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Report of the Governing Council of NCUI

Dear Fellow Cooperators,

On behalf of the Governing Council of National Cooperative Union of India, I have the pleasure in placing before you the Annual Report of NCUI for the year 2019-20.

During the year under review, the NCUI continued to function as nodal agency of the Indian Cooperative Movement. Its main objectives are to educate, guide and assist its member organizations in strengthening the cooperative sector. A brief report relating to various aspects of cooperative development during 2019-20 is as under :

Membership

At the close of the year, there were 268 cooperative organizations representing various sectors of the cooperative movement as members of NCUI. In the year 2019-20, 16 new members have been enrolled, out of which two are dormant for more than two decades.

Meetings of the Governing Council

During the year, four meetings of the Governing Council were held. Besides this, three meetings of the Executive Committee were held. Matters relating to administrative and financial management of NCUI, and various issues confronting the cooperative sector to make it strong and vibrant were discussed in the meetings.

Cooperative Education

The National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE), New Delhi organised 204 training programmes against the target of 80 programmes during the year, including a 12 week Diploma Programme in Cooperative Education and Development. All the important and emerging sectors/ areas like skill development, women, dairy, consumers, service coops, tourism coops, digital technologies, etc. were covered in the training programmes. 6894 persons from various sectors of the cooperative movement, in different states, were trained. The syllabus of Diploma Programme on Cooperative Education and Development was upgraded and more paid programmes were organised during the year. Emphasis was placed on organising training programmes for strengthening relatively weaker sectors like labour, fishery, tribal cooperatives, handloom and handicrafts etc. 47 such programmes were organised for weaker sector cooperatives. Due to the important role played by women in the development of cooperatives, 36 programmes were organised exclusively for women participants. Under the Coop Connect Programme, training programmes for Kendriya Vidyalaya School Teachers were held at Delhi, Thiruvananthapuram, Shimla and Jaipur.

Cooperative Education Field Projects

During the Year 2018-19, the NCUI Cooperative Education Field Projects including North-

East and Women Projects conducted wide ranging programmes on various issues of cooperative development. Under UDS projects, new societies registered during the year were 15, and the number of persons benefitting from income generating programmes were 11525, while 1377 SHGs were formed with 18,734 members. Under the Cooperative Education Field Projects (North-Eastern State), new societies registered during the year were 30, and number of SHGs formed were 66, while number of persons benefited under income generating scheme were 654. The women projects also progressed on all fronts including increase in number of SHGs, total membership, etc.

General Cooperative Policies

A Zonal Conference was organised for Central Zone States on Challenges and Opportunities for Cooperatives on 27th July, 2019 at Indira Gandhi Krishi Vishwavidyalaya, Raipur in which cooperative representatives from the states like Chattisgarh, U.P., M.P., Uttarakhand, etc. were present. The conference was inaugurated by Chattisgarh, Chief Minister Shri Bhupesh Vaghel. The conference came up with wide-ranging recommendations for strengthening the cooperative movement in the region like implementation of schemes and programmes by cooperative societies, active involvement of women and youth in the activities of cooperatives, etc. Several cooperative institutions approached NCUI regarding the issues faced by them. NCUI examined the issues received and extended all possible support to them in solving their problems.

Public Relations and Publications

The 66th All India Cooperative Week was organised from 14th to 20th November, 2019 which was inaugurated by Shri Santosh Kumar Gangwar, Union Minister of State (Independent Charge) Labour and Employment, Government of India. An attractive poster designed on the theme was printed and distributed to all the cooperative organisations. A Special Issue of 'The Cooperator' was brought out on the occasion. NCUI continued to publish 'The Cooperator' a monthly magazine carrying articles, features, success stories and news and views related to various issues of cooperative development. 'Indian Cooperative Review' a research journal containing case studies on various sectoral issues of the cooperative movement was regularly published. A National Workshop on "Cooperatives : A Key Partner in Skill Development and Employment Generation" was organised in which Manish Kumar, Managing Director, National Skill Development Corporation was the Chief Guest. In a major initiative NCUI was involved in preparation of NCUI Vision Document 2030, a comprehensive document highlighting future growth strategy of NCUI.

International Relations

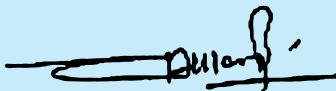
NCUI in collaboration with ICA-AP organised an International Workshop on "Enhancing Gender Equality in Cooperative Business" on 20-22 August 2019 at NCUI, Delhi. The International Day of Cooperatives was organised by NCUI in collaboration with ICA-AP on 6th July, 2019 by organising two events viz. Symposium on the theme "COOPS 4 Decent Work" and Children Picture Contest competition in which Jagdishwar, Goburdhun, GOSK, High Commissioner of Republic of

Mauritius was the Chief Guest. An International TOT Programme on Training Techniques for Trainers of Cooperatives and Rural Financing Institutions was organised by NCUI and CICTAB, Pune from 2-6 December, 2019 at NCUI. Besides visit of delegations of various countries to NCUI, the visits of representatives of Indian cooperatives to other countries through participation in many international fora provided a good opportunity for them to share, as well as exchange views on various issues of cooperative development.

MEMBERSHIP

The membership of National cooperative Union of India (NCUI) is open to national cooperative societies, state cooperative unions, state level cooperative federations and multi-state cooperative societies. At the beginning of the year, the membership of NCUI comprised of 262 cooperative institutions. These institutions represent different sectors of the Indian Cooperative Movement.

During the year 2019-2020, the following cooperative institutions were admitted as members of NCUI :

MANAGEMENT

Management Organs of National Cooperative Union of India

The Management of National Cooperative Union of India is carried out by the following three

organs :

1. General Body, which is comprised of delegates of the Member Institutions of NCUI.
2. Governing Council comprised of office bearers, elected and co-opted members.
3. Executive Committee, which is a sub-committee of the Governing Council of NCUI.

GENERAL BODY

As per the provisions of the Multi State Cooperative Societies Act 2002 and the Bye-laws of NCUI, the General Body of NCUI is comprised of one delegate from each member institution. The Annual General Body Meeting of NCUI for the year 2018-2019 was held on 04th September, 2019 in the Auditorium of the National Cooperative Union of India. The General Body deliberated on various issues concerning the Cooperative Movement in the country.

GOVERNING COUNCIL

During the year under review, four Meetings of the Governing Council were convened on 30.04.2019, 26.07.2019, 04.09.2019 and 26.12.2019. The meeting of the Governing Council for the last quarter i.e. January to March 2020 had been scheduled to be held on 25th March, 2020, but had to be postponed as a result of the complete lockdown in the Country due to the Covid 19 pandemic. The Governing Council in its earlier meetings dealt with various subjects related to the development of the cooperative movement and for carrying out the activities aimed at fulfilling the objectives of NCUI as per its bye-laws.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

During the year under review, three meetings of the NCUI Executive Committee took place on 15.07.2019, 04.09.2019 and 19.01.2020. The Executive Committee dealt with matters related to the administrative and financial management of NCUI.



CHAPTER – 2

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION

**NATIONAL CENTRE FOR COOPERATIVE
EDUCATION (NCCE)**

The National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE), New Delhi organised 204 training programmes including 12 week Diploma Programme in Cooperative Education and Development with 250% achievement against its target of 80 programmes during the year 2019-20,. The syllabus of the Diploma programme on Cooperative Education and Development was upgraded and more paid programmes were organised in this year. In all 6894 persons, from various sectors of the cooperative movement in different states, were trained. Of 204 training programmes, 47 programmes were organised for weaker sectors like labour, fisheries, tribal cooperatives etc. and exclusively for SC/ST cooperatives. 36 programmes were also organised exclusively for women cooperatives. The feedback of the participants is also taken into account while analysing of the impact of the training programmes conducted. NCCE had planned 25 - 30 more programmes all over India, but due to COVID-19, these programmes could not be conducted in the year 2019-2020.

1. Introduction

As a special measure for strengthening the

cooperative movement in cooperatively under – developed states / areas and reducing regional imbalances in the level of development, the Government of India had in 1976 approved an NCUI scheme of Cooperative Education. This is a Central Sector Scheme funded by the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare.

2. Objective

The main objective of the Scheme is to develop and promote cooperative societies in project areas and through them to increase the productivity of farmer members and thereby improve their socio-economic condition.

3. Approach

Intensive efforts for cooperative development through cooperative education combined with farm / technical guidance are the main ingredients of the project approach. The office bearers and members of project adopted societies are educated and motivated to implement the business development plans through their active participation in planning of business activities, operational management and most importantly evaluation. Self Help Groups are formed by the project personnel to facilitate micro – credit and sustainable income– generating activities. Formation and working of these groups is based on cooperative culture. All educational, farm guidance and developmental activities are linked with the business development plans of PACS / LAMPS adopted by projects for their overall development.

4. NCUI is implementing the Central Sector Scheme for the intensification of Cooperative Education through 41 Cooperative Education Field Projects including Women Projects and North Eastern Projects located in cooperatively under developed states / under developed areas of developed states and Union Territories as detailed below :

5. Project Activities:

The Project activities are divided mainly into 4 parts:

- **Educational / developmental activities:** Aiming at strengthening and developing cooperative societies with sound democratic character and strong financial base.
- **Farm / technical guidance activities:** Aiming at increasing farm production by adopting improved farm technology.
- **Socio-developmental activities:** Aiming at increasing functional literacy / adult education, better living conditions, health care, family welfare, drinking water facilities.
- **Women development activities:** Aiming at involvement of women in cooperatives as well as promoting women cooperatives exclusively and through them raising their socio – economic conditions.

NCUI WOMEN COOPERATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAMME UNDER COOPERATIVE EDUCATION FIELD PROJECTS FOR THE YEAR 2019-20

NCUI's Cooperative Education and Development Programme for Women is run through its 43 Cooperative Education Field Projects of which 4 are exclusive women projects located at Shimoga (Karnataka), Aska Behrampur (Orissa), Bhopal (Madhya Pradesh) and East Imphal (Manipur).

1. Progress

The progress of various activities, the formation of Self Help Groups and other educational / developmental achievements for the year. April 2019 to March, 2020 is given at Annexure IX & X respectively.

2. Formation of Self-Help Groups

During the year under report 323 Self-Help









Groups having membership of 4187 women were formed by the lady mobilisers of the cooperative education field projects. A total of 4097 Self Help Groups with 45051 members have been formed since inception till date. The details of activities under the Women's Education Project is at Annexure-XI.

3. Number of Beneficiaries

Through various income generating activities, 14759 women were benefited under this programme.

4. Average income

On an average, each woman beneficiary was able to earn about Rs. 5000/- per month.

5. Women Educated

During the year, a total of 68711 women were imparted education under various educational activities.

6. Resource Mobilisation

The self-help groups were able to mobilize Rs 21262714 from their own savings during the year under report.

7. Loan distributed

During the year, Rs. 807619719/- was disbursed as loan to members of self-help groups for taking up income generating activities.

8. Self Help Groups converted into cooperatives.

70 Cooperative societies have been registered under various State Cooperative Societies Acts of the members of self-help groups organized by NCUI cooperative education field projects.

**COOPERATIVE EDUCATION FIELD
PROJECTS IN UNDER DEVELOPED STATES/
AREAS OF THE DEVELOPED STATES OF
NORTH EAST (N.E.)**

Introduction

As a special measure for strengthening the cooperative movement in the North East and

reducing regional imbalances, the Government of India has been giving grants to NCUI under the Central Sector Scheme to operate six cooperative education field projects in the North East Region, which cover the under-developed areas of the region.

50% of the expenditure incurred on these projects is met through the grants received from the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare and the balance 50% is met through the funds collected from the cooperative movement in the form of the Cooperative Education Fund.

Objective

The main objective of the scheme is to develop and promote cooperative societies in the project areas, to increase the productivity of farmer members, to inculcate the habit of thrift amongst the women members, to impart and develop skills to the women and youth members thus improving their overall socio-economic condition in the area. Each project is given activity-wise targets to be achieved over the course of the entire year. The project activities include educational and training activities; farm/technical guidance activities; socio-developmental activities; and women development activities.

During 2019– 2020 all the six projects being implemented achieved their set targets and objectives as per the overall guidelines. A total of 36095 participants were trained.

Activity wise and project wise achievements/ progress and highlights of special activities is placed at annexure-XII, XIII, XIV, XV and XVI.

GENERAL COOPERATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAMMES/ SCHEMES CONDUCTED BY STATE COOPERATIVE UNIONS

In furtherance of its objectives to promote and develop the cooperative movement in India in accordance with cooperative principles, NCUI monitors cooperative education programmes to popularise the principles and practices of Cooperation. The overall objective of the Cooperative Education Programme is to create enlightened, participatory and responsive membership and cooperative leadership; to improve the management efficiency of board

members and office bearers of cooperative societies; to provide and develop dynamic and forward looking leadership and to create cooperative awareness among the masses, particularly the youth of the country and the women.

Presently, three types of Cooperative Education Programmes are being conducted in the country – (1) General cooperative education programme for agriculture cooperatives implemented by state cooperative unions; (2) Sector specific cooperative education programme covering dairy, fishery, women, urban credit, consumer, housing, industrial, handicrafts, forest, and labour contract construction, marketing cooperatives etc. (3) Special cooperative education projects based on area development approach.

The target group of this programme consists of members and managing committee members of primary agriculture cooperative societies and Self Help Groups wherever they are developed by the concerned State Cooperative Union at village level. The programme is implemented by State Cooperative Unions through the adoption of two types of approaches namely; peripatetic approach and intensive approach (cooperative education and development scheme). Under the peripatetic approach, education activities are organised at society level through mobile cooperative education instructors and under intensive approach the cooperative societies in selected blocks and districts are adopted for overall development of cooperatives and the cooperative education of members. The education programme is dovetailed with the developmental activities in the area. A team of educational personnel is deployed to conduct the education programme on an intensive basis in an identified area. During the year under report, the NCUI continued to monitor the effectiveness of state cooperative unions. All States were implementing cooperative education programmes with peripatetic approach.

