

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Editorial

Budget and Opportunities for Cooperatives

After the formation of Cooperative Ministry in July 2021, the cooperative sector has been given due recognition in every year's Budget. This paradigm shift, as compared to the past when cooperatives were not even mentioned in the budgetary provisions on several occasions, clearly indicates that cooperatives are the focal point of attention in the policy pronouncements in the recent times. The recent initiatives by Ministry of Cooperation to strengthen the cooperative movement have further given a strong policy thrust to the sector. No doubt, the budget pronouncements every year further give a boost to strengthening of this sector while also providing new opportunities for their growth and development.

The focus of this year's Budget on 'Garib' (Poor), 'Mahilayen' (Women), 'Yuva' (Youth) and 'Annadata' (Farmer) is indeed timely considering the need to give due attention to the needs of the deprived and neglected sections of the society. The cooperatives, which are primarily meant for these sections of the society, play an important role in poverty eradication thus improving the socio-economic condition of the farmers. This is validated from the fact that the focus of this year's budget is on employment and skilling. In the wake of growing unemployment, as cooperatives play an important role in employment generation, there are huge expectations that the cooperative sector will play a leading role on this front. In fact, the budget emphasizes that the National Cooperation Policy's goal will be fast-tracking growth of rural economy and generation of employment opportunities on a large scale. As the budget talks of importance of skilling, the cooperatives need to be skilled at all levels so that their professional competence is enhanced and they are able to successfully compete in the market economy. Under a new Centrally Sponsored scheme, the budgetary provision of 20 lakh youth being skilled over a five year period, will certainly provide opportunities to cooperative organizations to take advantage of this provision.

In fact, the budget provides several opportunities to cooperatives to lead and take initiatives in areas where there are immense potentialities. For example, as the budget lays emphasis on India achieving self-sufficiency in pulses and oilseeds, the cooperatives need to devise effective strategies and action-programs so that they can very well contribute in strengthening production, storage and marketing which can help in achieving this objective. Similarly, through effective panchayat-cooperative collaboration, the cooperatives can play an important role in bringing one crore farmers in the potentially rich field of natural farming.

The present issue of 'The Cooperator' has a focus on analysis of budget from a cooperative perspective. Hope the readers will like the various shades of opinion expressed by the experts in the articles

यह सराहनीय है कि बजटीय प्रावधानों के अनुसार नैनो डीएपी का उपयोग विभिन्न उत्पादों के लिए किया जाएगा। वर्ष 2024-2025 के बजट में इफको के नैनो उत्पादों को उचित महत्ता देने के लिए मैं प्रधानमंत्री श्री नरेंद्र मोदी जी को विशेष धन्यवाद देता हूं।

इनके अतिरिक्त कई ऐसी अन्य घोषणाएं भी हैं जहां सहकारी सिमितियां प्रत्यक्ष और अप्रत्यक्ष रूप से अहम भूमिका निभा सकती हैं जैसे "पीएम जनजाति उन्नत ग्राम अभियान" के माध्यम से आदिवासी समुदाय के 63,000 गांवों का विकास" एक सराहनीय पहल है। सहकारी सिमितियां इस मिशन में महत्वपूर्ण भूमिका निभा पाएंगी और सामाजिक-आर्थिक प्रगति को आगे बढ़ाने के लिए ग्रामीण क्षेत्रों में अपनी उपस्थिति का लाभ उठा पाएंगी। इस कदम से आदिवासी समुदायों की आजीविका में वृद्धि होगी और यह सुनिश्चित हो पाएगा कि विकास का लाभ देश के कोने-कोने तक पहुंचे।

इस बजट में घोषित 'पूर्वोदय' योजना बिहार, झारखंड, पश्चिम बंगाल, ओडिशा और आंध्र प्रदेश राज्य के बुनियादी ढांचे, मानव संसाधन, रोजगार और आर्थिक विकास को नई ऊर्जा प्रदान करेगी। इसके बदौलत सहकारी सिमितियों का क्षेत्रीय विकास की परियोजनाओं में अहम योगदान होगा जो स्थानीय अर्थव्यवस्थाओं की प्रगति में हमारी महत्वपूर्ण भूमिका को दर्शाएगा।

