ble Union Minister of State (I/C) for Housing & Urban Affairs. To commemorate World Habitat Day celebrations, NCHF brought out a special issue of 'NCHF Bulletin' which was released by the Hon'ble Union Minister of State (I/C) for HUA in the presence of Shri Durga Shanker Mishra, Secretary, Ministry of HUA and representatives of UN-Habitat. The above publication was circulated among the participants of the World Habitat Day function.

Documentation Centre

The Documentation Centre on Cooperative Housing at NCHF Secretariat was further strengthened by procuring various useful publications, reports etc. During the period under reference, a total of 44 books were added. This Documentation Centre has a collection of 1594 documents/books as on 31st March, 2019.

Updating of NCHF Web-Site

NCHF Web-site (www.nchfindia.net) was updated regularly during the period under report. For the benefit of members of housing cooperatives and others concerned, judgements of Supreme Court pertaining to housing cooperatives, development authorities, housing boards, etc. were included in NCHF Bulletin, all issues of which (April, 2018 to March, 2019) were uploaded on the Web-site. The website of NCHF has been made bilingual having information both in Hindi and English. The Annual Report and Audited Statement of Accounts of NCHF for the years 2014-15, 2015-16 and 2016-17 were also uploaded on NCHF Web-site.

Study Visits to NCHF Secretariat

Various trainees/students/cooperators made study visits to NCHF Secretariat during 2018-19, details of which are as under:

An invitation to enter the World Habitat Awards-2019 received from the World Habitat, an international not-for-profit organization established in the United Kingdom was circulated to Member ACHFs to facilitate them to submit the entries of their housing projects.

- Distribution of Surplus for the Financial Year 2017-18 as approved by the General Body of NCHF were sent to the Central Registrar of Cooperative Societies, Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare. Relevant details in respect of NCHF regarding government equity, reserves, profit, dividend paid, etc. during 2016-17 and 2017-18 were also sent to the above Ministry.
- 9. A Book entitled 'Moving on ... Moving Forward-A Year in Office' written by Shri M. Venkaiah Naidu, Hon'ble Vice-President of India was released by Shri Narender Modi, Hon'ble Prime Minister of India on 2nd September, 2018 at a function in Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi in the presence of Hon'ble Former Prime Ministers of India Dr. Manmohan Singh and Shri H.D. Deve Gowda, and Honble Lok Sabha Speaker Smt. Sumitra Mahajan and other dignitaries. The Chief Executive, NCHF also attended the above book release function.

NATIONAL FEDERATION OF URBAN COOPERATIVE BANKS & CREDIT SOCIETIES LTD. (NAFCUB)

he National Federation of Urban Cooperative Banks and Credit Societies Ltd.(NAFCUB), is the apex level promotional body of Urban Cooperative Banks and Credit Societies in the country. As on 31st March 2018, there were 1551 Urban Cooperative Banks, of which 54 were Scheduled Banks including 31 Multi State Urban Banks, 23 Single State Multi State Cooperative Banks and 1497 non Scheduled Banks of which 20 are multi State UCBs and 1477 Single State UCBs.

As on 31st March 2019, NAFCUB's total membership is 1787 with 927 urban cooperative banks, including 54 scheduled cooperative banks and 70 Mahila urban cooperative banks and 768 Cooperative Credit Societies. All 22 State Federations/ Associations in the urban cooperative credit sector are members of the National Federation. The main sources of NAFCUB's funds comprise Grants from the Ministry of Agriculture, annual membership fees

from member-institutions, admission fees, income from publications and training programmes, study tours, conferences and seminars.

During the year, NAFCUB remained active in the promotion and development of the urban cooperative credit sector. A few of its major activities during the year are detailed below:

A. Umbrella Organisation

The Reserve Bank of India, has in its Statement on Developmental and Regulatory Policies issued on February 07, 2019 as part of its Sixth Bi-monthly Monetary Policy Statement for 2018-19 has committed to the need of an Umbrella Organisation for urban cooperative banks, which is a welcome step. The Statement sets out various developmental and regulatory policy measures for strengthening regulation and supervision; broadening and deepening of the financial markets; payment and settlement systems; and financial inclusion.

The idea of setting up an UO for the UCB sector was first mooted in the year 2006 by the Working Group (Chairman: Shri N S Vishwanathan) set up by the Reserve Bank on Augmentation of Capital of UCB. It was examined in greater detail by the Working Group on Umbrella Organization and Constitution of Revival Fund for Urban Cooperative Banks (Chairman: Shri V S Das) in 2009 and the Expert Committee on Licensing of New Urban Cooperative Banks (Chairman: Shri Y H Malegam) in the year 2011. The need for UO has also been stressed by the High Powered Committee on UCBs (Chairman: Shri R Gandhi) in the year 2015.

The Reserve Bank will shortly take a decision on the specifics of the UO proposal received from NAFCUB.

B. Meeting with Sh. Sudershan Sen, Executive Director, RBI

A delegation of NAFCUB comprising of R. B. Shandilya, Officiating President, V. V. Anaskar, Vice President and Subhash Gupta, Chief Executive met Shri Sudarshan Sen, ED, RBI on April 04, 2018 and submitted to him a copy of the Model byelaws for Urban Cooperative Banks drafted by the Committee of Directors of NAFCUB.

C. NAFCUB Seminar on "Digital Banking and Cashless Payments paving way for greater Financial Inclusion" at Mumbai

A one day seminar on the theme "Digital Banking and Cashless Payments Paving the Way for Greater Financial Inclusion" was organized by NAFCUB for the Urban Cooperative Banks of Maharashtra on 4th May 10, 2018, at Mumbai. Around 100 delegates from various banks participated. Shri R. B. Shandilya, Officiating President, NAFCUB presided over the Inaugural Session of the Seminar and Dr. M. L. Abhyankar, Director NAFCUB, Shri Vilas Desai, Chairman, Ambarnath Jaihind Cooperative Bank, Sh. A.K. Khound, Chief General Manager (Retd), Reserve Bank of India, Sh. P.K. Arora, Chief General Manager (Retd), Reserve Bank of India Shri S.V. Sastry, M.D. and Chief Executive Officer SBI DFHI Ltd, Shri Prasad Nambiar, Sr. Vice President, IFTAS and Shri Mangesh P Kinare, Member Central Council ICAI were the Guests of Honour.

The Seminar also focused on the importance of an Umbrella Organization for Urban Cooperative Banks and the implications of the proposed FDRI Bill on the sector. The important provisions of GST applicable to UCBs were also discussed in the Seminar.

Shri R. B. Shandilya in his address said that technology is the most important differentiator for the urban cooperative banks to be able to compete with upcoming payments and small financial banks. Dr. Abhyankar in his address highlighted the role and contribution of technology in the growth of his bank i.e. Cosmos Cooperative bank and also the efforts of the bank to constantly upgrade technology to remain ahead in the sector.

In the various technical Sessions, a host of luminaries were present and contributed to the deliberations. Earlier Sh. Subhash Gupta, Chief Executive, NAFCUB welcomed all the delegates and guests. He requested banks to avail the benefits of NAFCUB seminars and adopt Innovative Technology solutions.

D. NAFCUB Delegation Meeting with DG and ED, RBI

A NAFCUB delegation met Sh. N. S. Vishwanathan, Deputy Governor, RBI and Sh.

Sudarshan Sen, Executive Director, RBI at Reserve Bank of India's Central Office, Mumbai on November 01, 2018 and submitted a Memorandum on important issues concerning Urban Cooperative Banks. The Delegation included Shri H. K. Patil, Former Minister, Govt. of Karnataka & Director, NAFCUB, Sh. Jyotindra Mehta, President, Sh. R. B. Shandilya and Sh. V. V. Anaskar, Vice Presidents, Dr. M. L. Abhyankar, Sh. K. Sharma & Sh. G. Rama Moorthy, Directors and Sh. Subhash Gupta, CE, NAFCUB.

The following important issues were discussed in detail during the meeting:

- Formation of Umbrella Organization for Urban Cooperative Banks
- Delinking Branch Licensing/Extension of Area of Operation from Guidelines issued for Constitution of BoM
- Review of Prudential Interbank (gross) Exposure Limit
- One Time Settlement (OTS) of NPAs Introduction of Compromise Settlement Scheme for UCB.
- Donations by UCB
- Board of Management
- Voluntary transition of UCB into Small Finance Banks

While there was a definite assurance on the issue of getting clearance of the proposal for the formation of Umbrella Organisation for UCBs, other issues were also discussed at length in the meeting.

E. RBI Governor meets Cooperative Banks

After assuming charge as Governor RBI, Shri Shaktikanta Das invited representatives from the cooperative banking sector for an interactive meeting to have first hand information on the issues concerning cooperative banks. Both National Federation of Urban Cooperative Banks and Credit Societies and National Federation of State Cooperative Banks were invited to participate in the meeting.

The following issues were raised by NAFCUB for discussion :

- Umbrella organisation of urban cooperative banks at national level
- 2. Liberalizing norms for opening of new branches by urban cooperative banks
- 3. Exempting unit banks and Grade I banks from adoption of BoM concept and making it voluntary for others.
- 4. Introduction of negotiated settlement of NPAs in urban cooperative banks. New OTS guidelines to be given.
- 5. Review of Vision Document for urban cooperative banks.
- Resolution of troubled urban cooperative banks to be in line with resolution of troubled commercial banks to protect interests of uninsured depositors' interest.