Under the Cooperative Education Programme, the following main educational and developmental activities are included :

- Orientation Course / Classes for Secretaries/ Managers of PACS - 2 weeks

- Managing Committee Members Class – 5 days
- Ordinary Members and Potential Members Class – 3 days
- Leadership Development Programmes – 3 days

The activities of the CEDS aim at assisting local societies in :

- Increasing membership.
- Convening meetings of Managing Committee and General Body regularly with high attendance and securing active participation of members.
- Assessing credit and other inputs required on the basis of real planning of crops and preparing societies to enable them to fulfill the members' needs.
- Promoting repayment of loans in time out of marketing of sale proceeds through cooperatives / cooperative efforts.
- Enabling societies to move towards self-reliance, assisting them in preparing long term plans for mobilizing deposits and ensuring regular collection of deposits out of sale proceeds of crops.
- Developing farm /dairy/ poultry/ horticulture etc. guidance services on their own in due course.

During the year 2019-20, 7883 training programmes were conducted. In all, 140113 persons were educated / trained including 49864 SC/ST participants and 42205 women participants.

Many of the state cooperative unions have diversified their education programmes and organised cooperative education programmes for other sectoral cooperatives as well. These programmes were conducted for many sectors such as. dairy, urban credit, fishery, industrial / weavers, marketing, labour contract and forest labour cooperatives, cooperative law etc. in the country's rural as well as the urban areas.

Some of the state cooperative unions like those in Himachal Pradesh and Kerala implemented special education programmes for SC/ST in selected area of the states. Additionally, some states organized classes/courses for SC/ST and backward community members / potential members as a part of the on-going Cooperative Education Programme. During the reporting year 2019-20, a total number of 102710 SC/ST persons and 100935 women were trained.

In response to the Government of India's 15 Point Welfare Programme for minority communities in the 40 identified districts, consistent efforts were made to cover minority communities under the

on-going cooperative education programme. The programme is being implemented through state cooperative unions and cooperative education field projects / units and the benefits of cooperative education programme are being provided to the minority communities.

During the year 2019- 20, total 7883 courses have been conducted and 140113 persons were trained by the State Cooperative Unions of the states of Gujarat, Delhi, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Kerala, Tripura, West Bengal, Chhattisgarh and Assam, which conducted these programmes regularly.

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAMME FOR WOMEN AND YOUTH THROUGH STATE COOPERATIVE UNIONS

Cooperative Education Programmes for Women are being implemented through the state cooperative unions in the states of Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Delhi, Gujarat, Himachal Pradesh, Kerala, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Mizoram, Orissa, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal. Cooperative education programmes/classes under this programme are being conducted by the lady cooperative education instructors in rural as well as in urban areas. The duration of these programmes varies from 1 to 7 days, which covers classes/ meetings for ordinary and potential women members of cooperative societies, managing committee members, office bearers and employees of women cooperatives etc.

During the year, April 2019 to March 2020, 1175 events were organised and as many as 46931 women were imparted knowledge in different areas in the various classes. The details of activities are mentioned below:

CHAPTER – 3

GENERAL COOPERATIVE POLICIES

Zonal Conference

A Zonal Conference was organized for Central Zone States on “Challenges and Opportunities for Cooperatives” on 27th July, 2019 at the premises of Indira Gandhi Krishi Vishwavidyalaya, Raipur in which cooperative representatives from the states like Chattisgarh, U.P., Uttarakhand, etc. were present. The Conference was inaugurated by the Chattisgarh Chief Minister Shri Bhupesh Vaghel. Shri Prem Sai Singh Tekam, Cooperative Minister Chattisgarh, Shri Sanjay Kumar Patil, Vice-Chancellor, Indira Gandhi Krishi Vishwavidyalaya, Shri S.K. Bansal, Chief General Manager, NABARD were present on the occasion. Shri Prem Sai Singh Tekam, Cooperative Minister, Chattisgarh said that cooperatives and agriculture are complementary to each other. He highlighted that Chattisgarh is the only state where the farmers have been given loans of around Rs.11,500 crore. Dr. Chandra Pal Singh Yadav, President NCUI emphasised that all the schemes and programmes of the state should be implemented by cooperative societies, and the cooperative law in the state should be amended in line with the 97th Constitutional Amendment Act.

One Day Zonal Conferences on Cooperative Development for the Western Zone States of Maharashtra, Goa, Gujarat, Dadra & Nagar Haveli and Daman & Diu and the North Eastern States of Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland and Tripura- are

being organized by the NCUI shortly for which the preparatory work has been completed.

17th Indian Cooperative Congress

Preparatory work for organizing 17th Indian Cooperative Congress has been initiated. The Hon'ble President of India and Hon'ble Prime Minister of India were addressed with the request to inaugurate the 17th Indian Cooperative Congress. The Managing Directors of National Level Federations have been requested to contribute a comprehensive status paper on the theme “**Cooperatives for Sustainable Development**”.

Services provided to Cooperative Societies

Several cooperative institutions approached NCUI regarding the issues faced by them. NCUI examined the issues received and extended all possible support to them in solving their problem.

NCUI has taken requisite action on the issues/suggestions received from its member institutions. It has been providing financial assistance to member organisations for conducting training programmes like LDPs/ Capacity Building programmes. NCUI has been contributing @50% of the programme cost for selective programmes under the Central Sector Scheme. Through NCCE, it is organizing training programmes for weaker sections, particularly SC/ ST societies at the primary level.

CHAPTER – 4

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Restructuring and Development of NCUI website www.ncui.coop

Restructuring and development of NCUI website www.ncui.coop was undertaken as per the guidelines and standards of Indian Government websites. The content of NCUI website was updated based on the inputs received from its various divisions.

The website was regularly updated with reports, photos, press releases, information of upcoming national/international training programmes, seminars, conferences and other events conducted by various divisions of NCUI during the year.

Strengthening of IT Infrastructure in NCUI

During the year, the process for strengthening of IT infrastructure in NCUI was initiated as per requisitions received from various divisions.

Support Services Provided

The IT division provided various support services i.e. LCD Projector with screen and laptop for the various programmes organised by NCCE, CICTAB and Children Painting Competition programmes, Vaikunth Bhai Mehta Memorial Lecture and All India Cooperative Week Programmes, Quiz Competition etc. The division also helped in preparing power point presentations on various issues from time to time, including the presentation submitted to the Ministry.

Monitoring and Maintenance of K7 Enterprise End Point Security Antivirus

The division monitored the K7 Enterprise End Point Security Antivirus regularly to keep a check on any viruses infecting the systems.

Social Media Interface of NCUI

During the year, the division regularly updated the information about programmes organised by the various divisions of NCUI on social media sites such as - Facebook, Instagram, Twitter & its Youtube Channel viz. NCUI Diaries. This includes:

- Bytes taken from participants & speakers
- Photos
- Programme Reports

These accounts are regularly accessed by many cooperators around the World.

Wi-Fi Accessibility and Other Activities

The IT division has regularly provided Wi-Fi access to all guests in the NCUI campus. The division regularly monitored the consumption of the internet and handled connectivity issues and other grievances of the Wi-Fi users.

The division, with the support of the Resident Engineer and AMC vendor of IT hardware also regularly resolves the various hardware & software related problems received from various divisions.

CHAPTER – 5

PUBLICATIONS, PUBLICITY AND PUBLIC RELATIONS

PUBLIC RELATIONS

During the year 2019-20, various activities were organised to strengthen the image-building of the organisation and also establish strong liaison with the print and electronic media.

1. Nomenclature Meeting of MDs/Senior Officers of National level Federations for Cooperative Week Celebrations

A Nomenclature Meeting of MDs/senior officers of Delhi based national / level cooperative federations was organised on 13th August, 2019. In consultation with the MDs/key representatives of national level federations, the theme of the Cooperative Week Celebrations, 66th in the series, was fixed as “**Role of Cooperatives in New India**”. It was decided to publish a poster on this occasion, for distribution to a large number of cooperative organizations/state cooperative unions all over the country.

2. 66th All India Cooperative Week

- The 66th All India Cooperative Week was organised all over the country from 14th to 20th November, 2019 with “**Role of Cooperatives in New India**” as the theme. The Inaugural function of the Cooperative week celebrations was held on 14th November, 2019. The Chief Guest on this occasion was Shri Santosh Kumar Gangwar, Union Minister of State (Independent Charge) Labour and Employment, Government of India. Chairmen/M.Ds of some cooperatives./key members of NCUI Governing Council were present on the occasion. An audience of around 500 comprising of cooperative officials from various organisations and students/faculty members from some of the management institutes attended the Inaugural function
- A national level Quiz and Extempore Speech competition was organised by NCUI on the occasion of the 66th All India Cooperative

Week Celebrations on 19th November, 2019. Necessary coordination in this regard was undertaken with all national level federations. The NCDC team was the winner of the First Prize on the occasion.

- A special issue of the NCUI Journal “The Cooperator”, which carried articles from eminent dignitaries including Chairmen/MDs, besides the messages received from President, PM, Cabinet/State Ministers, Governors/Chief Ministers, Cooperative Ministers of States, etc. was released on the occasion.
 - An attractive poster on the selected theme ‘**Role of Cooperatives in New India**’ was printed and posters were distributed to State Cooperative Unions, Registrars of Cooperative Societies. Institutes of Cooperative Management etc. The posters were widely appreciated by all quarters.
 - The work related to the Preparation of Guidelines of 66th All India Cooperative Week Celebration, which was uploaded on the NCUI Website in time, was handled by the division.
3. A National Workshop on the topic ‘**Cooperatives as a Key Partner in Skill Development and Employment Generation**’ was organised on 12th July, 2019 in which Manish Kumar. MD, National Skill Development Corporation was the Chief Guest. Other key dignitaries who were Guests of Honour on the occasion were– Dr. Vandana Agarwal, Director General, National Skill Development Agency, Mr. Raveendran Kasturl, Group CEO, Uralungul Labour Contract Cooperative Society Ms. Poonam Sharma, Director, NIESBUD, Mr. Raj Kumar, Manager, Agriculture Skill Council of India, etc. along with key representatives of the national level cooperative organisations. The recommendations of the workshop were widely circulated to all concerned.

4. Preparation of NCUI Vision Document 2030

In a major initiative, the Division was involved in the preparation of NCUI Vision Document 2030, a comprehensive document highlighting the future growth strategy of NCUI. The Document approved by the NCUI Governing Council was circulated to all concerned..

5. Press Releases of Important Events and Preparation of Draft Speeches/ Messages of NCUI President/C.E.

- ◆ National Workshop on 'Cooperatives as Partners in Skill Development for Employment Generation' ICA-NCUI International Workshop on Enhancing Gender Equality in Cooperative Business' held on 20-21st August, 2019
- ◆ Inaugural function of 66th All India Cooperative Week
- ◆ NCARDB-NCUI Workshop on Strengthening ARDBs held on 21st November, 2019 and distributed to the national dailies/ indiancooperative.com
- ◆ NCUI reaction of this year's budget and conversion of urban cooperative banks into small finance companies, Draft Speeches in English/Hindi was prepared for NCUI President on the occasion of NCUI AGM, All India Cooperative Week and State Cooperative Conference organised by BISCOMAUN.
- ◆ A message of NCUI President was prepared on the occasion of New Year.

6. Preparation Work for NCUI Diary-2020 and Annual Report 2018-19

Based on the decision to publish the NCUI Dairy-2020 on the eve of New Year, the Division compiled all the latest information related to the cooperatives from Cooperative Departments at

Centre/States, Institutes of Cooperative Management, Chairmen/MDs of national federations, Governing Council Members etc. The Diary work was completed within the deadline, and diaries were distributed in time to all concerned. The editing work of Annual Report in English/Hindi was also undertaken by the Division in time.

PUBLICATIONS

'The Cooperator'—Monthly Journal

'The Cooperator' is a monthly Journal of NCUI. It has both English and Hindi sections and provides a regular communication channel to the cooperative fraternity including cooperative institutions. A number of steps such as change in layout, design, new features, getting articles from reputed authors/experts, incorporation of interviews of Ministers/key dignitaries etc., were initiated, which brought about a definite improvement. During the year under review, all the 12 issues of 'The Cooperator' from April, 2019 to March, 2020 were printed and posted to the subscribers on time.

Special Issue

The division published a Special Issue of 'The Cooperator' in the month of November 2019, on the occasion of the 66th All India Cooperative Week. The main theme of the journal was based on Cooperative Week Theme, "**Role of Cooperatives in New India**". A good number of articles were obtained from the Chairmen/MDs of national level cooperative organisations, besides other experts. The advertisement campaign for the journal fetched good results and a good advertisement revenue was obtained from the Special Issue.

Indian Cooperative Review

This is a quarterly research journal of NCUI. The issues for the months of April, July,

October, 2019 were printed and posted in time. Letters were issued to MDs/ CEOs of cooperative organisations/teaching faculty/academicians/experts, to ensure that a large number of quality articles are received for publication in this journal.

राजभाषा का विकास

वर्ष 2019–2020 के दौरान राजभाषा नीति के कार्यान्वयन से संबंधित विशिष्ट उपलब्धियों/कार्यों का संक्षिप्त विवरण

भारत सरकार की राजभाषा नीति का अनुपालन

राजभाषा विभाग, गृह मंत्रालय द्वारा जारी वर्ष 2019–20 का वार्षिक कार्यक्रम, संघ कार्यालय के समस्त अधिकारियों एवं कर्मचारियों में अनुपालन हेतु वितरित किया गया। उक्त वार्षिक कार्यक्रम में निर्धारित लक्ष्यों को प्राप्त करने हेतु, संघ कार्यालय के अधिकारियों एवं कर्मचारियों द्वारा यथा-संभव प्रयास किए गए। राजभाषा अधिनियम 1963 की धारा 3(3) का, संघ कार्यालय में अनुपालन करवाने से संबंधी आवश्यक कार्यवाही की गयी तथा राजभाषा हिन्दी के प्रगामी प्रयोग से संबंधित आंकड़े एकत्रित कर, उन्हें तिमाही रिपोर्ट के रूप में समेकित कर राजभाषा विभाग, गृह मंत्रालय तथा कृषि, सहकारिता एवं किसान कल्याण विभाग, कृषि एवं किसान कल्याण मंत्रालय को प्रेषित किया गया तथा मंत्रालयों द्वारा रिपोर्ट से संबंधित दिए गए सुझावों एवं मार्ग दर्शन हेतु आवश्यक कदम उठाए गए।

हिन्दी पखवाड़े (16 से 30 सितम्बर, 2019)

संघ कार्यालय में दिनांक 16 से 30 सितम्बर, 2019 तक हिन्दी पखवाड़े का आयोजन भारतीय राष्ट्रीय सहकारी संघ द्वारा अन्य कार्यालयों के साथ संयुक्त रूप से आयोजित किया गया। इस दौरान निम्नांकित गतिविधियाँ आयोजित की गयीं:

1. हिन्दी दिवस

CHAPTER – 7

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

The division conducted many important activities during 2019-2020, which included organizing an international workshop titled Enhancing Gender Equality in Cooperative Business, international Training of Trainers (ToT) programme of CICTAB for Cooperatives and Rural Financial Institutions (RFI) for SAARC member countries Celebration of International Cooperative Day, nominations to participate in the International training courses in different countries, etc.