एक अन्य महत्वपूर्ण बात यह है कि भारत सरकार द्वारा तीन लाख करोड़ रुपये की राशि "नारी शक्ति" पहल के तहत आवंटित की गई है। यह पहल नारी को सशक्त बनाने की सरकार की प्रतिबद्धता को स्पष्ट रूप से दर्शाता है। इससे महिलाओं में नेतृत्व विकास की क्षमता को बढ़ावा मिलेगा। कामकाजी महिलाओं के लिए छात्रावास और क्रेच की सुविधा भी होगी। महिला स्वयं सहायता समूहों का गठन होगा, महिला उद्यमियों की बाजार तक पहुंच बढ़ेगी, मुद्रा लोन की सीमा में वृद्धि होगी और राज्य सरकारें महिलाओं द्वारा खरीदी गई संपत्तियों पर स्टांप शुल्क कम करने के लिए प्रोत्साहित होंगी जो सहकारिताओं में महिलाओं को और सशक्त करेंगी। यह सभी कदम महिलाओं में नेतृत्व क्षमता को बढ़ाने और उन्हे अपने व्यवसाय का विस्तार करने के लिए और सक्षम बनाएगा।

इस तरह से बजट 2024-25 सशक्त सहकारी आंदोलन के लिए मंच तैयार करता है और 'सहकार-से-समृद्धि' के दृष्टिकोण को साकार करता है जो पूरे देश में सतत विकास और समावेशी विकास को बढ़ावा देता है। हम सभी इन महत्वाकांक्षी लक्ष्यों को प्राप्त एवं साकार करने के लिए भारत सरकार के साथ मिलकर कार्य करने के लिए प्रतिबद्ध हैं।



Budget 2024 on **Implications of Union** Indian **Cooperative Movement**

The Economic Survey 2023-24, reviewing the state of the economy of the country, was placed in the Parliament on 22nd July 2024 by India's Finance Minister Smt. Nirmala Sitharaman. The report took special note of the status of ongoing cooperative revamping in India. The report also has acknowledged 'Farmer Producer Organizations', the alternative form of cooperative business entities. The survey states that the 'cooperatives are vital in aggregating produce, enhancing bargaining power, and ensuring better market access to small and marginal farmers, thereby preventing exploitation by middlemen and traders. Further, the report highlighted the role played by the Dairy cooperatives, PACS, tribal and other cooperative societies.

The report specifically mentions micro irrigation projects, banking and financial inclusion measures, input distribution such as fertilizers, and value addition of agricultural produce. The survey brought out the status of multi-state cooperative societies in India and the recent developments of organizing National Cooperative Exports Limited (NCEL), Bhartiya Beej Sahakari Samiti Limited (BBSSL) and National Cooperative Organics Limited (NCOL). The survey envisions that 'the new cooperatives seek to promote exports, facilitate access to improved seeds under a single brand name, and work toward the production, distribution, and marketing of certified and authentic organic products. The report further states that the 'grain storage programme, which will be the world's largest decentralized storage program, is planned in the cooperative sector to ensure food security and reduce wastage'.

The Finance Minister, in her budget speech, stated that the government would bring out a National Cooperation Policy for the systematic, orderly, and all-round development of the cooperative sector. Fast-tracking the growth of the rural economy and generating employment opportunities on a large scale will be the policy's goal. Further, she promised that the government would promote Farmer-Producer Organizations, cooperatives, and start-ups for vegetable supply chains for collection, storage, and marketing. The budget focused on the development of four castes, namely 'Garib' (Poor), 'Mahilayen' (Women), 'Yuva' (Youth), and 'Annadata' (Farmer). It is implied that the implementation of schemes to empower those four castes is possible mostly through collectives.

The Parliament has also passed the Finance (No. 2) Bill, 2024, moved by the Finance Minister. With respect to income tax to be paid by the Cooperatives, the bill states that for all cooperative societies, except those whose income is taxable under section 115BAD or section 115BAE of the Income-tax Act. a tax rate of 7% on income tax is levied if the total income exceeds one crore rupees but does not exceed ten crore rupees. Moreover, a tax rate of 12% on income tax is levied if the total income exceeds ten crore rupees.