F. 34th Meeting of Standing Advisory Committee (SAC) of RBI on Urban Cooperative Banks

The 34th Meeting of SAC of RBI on UCBs was held on March 15th, 2019 at RBI, Central Office, Mumbai. Sh. Jyotindra Mehta, President, and Sh. Subhash Gupta, Chief Executive attended the meeting on behalf of NAFCUB. Apart from NAFCUB, representatives of select State Federations / CRCS / RCS of major states and large UCB were also present during the meeting.

The following important issues concerning the sector were submitted by NAFCUB:

- Formation of National Level Umbrella Organisation for UCB
- Housing loan limit priority sector
- Housing Loans Enhancement in the housing loan ceiling
- Exposure to Housing, Real Estate and Commercial Real Estate
- Limit for investment in plant and machinery / equipment for manufacturing/ service enterprise
- Interest Subvention Scheme for MSME 2018
- Issue of performance guarantees
- Issue of open PPI

- Internet Banking Relaxation in criteria
- Merger of loss making banks amortization of loss
- Facility of Prudential Write Off to clean balance sheets
- Withdrawal of restrictions on advances under SAF

RBI responded positively on some of the issues and has assured a review of all the issues submitted by the NAFCUB and other federations.

G. Other Activities

1. Meeting of the CAB College Advisory Committee:

President, NAFCUB attended the 57th meeting of College Advisory Committee of CAB, Pune held on 6th April 2018. He emphasised the importance of conducting more programmes for small urban cooperative banks and in vernacular languages for UCBs in different regions, especially in North East region. He also stressed on the need to have more programmes relating to BR Act, Information Technology Act, Money Laundering Act and SARFAESI Act etc., and programmes for Directors of the Urban Cooperative Banks.

2. Human Resource Initiatives

a. <u>Seminar/Workshop/Round Table</u>

- i) The Federation organized a Seminar at Mumbai on 5th May 2018 on "Digital Banking and Challenges before Urban Cooperative Banks", which was attended by around 100 delegates from all over India.
- ii) A Round Table of CEOs on "Thriving in a Survival World". The main topic for discussion was Formation of Board of Management for UCB. The Round Table was attended by around 150 delegates of various Urban Cooperative Banks.

b. <u>Training Programme</u>

During the year, NAFCUB conducted 23 training programmes for urban cooperative banks and credit societies in collaboration with National

level training institutions. Six programmes were conducted with Reserve Bank of India, College of Agricultural Banking (CAB), Pune, 9 programmes with VAMNICOM, Pune, 6 programmes with National Centre for Cooperative Education, New Delhi and 2 were conducted at LINAC, NCDC, GURGAON. All the programmes were well attended and useful.

3. Publications

The Federation is regularly publishing two of its flagship publications (i) quarterly journal "Urban Credit" and (ii) fortnightly newsletter "Coop Banking".

NATIONAL FEDERATION OF COOPERATIVE SUGAR FACTORIES LTD. (NFCSF)

Activities of the National Federation of Cooperative Sugar Factories Limited during 2018-19

he National Federation of Cooperative Sugar Factories Limited (NFCSF) was established in 1960 to coordinate and facilitate the working of the affiliated cooperative sugar factories and State Federations of cooperative sugar factories and to assist in the promotion and installation of new cooperative sugar factories. The NFCSF was established at a time when India's standing in the world sugar scenario was negligible. However, the establishment of NFCSF changed the scenario. There was a steady increase in total sugar production and also the cooperative share in the total production. During the year 1982, 1988 to 1993, 1995, 1996 & 2000 India had achieved the distinction of becoming the world's largest producer of sugar, and the share of the cooperatives in total sugar production was between 55% to 61%. As on March 31, 2019, there were 743 installed sugar factories, of which 283 are in the cooperative sector.

During the last two years, India has witnessed a glut in sugar production. The domestic sugar production in 2018-19 recorded an all time high sugar production of 330 lakh tonnes by surpassing all production estimates. In the world market, there was surplus sugar production in these years. Domestic as well as world sugar prices were ruling well below the cost of production

of sugar. Due to the huge disparity between domestic prices and rock bottom international prices, India's export business became unviable. After the introduction of minimum selling prices (MSP) of sugar of Rs 29/kg (Increased to Rs 31/Kg w.e.f. from 14-02-2019), which is still below cost of production; the sugar factories which were trapped in the financial crisis and were not able to clear their cane price dues to farmers, received some respite. As on June 30, 2019, cane price arrears are still at a high level.

In order to improve the liquidity of sugar mills enabling them to clear cane price arrears of farmers and to stabilize domestic sugar price, Government took various corrective measures, as follows.

Minimum Selling Price (MSP): Government of India (GoI) fixed the minimum selling price of Rs. 29/-kg. of white / refined sugar at mill gate, which was later increased by Rs. 2/- per kg to Rs 31/- Per Kg w.e.f from 14-02-2019. No sugar mills are able to sell their inventory below MSP, which helps in reducing the mounting cane arrears and improving the liquidity position of the sugar mills.

Minimum Indicative Export quota of 50 Lmts: To reduce the Inventory level in India and improve the Cash inflow of sugar millers, Gol allowed export of 50 LMT of sugar under sugar mill wise minimum indicative export quota (MIEQ) scheme for the year 2018-19.

Financial Incentive on Cane Crushed: In order to offset the cost of cane & facilitate timely payment of cane price dues of sugarcane growers, GoI notified financial incentive on cane crushed during SS 2018-19. Under this scheme, financial assistance shall be available @ Rs. 13.80 per/qtl. of cane crushed for the production of sugar. The estimated expenditure to be incurred by government for this purpose will be Rs. 4163 crores.

Financial Assistance on Sugar Export: In order to facilitate export of sugar during sugar season 2018-19, thereby improving the liquidity position of sugar mills and clearing cane price dues of sugarcane growers, GoI notified the scheme for defraying expenditure towards internal transport, freight, handling & other charges on export. Exporting sugar by sugar mills is eligible

for @ Rs. 1000/MT for the mills located within 100 kms from the ports, @ Rs. 2500/MT for the mills located beyond 100 kms from the port in the coastal states and @ Rs. 3000/MT for mills located in other than coastal states or actual expenditure, whichever is lower. The total expenditure on this account would be about Rs.1375 crore, which will be borne by the Government.

Scheme for Extending Soft Loan to Sugar Mills: The purpose of this loan scheme is to help millers clear the sugarcane payment arrears relating to the Fair and Remunerative Price (FRP) of sugarcane fixed by Gol. The total interest subvention on this account would be about Rs.750 crores, which will be borne by the Government. Under this scheme, the Government will bear the interest subvention cost @ 7% simple interest or actual rate of interest charged by the bank, whichever is less, for one year, from the date of disbursement of the loan.

Financial Assistance to Sugar Mills for Enhancement and Augmentation of Ethanol Production Capacity: In order to increase the production of Ethanol and its supply under Ethanol Blended with Petrol(EBP) programme, thereby improving the liquidity position of sugar mills, enabling them to clear cane price arrears of the farmers as well as achieve the target of 10% EBP by 2022 & 20% EBP by 2030, the GOI has notified this scheme. Under this scheme, Maximum Interest Subvention is @ 6% available for five years for sugar millers, which is also extended to standalone distilleries. (Inprinciple approval was accorded by Government for extending soft loans of about Rs. 9106 crores to 174 sugar mills under the Scheme .The impact due to this Scheme is EBP increased from 4.2 % to 7% in Ethanol Season 2018-19

Besides the above, NFCSF continued to render its techno-commercial consultancy services to its member cooperative sugar factories and to the need- based private sector mills. The professional experts of NFCSF in various disciplines viz. Sugar Engineering, Sugar Technology, Sugarcane Agronomy, Financial Management, By-Products have helped member sugar factories to adopt new technologies and methods for cost effective production of sugarcane and effective utilization of by-products

of the industry, for value addition. The technical competence, financial acumen, excellent skills and professional interfacing of the experts of NFCSF helped the member sugar factories to meet new challenges and the ever rising global standards. Emphasis was laid on the vertical growth of production of the factories rather than horizontal growth. Accordingly, the projects undertaken during the year, pertained more to expansion of crushing capacities, modernization, cogeneration, effective utilisation of by-products i.e. ethanol from sugarcane, juice etc.

During the year, NFCSF undertook 74 projects in nine States in India. These projects were related to preparation of rehabilitation, modernization, expansion, co-generation and valuation project reports and detailed project reports and project reports for ten distillery projects. The Detailed Project Reports included cane development programme, valuation of existing plants and recommendations for up gradation and modernization of technology, cogeneration, machinery specifications, financial restructuring, means of financing pattern and viability analysis etc. During the year total technocommercial consultancy and inspection services from concept to commissioning were also provided.

As sugarcane is the backbone of the sugar industry and as varieties of sugarcane play a major role not only in increasing sugarcane productivity but also sugar recovery; in order to improve the productivity of sugarcane, NFCSF had constituted a Committee under the Chairmanship of the Managing Director, NFCSF. This Committee has been monitoring the varietal trials conducted in different cooperative sugar factory operational areas.

The Federation also organized a National Seminar on 'Challenges to Deliver Sustainability in the Indian Sugarcane Industry' in March, 2019 at Pune. The seminar was organised in view of NFCSF's continued emphasis on cost effective production of sugar cane, sugar and effective utilization of by-products in order to make the Indian sugar industry globally competitive. Leading sugar scientists, academicians, sugar technologists, policy makers, officers of cooperative and private sugar factories, sugar

federations and associations from across the country participated in the seminar.