International Workshop on “Enhancing Gender Equality in Cooperative Business”

NCUI in collaboration with ICA-AP organized an International Workshop on ‘Enhancing Gender Equality in Cooperative Business’ on 20 – 22 August 2019 at NCUI, New Delhi. The workshop focused on two broad issues - promoting gender equality in the workplace by looking into the issues around parity, opportunity, safety, mobility etc. and improving data, especially related to sex-disaggregated data. As many as 18 participants of members of ICA – AP Women Committee and other representatives from Bhutan, Iran, Maldives, Malaysia, Nepal, Japan, Philippines, Sri Lanka and India participated in the workshop. In addition, 30 women leaders and functionaries from state cooperative unions and members of NCUI National Committee for Empowerment of Women participated in the workshop.

The workshop was inaugurated by Dr. Chandra Pal Singh Yadav, President, NCUI and the valedictory address was given by Mrs. Vasudha Mishra, Additional Secretary (Cooperation), Department of Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare, Government of India. A study visit was also organized to Southern Star T/C (U) Society.

Celebration of International Cooperative Day on 1st Saturday of July 2019

The International Day of Cooperatives (#CoopsDay) was celebrated by NCUI in collaboration with ICA-AP on Saturday, 6th July 2019 by organizing two events which included a Symposium on the theme “COOPS 4 Decent

Work” and a Children Picture Contest in which 100 children in the age group of 6 to 15 years participated to draw and paint on the theme of Self Expression.

The Chief Guest of the Symposium was His Excellency Mr. Jagdishwar Goburdhun, GOSK, High Commissioner of the Republic of Mauritius in India. The other eminent speakers were Deputy Director of ILO Decent Work Team for South Asia and Country Office for India, Managing Director of NH Bank Korea New Delhi Office, Chairperson of Gujarat State Women’s SEWA Cooperative Federation Ahmedabad and Programme Director of Uralungal Labour Contract Cooperative Society Ltd. (ULCCS) Kerala. The Programme Manager of ICA-AP made a presentation on the study conducted by ICA on work and ownership. The Symposium was attended by more than 150 persons including representatives of national level cooperative federations and cooperative organizations in Delhi NCR region.

International Trainers’ Training Programme of CICTAB members of SAARC countries

- An International ToT Programme on Training Techniques for Trainers of Cooperative and Rural Financing Institutions was organised by National Cooperative Union of India (NCUI) and the Centre for International Cooperation & Training in Agricultural Banking (CICTAB) Pune from 2 – 6 December 2019 on its premises. As many as 28 participants representing CICTAB members from Nepal, India and Bangladesh participated in the five day training programme. These participants were from Central Bank and Cooperative Bank of Bangladesh, National level Cooperative Training Institutions from India viz., NCDC, NCCT and NCUI and Apex & Central Cooperative Federation of Nepal viz., NCF/N, NCBL, NEFSCUN and RMDC. The Programme was inaugurated by H. E. Dr. Manoj Nardeosingh Secretary General, AARDO and concluded in presence of Mr.

Balu G. Iyer, Regional Director, ICA- AP, Director CICTAB, Chief Executive & Sr. Officers of NCUI.

- An International Programme on Training Techniques for Trainers of Cooperative and Rural Financing Institutions (Focused on Case Writing) was organized at VAMNICOM, Pune from 6- 8 January, 2020 with the partial sponsorship of NCUI. Eminent faculty members from IRMA were invited to impart training on case writing to the 25 participants from India, Bangladesh and Nepal.

Participation in International Seminars, Conferences, Workshops & Meetings

- ◆ The ICA-AP Regional Board Meeting was held in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam on April 16 in conjunction with the Second ICA-AP Cooperative Registrars' Forum. ICA Asia and Pacific in partnership with the Vietnam Cooperative Alliance (VCA) organised the Second Asia Pacific Cooperative Registrars' Forum on Creating Enabling Legal Framework and Policies to Promote Sustainable Development of Cooperatives in the 21st Century. The Board meeting was attended by 32 participants, including Mr. Bruno Roelants, ICA Director General, 12 Board members, observers and interpreters. The Chief Executive of NCUI attended the ICA-AP Regional Board Meeting and also participated in the Cooperative Registrars' Forum on behalf of the President NCUI.
- ◆ The International Cooperative Alliance Global Conference and General Assembly 2019 were held on 15 – 17 October 2019 in Kigali, Rwanda. One of the Vice-Presidents, Shri G.H. Amin and Chief Executive NCUI were nominated to represent NCUI in the said ICA events. In addition, the International Cooperative Alliance – Asia Pacific Regional Board meeting as well as ICA Domus Trust was also held on 13th October 2019. The President, NCUI who is the Vice President of ICA – AP Regional Board & member of ICA Domus Trust attended the said meeting along with the Chief Executive NCUI.
- ◆ The Network for the Development of Agricultural Cooperatives in Asia & Pacific

(NEDAC) EXCOM meeting and meeting of the International Cooperative Banking Association (ICBA) in collaboration with the NEDAC were organised on 12-13 December 2019 in Colombo, Sri Lanka. The Chief Executive of NCUI participated in the said meeting.

- ◆ 14th Asia-Pacific Research Conference was held on 12 – 14 December 2019 at the University of Newcastle Australia. More than 100 researchers from various countries of Asia-Pacific Region were present in the conference. Dr. T. Paranjothi, Ex-Professor, VAMNICOM & Vice-Chairman of the committee and Sanjay Kumar Verma, Deputy Director NCUI & Member of the committee participated in the event. The Deputy Director NCUI presented a paper on "Innovative Ways to Strengthen Cooperatives in India through Cooperation among Cooperatives" at the Research Conference. Besides, NCUI also supported the participation of two young researchers from Sree Narayana College, University of Kerala and Ph.D. research scholar from Tata Institute of Social Science, Mumbai to present their papers on cooperatives at the Research Conference

Fraternal Delegation's Visit to India

- A group of 20 cooperative leaders and functionaries of Savings & Credit Cooperatives (SACCO) from Kenya visited India between 22 – 28 April 2019 for an exposure visit to see the functioning of cooperative institutions in India. NCUI organized the visit of the delegates to relevant cooperative institutions viz. National Federation of Urban Cooperative Banks & Credit Societies (NAFCUB), Southern Star T/C Society and Bhajanpura T/C Society in Delhi, besides arranging their visit to selected places of historical & cultural interest in Delhi & Agra for the above-said period. The delegates were welcomed at NCUI by Dr. Chandra Pal Singh Yadav, President NCUI, while the introductory remarks were made by Shri N. Satyanarayana, Chief Executive, NCUI. NCUI also arranged the visit of the delegation to the High Commission of Kenya





in New Delhi, where the High Commissioner had detailed discussions with the delegates about their learning experience in India.

- A four member delegation under the aegis of National Cooperative Federation of Nepal (NCF/N) headed by Ms. Om Devi Malla, Vice-Chair of NCF/N and Board Member of International Cooperative Alliance (ICA) and accompanied by Professor and Dean of the Faculty of Management of Tribhuvan University, Under Secretary of Ministry of Land Management, Cooperatives and Poverty Alleviation and Officer of the Curriculum Development Centre in the Ministry of Education, Science & Technology, Government of Nepal visited India from 20 – 24 May 2019 to study the development of cooperative curriculum in formal education system in India. The delegation met with the Regional Director, ICA – AP and were briefed about the formal cooperative education system run by different countries in Asia Pacific Region. An interactive meeting with the delegation & NCUI officials was organized on 21st May 2019 in NCUI where Director (International Relations) of NCUI made a brief presentation on the Indian Cooperative Movement and the role of NCUI with specific reference to youth and women in the field of cooperative development. Deputy Director, COOP Connect of NCUI also made a detailed presentation on the present status of curriculum development of cooperatives in the formal education system in India with special emphasis on school education and the active role of NCUI in this endeavour. Deputy Director, NCCE shared the details of the diploma programme run by NCCE, and suggested that there should be active participation of faculty members of Tribhuvan University in the faculty development programme organized in NCCE every year. NCUI in collaboration with the Mysore University also arranged a study exposure visit to Mysore University and other educational institutions in Bangalore where cooperative management is a part of the curriculum of formal education. The Nepalese team also visited Karnataka State Rural Development and Panchayat Raj University in Gadag, where the delegation was briefed

about the courses of M.Com in Cooperative Management and one year diploma course in Cooperative Management. In another meeting held at Karnataka Souhardha Federal Cooperative, the members of the Nepalese delegation were briefed about the successful running of the Diploma Programme in Cooperative Management.

- A 10 member delegation from National Cooperative Organization of Malaysia (ANGKASA) headed by Mr. Kamarudin Ismail, Deputy President, ANGKASA and ICA Global Board Member visited NCUI on 29th August 2019. The delegates were received by Dr. Bijender Singh, Vice-President, NCUI. The Chief Executive, NCUI and Director, International Relations, NCUI threw light on the growth of Indian cooperative movement and the role of NCUI.
- 20 participants from Nepal and Sri Lanka along with Consultant, CICTAB and Training Manager IFFCO of CICTAB training programme on “Agriculture & Rural Development through Cooperative Business Model” organized by IFFCO FMDI visited NCUI on 16th October 2019. Executive Director (IR) welcomed the visiting participants and Director (IR) made a presentation on Indian Cooperative Movement and activities of NCUI.
- A five member delegation from Karmath Saving & Credit Cooperative Ltd. Thamel, Kathmandu of Nepal headed by the Chairman Mr. Tirtha Kaji Maharjan and comprising of other Board members visited India from 8-12 January 2020. The delegation visited National Cooperative Union of India (NCUI) on 10th January 2020 where they were briefed about the Indian cooperative movement, and the role of NCUI in development.

in the meeting, but proxy voting for NCUI was arranged through the Chairman of Bangladesh Samabaya Bank Ltd. (BSBL) support was provided to the candidature of Managing Director NAFSCOB who was elected as President of ICBA.

- For the 27th Annual World Children Picture Contest organized by IE-NO-HIKARI Association of Japan, about 300 paintings received from different member organizations of NCUI were forwarded to the organiser in Japan for the contest.
- Being one of the founder members of AFGC, NCUI recently hosted a Secretarial level Preparatory Meeting for the AFGC 20th Anniversary Annual Meeting on 18 February 2020 at its office in New Delhi. Mr. Y. Kobayashi, Manager and Mr. R. Yoshizawa, Assistant Manager International Relation Division for Trade policy and Cooperation of JA Zenchu (AFGC Secretariat), Mr. U.G. Dayananda, President Independent Farmers' Network Sri Lanka and Senior Officials of NCUI were present. The three main agenda discussed in the preparatory meetings were.
 - ❖ Amendment of agreement of establishment of 1999 and 2000
 - ❖ Future direction of AFGC activities
 - ❖ Draft of a booklet of AFGC past activities

During the interaction with the Chief Executive NCUI, the representative of AFGC Secretariat in Japan appraised him that AFGC will focus on youth involvement in agriculture and how to make agriculture a lucrative profession. NCUI also arranged a courtesy visit of the delegates of Japan and Sri Lanka to ICA – AP and AARDO, as JA Zenchu is a member of ICA-AP as well as earlier member of AARDO.

- ◆ Dr. Mallika Kumar, Associate Professor and Coordinator of the Office of the International Programme, Shri Ram College of Commerce (SRCC), University of Delhi has been nominated by NCUI in the ICA – AP Committee on Cooperatives in Educational Institutions (ICEI).

Member Services

The International Relations Division has been regularly looking after the requirement of all member organisations of NCUI and its affiliates by providing them up to date information. All the circulars regarding various programmes were updated in time on the NCUI web-site/ circulated to all members. Also, nominations for international courses received from the member organisations have been processed and in case of selection, all necessary support has been extended. All necessary assistance was also been provided to the representatives of the member organizations for participation in the international programmes/ events.

- NCUI arranged a meeting of officials of National Cooperative Federation of Nepal on 29th May 2019 with a 12 member delegation of Delhi Healthcare Cooperative Society during their visit to Nepal from 24 – 29 May 2019 to study the cooperative movement in Nepal.
- National Federation of Urban Cooperative Banks and Credit Societies Ltd, New Delhi had shown interest in obtaining the membership of International Cooperative Banking Association (ICBA). The conditions of membership of ICBA require an application for membership to be signed and recommended by a direct member of ICA. Accordingly, the application duly signed by the Chief Executive NCUI has been forwarded to NAFCUB for its applying to avail membership in ICBA.
- A three-day International Summit & Expo on “Start & Stand Up North East” was organised by MSME Export Promotion Council (Supported by Ministry of MSME, Govt. of India) on 17th - 19th January 2020 at Maniram Dewan Trade Centre, Guwahati. A letter along with the brochure was sent to all member organisations of NCUI in North-Eastern States for hiring stalls from MSME Export Promotion Council to exhibit their products and explore business opportunities.

CHAPTER – 8

BRIEF REPORTS OF NATIONAL LEVEL COOPERATIVE ORGANISATIONS

INDIAN FARMERS FERTILISER COOPERATIVE LTD. (IFFCO)

IFFCO is the largest fertiliser cooperative engaged in manufacturing and marketing of fertiliser products. In the year 2019-20, a year affected by the global pandemic caused by COVID-19, and the unprecedented economic challenges, the Society has continued its excellent performance. During the year 2019-20, IFFCO achieved its highest ever production level of 91.42 lakh MT fertiliser materials. In the field of marketing, the Society achieved its highest ever sale of 133.30 lakh MT fertilisers and recorded a turnover of Rs. 29412 crore in the year under review. IFFCO also recorded the highest ever profit before Tax at Rs. 1280.43 crore during this period. Its paid up share capital stood at Rs. 628.34 crore as on March 31, 2020 and total number of member shareholders (cooperative societies) was 35,300.

In order to promote sustainable as well as environment-friendly agriculture, IFFCO has launched Nano technology based products i.e. nano nitrogen, nano zinc and nano copper for field trials over 11000 locations across the country. These products provide high nutrient use efficiency (NUE) as well as crop protection solutions. The results from the field trials of these products on plant growth, yield and soil health are very encouraging.