Moreover, several aspects of the 2024 budget are designed to benefit the common man and will significantly impact the economy. government has correctly identified the following four sectors that require considerable attention. Cooperatives can serve as a crucial tool in addressing them and meet their needs.

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


Figure: Four Identified Castes in the Budget (24-25), Gol

Addressing first Identified Caste: The Poor

The main driving force here should be to bring them out of the menace of poverty and hunger. Cooperatives could be instrumental in making basic necessity like food, shelter and clothing available to them. The existing system of public distribution in the nation is mainly rooted through cooperatives. By strengthening the cooperatives, the government can distribute food grains and other basic goods effectively. It will be a win-win situation for both the cooperatives and the marginalized sections of India.

The second major announcement of the Finance Minister is that 'under PM Awas Yojana Urban 2.0, housing needs of 1 crore urban poor and middle-class families will be addressed with an investment of ₹10 lakh crore'. The housing cooperative societies can play a vital role in availing funds from the government and construct houses for the identified beneficiaries. For clothing, the government should

leverage weavers' cooperatives by training weavers (with the budget providing for the skilling of youth and women) and establishing a sustainable network from cotton production to garment marketing.

Addressing Second Identified Caste: The Women

The second group identified by the Government of India for focused attention is 'Indian Women.' The budget allocates over ₹3 lakh crores schemes benefiting women and girls, promoting women-led development. This demonstrates the government's commitment to enhancing women's role in economic development. Their empowerment is supported through self-help groups and joint liability groups. Additionally, the budget allocates funds for Small, Micro, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs), and the limit for Mudra loans has increased to ₹20 lakhs.

In this context, the cooperative sector should respond proactively to implement these schemes through cooperatives. Cooperatives specifically registered for women's development, such as Women Welfare Cooperative Societies (of which there are 25,092 according to the National Cooperative Database), have the potential to access these funds for their development. To start with, MSMEs and women's cooperatives can utilize the finance minister's promise to organize women-specific skilling programs and promote market access for women-led SHG enterprises.

Addressing Third Identified Caste: The Youth

The third caste is youth. The youth who hesitate to join cooperatives should be sensitized, their skills developed and avenues should be explored for their meaningful employment in the cooperative sector. The National Council for Cooperative Training and the universities offering cooperation as a degree or diploma programmes can very well use this opportunity to undertake skill training programmes and help the youth start cooperative enterprises. Further, the youth, particularly the gig workers can start platform cooperatives to systematize their collective efforts. Through these measures, employment can be generated, and labour exploitation can be eradicated.

Addressing Fourth Identified Caste: The Farmers

The fourth and most important group are the farmers. The government's vision of doubling farmers' income is achievable by increasing their production and productivity. Organic produce will fetch premium prices and profits for Indian farmers. Farmers should be provided with credit and other inputs like fertilizers and pesticides through cooperatives.

achieve social justice comprehensively, а saturation approach will be adopted to cover all eligible people through various programs, including those for education and health, to empower them by improving their capabilities.' In this direction, the Ministry of Cooperation, Government of India, has given much attention to reorienting the functions of PACS

and upgrading them as multi-service centers. Moreover, schemes for fishermen development and animal husbandry will strengthen the rural economy.

Thus, it can be concluded that the budget allocates significant resources for the advancement of agriculture, rural development, youth, and women. The creation of a dedicated Ministry for the

cooperative movement highlights the government's commitment to this sector. It is now crucial for the National Cooperative Policy to be announced to provide a clear framework for future initiatives. NABARD is preparing an action plan to implement these policies effectively. Strengthening cooperative education and training, establishing a cooperative university, and expanding degree and diploma programs in cooperation agribusiness will develop a skilled pool of youth to drive cooperative enterprises. A proactive stance from cooperative federations in securing government funds and engaging actively in the food chain, both domestically and internationally, will enhance the role and influence of cooperatives in the economy.