During the year, NFCSF continued to publish its regular publications viz. 'Cooperative Sugar Press News' weekly magazine containing present reports on sugar and allied subjects, Parliament questions and answers, market reports and 'Cooperative Sugar' a monthly journal containing useful technical articles on sugarcane, sugar and their by-products and government orders, notifications and statistical information. Various articles on cooperatives and success stories of cooperatives are also published. NFCSF also maintained close contact with media during the year to make the public and journalists aware of the problems faced by the sugar industry and to highlight the achievements of the sugar industry.

NATIONAL LABOUR COOPERATIVES FEDERATION OF INDIA LTD. (NLCF)

Membership

As on 31.3.2019, the membership of National Labour Cooperatives Federation of India Ltd. (NLCF) was 404 represented by labour contract/construction and forest labour cooperatives from different parts of the country.

Leadership Development Training Programmes:

- National Labour Cooperatives Federation of India Ltd. (NLCF) organized a three days Leadership Development Training Programme in collaboration with National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE) New Delhi at Institute of Cooperative Management, Dehradun from 18-20 June 2018. 27 participants from various districts of Uttar Pradesh, Utarakhand, Haryana and Punjab States participated in the programme.
- National Labour Cooperatives Federation of India Ltd. (NLCF) organized a three days Leadership Development Programme for Chairmen/ Directors of Labour Cooperative of Andhra Pradesh and Telangana States in collaboration with National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE) from 26th to 28th February 2018 at Hyderabad. 49 participants from various Districts of Andhra Pradesh and Telangana States were participated in the programme.

NATIONAL FEDERATION OF STATE COOPERATIVE BANKS LTD. (NAFSCOB)

1. Genesis

Nay 19, 1964 with the broad objective of facilitating the operations of state and central cooperative banks in particular, and development of short term cooperative credit& banking in general. NAFSCOB has completed about 56 years of useful services to the rural cooperative credit delivery system.

NAFSCOB provides a common forum for its members and their affiliates to project their

achievements, focus their concerns and promote their interests. As at the end of March, 2018 (tentative) there are 33 State Cooperative Banks (SCB) in the country of which 32 SCBs are members of NAFSCOB. The short term cooperative credit & banking structure consists of 33 SCBs with a network of 1414 branches, 363 District Central Cooperative Banks (DCCB) with 14297 branches and 95336 Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS).

2. Performance Profile of NAFSCOB

The General Body of NAFSCOB is the ultimate authority in all matters relating to NAFSCOB. The NAFSCOB is managed by its Board of Directors and the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee of the NAFSCOB consists of the Chairman, Six Vice-Chairmen, representing six regions, and the Chief Executive of the NAFSCOB.

2.1. Wings/Sections of NAFSCOB

NAFSCOB operates with three important wings, viz. (1) Planning, Research and Development (PRD) and (2) Computer Services Division (CSD). With limited human & financial resources, it has been accomplishing its role exceedingly well in achieving the spelt out objectives and providing effective services to the member institutions, in particular, and the short-term cooperative structure, in general. So far, NAFSCOB has conducted 168 conferences/seminars/workshops and published 429 papers. The official quarterly journal of NAFSCOB entitled 'NAFSCOB Journal of Rural Cooperative Credit and Banking' disseminates important information related to Agriculture, Cooperatives, Rural Cooperative Credit & Banking, etc. through articles/ news/ data/ special features.

During the year 2018-19, NAFSCOB has made representations on issues of importance to the Union Finance Minister on the eve of the pre-budget discussion, including need for suitable support to short term cooperative credit structure (STCCS) to implement a roadmap to enhance their share in total agricultural credit disbursement, need for formulating appropriate schemes to help DCCB to regain their reputation/leadership, which was affected by their non-participation in SBN under demonetisation, restoration of exemption allowed under Section 80P of Income Tax Act, 1961 to SCB and DCCB and other issues concerning taxation affecting the SCB and DCCB, need for review, revamp and restructuring of Interest Subvention Scheme. Adverse **Implications** Demonetisation on DCCBs and SARFAESI Act 2002 - Need for Amendments to facilitate Cooperatives to recover loans.

National Federation of State Cooperative Banks (NAFSCOB) in consultation with and support of National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD) constituted a Committee to formulate "Human Resource (HR) Policy" for primary agricultural credit societies (PACS) and suggest guidelines under the Chairmanship of Shri Konduru Ravinder Rao, Director, NAFSCOB & President, Telangana State Cooperative Bank (SCB).

The Committee submitted its draft Report in November 2018 to the Chairman, NAFSCOB. NAFSCOB organised a one-day National Seminar to discuss the draft report of the Committee on 11 December 2018 (Tuesday) at Mumbai.

The Seminar was aimed at facilitating a wider range of consultation on the recommendations made by the Committee on HR Policy for PACS and to fine-tune/finalise the report.

2.4 Dissemination of Information:

NAFSCOB developed a system of disseminating information on agriculture, cooperatives, rural cooperative credit & banking through its in-house quarterly Journal entitled, "NAFSCOB Journal of Rural Cooperative Credit

and Banking".

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE AGRICULTURE AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT BANKS' FEDERATION LTD. (NCARDB)

A significant event in the history of Long Term Cooperative Credit Structure (LTCCS) in India has been the establishment of the National Cooperative Agriculture and Rural Development Banks' Federation Ltd (NCARDBF) in 1960. Since its inception, the Federation has been playing an important role in the growth of institutions in the sector. It has established effective coordination

and promoted understanding among member banks and liaison with Central and State Governments, NABARD and financing agencies of SCARDBs.

Lobbying with the Government for implementing revival package comprising of recapitalisation and reforms, guiding SCARDBs in self-driven reform initiatives and guidance and support to member banks in resource mobilization, recovery and NPA management, business expansion and diversification continued to be the thrust areas of Federation's activities during the year.

Revival Package for ARDBs

Demand for revival package has been the main focus of Federation's lobbying with Central Govt in the last few years. Federation has been taking up this matter with various authorities in the Government including Prime Minister and Finance Minister from time to time. Federation has also convened Meetings of Parliamentarians on this issue. Federation has submitted fresh memorandum on this issue to Hon'ble Prime Minister in the eve of this year's Union Budget pointing out the need to revive institutions in the long term cooperative credit structure to boost capital formation in agriculture and to address the credit crisis faced by their member farmers.

The delay in implementing the package aggravated financial weakness of ARDBs and drastically reduced their capacity to meet the credit requirements of about 98 lakh farmers (members of ARDBs with outstanding loans as on 31.3.2017) who by and large are unable to access credit from other agencies since their land already mortgaged with ARDBs. Implementation of the proposed revival package is the only solution to address credit crisis faced by them. The structure which is present in all major states with a network of 2600 outlets has the potential of expanding its annual lending at least by 5 times in the short run from the present level of about Rs.5000 crs, if revived.

The continuous representations and delegations keep the revival proposal live and the Federation hopes for a favourable decision on the same at political level.

Restructuring of ARDBs into Banks

There is consensus among institutions in the LTCCS as well as their stakeholders including State Govt and NABARD that ARDBs should be converted as regular banks to make them resource based institutions capable of meeting the credit needs of their members adequately and restoring its relevance in the rural financial system.

In response to Federation's various representations on the subject, RBI has recently informed that the suggestion of framing norms for licensing ARDBs as banks is under consideration.

Crop loan interest subvention scheme

The interest subvention scheme for crop loans implemented by Govt of India is presently not extended to farmers who avail crop loans from ARDBs, for which the Federation has been persistently taking up this matter with Ministry of Finance to address this issue. NABARD Chairman in his meeting with representatives of the Federation on 6th March 2019 informed that such a proposal is under its active consideration which, if implemented, will help SCARDBs to give crop loans to their long term borrowers at interest rates on par with other banks. Federation has also moved Government to introduce an interest subvention scheme for investment credit to agriculture in the pattern of crop loan interest subvention scheme in order to reduce the cost of long term loans for capital formation in agriculture.

Reform initiatives

Core Group for Reform Initiatives (CGRI)

Core Group for Reform Initiatives constituted by SCARDBs continue to have regular meetings in most of the banks. CGRI has been concentrating on deepening of self-driven reforms at the ground level and also reviewing the impact of reforms.

The focus of CGRI meetings during 2018-19 was preparation and implementation of special revival plans by SCARDBs with thrust on resource augmentation, business expansion, NPA management and computerisation.

Follow-up with State Governments for enhancing policy support to SCARDBs

The two Conferences of Principal Secretaries

of Cooperation and Registrars of Cooperative Societies organised by the Federation in 2012 and 2014 made several important recommendations for improving legal and policy environment of ARDBs and improving their working in general. The Federation is continuously following up these recommendations with State Govts concerned.

Scheme for Sanctioning Supplementary Credit Limit to meet Short term credit needs of long term borrowers

Absence of further financial support to supplement investment credit is a major shortcoming in the working of ARDBs. ARDBs generally give only long term loans leaving the short term credit needs of their members unattended and making them dependent on informal sources for such credit at exorbitant interest rates. Inadequate availability of short term credit also leads to sub-optimum utilisation of long term assets financed by ARDBs which affects borrowers' income and repaying capacity. Further, high cost of informal credit reduces the capacity of members to repay loans availed from the bank. Frequent contact of the borrower with the bank is necessary for timely repayment of loan is also not possible in the absence of further credit support after issuing investment credit.