IFFCO was ranked No. 1 by Fortune India 500 in the category of fertiliserfertiliser and agro-chemicals industries for the year 2019. IFFCO secured its position amongst top 3 agriculture cooperatives around the world based on turnover over GDP per capita for the year 2019. IFFCO was ranked— amongst the top 300 largest cooperatives in the World Cooperative Monitor ranking, designed by International Cooperative Alliance (ICA). During the year, IFFCO plants

bagged top awards from the Fertiliser Association of India (FAI) in various categories including excellence in production, safety, energy efficiency, best technical innovation and others.

Dr. U.S. Awasthi, Managing Director, IFFCO has featured in the list of top 50 influential leaders in the country, who made a difference in the life of individuals and societies as published by Fame India magazine. He is the only person from the cooperative sector to have so far attained this honour.

IFFCO has contributed 'Rs.25 Crores to PM CARES Fund to help the Government of India in its fight against the pandemic. The Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi Ji acknowledged the efforts and thanked IFFCO by mentioning the same in his tweet "Great Gesture. Thank you to IFFCO". Besides, IFFCO launched its 'Break the Corona Chain' campaign across India. The focus of this campaign has been to educate the farmers about the transmission of the virus, equip them with masks and sanitisers and spread the message of hygiene and social distancing. IFFCO's field staff in various states distributed masks, vitamin-C tablets and soaps to farmers, farm labourers and truck drivers.

Through its unique community mobilisation and education approach, IFFCO organised relief and awareness camps in over 1750 locations across India. In these programs IFFCO reached out to nearly 5.5 lakh people and distributed more than 4 lakh vitamin-C strips containing 10 tablets, over 35 lakh medicated soaps, over 3.5 lakh masks, over 100,000 sanitizers and a lot of medical kits. In addition, 40,000 ration kits (containing rice, pulses, spices and cooking oil) and 4 lakh food packets were also distributed to migrant laborers, workers and needy families at various locations including the national highways in Bihar, U.P. and Punjab.



Cooperative and Rural Development through various Initiatives

IFFCO in its efforts towards rural and cooperative development continues to fulfill corporate social responsibility through its promoted organisations / different programmes such as:

- **IFFCO Kisan Sewa Trust** : A charitable trust has been created out of joint contribution from IFFCO & its employees to provide relief and rehabilitation to the victims in the event of natural calamities. The Trust expanded its scope by providing financial assistance to the farmers living below poverty line for their critical medical treatment and education scholarship for higher studies to the children of poor & needy farmers.
- **Indian Farm Forestry Development Cooperative Limited (IFFDC)** : IFFCO promoted a separate multi-state cooperative society with the prime objective to conserve environment and mitigate climate changes through sustainable natural resource management. So far, 29,421 hectare wasteland has been developed as multi-purpose forests. These forests are catering to the needs of the community and sequestering about 1.41 lakh tonnes of atmospheric carbon annually, helping in mitigating the climate change. Presently, IFFDC is implementing projects on farm forestry, integrated watershed development, climate proofing, rural livelihood development, women empowerment, CSR etc.
- **Cooperative Rural Development Trust (CORDET)** has been promoted by IFFCO with an objective to promote rural development. It is engaged in providing training to farmers on various aspects of farming and animal husbandry by establishing model farms.
- **Promotional Programmes** : Various promotional and extension programmes have been organised with focus primarily on improving soil health, promoting balanced and integrated use of fertilisers to improve

N:P:K consumption ratio and educating farmers about the importance of secondary and micro nutrients. Programmes were also organised on latest agri-technology so as to enhance crop productivity through efficient use of fertilisers, water conservation etc which help in enhancing crop productivity and farmer's income.

- **Village Adoption programme** : The village adoption program was initiated by IFFCO with the objective to bring about overall socio-economic development in villages for sustainable agriculture development with particular emphasis on balanced use of fertilisers, quality seeds and better farm management. Various promotional, social and community development programs, medical and veterinary check-up campaigns, training programs for rural women etc., were organised in 261 adopted villages during the current year. Additionally, in order to promote and disseminate the appropriate technologies among the farmers in a large area, Farmer's Friend Clubs have been formed in the districts.
- **IFFCO Yuva**: IFFCO has launched a job portal for youth called IFFCO Yuva. This digital platform helps youth access and improve their skills and aspire for better career opportunities. The Society has been able to provide 3000 job opportunities so far through this portal.
- **Nano Fertilisers**: In line with the vision of our Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi Ji of doubling farmers' Income by 2022 and promoting sustainable as well as environment-friendly agriculture, IFFCO has introduced three Nanotechnology-based products which are -Nano Nitrogen, Nano Zinc and Nano Copper for 'On Field' trials at 11,000 locations across India. These products provide high nutrient use efficiency (NUE) as well as crop protection solutions.
- **Neem Plantation and Development of Improved Variants** : IFFCO has undertaken a project on Induction, Evaluation and Development of Polyploids in Neem (*Azadirachta indica*) in collaboration with

Forest Research Institute (FRI), Dehradun since June 2015. A 'Neem Plantation Campaign' has also been undertaken during 2019-20. Neem saplings were provided free of cost for plantation at fields, schools, cooperative premises, residential areas etc. in different states.

Apex Level Cooperative Marketing Federation in India having its reach all across the country including the remotest parts, through its three tier structure consisting of primary cooperatives at the base, state level cooperatives at the middle and NAFED at the top. NAFED's activities add to the

NATIONAL AGRICULTURAL COOPERATIVE MARKETING FEDERATION OF INDIA LTD. (NAFED)

NAFED - An Apex Cooperative Marketing Federation in India

In India, cooperatives play a crucial role in the marketing of farmers' produce as these cooperatives make significant contributions in making our agriculture strong, resilient and ready to meet the challenges of global economy.. Almost all secondary markets in the country have the presence of primary marketing cooperatives, which are members of the state marketing federations which in turn are the members of NAFED at the national level. NAFED is thus the

betterment of agriculture by protecting the interests of the farmers. Nafed is also a member of the International Cooperative Alliance (ICA).

Mission and Infrastructure of NAFED

Established on 2nd October 1958, with the mission to promote the trade of agricultural and forest resources across the country, NAFED has been rendering great service to the farmers and consumers of the country for the last six decades. NAFED infrastructure is spread all across the country with one or more of its branches in each state of India. It has a state of the art infrastructure comprising of warehouses, cold storages, pre-cooling units/vans, onion storages, tea blending and packing units, consumer marketing division etc.



Business Operations of NAFED

Domestic Operations

- is one of the central nodal agencies of the Government of India for the procurement of 16 notified agricultural commodities of oilseeds and pulses under Price Support Scheme (PSS). Under the Scheme, whenever there is a glut in market due to bumper production and when prices tend to crash, Nafed undertakes procurement at the Minimum Support Price under PSS of Government of India in case of 16 notified commodities (pulses, oilseeds, de-husked coconut, Milling/Ball Copra etc.) thereby providing remunerative prices to farmers and their produce.
- Undertakes procurement and marketing of oilseeds, pulses, food grains, spices, horticulture produce and vegetables like onion, potato, tomato etc. in outright account using its own funds against budgeted allocation
- Is one of the Central agencies for procurement of pulses and onion under Price Stabilization Fund (PSF) scheme of Government of India.
- Is a nodal state agency on behalf of Food Corporation of India and the state government under de-centralized procurement (DCP) scheme for wheat and paddy
- Supplies of milled pulses to Army, CPMFs and state governments under PDS, MDM, ICDS welfare schemes
- Undertakes production and marketing of bio-fertilisers to help the farmers to improve the productivity and quality of their crops
- Productes compressed bio gas (CBG) by treating various types of agri-wastes
- Undertakes procurement of apples - NAFED was designated as Central Nodal Agency by Govt. of India for procurement of apples in Jammu and Kashmir during 2019-2020 under Market Intervention Scheme (MIS)

- Organic Farming – NAFED is contributing towards promotion of sustainable agriculture and environment having 13 years of experience in the field of organic farming and its certification in states of Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Bihar and Uttarakhand covering a total area of around 45,000 ha.
- Certified Seed Production under the brand name of NAFED – NAFED is one of the central seed agencies of Department of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare (DAC&FW), Govt. of India and undertakes production, distribution and marketing of certified / foundation seed of pulses, oilseeds and cereals. Besides, it also supplies certified seeds to state governments under general supplies.
- National Animal Disease Control Programme (NADCP) – NAFED is working with the Ministry of Fishery, Animal Husbandry and Dairying, Government of India under the programme, to take forward their mission of eradicating FMD and Brucellosis diseases.
- Industrial Units – NAFED has properties in the form of lands, plots, residential complexes, office premises, godowns, cold storages and industrial units
- Retail Business - NAFED has been serving the consumers by selling good quality grocery items through a chain of “NAFED Bazaars” at affordable rates

International Trade

- ◆ NAFED has been undertaking import/export of various agricultural commodities over the years. The Federation has decades of experience, expertise and well established infrastructure for handling exports and imports of all kinds of agricultural commodities like food grains, pulses, spices, edible oils, de-oiled extractions and perishables like fresh fruit and vegetables including onion, garlic, potato, etc. NAFED offices are located at or in proximity to almost all important ports of India. Efforts are being made to further strengthen and augment the international trade business of the federation

for it to have a significant presence in the global market.

- NAFED is also undertaking supply / export of agricultural items / articles to various countries such as Iran, Bangladesh, Namibia, Myanmar etc as humanitarian assistance on behalf of the Ministry of External Affairs, Govt. of India.

The Brand NAFED

In the sixty years of its existence, NAFED has become a brand name amongst the farmers and consumers. NAFED brand of pulses, spices, tea and other products are quite popular amongst the consumers owing to their superior quality. NAFED deals in various flavours of tea and all kinds of pulses and spices produced in India. The blending and packaging of tea is done at its own unit located in the tea producing region in the North East of the country. The procurement is organised directly from the farmers without any middlemen under the close supervision of highly competent and experienced professionals, due to which NAFED products have a strong credibility in terms of price and quality.

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE DAIRY FEDERATION OF INDIA LTD. (NCDFI)

Report of the NCDFI Activities and Programmes during 2019-20

During the year 2019-20, the NCDFI continued to coordinate the sale of milk and milk products to institutions; facilitated online transactions of various commodities at NCDFI eMarket; and worked for genetic improvement of the cattle. NCDFI also continued to utilize part of its surplus in developmental activities.

Institutional Sale

NCDFI coordinates the supply of milk and milk products by dairy cooperatives across the country to various institutions such as the Ministry of Defence (MoD), Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP), and the Indian Railway Catering and Tourism Corporation (IRCTC). Some of the key achievements of NCDFI are elaborated below.

Supplies to Ministry of Defense (MoD) and Indo-Tibetan Border Police

During the year, NCDFI coordinated the supply of milk and milk products to 270 Army Supply Corp Depots, 44 Indian Air Force, and 3 Indian Naval Services Units under the Ministry of Defence. Further, the requirement of the Indo-Tibetan Border Police was also met by the member cooperatives of the NCDFI. Amul, Mahanand, Nandini, Saras, Verka, Visakha, and Warana brand UHT Milk were supplied to MOD. Milk product supplies were allocated to Bengaluru, Indore, Kaira, Ludhiana, Mehsana, Patiala, Sangamner, and Warana Milk Unions; Mother Dairy Bengaluru and Nandini Hi-Tech Plant. NCDFI is proud to mention here that 110 cooperative dairies spread across the country participated in the milk and milk products supply. Contracts concluded during the year were of the order of Rs.1,294 crores (Table 1).

Supplies to the Indian Army and other armed forces have always been considered a matter of pride. Apart from the privilege and the business

interest, cooperatives that have been consistently supplying to the Army have had tangible and intangible benefits. In addition to enabling an assured market, this has helped in capacity building, consistently improving the quality of products, creating goodwill, and also in the expansion of markets.

Meetings

Annual Review Meeting : The NCDFI annually convenes a meeting between the dairy cooperatives and senior officials to review the supplies, procedures, and payments. Accordingly, a meeting was convened at New Delhi on June 26, 2019 which was chaired by Major General Arvind Katoch, ADGST (SM), Directorate General of Supplies & Transport, IHQ of MoD. This meeting was attended by 60 representatives from the Ministry of Defence, NCDFI, and various dairy cooperatives. To curtail the rejections in the milk product supplies, NCDFI organised a Quality Control Meeting at Anand on December 27, 2019 to discuss the quality control aspects of the dairy products. The meeting was chaired by Major General Arvind Katoch, ADGST (SM), Directorate General of Supplies & Transport, IHQ of MoD and attended by 45 representatives from the Ministry of Defence, NCDFI, various dairy cooperatives and Centre for Analysis and Learning in Livestock and Food (CALF).

NCDFI eMARKET

Adoption of technology and its application to ensure better returns to dairy cooperatives and in turn to milk producers has been the prime focus of NCDFI. One such initiative is NCDFI eMarket which has immensely benefitted dairy cooperatives across the country. With the eAuction of dairy commodities, the platform has created a benchmark for market prices at the national level. During the year, eAuctions for milk were launched at the NCDFI eMarket. Further, services were extended for procurement of cattle feed ingredients, fodder seeds, edible oils, packing materials, chemicals, sugar, etc. During the year, the NCDFI eMarket also extended its services to the service Contracts such as the hiring of labour, transport, godown hiring, canteen services, etc.

Dairy Commodities

During the year, transacted volumes at

NCDFI eMarket included 15,777 MT SMP, 5,028 MT butter, 585 MT WMP, 475 MT Cheese, 221 MT Whey Powder, 25 MT Ghee apart from 4.77 crore litres of raw chilled milk (RCM) and 1.92 crore litres of separated skimmed milk (SSM). These transactions were done at NCDFI eMarket through various types of auctions i.e. 'Forward Auctions', 'Auction Sale', and 'Reverse Auctions'.

The brands that participated in the NCDFI eMarket auctions were Aarey, Aavin, Amrut, Amul, Devbhog, Gokul, Krushna, Maahi, Mahanand, Medha, Mother Dairy, Nandini, Parag, Rajhans, Sagar, Sanchi, Saras, Sudha, Verka, Vijaya, Vikas, Vita, and Warana. Though both private and cooperative organisations are registered members on the portal, it is only the cooperatives that are allowed to sell dairy commodities on the portal. The members of the NCDFI are routing their dairy commodity bulk sales through the NCDFI eMarket. Their decision has resulted in the realisation of higher sale proceedings.