Union Budget FY-25 and the Cooperative Sector: Key Reflections

Union **Budget** FY 2024-25 highlights continuance of the spirit of the Interim Budget presented by the Union Finance Minister in February 2024, before the commencement of elections. The budget lavs emphasis on growth momentum, productivity enhancement and employment generation with a sense of fiscal prudence, policy continuation and no-political-popularism. direction of achieving the esteemed goals of "Viksit Bharat", the Union Finance Minister has underlined nine priorities of the Government. namely, Productivity and resilience Agriculture: Employment & Skilling; Inclusive Human Resource Development and Social Justice; Manufacturing & Services: Urban Development; Energy Security; Infrastructure; Innovation, Research Development and the Next Generation Reforms. It is pertinent to deliberate upon these priorities with specific focus on the likely direct or indirect impact of the new initiatives being perceived by the Government of India in respect of various sectors

of the economy under this Annual Budget.

In the Agriculture Sector, the emphasis is on research enhancing crop productivity and for development of climate resilient crop varieties; as many as 109 new high-yielding and climate-resilient varieties of 32 field and horticulture crops will be released for cultivation by farmers. For further promotion of natural farming, 1 crore farmers across the country will be supported by way of certification and branding of their naturally grown crops, in the next two years' period. For this purpose, 10,000 need-based bio-input resource centres will be established. For achieving selfsufficiency in pulses and oilseeds, a strategy shall be put in place for enhancing their production, improving storage-infrastructure and enlarging the marketing network, particularly for mustard, groundnut, sesame, soybean, and sunflower. Similarly, for promoting higher production of vegetables,

large scale clusters will be developed closer to major consumption centres; Government will promote Farmer-Producer Organizations (FPOs), cooperatives and start-ups for vegetable supply chains with focus on an efficient infrastructure for collection, storage, and marketing of vegetables. For creating an efficient digital public infrastructure (DPI) for agriculture, the Union Government will implement various projects in association with the State Governments for coverage of as many as about 6 crore farmers under the "Farmer and Land Registry", along with the Kharif Crop Survey in about 400 districts using the DPI so created.

The Budget speaks of a special focus on Shrimp Production & Export for which financial support will be provided through NABARD for setting up a network of Nucleus Breeding Centres for Shrimp Broodstocks. These initiatives shall introduce a substantially enhanced potential for investment in the cooperative sector,

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opening up greater opportunities for the cooperative financial institutions by way of enhanced credit demand for both the production and the investment credit purposes the new crop varieties, vegetable production, pulses and oilseeds, natural farming produce and the infrastructure. The agricultural demand for the geographical areas covered for these initiatives shall have to be given a special treatment by the rural cooperative financial institutions as against the uniform yardstick adopted by them under the normal crop loan system for the district as a whole prevailing in the rural cooperative banks as of now.

Rural financial cooperatives will need to mobilize significant additional financial resources to meet the demands of grassroots cooperatives. This can be achieved through improved low-cost deposit mobilization strategies and by enhancing their ability to borrow from higher financing institutions. This need arises in the context of declining deposit growth rates across the banking sector in recent years. The Kisan Credit Cards shall also have to be reviewed so as to accommodate these new avenues of credit demand. Further, the PACS shall have to be enabled to get a link with the 'Farmer and Land Registry' for real time linkage of the farm holdings with the land records of PACS members. The financial cooperatives will have to upgrade themselves on their operational technology systems to take the best advantage of the initiatives under the digital public infrastructure for agriculture. As the cooperative is the oldest form of collectivisation of farmers, yet the new generation formats like the Farmer Producers' Organisations, Joint Liability Groups etc. are posing a formidable challenge to the cooperatives; hence. better coordination а would have to be ensured by the cooperative institutions with the agriculture departments in various States for taking a greater share of

the new initiatives.

heartening to note the announcement by the Union Finance Minister about the new National Cooperation Policy for systematic, orderly and all-round development of the cooperative sector. Fast-tracking growth of rural economy and generation of employment opportunities on a large scale will be the goal of the new National Cooperation Policy. While the contours of the Policy shall be known within a short time after its publication, the Cooperative Sector has to galvanise itself in advance for taking the best advantage of the new initiatives unfolding under this Policy.