Fixing supplementary credit limit which can be operated like a revolving cash credit to borrowers of long term loans will serve the twin purpose of meeting short term credit needs and improving loan recovery by increased borrower contact and reduced dependence of borrowers on informal sources of credit.

Working Group on Enhancing the Share of ARDBs in Rural Credit

Background

The ARDB structure is experiencing drastic decline in their market share since mid late 90s. Financial weaknesses on account of losses incurred under govt sponsored lending programmes, debt waivers as well as inadequate margins under the regulated interest rate regime prevailing till mid 90s. Continuing dependence on NABARD's refinance and failure to diversify source of funds. Drastic increase in the level of overdues and NPAs since early 2000, etc. Are some of the important reasons behind this.

As decided by the Board of Management of the Federation in its meeting on 21st July 2017, Chairman Federation has constituted a Working Group on enhancing the share of ARDBs in rural credit with focus on investment credit to agriculture under the Chairmanship of Shri Y.C. Nanda, ExChairman, NABARD and Co-Chairmanship of Shri D.N. Thakur, Dy. Managing Director, NCDC, one officer from NABARD and Chairmen/CEOs of Member Banks.

The Working Group has submitted its report on 1st November 2018.

Working Group on HR Policies in ARDBs

Human resource scenario in ARDBs in many States is marked by serious deficiencies in terms of quality and quantity. In this context, there is a need for devising appropriate HR policies by SCARDBs to ensure availability of staff of right size and quality at various levels to support their business development plans and to lay down norms and procedures on various aspects of human resource management. On this background, the Board of Management of the Federation in its meeting on 21st July 2017 authorised Chairman to constitute a Working Group on HR policies in ARDBs. Accordingly, the Chairman, Federation constituted a Working Group on HR policies under the chairmanship of Shri K. Sivadasan Nair, Vice Chairman of the Federation and co-chairmanship of Shri N. Satyanarayana, Chief Executive, NCUI and CEOs/ Managing Directors of Member Banks.

Seminars on Functional Restructuring

Federation has been organizing Seminars on Functional Restructuring of ARDBs for middle level executives of SCARDBs and PCARDBs in the new areas of operations as part of functional restructuring. The first programme during the year was held during 9th to 11th October 2018 with the participation of 20 officers of SCARDBs from various States and the second seminar was organized during 22nd to 24th November 2018 exclusively for CEOs of PCARDBs and branch managers of SCARDBs which was attended by 22 participants from 5 States. The first seminar during 9th to 11th October 2018 was inaugurated by Shri K. Sivadasan Nair, Chairman, NCARDB

Federation and the second seminar was inaugurated by Shri P.V. Prabhu, Ex.CEO of the Federation and presently Trustee Secretary, NIRB.

Pilot Project for Agriculture Value Chain Financing

The Board of Management of the Federation in its meeting on 20th December 2017 at Bangalore approved the Pilot Project for Agriculture Value Chain Financing by SCARDBs and member SCBs based on Group Approach. It was decided that all member banks which are eligible for refinance from NABARD should participate in the pilot project by selecting a contiguous area consisting of one or more panchayats in the respective States, suitable for the crops/activities identified by the banks.

Publications

Land Bank Journal with a new look

Recently, the Federation has changed the size of the Land Bank Journal with improvement in the quality of paper and printing. The Federation has engaged the services of a Senior Accredited Journalist worked with the important National Dailies for professional support in editing and publishing the journal. Three issues of Land Bank Journal i.e. June 2018, September 2018 & December 2018 have been published and circulated during the year and March 2019 issue is under print.

Annual Statistical Bulletin

Collection and compilation of statistics relating to member banks' operations and publication of Annual Statistical Bulletin is also undertaken by the Cell. Federation is trying to make this important publication up to date by streamlining the reporting system relating to ground level data relating to the operations of ARDBs.

Monthly Progress Report of ARDBs

Federation collects and compiles data on member banks' key operations on a monthly basis for review at its level and reporting to Govt. of India. Loans disbursements, recovery performance, borrowings and deposit mobilisation are the main areas covered in the monthly progress report. Ten consolidated monthly reports from April 2018 to February 2019 were brought out during the year 2018-19. March 2019 report is under compilation.

Report on Member Banks' Operations during 2018-19

General Information

The membership of the Federation as on 31 March 2019 comprises of 16 SCARDBs and 3 SCBs. Fully functional SCARDBs with unitary/mixed structure were operating through 686 branches, while those with federal structure had a network of 602 PCARDBs and 463 branches of PCARDBs as on 31 March 2019. The total membership of 13 functional SCARDBs as on 31 March 2019 was 107.49 lakh of which borrowing members were 62.41 lakh. Out of 13 fully functional banks 7 had elected boards. 541 out of 602 PCARDBs also had elected boards as on 31 March 2019.

Loans advanced

The total loans advanced by 13 SCARDBs (fully functional) during the year 2018-19 amounted to Rs. 4230.62 crore as against Rs. 4421.46 crore during 2017-18 showing a negative growth of 4.32% mainly on account of set back to normal lending operations due to declaration of loan waivers by some of the State Governments. The aggregate loans outstanding of these banks at Apex Bank level stood at Rs. 20679.26 crore for the year 2018-19 as against Rs. 20675.86 crore for the previous year 2017-18, showing a marginal increase of 0.02%.

Borrowings

Total borrowings by 13 SCARDBs (Fully functional) during 2018-19 decreased to Rs. 2720.23 crore from Rs. 3109.34 crore during 2017-18. NABARD continued to be the main source of borrowings during the year, with total refinance support of Rs. 1935.60 crore accounting for 71.16% of total borrowings by the banks. Remaining 28.84% of borrowings by theses SCARDBs were sourced from Govt. NCDC, NHB and various StCBs.

The borrowings outstanding of 13 SCARDBs

as on 31 March 2019 (Fully functional) stood at Rs. 15059.18 crore as against Rs. 15169.17 crore as on 31 March 2018. Borrowing outstanding of five banks viz., Himachal Pradesh, Kerala, Tripura, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal showed an increase and that of seven states viz., Gujarat, Haryana, Karnataka, Pondicherry, Punjab, Rajasthan and Tamil Nadu, decreased over the previous year. Jammu & Kashmir, SCARDB did not show any change in its borrowings outstanding position.

Deposit Mobilisation

All fully functional SCARDBs except Tripura have been taking deposits during the year under report. Deposits of these banks mainly comprised of member deposits under various deposit schemes as approved by their Board of Directors. Some of the SCARDBs are also collecting fixed deposits of 1 to 3 years duration from public as permitted under NABARD's guidelines for deposit mobilization by SCARDBs issued in 1997. Total deposit outstanding of SCARDBs as on 31st March 2019 were Rs. 2133.38 crore as against Rs. 2157.38 crore as on 31st March 2018 registering a meagre decrease of 1.12% over the previous year.

Financial Performance

The provisional profit / loss position as on 31st March 2019, in respect of 13 SCARDBs (Fully functional) shows that 9 SCARDBs are in profit and remaining 4 SCARDBs (Haryana, Jammu & Kashmir, Pondicherry and Tripura) have incurred losses. The number of SCARDBs in profit and those in losses during the year remain the same as in last year. All SCARDBs which received NABARD's refinance except Haryana were in profit during the year. Tamil Nadu though not getting NABARD's refinance continued to maintain the

growth in net profits during the year. The position is likely to undergo changes once the audited figures in respect of Himachal Pradesh, Karnataka, Punjab, and Uttar Pradesh are available. In respect of these banks, the previous year's position has been retained for review.

Non-Performing Assets

The total loan outstanding of 13 SCARDBs (Fully functional) amounted to '20465.08 crore as on 31st March 2019 with Gross NPA of '5129.55 crore which worked out to 25.06% of the total loan outstanding as against 24.84% as on 31st March 2018. Of the 13 SCARDBs, NPAs of 3 SCARDBs (Kerala, Pondicherry and Punjab) were significantly below the tolerable level of 5%.

Recovery Performance

The yearly recovery performance at apex and ultimate borrowers level is reported as of 30th June every year. Hence the latest available position of DCB is 30th June 2018. The total ground level demand of 13 SCARDBs (Fully functional) at the end of 30th June 2018 were '14114.61 crore against which collections were '6112.53 crore which formed 43.31% of demand as against 37.89% as on 30th June 2017. The recovery percentage at ultimate borrowers level was above 50% in the case of 4 SCARDBs viz., Himachal Pradesh, Kerala, Pondicherry and Tamil Nadu whereas Gujarat, Haryana, Jammu & Kashmir, Karnataka, Punjab, Rajasthan, Tripura, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal were in the range of below 50%. The amount of overdues as on 30th June 2018 stood at '8002.09 crore compared to ' 7785.80 crore as of 30th June 2017, showing an increase of '216.29 crore over previous year. The recovery climate was vitiated by the declaration of debt waiver scheme in some of the States.

CHAPTER - 9

IMPORTANT ACTIVITIES OF STATE LEVEL COOPERATIVE ORGANISATIONS

ANDHRA PRADESH

Andhra Pradesh State Cooperative Union Ltd., Vijayawada

Main Objective

The objectives of the Union are to promote and develop the cooperative movement in A.P. and educate, guide and assist the people in their efforts, to build up and expand the cooperative sector and to serve as an exponent of cooperative opinion in accordance with cooperative principles.