Cattle Feed Ingredients

Besides the sale of milk and milk products, NCDFI eMarket also facilitates the procurement of all required agri commodities for cattle feed plants. During the year, 47 cooperative cattle feed plants in the states of Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Gujarat, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Orissa, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, and West Bengal procured required cattle feed ingredients through the NCDFI eMarket. These ingredients included 2,60,825 MT Rice Bran/Polish, 2,04,664 MT Maize, 26,345 MT Cotton Seed Meal, 22,705 MT Mustard Meal, 11,930 MT Wheat, 9,525 MT Coconut Seed Meal, etc. A large and diversified supplier base facilitates the cooperatives to get the required raw materials in time with competitive prices. Hence, many cattle feed plants are in the process to procure raw materials through the NCDFI eMarket.

Other Products

NCDFI eMarket additionally offered support for procurement of sugar, edible oils, packing materials, compound cattle feed, fodder seeds, chemicals apart from scrap sales, and also concluded service contracts such as hiring of

labour, transport, godown hiring, canteen services, etc.

Increased Transparency

NCDFI is consistently making efforts to update the Android application and has released updated versions of NCDFI eMarket periodically, which enabled the users to remain updated with customized auction information on a real-time basis. Further, the NCDFI eMarket is regularly publishing the results of the eAuction in its monthly 'Activity Report', which is circulated to all members and is also available on the mobile application and webpages of the NCDFI eMarket. It gives a larger publicity to the concluded trades and prices for different products, apart from the information on newly introduced commodities and services on the NCDFI eMarket platform, which further helps cooperative buyers to get the products and services at more competitive prices.

Members

The total registered members on the NCDFI eMarket platform were 1,789 as on March 31, 2020 with wide participation from all parts of the country. During the year, NCDFI arranged member meets at Mumbai, Chennai and Erode to have their valuable inputs regarding the operations of NCDFI. Further, a meeting with the senior officials of the Mother Dairy Delhi was convened at Anand to deliberate on the issue related to extending the services of the NCDFI eMarket. The NCDFI also participated in the 48th Dairy Industry Conference at Jaipur, where it had an exhibition stall for promoting the activities of the NCDFI eMarket.

Transacted value

During the year, total business transactions at NCDFI eMarket were to the tune of Rs.2,047 crores consisting of value-added dairy products valued at Rs.595 crores, liquid milk worth of Rs.208 crores, cattle feed ingredients of Rs.1,110 crores and Rs.134 crores worth of other products.

Genetic Improvement

To provide better access of good quality semen doses to the milk producers in the country, NCDFI has partnered with NDDDB Dairy Services for distribution of frozen semen doses (FSDs) produced by Sabarmati Ashram Gaushala (Gujarat), Animal Breeding Centre (Uttar

Pradesh), Alamadhi Semen Station (Tamilnadu), Rohtak Semen Station (Haryana) and Rahuri Semen Station (Maharashtra). These semen stations are either owned or managed by the NDDDB Dairy Services.

These semen stations are equipped with the advanced and modern semen production facilities in the country with sophisticated semen processing equipment adhering to stringent quality control tests. The semen straws produced by these semen stations are marketed under the common brand name of 'SAG' which stands for Superior Animal Genetics.

During the year 2019-20, combined sale from all these semen stations was 3.10 crore FSDs valued at Rs.61 crores.

Total Business Transacted

During the year 2019-20 cumulative business transactions conducted by the NCDFI amounted to Rs.3,402 crores which was 56.27% higher than the previous year. This includes milk and milk products sales to Institutional buyers valued at Rs.1,294 crores, NCDFI eMarket transactions of Rs.2,047 crores, and sale of frozen semen doses of Rs.61 crores.

Developmental Activities

Being an apex body of dairy cooperatives in India, NCDFI foresees the requirement of utilising part of its surplus in spreading awareness among dairy cooperatives specifically in the areas of clean milk production, cooperative governance, productivity of animals, artificial insemination, ration balancing, etc. and to train manpower to enhance their performance and productivity.

NCDFI arranges AI Technician meets, stalls at farmer fairs, training programmes, farmer meets, seminars, workshops, cooperative conclaves, and management development programs based on the industry need assessment.

Training to Dairy Farmers

To supplement the income of dairy farmers by adopting organic and biodynamic farming, the NCDFI and the National Dairy Development Board (NDDDB) jointly organised 5 days of training on biodynamic farming and vegetable production at

Bhaikaka Krishi Kendra, Anand for dairy farmers of North East region. Three batches were conducted for 98 dairy farmers from the states of Sikkim, Assam, West Bengal, Tripura, and Manipur.

Management Development Program

NCDFI sponsored a 3-day Management Development Programme (MDP) in association with the Institute of Rural Management, Anand (IRMA) for the Managing Directors (MDs) and Senior Officers involved in NCDFI eMarket activities related to member dairy cooperatives on the “Applications of Digital Marketing to Gain Leadership Position in Competitive Markets” at Goa. Senior officials of various dairy cooperatives spread across the country attended this MDP.

Stalls at Farmer Fairs

To spread awareness on artificial insemination, NCDFI organised stalls at 17 different farmer fairs in the states of Haryana, Maharashtra, Odisha, Punjab, Rajasthan, and Tamilnadu.

Farmer Meets

As a part of promotional activity, NCDFI in coordination with NDDB Dairy Services organised 15 farmer meets which were attended by 1,346 farmers from across the country (Table 2).

Feedback

The consistent engagement of the NCDFI with its members coupled with developmental

initiatives has provided an opportunity to the NCDFI to get valuable feedback from participants on issues pertaining to procurement, processing, marketing, governance, policy, etc. The Federation is continuously working on the feedback received from the participants to address the needs of member cooperatives.

Manpower Development

During the year, the NCDFI organised a three-day Management Development Program (MDP) at Udaipur for 17 officers of the NCDFI. This program helped them to understand the importance of motivation, communication, and stress management to be more productive in the workplace. It also helped them to create awareness about personality development and understand their roles and responsibilities in the managerial context much better and also enhanced their ability to respond to customer needs. Additionally, NCDFI employees were also nominated to attend training programs, seminars, and conferences at premier institutions to help equip them with information regarding the latest developments in the industry.

Liaisoning for Cooperatives

NCDFI continued to liaison with the Government on various policy issues. NCDFI will

continue to engage with the Ministries such as defence, agriculture, cooperation, and railways on various pertinent issues of the dairy cooperative sector. Consistent support and inputs of members for working out a continuous strategy for liaisoning with various government authorities will immensely benefit it to take up the relevant policy matters with the highest authorities for a favourable consideration..

Awards and Recognition

The NCDFI has been selected for 'Swaraj Awards 2020' under 'Best Farmer's Cooperative (National)' category by the Outlook Group. The Award was presented by Shri Narendra Singh Tomar, Hon'ble Minister of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare and Minister of Rural Development, Government of India during the 'Outlook Agriculture Conclave and Swaraj Awards 2020' held at NASC Complex ICAR, New Delhi on February 24, 2020. NCDFI feels deeply humbled by the recognition received, and expresses its earnest gratitude to the organisers for their acknowledgment of and honour bestowed on NCDFI for its work. The accolade will boost the morale of all the stakeholders of dairy cooperatives and further catalyse the efforts of the NCDFI, which are headed for the betterment of millions of dairy farmers.

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE HOUSING FEDERATION OF INDIA (NCHF)

The National Cooperative Housing Federation of India (NCHF) is a nation-wide organisation of the cooperative housing sector. The main activities and achievements of NCHF during the year 2019-20 are given below:

Promotion Activities

- NCHF makes efforts to promote ACHFs in those states where such organizations do not exist and to strengthen the ACHFs which are comparatively weak. All necessary support and cooperation was provided to member ACHFs on various issues. Important publications/documents were also circulated to them at regular intervals. One of the member Federations of NCHF namely the Rajasthan State Cooperative Housing Federation (Rajasthan Housefed) entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Housing and Urban Development Corporation (HUDCO) for extending the benefits of interest subsidy to the eligible beneficiaries of Rajasthan under the CLSS component of PMAY. The MoU was circulated by NCHF to other ACHFs to explore possibility of availing benefit of the scheme on similar lines.
- The National Housing Bank (NHB) was requested for considering a loan of Rs.20 crore to Rajasthan Housefed. Information/data on borrowings, lending operations, housing loans disbursed and units constructed/financed by ACHFs during 2018-19 was also sent to the NHB for inclusion in their annual publication.
- The Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) was requested to sanction fresh loans to the ACHFs of Odisha and Rajasthan and grant repayment re-schedulements/one time settlement of loans advanced by LIC to ACHFs of Haryana, Madhya Pradesh, Puducherry and Odisha. Necessary guidance was also provided to the concerned ACHFs in preparing repayment re-schedulement proposal of LIC loans and the LIC was requested to consider such proposals sympathetically keeping in view genuine problems faced by them.
- The Registrars of Cooperative Societies (RCS) of concerned states were requested to permit housing cooperatives to get their audit done by Chartered Accountants who are registered with the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI). The RCS of concerned States were also requested to advise housing cooperatives to incorporate provisions for structural audit in their bye-laws or issue orders in this regard.
- Various organizations engaged in development of 'Accounting and Management Software for housing cooperatives' were requested to share details with J&K Cooperative Housing Corporation for facilitating them to adopt online accounting and management software to improve efficiency and to bring transparency in the working of housing cooperatives in the State of J&K.
- An article on 'New India Mission-Housing for All by 2022' written by Shri N.S. Mehara, Chief Executive, NCHF was published in the cooperative journals like Haryana Sahakari Prakash (1st December, 2019) and Sahakkar Darpan (November-December, 2019 Special issue) and also published in 'NCHF Bulletin' for wider publicity of the flagship programme of the government.
- Senior Officers of Member ACHFs visited NCHF Secretariat and discussed various issues with the Chief Executive, NCHF regarding strengthening of housing cooperatives, raising of funds, etc. NCHF was also represented in various meetings/conferences convened by the Government of India, state governments, cooperative and other concerned organizations.
- A brief note on the 'Problems & Suggestions on Fiscal Concessions to Housing Cooperatives in the Union Budget 2019-20' was sent to the National Cooperative Union of India (NCUI) in connection with the Pre-Budget consultations of the Hon'ble Union Finance Minister with different stakeholder groups held on 11.06.2019 at New Delhi. A

brief note on the problems faced by housing cooperatives across the country was also sent to the Gujarat State Cooperative Union for their information and taking up the issues with the State Government.

- On the occasion of International Day of Yoga on 21st June, 2019 a Booklet on Common Yoga Protocol in Hindi and English was circulated to the members of the Board of Directors of NCHF and the Managing Directors of ACHFs for their information and use.
- Member ACHFs and primary housing cooperatives were requested to cover their housing projects under the 'Standard Fire and Special Perils Policy' through NCHF at a reduced premium. A circular regarding arrangements with the Bajaj Allianz General Insurance Company for paperless vehicle insurance (Long Term – 1 to 3 years) on competitive rates through scanning QR Code was also sent to all the Managing Directors of ACHFs and to the president/secretaries of the district federations and primary housing cooperatives. On request, Judgements of Supreme Court/High Courts were sent to primary housing cooperatives and other concerned.

Education, Training & Information Dissemination

Leadership Development Programme for the Chairmen/Directors of housing cooperatives was organised from 23-25th September, 2019 at Delhi by National Centre for Cooperative Education (NCCE) in collaboration with NCHF. In all, 41 participants from eight states attended the Training Programme.

NCHF also conducts research studies and compiles information/statistical data for the benefit and use of all concerned engaged in cooperative housing activities. The Registrars of Cooperative Societies (RCS) of concerned states were requested to send information/data on the operations of housing cooperatives in their respective States.

Conferences/Workshops/Study Visits

Chief Executive, NCHF along with the

Chairman and the Vice-Chairman of West Bengal State Cooperative Housing Federation made a Study Visit to the corporate office of Odisha Cooperative Housing Corporation (OCHC) on 11th August, 2019 at Bhubaneswar to get the first hand information about the management, achievements, infrastructure and problems faced by housing cooperatives in Odisha. A Study Visit of the Directors of NCHF and Officers of Apex Cooperative Housing Federations was organised by NCHF in collaboration with M.P. State Cooperative Housing Federation to a cooperative housing project of M.P. Housefed namely Rachna Towers on 3rd January, 2020 at Rachna Nagar in Bhopal.

The 66th All India Cooperative Week was celebrated from 14-20th November, 2019 on the theme of 'Role of Cooperatives in New India'. To commemorate Cooperative Week Celebrations-2019, NCHF brought out a special issue of 'NCHF Bulletin' which was released by Shri Satnosh Kumar Gangwar, Hon'ble Union Minister of State (Independent Charge) for Labour and Employment at the Inaugural function of the Cooperative Week Celebrations organised by the National Cooperative Union of India (NCUI) on 14th November, 2019 at New Delhi.

An article on 'Housing for All' written by Shri N.S.Mehara, Chief Executive, NCHF was published in the Special Issue of 'The Cooperator' brought out on this occasion by the NCUI. Further, NCHF Staff participated in the Cooperative Quiz Competition organised by NCUI.

Publications

NCHF has been bringing out various publications from time to time. During the year 2019-20, it brought out various publications namely a monthly journal 'NCHF Bulletin' (including special issues on World Habitat Day and Cooperative Week Celebrations); Provision for Structural Audit – Compilation of Orders of RCS; Telephone Directory of NCHF; NCHF Pamphlet; Annual Report; Audit Report; and Compilation of Supreme Court Judgements.

Implementation of Rajbhasha (Hindi) in NCHF Office

Articles written in Hindi and other relevant

news items in Hindi on cooperative housing and related fields were published in 'NCHF Bulletin' regularly; Hindi Pakhwada was celebrated on 2-16th September, 2019; The Annual Report and Audit Report of NCHF for the year 2018-19 were prepared in Hindi; Meetings of Rajbhasha Karyanvayan Samiti and Hindi workshops were held regularly; Letter-heads, envelopes, vouchers, etc. were printed in Hindi; Quarterly and annual progress reports on the use of Rajbhasha Hindi in NCHF Secretariat were sent to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (HUA); Efforts were made to procure more Hindi Books and Hindi section on the web-site of NCHF was updated and contents in Hindi were uploaded on the web-site along with contents in English simultaneously; and Citizen Charter of NCHF was updated in Hindi.