second priority of the Government about the is **Employment and Skilling.** The Government has announced a couple of incentives for enhancing both the employment and skilling. The cooperative sector is one of the largest employers in the rural sector and a large number of backlogs is in existence in various cooperative institutions at different levels across almost all cooperative sub-sectors. It is high time that the cooperative institutions took a thorough review of their Human Resource Policies in respect of meeting the shortage of the manpower with an optimum cost burden and increasingly larger adoption of technology driven work systems, taking due advantage of the new initiatives of the Government for increasing the employment opportunities. This will have to go hands in hand with the review of the Human Resource Training and Skilling Policies both at the entry level as also the periodical skilling and re-skilling strategies. Adequate support will have to be considered for upgradation of the existing training and capacity building infrastructure and its appropriate enlargement in a phased manner to meet the emerging demands of the training, skilling and capacity building of the human resource in the emerging competitive scenario in various sectors of economy, more

so with respect to the cooperative financial institutions.

The Ministry of Cooperation will have to take adequate initiatives to ensure that the policy and strategy document of Government of India for the employment and skilling for implementing the budget proposals has a fair amount of consideration of the requirements of the cooperative sector and, at the same time, align the cooperative institutions with the intent of the Government of India in this regard.

Linked to the aforesaid priority on the employment and skilling is the priority relating to Inclusive **Human Resource Development** and Social Justice. Cooperative Sector by its concept itself is wedded to the cause of inclusive development and social justice. The Union Finance Minister mentioned that the Government is committed to all-round, all-pervasive and allinclusive development of people, particularly the farmers. youth, the women and the poor. Further, it is mentioned that the implementation of schemes meant for supporting economic activities by craftsmen, artisans, self-help groups, scheduled castes, schedule tribes, women entrepreneurs and street vendors will be stepped up. The cooperative institutions have to step up their all-round participation implementation of various schemes for all these sectors of economy. Moreover, a Plan for the all-round development of eastern region of the country covering, inter alia, various components of human resource development, infrastructure, and generation of economic opportunities is to be formulated by the Government. Even though the cooperative sector has not witnessed appropriate growth and development in the eastern part of India, it has to be emphasised that the cooperatives cannot remain oblivious of the new initiatives to be rolled out for development of this part of the country, nor the proposed plan can ignore the potential of the cooperative sector in development of the Rural Eastern India. Therefore, the cooperative leadership must debate thoroughly upon the possible role of the cooperative sector in this Plan and work out appropriate suggestive strategy for consideration of the Ministry of Cooperation for its inclusion in the Plan of developing the eastern part of India under the banner of "Purvodaya" as envisaged in the Budget document.

The priorities in Manufacturing & Services sector envisage a substantial support for promotion of Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs), particularly the labour-intensive manufacturing, coverina financing, regulatory changes and technology support to help the MSMEs grow and also compete globally. The measures regarding the financial aspects include a Credit Guarantee Scheme for MSMEs in the Manufacturing Sector, new assessment model for MSME credit, a new mechanism for facilitating continuation of bank credit to MSMEs during their stress period, enhancing the limit of Mudra loans to ₹20 lakh from the current ₹10 lakh for those entrepreneurs who have availed and successfully repaid previous loans and enhanced scope for mandatory on-boarding in Trade Receivables Discounting System (TReDS) for facilitating MSMEs to unlock their working capital by converting their trade receivables into cash. Further, the financial support for setting up of 50 multi-product food irradiation units in the MSME sector and for setting up of 100 food quality and safety testing labs with National Accreditation Board for Testing and Calibration Laboratories (NABL) accreditation will be facilitated. These measures shall offer additional opportunities for setting up of MSMEs by the industrial cooperatives as also the enhanced scope for better quality financing by the financial cooperatives to individual MSME units. The MSME portfolio of most of the financial cooperatives is quite limited as of now; however, these

cooperatives need a substantial and carefully crafted growth of their rural MSME portfolio, more so related to the agro-processing and agricultural inputs and implements related MSME units. To further prop up the basic infrastructure in manufacturing sector, the budget proposals include promotion of Rental Housing with dormitory type accommodation for industrial workers in Public-Private Partnership (PPP) mode with viability gap funding (VGF) support and commitment from anchor industries. The industrial cooperatives with a substantial work-force may take advantage of promoting such residential units in their premises or nearby locations for use by their residential purposes rather than investing in creation of their own housing buildings. Further, the financial cooperatives having a housing loan portfolio may look for participating in financing of such projects in cooperative sector and otherwise; they will have to make room for such lending in their housing loan policies with the approval of RBI as the rental housing is not permissible to them as of now.