MEP (Member Education Programmes)

The flag ship training programme of the Union is Member Education Programme for all the cooperative society members at grass root level. There are 13 Educational Officers working in 13 districts, promoting & propagating the cooperative principles. Between 2016-17 and 2018-19, the number of classes conducted in PACs were 1728, with 1,33,667, member attendees. The classes conducted in other societies were 571, with 35,910, number of attendees, making for a total of 2,299 classes and 1,69,577 attendees.

The training classes are conducted by the Cooperative Educational Officers (CEOs) in consultation with the management of the respective societies. The expenditure was borne by the societies concerned from their Member Education Fund.

The Union has been conducting Diploma in Cooperative Management and Computer Applications (DCM & CA) Course in its four training centres located at Rajahmundry, Vijayawada, Kadapa and Ananthapur. As on date, three batches have undergone training successfully for a 6 months programme. The 4th batch of DCM & CA Course has commenced from 04-07-2019 for both In-service oficials and freshers. Since last

three years, the number of trainees who applied was 613, and the number of trainees who appeared for examinations and were awarded certificates was 569.

Short Term Training Programmes

The AP State Cooperative Union, Vijayawada has been proudly conducting Short Term Training Programmes for the In-service personnel of Societies and Department staff on different topics besides preparing subject material for the purpose. From 2016-17 till date, 443 training programmes were conducted, and the number of participants who attended were 20,371.

In addition to above traditional programmes, the Union has also conducted state and district level seminars for the targeted groups with the financial support of the National Cooperative Union of India, 1041 participants have been trained in various programmes conducted by CTCs at various places on different subjects such as Seminars for SC and ST women candidates of cashless transactions and digital banking, marketing of products of women societies, etc.

Apart from organising educational and training programmes, the A.P. State Cooperative Union has undertaken publication of monthly journal by name "Sahakara Samacharam". Sahakara Samacharam covers articles on subjects relating to different segments of cooperatives, and also covers articles on subjects relating to cooperative movement in general.

Cooperative Week Celebrations and International Cooperative Day

The Union has been conducting Cooperative Week Celebrations in the entire State of Andhra Pradesh in each nook and corner from Nov. 14th to 20th every year, involving all its staff members as per the schedule given by the National Cooperative Union of India. The Union has also

ASSAM

Assam State Cooperative Union

ssam State Cooperative Union organised A various activities with the financial help of NCUI during the year 2018-19. Assam State Cooperative Union organised a state level seminar on 14.11.2019 which was attended by members of different cooperative societies of every district, including state level federation. Assam State Cooperative Union conducted two Leadership Development Programmes in different places of Assam for youth. In these programmes, about 50 participants of different cooperative societies/SHG participated. For women empowerment, Assam State Cooperative Union conducted 2 women LDPs. Assam State Cooperative Union also conducted 5 district level seminars in various districts of Assam, which were attended by around 400 participants.

Assam State Cooperative Union conducted 1 inter-state study visit programme to Kalkata (West Bengal) w.e.f. 07.02.2019 to 12.02.2019 in which the BODs of different cooperative societies of Assam including the ASCU and DCUs participated.

In addition to this, the regular training programmes/seminars etc. of Assam State Cooperative Union were too held for the benefit of the members of the cooperative societies of Assam. Through 271 courses conducted for Secretaries/Managers, MCMs/Office Bearers, Members/Potential Members, Course for Leaders, G.B. meeting/study circle, around 6745 persons were trained. Amongst these, 3456 were women, and 1440/1788 were SC/STs. For another 114 courses related to agriculture cooperative, dairy cooperatives, fisheries cooperative, BDP/SHG, etc., 2868 persons were trained.

DELHI

Delhi State Cooperative Union

The main object of the Union is to impart education to the elected members of societies as well as their members by organizing

educational camps both at the society level as well at central places. A present, there is only one instructor who looks after this programme:

In the year 2018-19, the Union conducted 70 training camps and trained 1267 M.C. members and active members. 97 office bearers were trained by organizing two workshops of newly registered thrift and credit societies at the premises of Delhi Swastik Cooperative Society and Bhajanpura Cooperative T/C Society in which subjects like KYC Norms, GST and Income Tax were discussed. A workshop on GST was also organized for the urban Cooperative banks & urban T/C societies at Nehru Yuva Kendra, D.D. Upadhya Marg, New Delhi, which was addressed by Additional Commissioner, Sales Tax/GST, Govt. of Delhi and other leading cooperatives.

A seminar for cooperative leaders, addressed by Hon'ble Minister of Cooperatives was organised on 15.11.2018 as a part of Cooperative Week Celebration which was attended by 100 senior leaders of cooperative societies. A seminar on solar energy was also organized in collaboration with Apex Group Housing Societies Federation in Nov., 2018.

A Prize Distribution Function was organized at Hindi Bhawan, New Delhi to honour good working societies and eminent cooperators on 20.11.2018, which was addressed by Shri Rajendra Pal Gautam, Hon'ble Minister for Cooperatives & Registrar, Cooperative Societies. 300 representatives from cooperative societies participated in the said function.

During the year 2018-19, following books were published for the use of societies and cooperatives:

- A Guide containing comprehensive procedures for registration of new societies was published.
- Model Bye-laws for different kind of societies were up-to-dated and published.
- Delhi Cooperative Societies Act 2003 & Rules 2007 were up-to-dated and published for the use of societies and individuals.
- Sehkari Journal was published containing useful articles on different issues of cooperative development.

Other Promotional Activities

The Union arranged sale of stationery items such as cash book, ledgers, Act, Rules and Byelaws as well other stationery items as prescribed under the rules. These were made available to the societies on reasonable rates.

The Union also provided technical guidance to 741 cooperators on various subjects such as registration, election, arbitration, amendment in bye-laws, investment of funds etc. The Union coordinated with the state level federations in raising their issues before competent authorities.

GUJARAT

Gujarat State Cooperative Union

Inder the joint aegis of Gujarat State Cooperative Union and Kheda District Cooperative Union, 65th All India Cooperative Week 2018 was held on November 14th November, 2018 at Nadiad. Shri Lalsinhbhai Vadodiya inaugurated the function. He also released Special Edition of "Sahakar" Fortnightly on this occasion. Inaugurating the function, Shri Lalsinhbhai Vadodiya stated that the cooperative movement in Gujarat is very strong and the credit for White Revolution (Operation Flood) goes to the milk cooperatives of Gujarat.

Presiding over the function, Hon'ble Chairman of Kheda District Cooperative Union and District Cooperative Bank, Shri Dhirubhai Chavda, stated that when the existence of villages is threatened, cooperative sector has made good contribution in raising the income level of the masses.

Gracing the function as its Hon'ble Chief Guest, Honorary Secretary of Gujarat State Cooperative Union, Shri Arvindbhai Tagadia stated that Kheda District is a pilgrimage place of cooperative activities. He said that we all will have to be united, when 70%-75% allied vocations are attached to agriculture sector, and the cooperative sector is only the right way for survival of the economy. The Chaklasi Cooperative Credit Society Ltd, Chaklasi, stood second, while Thasra Vepari Mandal Cooperative Credit Society Ltd stood third in the competition.

A Cooperative Convention 2019 was held on 1st March, 2019, Koba, Gandhinagar under the aegis of Gujarat State Cooperative Union, on a vital topic related to doubling of farmers income by 2022.

Inaugurating the Cooperative Convention Shri Parshottam Rupala Union Minister of State for Agriculture, stated that the farmers and cooperatives across the state are committed to achieve the target for doubling of farmers' income.

Gujarat State Cooperative Marketing Federation Ltd. (GUJCOMASOL)

As an apex level federation of Gujarat, Gujarat State Cooperative Marketing Federation Ltd. popularly known as "GUJCOMASOL" has more than 2410.60 crore turnover. It's core objective is farmers welfare. The federation distributes agriculture Inputs like fertilizer, seeds and pesticides as well as procures agri commodities directly from farmers for serving their interest as well as the interest of cooperative societies and consumers.

Fertilizer distribution is the most important activity among many activities being carried out by GUJCOMASOL. During the F.Y. 2018-19, its was fertilizer sales amounting for 12,82,398 MTs valued at Rs.1308.09 crores.

To ensure easy availability during Kharif-2019, advance purchase of urea, DAP and NPKs fertilizers were pre-booked from February to March-2019.

The entire fertilizer allotment by Govt. of Gujarat to IFFCO, KRIBHCO, IPL, GSFC and GNFC is being lifted by GUJCOMASOL and distributed through cooperatives to the farmers. GUJCOMASOL distributes the fertilisers through its three tire system.

The three tier fertilizer distribution system of Gujcomasol in Gujarat is very unique in the country as more than 5000 societies are associated with this three tier distribution system.

In the untouched areas where no cooperatives are present at all or cooperatives are weak, or the area fertilizer department opens depots which supply fertilizers, seeds, pesticides and other inputs to farmers as well as to small cooperatives which need to purchase part truck load/mix truck load of agro inputs. Such depots distribute fertilizers to the farmers. Presently, 89 depots are operative and have sold fertiliser valued at Rs. 169,48 crores. Further, in cases of revival of the strong cooperatives, in such areas, depot services are withdrawn so that they may get sufficient business volume.

In reference to growth of micro irrigation system and growing awareness about use of WSF, city compost, micro nutrients to improve the agricultural production, GUJCOMASOL/ coops are distributing such products. The district liason officers and company officials are working together for promoting such products.

For all distribution and promotional activities, there are district liaison officers & depot supervisors for all the districts, and they coordinate with companies, Agriculture Department, coops, TPSUs/DPSUs etc.