The Chief Executive, NCHF attended the meeting of Hindi Salahkar Samiti of the Ministry of HUA as well as the meetings of Town Official Language Implementation Committee (TOLIC) South Delhi-I on 26.08.2019 and 28.01.2020 at New Delhi.

World Habitat Day Celebrations

World Habitat Day was celebrated on 4th October, 2019 at Vigyan Bhawan in New Delhi, which was inaugurated by Shri Hardeep Singh Puri, Hon'ble Union Minister of State for Housing & Urban Affairs, Civil Aviation (Independent Charge) and Commerce & Industry.

To commemorate the World Habitat Day-2019 celebrations, NCHF brought out a special issue of 'NCHF Bulletin' on the theme, which was released by Shri Hardeep Singh Puri, Hon'ble Union Minister in the presence of Shri Durga Shanker Mishra, Secretary, Ministry of HUA and representatives of UN-Habitat.

Updating of NCHF Website

NCHF Web-site (www.nchfindia.net) was updated regularly during the period under report. For the benefit of members of housing cooperatives and others concerned, judgements of Supreme Court pertaining to housing cooperatives/development authorities/housing boards were included in NCHF Bulletin, all issues of which (April, 2019 to March, 2020) were uploaded on the Web-site. The Web-site of NCHF

has been made bilingual having information both in Hindi and English. The Annual Report and Audited Statement of Accounts of NCHF for the year 2017-18 and updated Citizen Charter of NCHF both in Hindi and English were also uploaded on NCHF Web-site.

Study Visits to NCHF Secretariat

**NATIONAL FEDERATION OF URBAN
COOPERATIVE BANKS AND CREDIT
SOCIETIES LTD. (NAFCUB)**

The National Federation of Urban Cooperative Banks and Credit Societies Ltd., (NAFCUB) is the apex level promotional body of urban cooperative banks and credit societies in the country.

As on 31st March 2019 the total membership of NAFCUB is 1778 out of which 986 are urban cooperative banks and 770 cooperative credit societies are members of NAFCUB. There are 22 state federations/associations in the urban cooperative credit sector and all are members of the National Federation.

Activities of NAFCUB during 2019-20

NAFCUB, being an apex body of urban cooperative banks and credit societies regularly takes up various issues concerning the sector with the regulators i.e. Reserve Bank of India, Central Registrar of Cooperative Societies and State Registrars of Cooperatives Societies as also with other authorities - Ministry of Finance, Ministry of MSMEs, SIDBI, DICGC etc. During the year 2019-20, NAFCUB took up various issues concerning urban cooperative banks and cooperative credit societies with the above authorities. With the persistent efforts of the Federation, many issues were resolved.

Umbrella Organization for UCBs

The foremost important issue and dream of urban cooperative banks has been fulfilled with RBI's approval being granted for the formation of an umbrella organisation, which would be in the form of a non-deposit taking NBFC.

Reduction in Income Tax rate for Cooperative Banks

NAFCUB regularly presents its pre-budget submission to the Hon'ble Union Finance Minister, highlighting the important issues that need the attention of the Ministry for their resolution. During the year, the two most important issues

concerning UCB sector were resolved. The Hon'ble Union Finance Minister in the Union Budget 2020-2021 made two important announcements related to Urban Cooperative Banks. One of the most important relates to the reduction in income tax rates for cooperative banks from the existing 33% to 22% and bringing them at par with the corporates. NAFCUB took up the issue of recent deduction in corporate tax to 22% with the Hon'ble Finance Minister, which was considered by the Government. This is a remarkable achievement for NAFCUB.

Increase the limit of Deposit Insurance

Another long pending demand of the sector to increase the limit of deposit insurance cover from existing Rs.1 lakh to Rs. 5 lakh has also been accepted with the nominal increase in the rate of premium to be charged by banks from existing 10 paise to 12 paise per hundred Rupees.

Amendments in the Banking Regulation Act.

Another big achievement for the UCB Sector introduced in the Budget is the announcement regarding amendments in the Banking Regulation Act that would strengthen the cooperative banks. The Budget declared that a mechanism would be created to raise the capital of cooperatives and NAFCUB efforts made by NAFCUB are bringing fruitful results to the sector.

Contribution of UCBs to PM CARES Fund for COVID 19 Victims

Further, on 30th March, 2020, the Finance Minister was requested that the contribution made by UCBs to PM CARES Fund up to 30th June, 2020 be made eligible for deduction under section 80(G) of Income Tax Act for the Financial Year 2019-20 i.e. Assessment Year 2020-2021. The limit on deduction of 10% of gross income is also not applicable for donations to PM CARES Fund. The Finance Ministry accepting NAFCUB request, immediately issued an Ordinance on 31st March, 2020 extending the timeline to 30th June, 2020 for making donations to PM CARES Fund u/s 80G of the Act.

During the year, NAFCUB submitted its views on amendments to Multi State Cooperative Societies Act, 2002, Banning of Unregulated

Deposit Schemes Bill 2019 to the Ministry,

Reserve Bank of India

Meeting of College Advisory Committee of RBI

President, NAFCUB attended the 58th meeting of the College Advisory Committee of CAB, Pune held on 26th April 2019. It was suggested to have more programmes in vernacular languages for small urban cooperative banks in different regions especially in North East region. Emphasis should also be given to organising more programmes for unit banks as well as programmes relating to BR Act, Information Technology Act etc.

RBI's Standing Advisory Committee

During the year, NAFCUB took up various important issues concerning UCB sector with Reserve Bank of India in the RBI's Standing Advisory Committee, which has been constituted to discuss issues concerning UCBs. NAFCUB also regularly takes up various issues as received from its member banks with the RBI for their timely resolution and also submits its views on the guidelines issued by the RBI from time to time related to policy matters viz. board of management, exposure norms and revision in priority sector lending targets etc.

Resolving various problems of UCBs during COVID 19

NAFCUB actively involved itself in resolving the problems faced by UCBs due to the crisis in Yes Bank which had put various urban cooperative banks in trouble as their business was badly affected with the stoppage of CTS arrangement they had made with the bank. The Federation took up the matter with RBI on an urgent basis and the issue was resolved with issuance of NOC by YES Bank to all the banks to open CTS accounts with any other commercial bank of their choice.

On account of breakout of pandemic Covid 19, there was nationwide complete lockdown, in the month of March 2020. During the lockdown period in the period of Covid Pandemic, NAFCUB maintained correspondence with RBI Governor/Deputy Governor requesting that all types of loans may be permitted to be classified as per 180 days norms w.e.f. January 01, 2020 and

CAMEL rating, implementation of BOM, exposure norms and revised priority sector lending targets and SAF should be kept in abeyance till the normalcy is restored. It was also requested to provide one time deferment for a period of 6 months and consequent extension of installments for all term loans, not to remove any existing FSWM Bank for the next 6 months till the situation is improved. RBI was also requested to provide relaxations in regulatory norms of income recognition, asset classification, provisioning and other related matters. Considering this request, RBI on March 27, 2020 issued a Covid 19 Package vide its notification to all banks including UCBs, providing certain reliefs to the banks to some extent. It has permitted banks to grant a moratorium of 3 months on payment of all installments falling due between March 01 to May 31, 2020. As such, the repayment schedule was shifted across the board by 3 months after the moratorium period.

H.R. Initiatives

Seminar/Workshop/Round Table

The Federation during the year organised 20 training programmes in collaboration with Reserve Bank of India College of Agricultural Banking, Pune, Vaikunth National Institute of Cooperative Management, Pune National Cooperative Development Corporation (LINAC), Gurgaon and National Centre for Cooperative Education, New Delhi for the benefit of urban cooperative banks particularly for smaller urban banks on the important topics of digital banking and cyber security, credit management, financial management, corporate governance, RBI regulation & recovery management, internal inspection & audit, RBI. Three seminars on the topics of (i) Digital Banking & Cyber Security (ii) Good Governance for Mahila UCBs and Good Governance for Cooperative Credit Societies were also organised. Apart from this, a Round Table for CEOs of UCBs to discuss important issues concerning the Sector was also organised.

The Federation regularly publishes two of

its flagship publications (i) quarterly journal "Urban Credit" and (ii) fortnightly newsletter "Coop Banking". Both these publications contain useful reading material and are very popular with subscribers .

From time to time, the NAFSCOB publishes important literature for the benefit of the urban cooperative credit sector. **NATIONAL FEDERATION OF STATE
COOPERATIVE BANKS LTD. (NAFSCOB)**

National Federation of State Cooperative Banks Ltd. (NAFSCOB), Vashi Navi Mumbai was established on May 19, 1964 with a broad objective to facilitate the operations of state and central cooperative banks, in particular, and the development of short term cooperative credit & banking in general. At the end of March, 2019, there are 33 State Cooperative Banks (SCBs), with a network of 1219 branches, 363 District Central Cooperative Banks (DCCBs) with 14293 branches and 95238 Primary Agricultural Credit Societies (PACS) .

The Chairman, NAFSCOB submitted a memorandum to the Union Finance Minister with a request to address the following issues for possible incorporation in the Union Budget 2020-21, some of which are:

- Income Tax Issues – Issues for Consideration
- Need for restoration of Section 80P of Income Tax Act, 1961, or
- To consider the proposal for reduction of income tax rate for cooperatives, similar to the option made available to domestic companies.
- 3.1.2. To consider the proposal to exempt

primary agriculture cooperative societies (PACS) and primary cooperative agricultural and rural development banks (PCARDBS) from TDS under section 194N.

- 3.1.3. Need for exempting SCBs and DCCBs from the provisions of Section 194A of Income Tax Act, 1961
- To consider the proposal for budgetary provision towards computerisation in all PACS in the country to address developments in Information Communication Technology (ICT) & to SCBs/DCCBs to pave way for migration to CBS platform.
- To consider budgetary provision on a sharing basis between the centre and the state governments, for implementation of the Human Resource Policy formulated for PACS by NAFSCOB.
- To peruse the proposal for formulation of Institutional Protection System (IPS) to strengthen rural cooperative credit and banking structure and consider contribution to its corpus.

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE AGRICULTURE & RURAL DEVELOPMENT BANKS' FEDERATION LTD. (NCARDBF)

The Federation was established in 1960 as the national apex organization for long term cooperative credit structure (LTCCS). LTCCS advances loans mainly for capital formation in agriculture and rural sectors.

At present the structure comprises of 16 SCARDBs of which only 13 are fully functional with a network of 1,751 PCARDBs/branches of SCARDBs at ground level. These banks have a total membership of 1,07,49,291 rural households of which 62,40,508 have outstanding loans. The total loans outstanding and borrowings outstanding of these banks as on 31.03.2020 were Rs. 23715 crores and Rs. 17410 crores respectively. Fully functional SCARDBs have total deposits of '2083 crores as on 31.3.2020 as against Rs. 2133 crores as on 31.3.2019. Their total lending during 2019-20 stood at Rs. 4680 crores as against Rs. 4230 crores during the previous year. Aggregate recoveries were 46.8% (upto June 2019) as against 43.31% last year.

Activities undertaken through Planning, Research & Development Cell with financial assistance from Govt of India under Central Sector Integrated Scheme for the year 2019-20

- Working Group on HR on LTCCS under the Chairmanship of Shri K. Sivadasan Nair, Chairman, NCARDBF and Joint Chairmanship of Shri N. Satyanarayana, Chief Executive, NCUI was formed under which the work related to data collection and compilation as per questionnaire has been completed. The draft report is under preparation.
- Study on recovery policy of banks. – Model recovery policy of ARDBs was finalised based on best practices and circulated to member banks for formulating/reformulating recovery policy at their levels.
- A Seminar on Business Expansion and Diversification by ARDBs was held on 10th January 2019 in Mumbai.
- National Conference of ARDBs 2019, was held on 21st November 2019 in New Delhi.
- Workshop on Revival Road Map for LTCCS was held on 18th January 2020 in Hyderabad.
- Functional Restructuring of ARDBs for middle/junior level Officers of ARDBs at NIRB, Bangalore during 5-7 March 2020.

Model Recovery Policy

The model Recovery Policy for member

banks finalized by the Board of the Federation recently, envisages significant changes in the loan and recovery systems. Banks need to view recovery as an essential part of the credit cycle and not just as the final step, so that loan officers remain responsible for the recovery of loans during the life of the loan. Timely detection of issues in the loan account can avoid default in repayment to a great extent.

Agriculture is prone to specific risks such as climate risk, price risk, risk of pests and diseases. In spite of reforms introduced in crop insurance through Pradhan Manthri Fasal Bhima Yojana the coverage of Crop Insurance at peak level in the last two years was limited to 40-45% for the farmers. It is reported that crop insurance enrolment has come down by 15% during 2019-20. The Model Recovery policy suggests that the banks should endeavor to make clients aware of these risks and should take such risks into account in the loan design. It is necessary to make a provision for rescheduling instalments due under agriculture term loan in a bad crop year, either partly or wholly, depending on the extent of losses and the impact of such losses on overall repaying capacity of the clients.

It is observed that ARDBs should also help such clients, who do not keep records of income and expenses, in spite of having capacity, and will fail to pay on time due to poor management of cash flow to accumulate their routine savings by extending the facility of thrift and saving accounts.

Adequate arrangements for financing working capital/production credit needs of clients who avail investment credit, sanctioning of loan and fixing loan period and due dates strictly based on repaying capacity, regular monitoring of activities undertaken by clients using the loan, introducing incentive scheme to clients for timely repayment, are the other major highlights of the model recovery policy.

National Conference of ARDBs 2019

The National Cooperative Agriculture & Rural Development Banks' Federation organised the National Conference of ARDBs 2019 at New Delhi on 21st November 2019. The Conference was inaugurated by Shri Parshottam Rupala, Hon'ble

Minister of State for Agriculture and Farmers Welfare. The function was chaired by Dr. Chandra Pal Singh, MP, President, NCUI.