Under the priority on **Urban Development**, the Government proposes, among other important measures, a high priority to the Urban Housing sector. With a target of facilitating around one crore families under the PM Awas Yojana Urban 2.0, the investment of around Rs 10 lakh crore including the central assistance of Rs 2.2 lakh crore is envisaged for over the next 5 years' period. A provision of interest subsidy to facilitate loans to the eligible families at affordable rates is also being considered. This offers an opportunity to the housing construction cooperatives to participate in this growth story. Also, the financial cooperatives must find an enhanced scope for their housing loan portfolio. The Urban Development priority also includes bankable projects for Water Supply and Sanitation that will include use of treated water for irrigation and filling up of tanks in nearby areas. The financial cooperatives, especially the State Cooperative Banks (StCBs) and the capable District Central Cooperative Banks (DCCBs) may find scope for participation in the consortia of banks that may be created for financing of such large projects.

Under the priority on **Energy** Security. the Scheme of PM Surva Ghar Muft Bijli Yojana for installing rooftop solar plants has been highlighted apart from various other initiatives. It has to be examined as to whether the Primary Agricultural Credit Societies as also other functional cooperative societies in far-flung areas could also be included as beneficiaries under this Scheme: the branches of DCCBs as also the Cooperative Agricultural and Rural Development Banks (CARDBs) in such areas could also be included for this purpose. If not, then the Ministry of Cooperation may be requested to intervene and formulate a similar scheme with appropriate financial support for the ground level cooperative institutions. The StCBs and DCCBs as also the CARDBs may consider their own schemes for financing of such solar energy units by the users both at individual family as also the institutional level. The alternate sources of energy are surely going to be a major source of energy in near future and the cooperative financial institutions have to gear up themselves to utilise the emerging potential demand for credit under this sector.

The Infrastructure continues to be a high priority area for the Government as the investment in basic infrastructure goes a long way in spurring the growth of all sectors of economy. Apart from a large-scale public sector investment, both by the Central Government and the State Governments, a high proportion of private sector investment is also envisaged through viability gap funding, promoting enabling policies and regulations as also a marketbased financing framework. The Union Finance Minister has laid emphasis on Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana (PMGSY), Irrigation & Flood Mitigation and Tourism apart from the ongoing areas of roads, ports, airports, multimodal communication and social infrastructure as also the critical infrastructure for manufacturing and services sectors. The infrastructure development shall reauire substantial amount of non-budgetary financial resources at various levels for Government as also the private infrastructure developers. Cooperative Financial Institutions should find a way for participation in the consortia led by the commercial banks and financial institutions for supporting these infrastructure finance requirements. construction sector cooperatives also need to gear up themselves to participate competitively in infrastructure development story of the country.

The last two priorities enlisted by the Union Finance Minister in her Budget Speech relate to the Innovation, Research & Development and the Next Generation Reforms focussing on Economic Policy Framework, land-related reforms, Labour related reforms and Capital and entrepreneurship related reforms etc. The government will create taxonomy for climate finance to boost capital for climate adaptation and mitigation, supporting the country's climate goals and green transition. These measures shall go a long way in stepping up the development and economic growth opportunities in the years to come for building Viksit Bharat. The theme and intent of these reform measures need to be imbibed by the cooperative sector also as this sector may not remain oblivious of the wave of institutional reforms envisaged by the Government in the Budget Document. The cooperatives leadership should come forward for initiating an appropriate dialogue for futuristic integrated reforms in each sub-sector and segment of the cooperative sector that may be driven by the New National

Cooperative Policy and the ongoing effort of the Government under the theme of 'Next Generation Reforms', especially for adoption of evolving operational technology and digitalisation by the cooperative institutions of all kinds.

The Budget Document lays down substantially enhanced financial allocations for meeting the goals each of the nine priorities discussed in the previous paragraphs. Happily, the budget allocation for the Ministry of Cooperation has been enhanced by 58.20% from Rs 7 billion in 2023-24 (RE) to Rs 12 billion for FY 2024-25. Evidently, a large chunk of this enhancement shall be going for the developmental initiatives for strengthening the cooperative sector.