The Government of India initiated DBT Scheme under which all subsidized fertilizers were required to be sold through POS machines with Aadhar authentication of the farmers. The fertilizer dept. has coordinated with agriculture dept, coops, TPSUs/DPSUs for implementation of DBT Scheme, and now major cooperatives have prepared themselves for this task right now.

Production and sales of seed is being carried out by Seed Department of GUJCOMASOL.

Through continuous monitoring of the seed production programme by technical staff and commitment of farmers, it becomes possible to provide quality certified seeds to the farmers of the state. No doublt, "GUJCOMASOL" brand seeds are much popular among the farmers, and it deals in the seeds of 13 major crops grown in Gujarat. Production, distribution of more than 50 hybrids or varieties of different crops is being undertakin. This year while new varieties are introduced, production programmes are undertaken for TUR-GJP-1, Groundnut - GJG-32, GJG-9, Mustard -GDM-4, Gram-GUJ-5, GUJ-6, Wheat-GW-11, GW-451, Moong-GAM-5 etc. Last year the turnover of seed division was 11.95 crores, which increased upto more than 25 crores in the year of 2018-19. The profit also increased upto 3.25 crore compared to 1.39 crores during last year. The seed division is providing seeds to the farmers at subsidised rate under different state and central sponsored schemes of subsidies. Last year, 65 lakh .subsidy was passed out to the farmers, which increased in 2018-19 to 8 crores.

Since 1968, GUJCOMASOL has its own pesticide production and formulation unit at Narol. It is a pioneer in the cooperative field for establishment of such a unit with best in-house facilities for testing and analysis of its products. Utmost care is taken for ensuring the production of the finest quality pesticide at equitable prices, which is well known for it's quality in Gujarat State. Federation is providing quality pesticides to the farmers through cooperative system as well as private dealers dealing with government schemes and also through various sales depot. During the year 2018-19, its sales of pesticides was to the tune of Rs. 204.49 lakhs.

To promote farmers' welfare, GUJCOMASOL commerce department procures various agricultural produce directly from farmers at a reasonable price. As the apex level federation of Gujarat farmers, GUJCOMASOL commerce department procures agricultural commodities under Price Support Scheme (PSS) of Government of India. During the year 2018-19, 1.54 lakhs MTs of agricultural commodities were procured directly from farmers, valued at more then 700 crore under PSS. Procurement, process and value addition of agricultural commodities are key areas of work of the commerce department.

GUJCOMASOL has established godowns for the storage of chemicals, fertilizers, seeds, food grains, pulses, oil & oil seeds, pesticides etc. at the key locations of district as well as important points on State and National Highways in the State. Godowns were constructed under loan and subsidy scheme. At present, the Central Government has taken a decision to stop subsidy under Gramin Bhandaran Yoina. GUJCOMASOL owns 156 godowns having 2,07,950 MT. storage capacity located at different places in the state. Recently, two godowns at Tarapur Estate have been completed. Recently, renovation work of Kankaria Estate has been completed. The Federation has started construction of one more godown by scientific method. GUJCOMASOL always supports Gujarat State Seeds Corpn., GSFC, IFFCO, NHBC, NCMSL, Edelwesis, LTC, and other intuitions associated with agri. commodities and agri-inputs for storage of their fertilizers, food grains, oil seeds, hybrid seeds & pesticides in the spare godowns on a monthly rental basis.

HARYANA

Haryana State Cooperative Supply and Marketing Federation (HAFED)

AFED is the largest apex cooperative federation of Haryana State which came into existence on November 1st, 1966. Since then it is playing a leading role in serving the farmers of Haryana as well as consumers in India and overseas. Over the years HAFED has become one of the largest food grains procurement agency of the State, a premier warehousing agency of the State for scientific storage of food grains and a largest chain of agro-processing units in the State. It is a major supplier of quality and safe consumer products, and a distributor of agro-inputs with a largest supply chain network.

To execute various functions, HAFED has good infrastructure, comprising of godowns (18.03 lakh MT), open plinths (11.02 lakh MT, animal feed plants, pesticides plants, turmeric plant, commercial warehouses, etc.

The wheat procurement is done for the central pool on behalf of the FCI. During 2019-20, the quantity procured was of 39.07 (lakh MT).

NAFED is the central nodal agency for procurement of oil seeds and pulses under price support scheme (PSS) in the country. HAFED is the state agency for procurement of oil seeds and pulses on behalf of NAFED in Haryana. HAFED therefore also procures mustard seed, gram & sunflower seed on behalf of NAFED under Price Support Scheme in case their prices fall below the support price. HAFED also makes procurement of mustard seed for its oil mills on commercial basis. The procurement of mustard seed and sunflower seed made by HAFED during 2018-19 was 2,35,072 MT and 4926 MT respectively.

The procurement made by HAFED of bazra at an MSP of Rs. 1950 (Rs. per qtl.) was 95,920 MT (quantity procured). The purchase of moong was done first time under PSF Scheme in 2018-19, at MSP of 6975 per qutl. procuring 223 MT. HAFED procures paddy at support price for central pool, which is delivered as custom milled rice to FCI as per Govt. of India scheme. In 2018-19, the share allotted percentage was 30.40, while the share procured percentage was 30, while for paddy (in lakh MT), it was 18.06. HAFED procured 174 MT of maize for the first time is 2018-19, at MSP of Rs. 1700/per MT.

HAFED was declared as a Nodal Agency by the State Government for construction of approx. 39.56 lakh MT godowns in the State of Haryana under Private Entrepreneur Godown (PEG) Scheme 2008 of Government of India. Out of this, a capacity of 34.56 lakh MTs has been completed upto 28.02.2019, while 0.47 lakh MTs capacity is under construction.

It's Oil mill set up at Rewari in 1986 produces 'Kachchi Ghani 'Agmark' mustard oil, the quality of which is comparable with the best available in the country. The turnover of the mill in 2018-19 was Rs. 12,195 lakh and it earned a profit of Rs. 197 lakh.

The processing and marketing facilities in the oil mill have also been improved. Various measures have been taken up to enhance the crushing capacity and to improve the quality of the oil. The godowns of 3,300 MT have been constructed in the oil mills, and a packing section of 1500 MT was constructed at oil mill Rewari.

HAFED set up Modern Kachchi Ghani

Mustard Oil Mill at Narnaul of 30 TPD capacity in 2003. In 2018-19, it's turnover was Rs. 12,843 lakh, and profit was Rs. 244 lakhs.

Cattle feed plant of 100 TPD capacity was set up in 1976 at Rohtak. It has facilities for manufacturing cattle feed, poultry feed, piggery feed & mineral mixtures, bricks and molasses urea bricks. The consistency in quality and regular supply has earned a lot of goodwill for HAFED cattle feeds. HAFED had replaced existing plant with ultra modern technology new plant of 150 TPD capacity (expandable upto 300 TPD) in the year.

HAFED set up an Animal Feed Plant at Saktakhera of 50 TPD capacity in the year 2001. With a view to make available quality insecticides and weedicides at reasonable prices, HAFED established a Pesticide Plant at Taraori in 1974. During the last few years, several new products have been added to meet the requirements of wheat, paddy, cotton & oil seed crops of Haryana State.

HAFED has set up a sugar mill of 2500 TCD capacity alongwith incidental co-generation and 2 MW power exportable to state grid at Assandh at an approx cost of Rs. 80.00 crores during the year 2008. The sugarcane sowing area has been increased remarkably since its inception. Hafed Sugar Mill, Assandh has been awarded a 3rd prize at the National level for the year 2013-14, 2nd prize for the year 2014-15 and 1st prize for the year 2016-17 in financial management of cooperative sugar mills.

With an aim to provide good quality seeds to the farmers at a reasonable price, HAFED has diversified into a new activity of seed production during the year 2010-2011. The performance of the plant during the last three years is very good

The rice mill was set up by HAFED at Taraori in 1970, and up-gradations have been made in the mill from time to time. In the year 2012-13, the rice mill has been modernized and the capacity of newly set up paddy shelling, polishing and Sortex units have increased to 4 MT, 4 MT and 6 MT per hour respectively. The performance of Rice Mill, Taraori for the last three years is very good. The flour mill has been set up at Taraori in the year 2012-13 with a capacity of 20 tonnes per day.

The sale of HAFED consumer products since the last three years has been increasing since the last three years. There was sale of Rs. 255.85 crores in 2018-19.

HAFED is the sole State Nodal Agency for arrangement and distribution of fertilizers through cooperative network in Haryana. It has been successfully making timely arrangements of all kinds of fertilizers. Agricultural inputs like seeds, fertilizers and pesticides/ insecticides/ weedicides play an important role in increasing the productivity of crops. Over the years, through the network of its cooperatives, HAFED has been ensuring that the farmers get quality Inputs at reasonable prices. HAFED's role in Inputs' supply is important not only from economy point of view, but also from the fact that with HAFED, a farmer is sure of the quality/ purity, and is saved the possibility of any damage to his crops. The fertilizer sale during the last three years is indeed heartening.

HAFED has played a vital role in controlling shortage of Urea and DAP in the state by taking timely action for advance stocking. It has made advance tie ups with IFFCO, Kribhco, NFL and the Indian Potash Limited for advance stocking of DAP & UREA in the state.