Major recommendations/action points of the Conference are listed below :

State Government/Govt of India/RBI

- ◆ State and Central Government support and cooperation is necessary in implementing the structural reforms suggested in the Vaidyanathan Task Force II Report. (Action: State Govts/Gol)
- ◆ Government of India should consider recapitalisation of ARDBs without further delay as they are the only agency helping in creation of capital formation in agriculture, which has been left out in the restructuring process. (Action: Gol)
- ◆ The State Governments may be requested to appoint a Committee at state level consisting of representatives of stakeholders, NABARD to study the working of ARDBs and to suggest measures to strengthen them.
- ◆ The Federation needs to constitute a high level team to study various aspects of the functioning of LTCCS and bring out remedial measures for their revival.
- ◆ ARDBs should take following measures to step up investment credit like increasing coverage and outreach by opening customer service points and appoint business correspondents in potential areas, diversifying to agricultural value chain financing, addressing on priority critical issues affecting risk rating and eligibility for NABARD's refinance, introducing short term loan products to meet production/working capital/contingent credit needs of members, speeding up technology adoption and setting time frame for completing the process.

Meeting with Chairman, NABARD on 6th February 2020

Outstanding issues relating to refinance policy of NABARD with respect of SCARDBs were discussed in the meeting. The Federation welcomed the funding support to PCARDBs for

extending refinance support to unitary SCARDBs also for developing Multi Service Centres.

Delegation to Shri Parshottam Rupala, Hon'ble Union Minister of State for Agriculture & Farmers Welfare on 12th March 2020

A delegation from the Federation met Shri Parshottam Rupala, Hon'ble Union MoS for Agriculture & Farmers Welfare on 12 March 2020. The delegation requested the intervention of the Hon'ble Minister for reactivising the proposal regarding the revival package for LTCCS, based on the recommendations of VTF II, extending Govt of India's crop loan interest subvention scheme to SCARDBs, evolving norms for giving banking licence to ARDBs, etc.

Computerisation of ARDBs – Renewal of Contract with NIC

An initial 3 year contract between SCARDBs and NIC has now expired in some states. In the meantime, member banks were advised to inform the Federation issues and disputes, if any, to be discussed and sorted out with NIC at the earliest.

Deposit Mobilisation by ARDBs – Scheme of Deposit Mobilisation

With the enactment of the Banning of Unregulated Deposit Schemes (BUDS) Act 2019, the powers to regulate deposit schemes of ARDBs now solely rest with the state governments concerned. After the enactment of BUDS Act, ARDBs can collect deposits from their voting

members as well as from others based on schemes approved by State Government.

The Federation is implementing through SCARDBs a pilot project in select districts for cluster based financing of small and marginal farmers and post harvest value additions to their produce for maximising returns.

Publications

Publication of *Land Bank Journal* is an important work of the PRD Cell. Three issues of *Land Bank Journal* i.e. June 2019, September 2019 & December 2019 have been published and circulated during the year and March 2020 issue is under compilation.

Annual Statistical Bulletin

Statistical Bulletin for the year for the year 2017-18 was published during the year. The Bulletin for 2018-19 is under compilation. The Federation is trying to update this important publication by streamlining the reporting system relating to ground level data relating to the operations of ARDBs.

Monthly Progress Report of ARDBs

The Federation collects and compiles data on member banks' key operations on a monthly basis for review at its level and reporting to Government of India. Nine consolidated monthly reports from April 2018 to January 2020 were brought out during the year 2019-20. February and March 2020 reports are under compilation.

CHAPTER – 9

IMPORTANT ACTIVITIES OF STATE LEVEL COOPERATIVE ORGANISATIONS

ANDHRA PRADESH

Andhra Pradesh State Cooperative Union Ltd., Vijayawada

The Andhra Pradesh State Cooperative Union provides education and training for the members, elected members of the managing committees and employees of the cooperative societies to improve their capacity building so that they can professionally equip themselves to compete in the market economy.

A.P. State Cooperative Union, Vijayawada conducted 48 short-term training programmes for the employees, members of the managing committee and members of the societies, employees of financing bank and departmental staff on key issues of cooperative development. In total, 2115 candidates participated in the training programmes given below.

A TOT programme for district cooperative audit officers from each district on the subjects of Capital Adequacy Ratio (CRAR), Distribution of Profits in PACS and Audit rating & Classification was held on 04-01-2020 at KDCCB Ltd., Regional Office, Vijayawada. A total number of 56 candidates participated in the programme.

A two days training programme for all the department field staff on the subject of “Audit of Accounts of Cooperative Societies with Reference to Act Provisions, Common Accounting System (CAS) & MIS System in PACS as per NABARD Guidelines, was held on 8th & 9th January, 2020 at Vijayawada Cooperative Centre Ltd., Vijayawada. Thirty eight (38) candidates participated in the training programme.

37 one day training programmes for newly appointed PACS committee chairpersons and persons on the subject of “Important Provisions of APCS Act, 1964 & Rules and Bye-laws” in all

districts in the state were organised in which a total of 1477 PACS Chairpersons participated.

69 one day training programmes for newly appointed PIC Committee chairpersons and other persons of PACS on “Important Provisions of APCS Act, 1964 & Rules and Bye-laws” in all districts in the state were held. In total, 3769 PIC committee members participated in the programmes.

A state level seminar on “Role of Cooperatives for Development of SC/ST and weaker section women” was held at Guntur with NCUI support on 13-06-2019 in coordination with DRDA-Velugu, Guntur. 77 members participated in the seminar.

A five days trainer’s training programme on “Cooperative Education” for all the employees of APSC Union Ltd., Vijayawada was held from 24th To 28th July, 2019 with NCUI support. 30 employees participated in the training programme.

A Seminar on “Role of cooperatives for development of SC/ST and weaker section women” for the ST women of Mandala Mahila Samakhya MACS societies was held at Kadapa YSR District on 04-06-2019 in coordination with DRDA-Velugu, Guntur. 114 members participated in the training programme.

International Day of Cooperatives and All India Cooperative Week Celebrations were organised by the Union.

The 4th batch of DCM & CA Course commenced on 04-07-2019 and concluded on 31-12-2019 for both in-service staff as well as freshers. 162 candidates completed the course successfully. 863 member education programmes were conducted and 73,501 members participated in these programmes during the year 2019-2020.

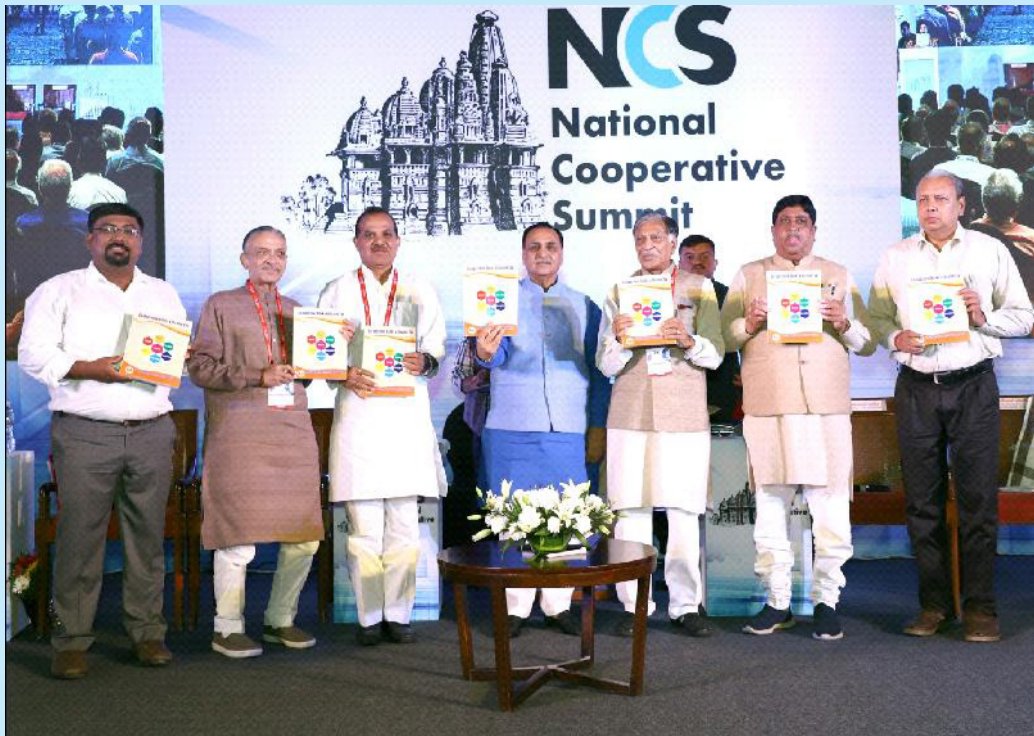

SEWA Cooperative Federation

S EWA Federation has been working as an Enterprise Support System (ESS) with women-owned cooperatives in Gujarat, since 1992. Starting with 33 cooperatives, the Federation has in total promoted 106 cooperatives, with 300,000 informal women workers. The year 2019-2020 has been a year of growth for SEWA Cooperative Federation.

The highlights of this year included :

- Along with SEWA Bharat, ICA-AP and ILO, SEWA Federation organised a national workshop on strengthening women's cooperatives. Issues related to the importance of networking for the marketing of services and products, and various opportunities to sell products online, enabling capital access by women cooperatives and creating a positive policy environment for cooperatives, etc. were discussed.
- SEWA Cooperative Federation's inputs were included in the 'Think Coop' module developed by the International Labour Organization.
- The Federation participated in the Global Youth forum organized by the International Cooperative Alliance in Malaysia, where a training session was conducted on the topic

of 'Organizational Structure of Cooperatives'. Following this, SEWA became a member of the Youth Committee at the International Cooperative Alliance.

- Representatives from the SEWA Cooperative Federation and SEWA Bharat attended a workshop organized by the Cambodia Business and Human Resource Center, where they shared the experiences of cooperatives and the labour unions.
- SEWA Homecare, a domestic workers' cooperative celebrated its 10 years anniversary.

SEWA also introduced the Farm 2 Table initiative which promotes the concept of direct delivery of vegetables straight from the farm. This delivery service was first started in sister organisations and has since been expanded to other B2B linkages. A number of skill-based training sessions were organised in the agriculture sector and the handicrafts sector. A total of 289 training sessions were organised with approximately 5900 participants. A Board of Directors' training for member cooperatives of SEWA Federation was also organised.

In collaboration with the International Labour Organization, SEWA Cooperative Federation provided data collection support for a research project. A total of 250 women beauty workers and tutors who use online platforms for providing their services were interviewed as a part of the project.

SEWA Cooperative Federation also carried-out a Farmer Mapping Survey for Megha Mandli in Tapi District. A total of 875 farmers were interviewed from 7 blocks of Tapi District. The purpose of this project was to understand the on-ground situation of the agricultural yield and the market where it could be sold as well as the availability of various government services.

The President and Deputy Managing Director of SEWA Cooperative Federation attended a workshop organized by KEDV Cooperative Federation SIMURG Union of Turkey. In this workshop, the representatives of SEWA Union and SEWA Cooperative Federation discussed their activities, organisational structure, how both (the union and the federation) plan their strategies and

work together, and lastly, the challenges both the organizations have faced so far.

The SEWA Managing Director attended a workshop organised by the Overseas Development Institute, London. In this conference, the Managing Director participated in a discussion on chalking out a roadmap for the next ten years on the issues related to empowerment and equality of sisters and social security. She also discussed the importance of identification and registration of the workers and the role technology plays in it. There was a discussion on how the cooperatives associated with the SEWA Cooperative Federation are using platforms as a medium for increasing their sales and reaching out to a larger audience during a workshop organized by The New School, New York on the theme of Platform Cooperativism.

Mr. Bruno of the International Cooperative Alliance, Mr. Simel from the International Labour Organization and the President of National Rural Livelihoods Mission of Andhra Pradesh visited the SEWA Union to learn about its activities and programmes. Representatives of the SEWA Cooperative Federation participated in a Round Table Conference organized by the United Nations where they shared the experiences of the Lok Swasthya Mandali, Vimo SEWA, and Sangini Childcare Cooperative.

A training session was organized and conducted by the SEWA Cooperative Federation for participants from four countries (Tanzania, Ethiopia, Nepal and Rwanda). In this training session, there was knowledge sharing session on the various livelihood initiatives undertaken by the SEWA Cooperative Federation and the Gujarat Government.

One time settlement scheme 2019 covered those defaulter loanees of DPCARDBs who could not clear their installments of principal and interest due to certain reasons as on 31.8.19. As per norms of the Scheme, defaulter loanee is entitled to avail 50% of entire interest liability inclusive of overdue interest as on 30.8.19. The penal interest @ 2% p.a. is borne by the bank. The Scheme covers all the purposes. The Scheme has been closed on 31.01.2020.

Under "Timely Repayment Interest Incentive Scheme" of the State Govt. launched in 2009, the previous state government had provided Rs. 80.31 crore to 154770 beneficiaries during the period of 5 years. Similarly, the present state government has provided Rs. 65.24 core to 74879 beneficiaries. Thus, a total number of 229649 beneficiaries have availed interest subvention amounting to Rs. 145.55 crore since the inception of the scheme until 31.03.2020.

HIMACHAL PRADESH**Himachal Pradesh State Cooperative Development Federation**

The principal objective of the Himachal Pradesh State Cooperative Development Federation is to promote and develop the cooperative movement in Himachal Pradesh, to educate, guide and assist the people in their efforts to build up and expand the cooperative movement.

Cooperative education programme was first introduced in Himachal Pradesh in the year 1957 with two cooperative educational units under the charge of a cooperative education officer. The present sanctioned strength of CEIs is 24 and the number of lecturers and CEIs/others is only 15.

This Federation is running two cooperative training centres at Mashobra, Distt. Shimla and Garli, Distt. Kangra to cater to the training needs of junior personnel of cooperative department and employees of cooperative institutions. In both training centres, one Diploma in Cooperative Management Course of 16 week duration is organised in a year keeping account of the guidelines and syllabus prescribed by National Council for Cooperative Training (NCCT).

During 2019-20, with 272 Courses, comprising of Secretary/Manager Course, SC/ST Camps, Youth Camps, Diploma for Certified Auditors, etc., 9926 persons were trained.

Apart from the implementation of the Cooperative Education and Training Programme, this Federation also has various publication and propaganda activities including publication of "Sahkar Durpan", organization of All India Cooperative Week/seminars/workshops, conferring of awards, interstate study visits, etc.

In the recent years the Printing Unit has been modernised by installation of three offset printing machines. As a result, this Federation is able to acquire printing work from H.P. University, and various government Departments such as the Transport Department, the Department of Science and Technology, ICAR, Panchayati Raj etc.

KARNATAKA**Karnataka State Cooperative Marketing Federation Ltd.**

The Karnataka State Cooperative Marketing Federation Ltd., was established on 11.11.1943 under the erstwhile Mysore State Cooperative Societies Act.