Ending Remarks

The Union Budget 2024-25 lays down a comprehensive charter development growth, renaissance of the national as also the local economy across the length and the breadth of our country. Apart from various other important aspects, the Budget places a lot of importance to the investments linked with a substantial financial support as also the institutional strengthening and reforms so necessary for the objective of Viksit Bharat. The cooperatives constitute a widespread institutional infrastructure for financial growth of the rural economy of our country. These institutions are at a crossroad in their endeavour to reform themselves to match their capabilities to the requirements of the evolving economy in a futuristic scenario to serve the Rural India based on its natural expectations. Historically, the Cooperatives have been in the reactive and compliance mode, responding to what has been prescribed for them. There have been very little proactive efforts and initiatives emerging from within the cooperative sector. This mindset has to be shelved with and

the cooperatives need to adopt a pro-active approach imbibing the signals emerging from the evolving socio-economic environment of the country. As evident from the Budget Speech of the Union Finance Minister, the new National Cooperation Policy is to be rolled out soon. But the Budget has given a lot of signals within the nine priorities set out for the Government over the years to come by. The cooperatives need absorbing these aspects to learn about the potential available for their growth, realise the threats emerging in the evolving economic space and, accordingly, lay down an appropriate path for their moving ahead.

lot of strategic. moral. operational, technology and financial support shall be needed by the cooperative sector from the external environment in their pursuit of strengthening, restructuring and reforming the entire sector over a period of time. However, it should be appreciated that this would be possible only when the cooperative sector stands on its own feet and proves its worthiness for such external support. The Ministry of Cooperation is a strong pillar of strength for the cooperatives in entire country, but the National and State level Cooperative Leadership and Institutions must rise to the occasion the cause and come out with a series of documents specifying their action plan and the support needed by them. The role of the Ministry of Cooperation shall be very important in this regard for providing adequate support to the cooperatives from the Governments at National and State levels and to get the cooperatives included in various support measures rolled out in the Budget. Yet, the role of the Cooperative Leadership is greater to keep the flag of the cooperative ethos and values high in the coming years.

Cooperatives, Farmer- Producer Organizations and **Start-Ups for Strengthening Vegetable Supply Chain**

"Large scale clusters for vegetable production will be developed closer to major consumption centres. Cooperatives, FPOs and start-ups will be promoted for vegetable supply chains including for collection, storage, and marketing", announced Hon'ble Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitaraman in her budget speech this year. As per ICMR recommendations for a 2000 kcal intake a day, people should eat about 250 grams of cereals, 400 grams of vegetables, 100 grams of fruits, 85 grams of pulses/eggs/flesh foods, 35 grams of nuts and seeds, and 27 grams of fat/oils. This clearly highlights the importance of 'Vegetables' in human nutrition. As much as importance the vegetables have in a human food plate, more important become its supply chain. Ironically, vegetable supply chain has its own limitations until affirmative efforts are being made to make this supply chain efficient. Price volatility, demand-supply mismatch, perishable nature of products, poor transportation infrastructure for and storage, post-harvest losses and long chain of intermediaries

are the well-known problems of the vegetable supply chain. Addressing these major problems with proper solutions and schemes will turn out to be a commendable work if implemented properly.

Why Cooperatives and FPOs?

The big institutions like Indian Farmers Fertilizer Cooperative Limited (IFFCO). Krishak Bharati Cooperative Limited (KRIBHCO). Anand Milk Union Limited (AMUL), etc. are the best example of the success stories in cooperative sector. As per the cooperative structure in India, a good number of cooperatives at the state level, like urban cooperative banks, primary agriculture cooperative societies at the village level, fishery and other forms of cooperatives are making unwavering efforts to improve the status of the people in the rural as well as urban areas. Cooperatives have enormous potential of solving the problem of unemployment by skilling people in the field of horticulture, more particularly in post-harvest operations. Cooperatives are meant not to eliminate commission agents but also control the ecosystem activities through laying down community guidelines and also offering an alternative channel of sale for the cultivators. Co-operatives also have a strong element of trust within the organization which is one of the highest social values needed to run an organization successfully.


cooperatives played important role in horticulture sector by providing marketing and distribution network along with credit and inputs to the farmers, which supplemented the efforts of the state and private sector. The National Cooperative Development Corporation (NCDC) is a organization in the country which is meant for promoting, developing financing post-harvest activities through cooperatives in agriculture and allied sectors. Due to realization of its enormous potential for socio-economic upliftment of its members and overall community. the cooperative sector in the country has developed fast..