HAFED has started setting up of Mega Food Project at IMT, Rohtak, with an estimated project cost of 179.75 crore for which Hafed has already taken 50 acres land from HSIIDC on 75 years lease. The final approval from Ministry of Food Processing Industry, Government of India was received on 21.02.2018. As per the approval, the project is required to be completed within 30 months.

HIMACHAL PRADESH

H.P. Sate Cooperative Development Federation, Shimla

he cooperative movement plays a significant role in the upliftment of socio-economic standard of the people in Himachal Pradesh. There are 4875 different types of cooperative societies with a membership of 17.98 lakh in the state. These societies have share capital of Rs. 35800.10 lakh, and deposits of Rs. 2698339.50 lakhs. The total working capital of these societies is Rs. 3488040 lakh. In the preceding year, these cooperative societies distributed essential items to the tune of Rs. 288282.90 lakh under PDS. They have supplied fertiliser and agriculture inputs to the tune of RS. 52879.20 lakh. During the same period, agriculture and non-agriculture loan to the tune of Rs. 14288902.40 lakh have also been distributed by the societies to its members.

With the scenic beauty and abundant natural resources available in the state, the cooperative sector has been envisaged as the most promising segment for generation of new employment avenues. All efforts have been made to explore the possibility of formation of cooperative societies for hydro electric, floriculture, tourism, poly houses for off-seasonal vegetables and production of medicine herbs, etc.

The Himachal Pradesh State Cooperative Development Federation Ltd., Shimla came into being in the year 1960, at the initiative of the Department of Cooperation, H.P. Government. Its principal objective is, "to promote and develop the cooperative movement in Himachal Pradesh, to educate, guide and assist the people in their efforts to build up and expand the cooperative movement".

This Federation is running two Cooperative Training Centres at Mashobra, Distt., Shimla and Garli, Distt Kangra to cater to the training needs of junior personnel of the cooperative department and employees of cooperative institutions. In both training centres, one Diploma in Cooperative Management Course of 16 week duration is organised in a year, the guidelines and syllabus for which are prescribed by National Council for Cooperative Training (NCCT). During the year

2018-19, 9312 persons were trained for 3000 Courses such as Secretary/Manager Course, Managing Committee member camps, member/ potential members camps, youth camps, Diploma in Cooperative Management Course, Tribal Courses, Seminars, etc.

Apart from implementation of cooperative education and training programme, the federation also undertakes publication and propaganda activities. The main activities under the programme such as:

- Publication of monthly Magazine "Sahkar Darpan"
- Publication of cooperative literature and pamphlets.
- Dissemination of achievements and programme of cooperative movement.
- Organisation of All India Cooperative Week.
- Organisation of seminars and workshops.
- Conferring of awards on outstanding cooperative societies.
- Organisation of interstate study visits.
- Organisation of camps in tribal areas within special drive.

KARNATAKA

Karnataka State Cooperative Federation Ltd.

Arnataka State Cooperative Federation provides education and training for the development of cooperative movement in the state, and also it gives wide publicity to the activities of cooperatives. Member education programme with the guidance from National Cooperative Union of India has been successfully implemented since 1957. Under this scheme, education is provided to the secretaries, members, executive committee members, staff, women and SC, ST members of the societies. It has been running 8 cooperative training centers through which a Diploma in Cooperative Management training is conducted for a period of 26 weeks. A correspondence course of Diploma in

Cooperative Management Training is conducted for a period of 24 weeks.

With a view to make the member education programme more effective so as to face the global challenges, it was decided to arrange cluster type training programmes keeping 2 or 3 cooperative institutions in a group at the village level and impart the required training to the participants.

The cluster programme has been widely appreciated. Directors of the societies, women members, members belonging to SC/ST and youth are participating in this programme. During 2018-19, 750 classes were conducted.

Education and training programmes pertaining to all sectors of cooperative movement were organized in all the districts of the state. Need-based training programmes for secretaries, staff, office bearers, directors are being organized through district co-op. unions. As in 2018-19, 234 classes were conducted for 18048 participants. As far as district cooperative union board members' study visit programme is concerned, three classes were conducted for 43 participants. State level training programmes on subjects related to different sectors of the cooperative movement are also organised. During 2018-19, 66 such programmes were organised, in which 7251 people participated. It has been organising essay and debate competition on cooperation for the students of schools and colleges at district level, though District Cooperative Unions. 780 school students and 662 college students participated in 29 essay competitions and 133 students drawn from pre-degree and Post degree colleges participated in state level debating competitions. For LAMPS cooperative societies in 2018-19, five training programmes were conducted which were attended by 156 members.

2180 candidates were trained by the Federation through training programmes such as Diploma in Cooperative Management (Correspondence), as well as need based training conducted by Karnataka Institute of Cooperative Management in 2018-19.

Publicity

Federation has been publishing "Sahakara Weekly" for the last 50 years. The weekly includes the news and views on cooperatives, government

circulars, progress report on cooperatives, interview with senior cooperators, information on best cooperators and such other items. At present, about 15,000 cooperatives and cooperators have been enrolled as subscribers for the weekly.



The Central Arecanut & Cocoa Marketing and Processing Cooperative Ltd. (CAMPCO)

he Central Arecanut and Cocoa Marketing and Processing Cooperative Ltd., popularly known as CAMPCO was registered under the Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act involving the arecanut growers from the states of Karnataka and Kerala. Shri Varanashi Subraya Bhat, the Founder President by his selfless service and sacrifice laid a strong edifice in forming this giant cooperative CAMPCO. CAMPCO set up one of the most sophisticated chocolate factories at Puttur in the year 1986. The ISO certified factory produces finished and industrial products. Our chocolate products are being exported, and we have received export excellence award from the Federation of Indian Export Organisations-Southern Region, Ministry of Commerce, Government of India for consecutive four terms during 2014-18.

CAMPCO having a strong membership base has a turnover of Rs. 1878.00 crores reaching every nook and corner of our nation with a network of more than 150 branches. Apart from arecanut and cocoa, CAMPCO also deals with rubber and pepper. Towards green energy, CAMPCO has set up three wind mill units. CAMPCO has withstood the brunt of changing market trends, recession and upheavals in the arecanut market. Through a judicious marketing strategy, CAMPCO has gained the confidence of the grower members and has assured them that in future too it will abide by the main objective for which CAMPCO has been set up i.e. safeguarding the interest of the grower members.

For the financial year 2018-19, CAMPCO has crossed an all-time high turnover of Rs. 1,878.00 crores and also achieved record purchases and sales in the history of CAMPCO, well recognised for its quality products. For the year, CAMPCO has purchased 57210 MTs of arecanut, 5378 MTs

of cocoa, 2250 MTs of rubber and 663 MTs of pepper from grower members. It has sold 54767 MTs of arecanut, 2248 MTs of rubber and 518 MTs of pepper. 3657 MTs of cocoa beans were consumed in the CAMPCO chocolate factory.

The total production of CAMPCO chocolate factory has touched 14606 MTs including export of 1106 MTs. Under social responsibility, CAMPCO has extended financial aid towards the medical treatment of grower members. A total of 31 beneficiaries have availed this facility of which 19 members have been aided for open heart surgery and 12 for dialysis treatment.

In order to have more value added products from arecanut and to increase arecanut productivity and returns of farmers, CAMPCO in collaboration with the ARDF, Mangaluru and SDMIT, Ujire organised seminars on entrepreneurship development and industrial opportunities in Areca" and "Honey Bee Farming" at SDMIT, Ujire. CAMPCO in collaboration with CPCRI is conducting research in value addition for our products.

CAMPCO maintains personal touch with the members by visiting the farmers at their residence. During cooperative week celebration, management and staff visited the farmer members and held interactions with them. To have intercrops in arecanut gardens, CAMPCO has distributed 30,000 pepper saplings to the members at a subsidised rate.

In order to safeguard the interest of member growers who grow crops like arecanut, cocoa, rubber and pepper, it has distributed I.S.I. quality CAMPCO brand copper sulphate to the tune of 142 MTs to the farmers through its branches and agents societies at a very reasonable rate.

To meet the present international food safety standards and zoning of food processing area as per FSSAI standards, CAMPCO chocolate factory had its new amenity building and various certifications like, FSSC 22000 (Version 4.1), ISO 14000:2015, etc.

Exclusive CAMPCO chocolate kiosks are functioning at Puttur and Bangalore in Karnataka, for making available to the local consumers the entire range of chocolate products. Towards green

environment, windmills which were installed in 2008-09 (1 unit) and 2011-12 (2 units) continue to yield good results. They have generated 45 lakh units, and nearly 75% of total energy requirement at the chocolate factory is fulfilled by these three windmill units. Further, in addition to the above, moving ahead with green energy, CAMPCO has now planned to go in for installation of 400 KW solar project at CCF Puttur on Boot Model. The yearly requirement of energy from KPTCL is aprx. 60 lakhs units, but we generate around 45 lakh units from the above said windmill turbine generators, while remaining 15 lakh units are drawn from MESCOM. In order to move towards self-sufficiency, it is proposed to generate five lakhs units through solar generation.

The grower members have many times in the past expressed the dearth of skilled labourers in the areca gardens for harvesting and spraying. Hence to overcome this problem of the growers, and also to create an opportunity for the unemployed youth, CAMPCO in association with the ARDF has organised two skill development programmes at CPCRI Vittal, in the month of December, 2018 and February, 2019 wherein a total number of 53 youth have been benefitted.