The Federation is distributing fertilisers to the farmers through its member societies with a wide network of 40 branches. It has distributed 1,26,474 MTs. of fertiliserfertilisers under government's buffer stock scheme and also supplied 74,613 MTs. Fertilisers under its own account during the year 2019-20.

The Federation is also undertaking procurement of various agricultural produce, under Central Government's Minimum Support Price (MSP); Market intervention Scheme (MIS) and Price Stabilization Scheme (PSF) to help the farmers of the state during the slowdown of market prices. NAFED is the Central Nodal Agency for these procurements. In the year 2019-20, under the above said schemes, the Federation has procured 41,72,805.50 quintals of various agricultural produces valued at Rs. 2316.54 crore.

The Federation has immovable properties in 64 places, throughout the state. It has got 135 godowns, total storage capacity of which comes to 1.73 lakh MTs., besides owning its own office buildings at 15 places.

The Federation proposes to undertake the below mentioned activities:

- To open 50 sales depot in the state, for retail sales of fertilisers, pesticides and agricultural produces;
- To open wholesale and retail sales points for generic medicines;
- To undertake procurement of various agricultural produce under own funds.
- Construction of logistic warehouses and commercial complexes;
- To supply groceries and other items to



various government/public sector institutions on commission basis.

- To help the farmers of the state by establishing E-Market units.



The Karnataka State Cooperative Apex Bank Ltd.

The Karnataka State Cooperative Apex Bank Ltd., which is popularly known as “APEX BANK” was established in the year 1915. The bank, identified as one of the premier state cooperative banks in the country, has completed 105 years of useful and eventful services in the cooperative movement of Karnataka and has achieved significant growth.

The primary objective of the bank is to provide short-term and medium-term agricultural loans to farmers through DCC Banks and PACS. Besides, the bank is also extending working capital and term loans to agri-based cooperatives and private sugar factories through consortium arrangements. The apex bank, being a scheduled bank is carrying out all retail banking activities including mobilisation of deposits, and issue of loans to the public through its network of 52 branches in Bangalore city, which are functioning under CBS with RTGS and NEFT facility.



Karnataka State Cooperative Federation Ltd., Bangalore

The Mysore Provincial Cooperative Institution came into existence on 27th August 1924 with the sole objective of providing the necessary cooperative education and training for the development of the cooperative movement in the state and also to give wide publicity to the activities of the cooperatives. Like-minded co-operators were behind this move. This organisation was renamed as Mysore State Cooperative Union soon after the re-organization of states on linguistic basis. Further again, four cooperative institutions were merged and the new institution was formed called Karnataka State Co-operative Federation Limited.

The objective of the Karnataka State Cooperative Federation is to provide education and training for the development of the co-operative movement in the state and also to give wider publicity to the activities of the co-operatives.

Under the Member Education Programme scheme, education is provided to the secretaries, members, executive committee members, staff, women and SC/ST members of the societies. To bring the women folk into the co-operative movement a separate women's wing was started in 1966. The Federation has been running eight co-operative training centres through which a Diploma Programme in Cooperative Management is conducted for a period of 26 weeks and also a correspondence course of Diploma in co-operative management training is conducted for a period of 24 weeks. The Federation has been publishing “**Sahakara**” News Weekly, which is in its 50th year of publication.

With a view to make the Member Education Programme more effective and also to face the global challenges, it was decided to arrange cluster type training programmes for 2 or 3 co-operative institutions in a group at the village level.

The cluster programme has been widely appreciated. The directors of the societies, women members, members belonging to SC/ST and youth are participating in this programme. During the year 2019-20, 855 classes were conducted for 27,629 participants, in which the number of classes conducted for women and youth was significant.

Education and training programmes pertaining to all sectors of the cooperative movement have been organised in all the districts of the state. Need-based training programmes for secretaries, staff, office bearers, directors are being organised through district cooperative unions. During 2019-20, for district level special programmes, the members of classes conducted were 262, and the number of participants was 20627.

The federation arranges state level training programmes for different sectors of the co-operative movement. During 2019-20, 82 such programmes were conducted in which 10802 people participated.

State level Programme Inauguration

The Federation has been organising essay and debate competitions on cooperatives for the students of schools and colleges at district level through District Cooperative Unions. 868 students participated in 29 debating competitions and 813 students participated in 29 essay competitions. For LAMPS cooperative societies, training programmes were conducted for 85 participants. 18 training programmes were conducted by the Karnataka Institute of Cooperative Management in 2019-20 for 3212 participants.

During the year 2019-2020, KICM Belagavi won the Inter-KICM debate competition.

Publicity

Karnataka State Cooperative Federation has been publishing "SAHAKARA WEEKLY" for the last 51 Years.

PUDUCHERRY

Family Development Cooperative Thrift and Credit Society Ltd., (FAMCO), Puducherry

FAMCO was registered by the Central Registrar of Cooperatives, on 23rd Day of July, 2009, as a Multi State Cooperative Society. Its area of operation includes the states of Puducherry, Tamilnadu and Karnataka with the registration number MSCS/CR/307/2009.

As on 31.03.2020, FAMCO has a total membership of 433 members (111 Individual members and 322 Group Members). The total paid up share capital is Rs.12, 57,900/-. The total number of members as on 31.03.2019 was 413 (100 individual members and 313 Group members) and the total paid up share capital was Rs. 12,42,800/-. During the reporting period, 11 Individual members and 9 Group Members joined FAMCO with an additional share capital of Rs.4,300/- and Rs.10,800/- respectively. Hence the total shares increased during this reporting period by Rs.15,100/-.

As on 31st March 2020, FAMCO has total deposits of Rs.1.64 crores. During the year, 33 member SHGs were given a total loan of Rs. 97,

00,000/- for small income generation activities. The loans are repaid 100%. Since inception, FAMCO has granted a total loan of Rs.10.43 Crores to 433 SHGs covering 6000 families.

The 10th Annual General Body Meeting of FAMCO was held on 10.08.2019. All the candidates were elected unopposed as Directors of FAMCO for a period of 5 years from 30.08.2019 to 29.08.2024.

On 21.08.2019, Rev. Fr. A.S. Antonisamy, Founder, FAMCO and Mr.M.Aloysius, CEO, FAMCO visited the Bon Secours College for Women, Thanjavur. A motivation meeting was arranged for the drivers of the college buses. 65 drivers participated in the meeting. They were encouraged to undertake thrift and savings. All of them resolved to form 5 groups of SHGs with 13 members each.

Rev. Fr. A.S. Antonisqamy, Founder, FAMCO, was invited to the Kanchi Maamunivar Centre for Post Graduate Studies (KMCPDS), on 15.08.2019. पी०सी०यू० द्वारा संचालित योजनाओं दिनांक 01.04.2019 से 31.03.2020 तक की अवधि के कार्यों का विवरण/प्रगति रिपोर्ट

उत्तर प्रदेश कोआपरेटिव यूनियन लि०, (पी०सी०यू०) एक राज्य स्तरीय गैर व्यावसायिक सहकारी संस्था है जिसका मुख्य उद्देश्य सहकारी शिक्षा एवं प्रशिक्षण की व्यवस्था करना तथा सहकारी कार्यक्रमों का क्षेत्र में व्यापक प्रचार-प्रसार करना है। इस संस्था का गठन वर्ष 1928 में हुआ था।

उपर्युक्त उद्देश्यों की पूर्ति हेतु प्रदेश के जनपदों में सहकारी शिक्षा हेतु सचल इकाइयों की स्थापना की गई है, तथा निम्न स्थानों पर 06 सहकारी प्रबंध प्रशिक्षण केन्द्र स्थापित किए गए हैं—

1. मेरठ, 2. वाराणसी, 3. हैवरा (इटावा), 4. महोबा,
5. अयोध्या (फैजाबाद), 6. बिलारी (मुरादाबाद)।

1. सहकारी शिक्षा कार्यक्रम

इसके अन्तर्गत सहकारी सदस्यों/भावी सदस्यों एवं सहकारी बन्धुओं/पदाधिकारियों को शिविरों, गोष्ठियों एवं सभाओं के माध्यम से सहकारी सिद्धांत, दर्शन तथा व्यवहार आदि की शिक्षा दी जाती है। वर्ष 2019-20 में इस योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2019 से 31.03.2020 तक कुल 7361 सहकारी बन्धुओं/सदस्यों/भावी सदस्यों को शिक्षित किया गया।

2. सहकारी प्रशिक्षण योजना

संस्था द्वारा संचालित 06 प्रशिक्षण केन्द्रों पर पत्रोपाधि सत्र (डिप्लोमा कोर्स) एवं अल्पकालिक सत्र आयोजित किए जाते हैं। वर्ष 2019-20 में इस योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2019 से 31.03.2020 तक कुल 219 कार्मिकों को प्रशिक्षित किया गया।

3. सहकारी शिक्षा निधि योजना

सहकारी शिक्षा एवं प्रशिक्षण कार्यक्रमों के संचालन हेतु सहकारी संस्थाओं द्वारा सहकारी शिक्षा निधि में अंशदान किए जाने का प्रावधान उ०प्र० सहकारी नियमावली के नियम संख्या - 138 में किया गया है, जिसके आधार पर वर्ष

2019-20 में इस योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2019 से 31.03.2020 तक कुल 30 20.55 लाख शिक्षा निधि मद में प्राप्त हुए।

4. सहकारी बीमा योजना

वित्तीय संसाधनों में वर्षद्धि लाने के उद्देश्य से प्रदेश की सहकारी संस्थाओं की परिसम्पत्तियों/कैश की सुरक्षा सदस्यों की किसी दुर्घटना में मृत्यु/अपंगता की स्थिति में उन्हें बीमा की सुविधा एक समान न्यूनतम दर पर उपलब्ध कराए जाने की व्यवस्था पी०सी०यू० द्वारा साधारण बीमा कम्पनी के सहयोग से सुलभ कराई जा रही है। वर्ष 2019-20 में इस योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2019 से 31.03.2020 तक कुल रु० 44.85 लाख का बीमा कमीशन मद में आय प्राप्त हुई।

5. सहकारी प्रेस

सहकारी कार्यक्रमों के व्यापक प्रचार-प्रसार संस्था द्वारा "सहकारिता साप्ताहिक" समाचार पत्र एवं "सहकारिता मासिक" पत्रिका का नियमित प्रकाशन हेतु संस्था का एक अपना सहकारी प्रेस वर्ष 1969 से स्थापित है। इस प्रेस के द्वारा सहकारी क्षेत्र की संस्थाओं के उपयोगार्थ विभिन्न प्रकार की स्टेशनरी की छपाई का कार्य भी किया जाता है। वर्ष 2019-20 में इसकी योजना के अन्तर्गत दिनांक 01.04.2019 से 31.03.2020 तक कुल रु० 50.87 लाख का छपाई का कार्य किया गया था।

6. धान एवं गेहूँ क्रय योजना

संस्था द्वारा वर्ष 2019-20 में किसानों से 394551.69 मी०टन गेहूँ एवं 676882.21 मी०टन धान क्रय किया गया जिससे संस्था को प्रशासनिक शुल्क के रूप में रु० 2300.42 लाख आय संभावित है।

7. आडिटोरियम

संस्था द्वारा भूतल पर आधुनिक सुविधाओं से युक्त वातानुकूलित आडिटोरियम का संचालन किया जा रहा है जो सहकारी तथा गैर सहकारी संस्थाओं/संगठनों की गोष्ठी, सेमिनार, सम्मेलन आदि हेतु उचित दरों पर उपलब्ध कराया जाता है। दिनांक 01.04.2019 से 31.03.2020 तक कुल रु० 09.87 लाख की आय प्राप्त हुई है।

संस्था की आय के स्रोत एवं समस्याएं

1. वर्ष 1996-97 के पूर्व तक शिक्षा/प्रशिक्षण एवं

प्रचार-प्रसार से राज्य सरकार से पी0सी0यू0 को वित्तीय सहायता उपलब्ध कराई जाती रही, जो 1996-97 के पश्चात पूर्णतया बन्द कर दी गई है। इसके फलस्वरूप संस्था को अपने कार्यक्रमों के संचालन हेतु वित्तीय कठिनाईयों का सामना करना पड़ रहा है।

2. संस्था के आय का मुख्य स्रोत विभिन्न सहकारी संस्थाओं से प्राप्त होने वाली सहकारी शिक्षा निधि की धनराशि है। वर्तमान में बैंकिंग सहकारी संस्थाओं यथा पैक्स, उ0प्र0 सहकारी बैंक के लिए शिक्षा निधि ऐच्छिक होने के कारण एवं विभिन्न सहकारी संस्थाओं की वित्तीय स्थिति अच्छी न होने के कारण उनसे शिक्षा निधि की वाजिब धनराशि प्राप्त नहीं हो पा रही है।
3. वित्तीय वर्ष 2019-20 के आय-व्यय में उ0प्र0 कोआपरेटिव यूनियन लि0 लखनऊ के 6 सहकारी प्रबन्ध प्रशिक्षण केन्द्रों के संचालन में सहयोग हेतु रु0 100.00 लाख की अनुदान स्वरूप वित्तीय सहायता के बजट प्रावधान कराने का अनुरोध भारतीय राष्ट्रीय सहकारी संघ, नई दिल्ली से किया जाता है। जिससे सहकारी क्षेत्र के मानव संसाधन के विकास एवं सहकारी शिक्षा एवं प्रशिक्षण व्यवस्था को सुदृढ़ बनाने के लिए प्रभावी प्रशिक्षण कार्यक्रम संचालित किए जाएंगे, इससे सहकारी आंदोलन को गति मिलेगी।

WEST BENGAL

West Bengal State Cooperative Union, Kolkata

The West Bengal State Cooperative Union imparted cooperative training through its 6 (Six) CCMs located at Uttarpara, Barsul, Sriniketan, Jhargram, Jalpaiguri & Kalimpong. One new CCM at Malda, District Malda has been set up and it is starting its work shortly. 20 Week Diploma Courses as well as short term courses were conducted at CCMs. 323 courses were held at various CCMs in which there were 7600 participants comprised of SC/ST and females.

Member Education Programmes are conducted at grass root level i.e. society level by DCEIs (District Cooperative Education Instructors) engaged in every district cooperative union. 2384 classes were organised in which there were 76521 participants comprising of SC/ST, minorities and women.