A new Ministry of Cooperation under the Government of India has been recently established to provide a separate administrative, legal and policy framework for strengthening the cooperative movement in the country. The vision statement of this Ministry is 'Sahkar Se Samriddhi' (Prosperity from cooperation). This Ministry through various initiatives is working hard to strengthen the cooperatives at the grassroot level. It is streamlining processes for ease of doing businesses for co-operatives and enabling the development of Multi-State Co-operatives (MSCS).

Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) play a pivotal role in transforming the landscape of Indian agriculture. They serve as a vital bridge, mobilizing and uniting small and marginal farmers, and enabling them to operate within a businessoriented framework across the entire agricultural supply and value chain. This collective approach not only enhances the economic standing of individual farmers but also contributes to the overall sustainability of agriculture in India.

Vegetable Supply Chain and its Volatility

Vegetable supply chain involves a set of activities starting from production to distribution, bringing the vegetables to the market and eventually, to the consumer. It encompasses stages such as production, processing, and storage, transportation, distribution. Further, in the journey from farm to fork, there are several stages where products are lost within the supply chain. Following is the typical Vegetable Supply Chain prevalent in India.



Insufficiently ventilated trucks and inadequate packaging methods are major problems during the transportation of harvested goods. The absence of essential components like reefer trucks and cold storage facilities further adds to the problem within the supply chain.

Vegetable inflation has trending up with more frequent spikes in recent years mainly driven by a supply-demand mismatch. Total losses on account of harvesting, packaging, transporting, storage and marketing remain significant and high, in the range of 4.9-11.6 per cent for various vegetables as per the NABCONS study in 2022. Such losses put further pressure on the supply and availability of vegetables for final sale and consumption.

Tomatoes, onions and potatoes (TOP) are the most consumed vegetables in India and make up more than a third of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) vegetables category. Hence, any sharp movement in TOP prices influences the movement in CPI vegetables inflation. For instance, during fiscal years 2020-23, vegetable inflation surged to 5.7 per cent from nil in the preceding four fiscal years, driven by a sharp rise in TOP inflation to 9.1 per cent. With the price fluctuations in TOP "Operation Greens" was announced on the line of "Operation Flood", with an outlay of Rs.500 crore to promote Farmer Producers Organizations (FPOs), agri-logistics, processing facilities and professional management.

How Collectives Can Contribute to the Cause: Way Forward

Developing large scale clusters near the consumption centres can bring down transportation costs and postharvest losses. The fresh roduce can reach consumers, improving quality and reducing waste. Large clusters can also achieve economies of scale, making production more efficient and cost-effective, leading to higher productivity and profitability for farmers. Focus also is required on increasing food processing capacities and value addition in value chain by creating firm linkages with identified production clusters. In addition, enhancing value realisation of farmers by targeted interventions to strengthen production clusters and FPOs, and linking/connecting the farmers with the market., are also important. Promoting FPOs and cooperatives can enhance collective bargaining power, improve access to inputs and technology, and facilitate better market linkages. FPOs and cooperatives can play a crucial role in value addition and processing. Start-ups in the agricultural sector come up with innovative solutions in the areas of precision farming, supply chain management, and direct-to-consumer models, leveraging technology to enhance efficiency, transparency, traceability. Enhanced efficiency and reduced wastage can also contribute to better profitability. With improved infrastructure and organized supply chains, the quality of vegetables can improve, and their availability can be more consistent throughout the year.

Conclusion

government's vision developing vegetable production closer to consumption centres and promoting FPOs, cooperatives, and startups for efficient supply chains is likely to benefit both farmers and consumers. These initiatives can potentially lead to increased farmer incomes by reducing intermediaries and improving market linkages, ensuring farmers receive a higher share of the final market price.