In order to update the farmers with latest technology, CAMPCO along with Vivekananda College of Engineering and Technology organised an areca machinery fair at Puttur, from 23rd to 25th February, 2019 wherein more than two lakh farmers participated. In a major move, the grower members being a major part of CAMPCO family, it has now been decided to extend monetary compensation to the tune of Rs. 50,000/- to members and their dependents and another Rs. 50,000/- to workers in the event of accidental death. CAMPCO is now building a state of the art master godown at Kavu, Puttur with around one lakh sq.ft., with a separate cocoa processing unit to cater to the needs of foreign market. CAMPCO in collaboration with the NCUI organised an awareness programme for Board of Directors and personnel of cooperative organisations, on 7th March, 2018. Also a two days sensitisation programme for the employees of the organisation was conducted in the head office of CAMPCO on 9th and 10th of February, 2019.

CAMPCO amidst various difficulties is moving

forward successfully, meeting all challenges in its way, while giving due priority to the interest of the farmer community and areca growers.

State Cooperative Union, Kerala

State Cooperative Union, Kerala is playing a vital role in the cooperative education and training in the state through 12 cooperative training colleges, 10 cooperative training centres, 6 JDC extension training centres and through 21 member education units. It also runs a prestigious B-School namely. Kerala Institute of Cooperative Management (KICMA) and KICMA Arts and Science College at Neyyardam, Thiruvananthapuram

The Union organised 65th All India Cooperative Week celebration in a befitting manner from 14th November to 20th November 2018. The state level inauguration of Cooperative week was held at Kasaragod District on 14th November 2018. Hon'ble Chief Minister of Kerala Shri Pinarayi Vijayan inaugurated the celebrations. The National Centre for Cooperative Education, New Delhi and State Cooperative Union, Kerala jointly organized a Leadership Development Programme for the Directors of Hospital Cooperative Societies of Kerala on 2019 July 12 at Thiruvananthapuram. Shri Koliyakode. N. Krishnan Nair, Convenor of the State Cooperative Union inaugurated the conference.

A Leadership Development Programme for the Presidents and Directors of P ACS of Kannur and Kasaragod Districts was conducted at KICMA on 2019 February 22 and 23. 42 delegates from PACS actively participated in the Programme.

During the reporting period, 3 individual members and 38 group members have joined FAMCO with an additional share

capital of Rs. 2,200/- and Rs. 65,600/respectively Hence the total shares increased

on 31st March 2019, FAMCO has total deposits of
Rs.1.57 Crores. During the year, 52 member
SHGs were given a total loan of Rs.1,53,00,000/-

shGs were given a total loan of Rs.1,53,00,000/for small income generation activities. The loans are repaid 100%. Since inception, FAMCO had granted a total loan of Rs.9.46 crores to 400 SHGs covering 5000 families.

On 12.10.2018 a team comprising of Rev. Fr. A.S. Antonisamy, Founder, FAMCO, Mr. G. Joseph Adrien Anto, Chairman, FAMCO, and others went to Ben Secours College for Women, where a motivation meeting was held to create awareness among the students. The SHGs were formally inaugurated. The latest notifications and press notes released by the Reserve Bank of India on various subjects related to cooperative development are also released for the benefit of member UCBs.

उत्तर प्रदेश

उत्तर प्रदेश कोआपरेटिव यूनियन लि.

तर प्रदेश कोआपरेटिव यूनियन लि. (पी.सी.यू.) एक राज्य स्तरीय व्यावसायिक सहकारी संस्था है जिसका मुख्य उद्देश्य सहकारी शिक्षा एवं प्रशिक्षण की व्यवस्था करना तथा सहकारी कार्यक्रमों का व्यापक प्रचार—प्रसार करना है। इस संस्था का गठन वर्ष 1928 में हुआ था।

उपर्युक्त उद्देश्यों की पूर्ति हेतु प्रदेश के जनपदों में सहकारी शिक्षा हेतु सचल इकाइयों की स्थापना की गई है, तथा निम्न 06 सहकारी प्रबंध प्रशिक्षण केन्द्र स्थापित किये गये हैं:

मेरठ, 2. वाराणसी, 3 हैबरा (इटावा), 4. महोबा,
 अयोध्या (फैजाबाद), एवं 6. बिलारी (मुरादाबाद)।

सहकारी शिक्षा कार्यक्रम के अर्न्तगत सहकारी सदस्यों/भावी सदस्यों एवं सहकारी बंधुओं/पदाधिकारियों को गोष्ठियों एवं सभाओं के माध्यम से सहकारी सिद्धांत, दर्शन तथा व्यवहार आदि की शिक्षा दी जाती है। वर्ष 2018—19 में इस योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2018 से 31.03.2019 तक कुल 1780 सहकारी बन्धुओं/सदस्यों/भावी सदस्यों को शिक्षित किया गया।

संस्था द्वारा संचालित 6 प्रशिक्षण केन्दों पर पत्रोपाधि सत्र (डिप्लोमा कोर्स) एवं अल्पकालिक सत्र आयोजित किये जाते हैं। वर्ष 2018—19 में इस योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2018 से 31.03.2019 तक कुल 264 कार्मिकों को प्रशिक्षित किया गया।

सहकारी शिक्षा एवं प्रशिक्षण कार्यक्रमों के संचालन हेतु सहकारी संस्थाओं द्वारा सहकारी शिक्षा निधि में अंशदान किये जाने का प्रावधान उ.प्र. सहकारी नियमावली के नियम संख्या—138 में किया गया है, जिसके आधार पर वर्ष 2018—19 में इस योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2018 से 31.03.2019 तक कुल रु. 29.41 लाख शिक्षा निधि के मद में प्राप्त हुए।

वित्तीय संसाधनों में वृद्धि लाने के उद्देश्य से प्रदेश की सहकारी संस्थाओं की परिसम्पत्तियों / कैश की सुरक्षा तथा सहकारी सदस्यों की किसी दुर्घटना में मृत्यु / अपंगता की स्थिति में उन्हें बीमा की सुविधा एक समान एवं न्यूनतम दर पर उपलब्ध कराये जाने की व्यवस्था पी.सी.यू. द्वारा साधारण बीमा कम्पनी के सहयोग से सुलभ कराई जा रही है। वर्ष 2018—19 में इस योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2018 से 31.03.2019 तक कुल रु. 48.08 लाख का बीमा कमीशन मद में आय प्राप्त हुई।

सहकारी कार्यक्रमों के व्यापक प्रचार—प्रसार हेतु संस्था द्वारा "सहकारिता साप्ताहिक" समाचार पत्र एवं "सहकारिता मासिक" पत्रिका का नियमित प्रकाशन हेतु संस्था का एक अपना सहकारी प्रेस वर्ष 1969 से स्थापित है। इस प्रेस के द्वारा सहकारी क्षेत्र की संस्थाओं के उपयोगार्थ विभिन्न प्रकार की स्टेशनरी छपाई का कार्य भी किया जाता है। वर्ष 2018—19 में इस योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2018 से 31.03.2019 तक तक कुल रु. 81.03 लाख का छपाई का कार्य किया गया था।

संस्था द्वारा वर्ष 2018—19 में किसानों से 504338.17 मी.टन गेहूं एवं 611654.17 मी. टन धान क्रय किया गया जिससे संस्था को प्रशासनिक शुल्क के रूप में रु. 2523.47 लाख आय संभावित है।

संस्था द्वारा भू—तल पर आधुनिक सुविधाओं से युक्त वातानुकूलित ओडिटोरियम का संचालन किया जा रहा है जो सहकारी तथा गैर—सहकारी संस्थाओं/संगठनों को गोष्ठी, सेमिनार, सम्मेलन आदि हेतु उचित दरों पर उपलब्ध कराया जाता है। दिनांक 01.04.2018 से 31.03.2019 तक कुल रु. 3.68 लाख की आय प्राप्त हुई है।

वर्ष 1996—97 के पूर्व तक शिक्षा / प्रशिक्षण एवं प्रचार—प्रसार के लिए राज्य सरकार से पी.सी.यू. को वित्तीय सहायता उपलब्ध करायी जाती रही है, जो 1996—97 के पश्चात से पूर्णतया बन्द कर दी गयी है, जिसके फलस्वरूप संस्था को अपने कार्यक्रमों के संचालन हेतु वित्तीय कितनाईयों का सामना करना पड़ रहा है।

संस्था की आय का मुख्य स्रोत विभिन्न सहकारी संस्थाओं से प्राप्त होने वाली सहकारी शिक्षा निधि की धनराशि है। वर्तमान में बैंकिंग सहकारी संस्थाओं यथा— पैक्स, उ.प्र. सहकारी बैंक के लिए शिक्षा निधि ऐच्छिक होने के कारण उनसे शिक्षा निधि में धनराशि प्राप्त नहीं हो पा रही है।

वित्तीय वर्ष 2018—19 के आय—व्यय में उत्तर प्रदेश कोआपरेटिव यूनियन लि., लखनऊ के 6 सहकारी प्रबंध प्रशिक्षण केन्द्रों के संचालन हेतु रु. 100.00 लाख की अनुदान स्वरूप वित्तीय सहायता का बजट में प्रावधान कराने का अनुरोध भारतीय राष्ट्रीय सहकारी संघ से किया गया था, जिससे सहकारी क्षेत्र के मानव संसाधन के विकास एवं सहकारी प्रशिक्षण—व्यवस्था को सुदृढ़ बनाने के लिए प्रभावी प्रशिक्षण कार्यक्रम संचालित किये जायेंगे। इससे सहकारी आंडोलन को गति मिलेगी।
